Key Advantage Update

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Virginia will begin mailing PCP confirmation letters to each employee and retiree enrolled in the Key Advantage program. You should expect confirmation during the last week of August. The purpose of these letters will be to ensure that the records received by Blue Cross/Blue Shield accurately reflect your PCP selection.

If you have selected a PCP, and/or if you have selected a PCP for any covered dependents, the letter will identify the physician who has been selected as the PCP for each covered person. You will need to review the PCP information for accuracy. If the information is correct, you do not need to take any action. If any information is incorrect, you will need to complete a new PCP selection form, and submit it to Rita Metcalfe, Benefits Administrator, Thiemes House, ext. 13158.

If you or any covered person have not selected a PCP prior to when the confirmation letters are sent, the letter will state that no PCP has been selected. The letter will include a reminder that to receive the highest level of benefits, each covered person must select a PCP. Once you submit a completed PCP selection form, you will receive another letter from Blue Cross/Blue Shield confirming your selection. See list of PCP physicians in the area on p. 2.

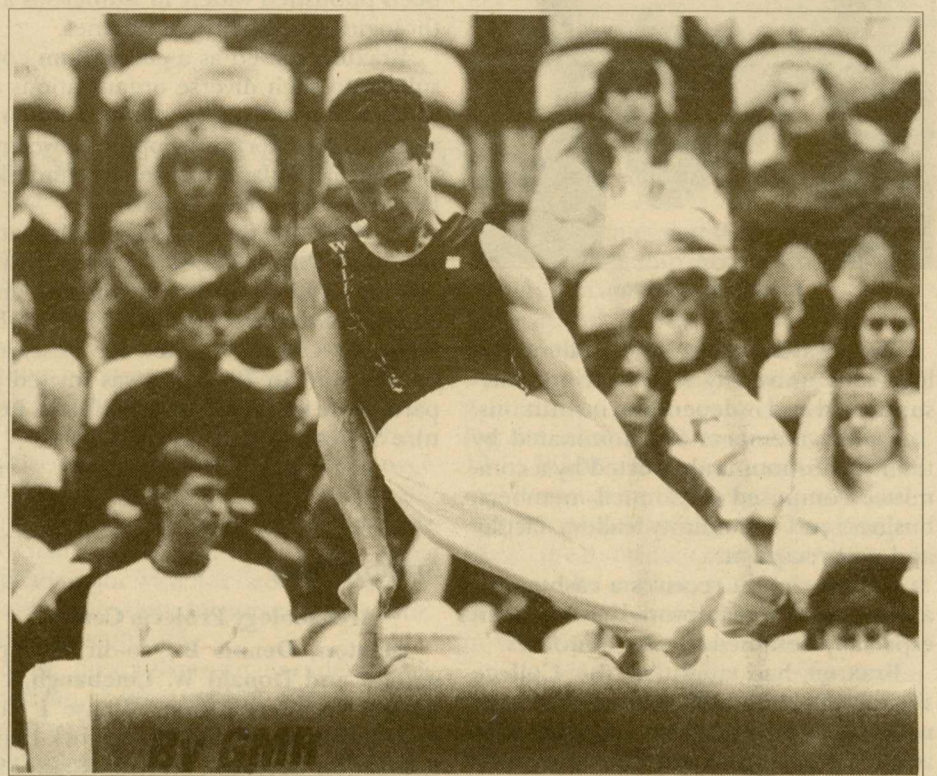
The library is missing more than 175 books, videotapes and other materials. Some items have been out for more than three years.

Swem Library Acquires Dryden First Edition From W. Melville Jones Bequest

Swem Library, through a bequest from the estate of W. Melville Jones, the College's first Vice President for Academic Affairs and Chancellor Professor of English, Emeritus, has acquired a first edition of John Dryden's play *Don Sebastian* (1690).

John Dryden (1631-1700), a Restoration poet, wrote "Don Sebastian" following the Glorious Revolution of 1688 in England. This play is said to be his best dramatic performance. His tragedies give a vigorous utterance, one authority noted, of a rather cynical view of life and are unrivaled as tragedies. Poet laureate under King James II, he was not in favor of the assumption to the throne of King William III and Queen Mary II, and this play reflects his sentiments. He was ac-

claimed during his lifetime, and his versification served later as an inspiration to Thomas Gray and Alexander Pope.

This copy of Dryden's play is bound with two other plays: John Crowne, "The Destruction of Jerusalem" (first edition, 1677), and Nathaniel Lee, "The Massacre of Paris" (first edition, 1690). This copy formerly belonged to James Earl of Barrymore whose bookplate is affixed to the inside cover.

Dr. W. Melville Jones' field was early English literature, and University Librarian Nancy Marshall, noted that it is fitting the book chosen in his memory should be a work of one of the early eminent English writers of the 17th century.

Joanne Braxton Wins SCHEV Award

Joanne M. Braxton, Francis L. and Edwin L. Cummings Professor of American Studies and professor of English has been selected by the State Council of Higher Education for Outstanding Faculty honors.

The awards recognize excellent college and university faculty from state-supported and independent institutions.

Faculty members are nominated by their institutions and selected by a committee composed of Council members, business and community leaders, faculty and past recipients.

Each recipient receives a cash award and a crystal art sculpture that has been especially designed for the honorees.

Braxton has taught at the College since 1980. Her fields of interest include major American authors, creative writing, black literature and American autobiography.

An accomplished poet, Braxton is the author of a collection of poetry, *Sometimes I Think About Maryland*, (Sunbury Press, 1977); and *Black Women Writing Autobiography: A Tradition Within a Tradition*, published by Temple University Press (1979). She is also co-editor with Andree Nicola McLaughlin of *Wild Women in the Whirlwind: Afro-American Culture and the Contemporary Literary Renaissance*, published by Rutgers University Press (1990) and simultaneously by Serpent's Tail Press, London, England. This work won the 1990 Koppelman Book Award.

In 1986 Braxton received the College's highest faculty honor, the Thomas Jef-

erson Teaching Award. She was named an Alumni Fellow in 1988. Braxton is Commonwealth Center Scholar-in-Residence and has received a summer research grant from the College.

Braxton wrote the introduction to *The Work of the Afro-American Woman* (1894) by Gertrude B. Mossell, published by The Schomburg Library of 19th Century Black Women Writers (Oxford University Press, 1988). She is currently at work on a new edition of *The Complete Poems of Paul Lawrence Dunbar*, to be published by the University Press of Virginia; and the first modern publication of Frances Kemble's *Journal of a Resident on a Georgian Plantation 1833-1839*. Her poetry has been published widely in numerous anthologies and literary magazines.

Braxton served as a curriculum consultant to such diverse organizations as Medgar Evers College of the City University of New York and Sophie Newcomb College of Tulane University, and the Portsmouth Public Schools.

In 1984, she was an NEH Fellow at a seminar for college teachers titled "Women's Literature and Culture," and a Mellon Scholar/National Fellow at the Wellesley College Center for Research on Women. In 1990 she was invited to participate in the Feminist Scholars' Lecture Series at Yale University.

Karen Dolecki of the video services department is one of five volunteers to win the Outstanding Leader awards from the American Lung Association of Virginia.

Outstanding Leader Awards recognize those individuals who have do-

nated at least \$1,500, directly or through in-kind services, to ALAV in the past year. Dolecki has been an active ALAV supporter. She has participated as a rider or volunteer on each of the seven Colonial Virginia Bike Treks. For the past two years, she has received recognition as a member of the Trek's Winners Circle for top fundraisers.

In 1991 she produced a videotape of the previous year's Trek and coordinated the videotaping of the 1991 event.

Dolecki said she got involved with ALAV because her former boss John Sherman was an enthusiastic volunteer. She found she enjoyed cycling, but her off-the-job assignments as an MBA student at William and Mary don't leave her much time for cycling now, she says.

ALAV is the oldest voluntary health agency in Virginia. Founded in 1909 to combat tuberculosis, the association today fights lung disease through education and research.

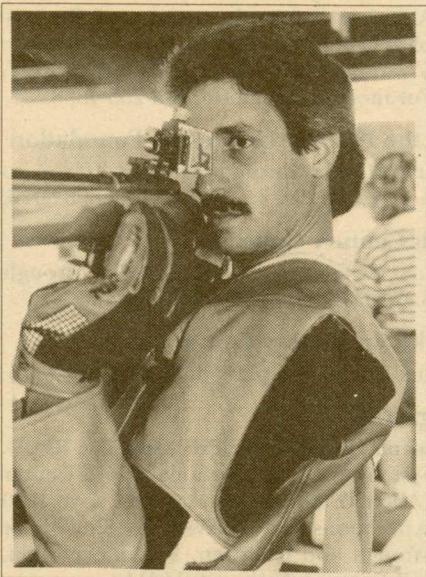

Foth Wins Medal In Barcelona

Persistence paid off for Bob Foth '80. One of the premiere shooters in the world for the past decade, the former William and Mary math major and riflery coach won an Olympic silver medal in the three-position rifle event in Barcelona, July 31.

As a student, Foth led one of W&M's finest ever riflery squads. In 1979-80 the Tribe went 11-1, defeating traditionally powerful teams like N.C. State and Penn State. The W&M riflemen won the prestigious Southeastern Invitational Tournament, dethroning perennial champ N.C. State. Foth and teammate Rich Jones were qualifiers for the NCAA Finals as well as the Olympic tryouts. ... Foth competed in Seoul in 1988 finishing fourth in the air rifle event. He finished seventh in this event at Barcelona.

Gymnastics Team Boasts Scholar-Athletes, ECAC Championship

William and Mary gymnastics team, with a 3.38 grade point average, has been declared for the second year in a row the national academic team champion for men's gymnastics by the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches.

Behind W&M for honors in the top 10 were Kent State, Cornell, Cal-Berkeley, Ohio State, Nebraska, James Madison (6), New Mexico, MIT and UCLA. The only Virginia team in the second 10 was Radford (16).

"All in all it was a fantastic year for our team as we broke the all-time W&M team scoring record with a 273.80 total on our way to winning the ECAC Championship," reports Coach Cliff Gauthier.

The team finished the season with its 18th straight victory in the state championship. Four gymnasts—Lance Hoffman, Rick Mansfield, Marc Lim and Randy Jewart—earned individual academic all-American honors.

Two seniors, just missed the 3.5 gpa

cut off for academic all-American. Dan Krovich had a 3.49 and David Williams had a 3.46. However both are well set for the future as they will be attending Johns Hopkins next year. Dan graduated with highest honors in chemistry and will receive \$14,000 a year plus free tuition to do research while working toward a Ph.D. in pharmacology. David has received over \$20,000 in scholarships to attend medical school. Randy, who broke the state floor exercise record with a 9.6, is an English major who has been accepted at Boston University to pursue his artistic talents in sculpture.

Marc, now a three-time academic all-American, broke W&M's all-time high bar record this year with a near-perfect 9.75 score. This summer, Marc, an international studies major, worked in Japan as part of W&M's intern program. He may return to Japan to study after he graduates, as he has already received re-

gional recommendation for a prestigious Rotary Scholarship. Marc also serves as a Presidential Aide.

Rick and Randy now have become two-time academic all-Americans. Rick is a biology/pre-med major who just missed a 4.0 due to one A- each semester. During the season Rick moved into the top 10 in W&M's all-time records on pommel horse and in the all-around. Lance, a junior and a biology/pre-med major, like all the individual academic All-Americans in the nation, had a perfect 4.0 grade point. He moved into fourth place in W&M's all-time rings records.

The team will open its next season Jan. 16, at the Navy Invitational. Its first home meet will be Jan. 24 against Pittsburgh. The team will also meet James Madison March 10 at home. The 1993 season doesn't have many home meets because of tercentenary celebrations that are scheduled in William and Mary Hall.
