W&M Homecoming Has Something For All

After last year's incredible success, all alumni from the College of William and Mary are invited to participate in the second annual Saturday Night Bash—the crown jewel event of Homecoming Weekend 2008.

This weekend, alumni from around the globe will make their annual pilgrimage back to their alma mater to celebrate and reconnect with their classmates, and get to know their College all over again with events like the annual Homecoming parade, the Homecoming football game—which pits the Tribe against Rhode Island—and much more.

Among those returning from abroad to attend Homecoming and reunion events this weekend is Harshad Daswani, a 1998 graduate, who lives and works in India. If you see Daswani, you might want to ask him how he enjoyed his 11,000-mile journey from Bombay to the College, a place so different from where he lives, but so dear to his heart.

"The classroom experiences gave me the skills I needed to develop myself and my business so that is foremost," says Daswani. "But I miss the people. I am in touch with a large number of professors and friends that I made there."

"I miss the 'silent moments' after a hard study session or a group meeting that ended late, I would like to sit by the Sunken Garden or perhaps near Swem and Barksdale and let the day sink in. I miss Lake Matoaka and the U.C.'s mozzarella sticks—which I ate too much of."

Since the first Homecoming on Oct. 23, 1926, the Alumni Association has hosted the annual reunion for generations of W&M alumni, family and friends. The first Homecoming football game was played against George Washington University and the Tribe was victorious, winning 14-0 at old Cary Field. Since that first Homecoming, the alumni ranks have grown to over 82,000 living alumni and the College has become one of the world's leading public universities and among the best universities in the United States.

The Alumni Association expects thousands of alumni, students, faculty, administrators, parents and friends of the College to participate in this year's 82nd anniversary celebration of Homecoming at William and Mary.

Sadlers to Officiate at Homecoming Parade

This year's Homecoming will be different for Sam Sadler '64, M.Ed. '71 and Mary Liz Smith Sadler '65. This trip down Duke of Gloucester Street will be one perhaps of relaxation, remembrance and revelry for Sam, because for the first time in 41 years, he won't be calling the shots. On June 30, Sam retired from the place he has worked and loved for so long.



Sam's tenure at the College started in 1967 and ended with a ceremony renaming the former University Center in his honor. The new Sadler Center is a testament to Sam's dedication to the College over the years, and one way for the William and Mary community to say 'thank you' to the former vice president for student affairs. Riding in a convertible as the most honored guest in the 2008 Homecoming parade is another way.

"I found it hard to believe that 41 years, make that 45 if you count my College days, had passed so very quickly," said Sadler. "Perhaps that's a sign that I have had fun in the time that I have spent here."

Sam's reputation with the students has become the stuff of legend, and before his official retirement, they held a rally—complete with balloons and banners—just to share with him how much of an impact he's had on their time at the College.

"I think I speak for everyone when I say that we will all dearly miss Mr. Sadler," said Nick Faulkner '08. "He has been a father, administrator and friend to so many of us."

The parade will start on Saturday at 9:30 a.m. near the corner of Duke of Gloucester and Botetourt Streets. It will then proceed down Richmond Road past the Alumni House to Brooks Street and end at William and Mary Hall.

Board of Visitors Names W. Taylor Reveley III 27th President

W. Taylor Reveley III was named the College of William and Mary's 27th president during a special session of the College's Board of Visitors. Reveley had been serving as the College's interim president since February 2008.

"After several weeks of discussion with the William and Mary community, it became apparent that Taylor Reveley is the right person for this campus at this time," the College's Rector Michael K. Powell said in an announcement. "The challenges that the College is facing need immediate attention from a strong, committed leader. Moreover, in our judgment the College would benefit from an extended period of stability. Taylor is already providing the leadership and vision necessary to move the College powerfully forward in the face of those challenges. We celebrate the good fortune of having Taylor Reveley and we know he will make an excellent president."

Before taking the interim position eight months ago, Reveley had served as dean of the William & Mary Law School for nearly a decade.

"It has been wrenching to leave the country's oldest law school," Reveley said, "but the privilege of helping to lead one of our country's great universities is enormous. I deeply appreciate the faith placed in me by the Board of Visitors and by the people of William & Mary writ large. Helen and I have been truly touched by the support we've received from all corners of the William &

Mary community. It has become clear that we are all stewards of an extraordinary place."

Reveley has worked quickly to build relationships across the College community and beyond. He has spent a good portion of his first eight months on the main campus meeting with students, faculty and staff; in Richmond, working with the governor and members of the General Assembly; and on the road, discussing the future of the College with alumni and donors. Reveley also quickly identified critical needs in the College's financial resources and began to communicate the need for increased private giving to support William and Mary's people and programs. Reveley has also begun development of a new strategic planning process for the university—the first since 1994.

Reveley comes to the College's top post with a wealth of experience in both leadership and academia. He practiced law at Hunton & Williams in Richmond for 28 years and was a managing partner of the international firm for nine years. Reveley is a trustee emeritus of Princeton University—where he served on the board for 14 years—and is a current trustee of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the Virginia Historical Society, and St. Christopher's School. Reveley's scholarship credentials are also well known. He has extensively studied and written about the constitutional division of the war powers between the president and Congress. Reveley's *War Powers of the President and Congress—Who Holds the*

Arrows and Olive Branch? has been one of the leading books on the subject for 25 years. Recently, he served as co-director of the National War Powers Commission, a bipartisan group headed by former U.S. Secretaries of State James Baker and Warren Christopher.

Reveley received his bachelor of arts degree from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs in 1965. At Princeton, he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. Reveley received his law degree from the University of Virginia Law School in 1968. During the United States Supreme Court's 1969 term, he clerked for Justice William J. Brennan, Jr.

He and his wife, Helen, have four children and a daughter-in-law.

The William and Mary Alumni Association will announce the results of the election for its Board of Directors during the Annual Meeting at 4 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 23, in Family Circle at the Alumni House. All alumni are encouraged to attend. Board members must be active alumni, having donated to one of the recognized funds of the Alumni Association or the College. Each new member will serve one four-year term, starting in March 2009. The Board of Directors is responsible for developing policy and steering the course of the Alumni Association. Gift From Class of 1983 Tops \$1 Million

They have good reason to celebrate—and so does the College. During Homecoming 2008, which takes place Oct. 23-26, nine classes from 1963 to 2003 will gather on campus for their class reunions. The Class of 1959 will return in spring 2009 in celebration of their 50th reunion. In addition to reconnecting with classmates, the reunion classes pull together for another reason: making a difference for the College.

Reunion gifts provide William and Mary with expendable resources, which allow the College to meet daily operating expenses as well as direct funds where they are needed most—providing everything from research opportunities to improvements to facilities to funds for study abroad.

"These gifts make an impact at the College every day," says Sean Pieri, vice president for development. "Our alumni are key partners in moving the College toward an extraordinary future."

The Class of 1983 is making an impact in a big way—exceeding its original class gift goal of \$750,000 and exceeding their stretch goal of \$1 million—with \$1.019 million raised toward unrestricted gifts and pledges to the Fund for William and Mary as of Oct. 14.

Tim Dunn '83, a member of the William and Mary Board of Visitors, is co-chairing the 25th reunion gift committee with his wife, Ellen Stofan '83, and classmate Peter Atwater '83.

"We felt that the school really needed to go to a higher level and raise the bar and start reaching for bigger numbers," said Dunn. He added that he has gotten the impression that a \$1 million target for a 25th reunion gift is relatively moderate compared to peer institutions. The committee has also identified groups within the class—from fraternities and sororities to dormmates to athletic teammates—to rally them behind the overall cause.

"I think if you can make it more personal and capture those memories that speak to 'what the school really did for me,' it's a good way to get people to participate," Stofan says.
