

Camp Pennally town near Washington City D.C. January 3rd 1862

Dear Ma & Pa

With pleasure to me I take my pen in hand to inform you that I received your kind and always welcome letter dated Dec 39th and I assure you I was glad to hear that you was in the enjoyment of good health as this leaves me at present thank God.

Dear Ma I will not write you a long letter for I have no news to tell you of onley I passed a very good Christmas and New Year all though I am in the Tented Field surrounded by my companions in arms and fighting for a cause which I think just and Holy. For as our Four Fathers framed the Constitution headed by such men as George Washington & Thomas Jefferson so let it be the laws must and shall be obeyed. As yet we have had no engagement with the enemy but yesterday we received orders to have two days rations cooked and be prepared for a march and up to this time the order has not been countermanded but I do not think we will march and if we do we will not be in the battle for we are the Second Reserve. Dear Ma your kind and always welcome letter will cheer me on to do my duty not onley to my Country (which God knows I love) but to those I have left behind me. You state you are glad that I have the good will of my Company Ma I will speak candidly and I hope sincerely I have the good will of every man Officers and all in my Company there is nothing that lays in their power but they would do for me but who have I to thank for it but my Parance God Bless them. You speak of John Hall looking so bad I am sorry it is so for John has shode a brotherly feeling towardest me and to repay him for it I have arranged things so that he can draw in every two \$15.00 of my pay commencing in March the thing is so arranged that let me be taken prisoner but God grant I may never be for I would drudg at one than to be a Prisoner in the hands of the men we are fighting against he can draw this money we will git two months pay in corse of a week or so - Then I will try and come home and if envy

can git-a Ferlough I can Ma to tell you how much I am beloved
in the Company Although I did not hear it untill to day the
Boys collected \$24.00 last pay day and then they laid it over to this
Pay to make me a present of a Gold Watch what think you of
that - Ma you can trace though the annals of history and you will
find nothing like that - And Ma shoud not I ought to feel
proud of it - Ma although I am a little higher than a private
but still I do not consider my self better than one but Ma ^{when} comd
the Chickens before they are hatched

Give my love to All my Brothers and Sisters Tell them I wish them
all well I wrote a letter to Thomas but whether he received it or not
I can not say you can look for me about 3 or 4 weeks to see you if
nothing happens to detain me so rest assured I will take care of my
self untill then So thanking you for wishing me a happy New Years
and hoping this will find you all in the enjoyment of good health
as this leaves me at present I will bid you Good night and God
Bless you all

I will bid you good night as it is 12 O'clock and after my
hard days work I will close Oh I for got to tell you that
one of the Boys received a bose and I helped him to eat a Chicken
