Four mile Tree. August 9. 1807

I received Mr. Anderson's and Jane the latter you may tell that in a few days she shall have a long letter from me also Mr. Anderson. I am very sorry to hear Christian has been so sick since his my departure do give my love to her if she is not gone home. I should write her but do not know whether she will be at Williamsburg. I now not in what terms to express my dear Sarah, the delight I feel on my new visit for I never in my life saw so amiable a family, Sally and myself do nothing but walk about the place, we went night before last a rading and stayed in about an hour. I have written a long letter to Mr. Anderson this morning and shall send both his and yours by mail. Tell Mrs. Anderson that she need not send me any more shifts as I think I have got as many as I shall want here. If Mrs. Anderson had not put the letters to Papa and Mr. Anderson in the post office do pray put her in mind of it and have it sent as you readily as I want them to go out I sent a copy of the of your servant. There has been a great deal of company here since we came then and I expect we shall have company and I shall go out for all next week. I have had tea ought once since I came and did spend the evening quite agreeably at Mr. Coche's about two miles from this. I often
