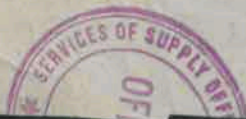

The following is an extract from instructions received from the Surgeon General of the Army concerning length of service:

"Reserve nurses assigned to active service during war will be expected to serve as long as they may be needed. A nurse who desires relief from active service may apply therefor by letter to the Surgeon General, through the proper channels, stating her reasons in full. If these reasons are sufficient in the judgment of the Surgeon General her request may be granted. Return transportation will not be authorized to nurses who have served less than one year, unless the need for their services ceases to exist, or to those who are discharged for misconduct. A nurse who is found to be unsuited for the service, physically, professionally or temperamentally will be furnished transportation to her home for relief from active service, without regard to length of service."

While, during your assignment to duty you will be under military authority instead of the Red Cross, we shall follow your work with the greatest interest through your efficiency reports which will be sent to the Surgeon General's office each month. HEADQUARTERS SECOND DIVISION (REGULAR)

AMERICAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCES.

France, november 11, 1918.

ORDER

1. An armistice between the Allied nations and Germany has been signed and hostilities ceased temporarily at 11:A.M. today.
2. It is fitting that the great part played by the 2nd Division in bringing about this momentous victory over a redoubtable foe, should be recounted at this time.
3. At the end of May the enemy broke the Allied lines on a wide front west of Rheims and reached the Marne near Chateau Thierry, the safety of Paris and the Allied armies itself was at stake. At this critical hour the 2nd Division was deployed to meet the foe. It stopped the advance, drove him back, and it demonstrated for all time that the American is second to none in valor, in endurance and in grim and unyielding determination to conquer.
4. Again on July 18th during the last great enemy offensive, the 2nd Division after a night of unparalleled difficulty, stuck near Soissons, the flank of the enemy salient? penetrated his lines and brought his offensive to a standstill. This was the beginning of the Allied offensive, which has continued unceasingly and untiringly, until today.
5. On September 12th to 15th the American army fought its first battle in France, under American leadership, to the 2nd Division, was assigned the most difficult and important task, the capture of Thiaucourt and the Jaulny-Xammes ridge. It reached its second days objective on the first day, drove off the enemies counter-attacks and clinched the victory.
6. In the Champagne district, October 2nd to 10th, it fought beside the fourth French Army. On the 3rd of October it seized the Mont Blanc ridge, the keystone of the arch of the main German position advanced beyond the ridge and although both flanks were unsupported, it held its gains with the utmost tenacity. Inflicting tremendous losses on the enemy. This victory freed Rheims and forced the entire German Army between that city and the Argonne Forest to retreat to the Aisne, a distance of 30 kilometers.
7. During the later part of October the Division was ordered to join the 1st American Army, for the great attack of November 1st. It was given the post of honor and led the advance. It drove through the enemies fortified lines to a depth of over nine kilometers, seized the heights of Bayonville and destroyed the enemy division on its front. On November 3rd, it advanced to Fosse, and attacked and captured the heights of Vsux.
8. At night it pressed forward through the forest of Valval by a single road and occupied the ridge near Beaumont. On the night of the 4th, it again attacked and advanced its lines to the Meuse. Finally on the night of the 10th it forced its way across the Meuse and seized a commanding position on the eastern bank.

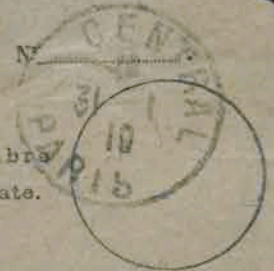

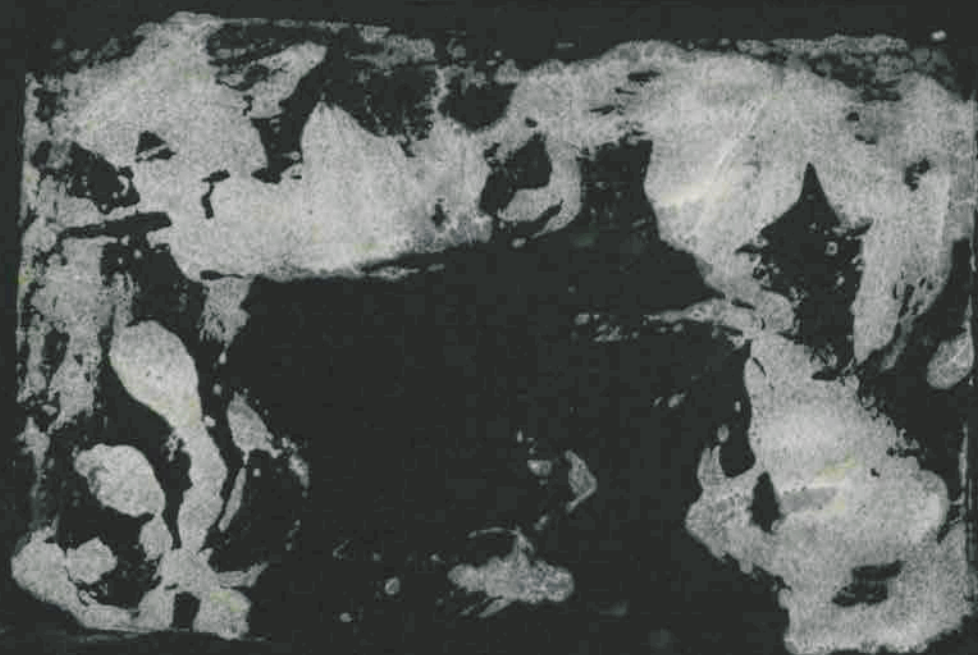

## 500 WAR VETERANS MAKE BONUS CLAIM

American Legion Officers  
Assist Applicants in Pre-  
paring State Blanks.

### GREAT SPEED SOUGHT

More than 500 Michigan ex-service men were at the Armory Saturday taking advantage of the assistance given them by Phillips-Elliott-Hodges Post, American Legion, in preparing the application blanks for the state's \$15 a month war bonus. Blanks have been received here and are being called for by the men rapidly. It is the desire of Legion officials to get them all made out as rapidly as possible.

The blanks contain spaces for copies of the man's discharge and the enlistment record that goes with it, and it is necessary that every man have his discharge in order to make out the blank properly. Besides the information contained on the discharge other information, comparatively simple in their nature.

In order to take care of the men applying for the blanks the armory will be open week days from 8:30 to 5:30 o'clock as well as Saturday afternoons and Monday evenings. If the number of men calling is such as to make it necessary the Armory will be kept open every evening.
