

§2.1-344.1.D. - At the conclusion of any executive or closed meeting convened hereunder, the public body holding such meeting shall reconvene in open session immediately thereafter and shall take a roll call or other recorded vote to be included in the minutes of that body, certifying that to the best of the member's knowledge (i) only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements under this chapter, and (ii) only such public business matters as were identified in the motion by which the executive or closed meeting was convened were heard, discussed or considered in the meeting by the public body. Any member of the public body who believes that there was a departure from the requirements of subdivisions (i) and (ii) above, shall so state prior to the vote, indicating the substance of the departure that, in his judgment, has taken place. The statement shall be recorded in the minutes of the public body.

COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY HONORING HERBERT FRIEDMAN DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY

Herbert Friedman completed his undergraduate studies at Brooklyn College and received his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Connecticut. He began teaching at William and Mary in 1963 as an Assistant Professor. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 1967 and to Professor in 1973. On 8 October 1996 Professor Friedman died following a brief illness.

During his thirty-three years at William and Mary, Professor Friedman was known for his patience, wit, and congenial personality. His expertise was in comparative psychology, learning, statistics, and experimental design. He taught the department's core courses---Introductory Psychology, Elementary Statistics, and Research Methods--to many psychology concentrators. He was a member of the American Psychological Association, Eastern Psychological Association, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Psychonomic Society, Sigma Xi, and the Virginia Academy of Science.

Professor Friedman served on the College Committee on Animal Research. During his eight years as a member of the Assessment Steering Committee's General Education Subcommittee, he was instrumental in developing the Historical Knowledge Test which was administered in October 1990 to members of the 1991 graduating class. A subsequent Cultural Knowledge Test was administered to alumni who volunteered to take the test during the Tercentenary Weekend in October 1993. The test was also given to entering students in 1994 and 1995 during Freshman Orientation. Professor Friedman wrote the first Psychology Major's Handbook in 1992 for sophomores considering concentrating in psychology. This handbook has been a valuable tool for students and faculty members, and it has served as a model for other departments that have published handbooks for their majors.

Professor Friedman demonstrated a commitment to undergraduate education through the generous amount of time he spent talking with advisees about their curriculum or future plans. His interest in preparing students for learning extended to his work with high school students and the Head Start program. He was dedicated to serving the larger student population, particularly those who did not have access to resources or funding. He co-authored a book, *Doing Your Best on the SAT*, for college-bound high school students to help them navigate the SAT test through improved understanding of the test and test-taking strategy.

As chair of the Psychology Department from 1988-94, Professor Friedman served with innovative and compassionate leadership. To his many colleagues, Professor Friedman was a valued and trusted friend and colleague. As adviser, committee member, senior faculty member, and departmental chair, he helped shape the improvement of William and Mary during his long service.

COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY RESTRUCTURED DEGREE PROGRAMS WITHIN THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

The College's Strategic Plan, Into the Fourth Century: A Plan for the Future of the College of William and Mary, charged the Dean of the School of Education to continue the restructuring already underway, further defining and sharpening the focus of the School and its academic programs.

Throughout the summer of 1995 and the subsequent academic year, Faculty in the School of Education engaged in a comprehensive review of the School's mission; academic programs, research and public service activities; student and faculty resources; organization and administrative structure; and alumni and development programs. Faculty sought input from students, alumni, practicing professionals, employers, and colleagues in the William and Mary community. They also consulted the professional literature and reviewed programs of exemplary peer institutions. Standing committees and program areas coordinated certain aspects of the review and made formal recommendations for Faculty action in accord with School of Education Bylaws.

Central to this restructuring plan is the consolidation and strengthening of academic program offerings at the graduate level. Currently, the School of Education operates four separate master's degree programs to prepare teachers for K-12 schools. The programs in elementary education, secondary education, gifted education, and special education have always been parallel in structure and requirements. Consolidation of these teacher education programs into a single unified master's degree will permit steamlining of enrollment procedures and course offerings. A redesigned foundations core and sequence of clinical experiences will strengthen the curriculum. Within the consolidated degree program, students will be able to pursue their specialized concentrations for teacher licensure. More extensive interactions of faculty and students across the specialization areas will enrich the program and prepare graduates to work together in school settings.

At the doctoral level, the School of Education has offered separate programs to prepare administrators for K-12 and higher education settings. To concentrate resources and achieve greater distinction, the restructuring plan calls for a merger of the doctoral programs in educational administration and in higher education into a single unified degree in educational policy, planning, and leadership. This restructured program includes a newly developed common core and an expanded research component. The School of Education seeks approval to offer the Ph.D. degree as an option for students who complete this enhanced program. The capacity to offer the Ph.D. as well as the Ed.D. will enable William and Mary to be more competitive with state and national peer institutions in the recruitment of students and employment of graduates. The doctoral program in counseling has also been restructured to include the Ph.D. option.

These curricular changes were approved by the School of Education Faculty in May, 1996, for incorporation into the restructuring plan. Faculty are now developing specific implementation plans and course syllabi for the restructured programs.

Upon recommendation of the Provost, the President recommends the following revisions for graduate degree programs of the School of Education:

Consolidation of four separate masters degree programs--M.A.Ed. in Elementary Education; M.A.Ed. in Secondary Education; M.A.Ed. in Gifted Education, and M.Ed. In Special Education--into a single degree with a new title--M.A.Ed. in Curriculum and Instruction.

Consolidation of two doctoral degrees--Ed.D. in Educational Administration and Ed.D. in Higher Education Administration--into a unified degree with a new title and a new Ph.D. option--Ed.D./Ph.D. in Educational Policy, Planning, and Leadership.

A title change and addition of the Ph.D. option for the remaining doctoral degree--Ed.D. in Guidance and Counseling to Ed.D./Ph.D. in Counselor Education.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Visitors approves the submission to the State Council of Higher Education of a proposal authorizing the College to revise the graduate degree programs of the School of Education as soon thereafter as feasible.



OFFICE OF INTERNAL AUDIT APPROVAL OF FIVE YEAR WORK PLAN

As provided in the Office of Internal Audit Charter, revised at the September 1996 meeting of the Board of Visitors, the Director is responsible for preparing comprehensive five-year and annual work plans based upon judgment and a risk assessment model. The Work Plan is a five-year schedule of projects for the Office of Internal Audit. The Plan is comprised of the following:

Administrative and Training (including professional development) comprises 19% of the Plan.

Annual Audit/Review Hours includes support for the Auditor of Public Accounts (APA); financial statement desk reviews; Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline; capital outlay and information technology reviews; and management advisory services. This category comprises 33% of the Plan.

The Risk Plan incorporates the numerous functions of the College not included in the Annual Audit/Review section and prioritizes them according to risk scores derived from our risk assessment model. Larger risk scores indicate more risk. This category comprises 48% of the Plan.

The 1997-2001 Work Plan has been reviewed by the Chairman of the Audit Committee, the President and Vice President for Management and Budget of the College of William and Mary, the President and the Dean of Administration and Finance of Richard Bland College.

RICHARD BLAND COLLEGE INTERNAL CONTROL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1996

Introduction

The ultimate responsibility for proper internal controls rests with management. Internal controls do not constitute or require separate systems within the agency but are and should be an integral part of each system an agency uses to operate its programs and functions. Controls are merely techniques or mechanisms installed in such systems to ensure that a specific purpose or objective is achieved. Controls are detective, corrective, or preventative and are intended to signal problems that may occur or may have occurred.

The State Comptroller has developed and published a standard approach to maintaining adequate internal controls that should assist institutions in establishing an adequate internal control policy and supporting administrative procedures. This standard approach is found in Section 10305 of the Commonwealth Accounting Policies and Procedures Manual and is the basis for the Richard Bland College Internal Control Study.

Approach

The first step in performing the internal control study was to segment the College into manageable areas or assessable units whose controls would be individually analyzed. This segmentation was determined along organizational lines and resulted in approximately 30 assessable units.

An initial self-assessment and more in-depth assessments by the Internal Auditor were conducted during the 1986-87 fiscal year. Assessments were based on questionnaires and interviews with responsible personnel and were conducted by the Internal Auditor and his staff. With the completion of those initial assessments, the College's plan requires assessment of 20% of the assessable units each year, resulting in a review of all units within a five year period.

Results

During the 1995-96 fiscal year, self-assessments were conducted for the units of Financial Aid, FAACS, Development, Financial Statements, Grounds and Food Service. Vulnerability ratings for the self-assessments ranged from 1.16 to 2.05, which indicates low vulnerability. It is important to emphasize that although the overall vulnerability ratings were low, there were several individual ratings where a high vulnerability score in a specific control area was offset by low scores in other areas.

The Internal Control Study for 1995-96 revealed no material weaknesses. As such, management can report that the internal control system in effect at Richard Bland College during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1996, taken as a whole, was sufficient to provide reasonable assurance that the objectives of internal control specified in the Comptroller's directive are being accomplished.

Funds may be expended for, but not limited to, the following purposes:

<u>Entertainment:</u> Used to pay for the entertainment of alumni, members of the community, friends of the College, faculty, administrative staff, other employees and students.

<u>Memberships:</u> Used to pay membership dues for various Collegerelated and civic organizations for the President and other professional staff members (i.e., Council of Presidents, Rotary, Country Club, etc.).

<u>Meetings:</u> Used to pay expenses not paid by State funds for meetings attended on State business or as a representative of the College.

<u>Miscellaneous:</u> Used to pay miscellaneous expenses for the President's House or expenses incurred for college business or community and/or social matters (i.e., Christmas cards, flowers, printing, framing, gifts, liquors, meals, etc.).

Internal controls are an integral part of an institution's accounting and administrative system that assist management in fulfilling its responsibilities by providing reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded from unauthorized use or disposition and that financial records are reliable. These controls enable management to prepare accurate financial statements and make meaningful decisions regarding the allocation of resources.

In accordance with the <u>Commonwealth of Virginia Accounting Policies and Procedures and Manual</u>, all offices considered to have a high risk assessment rating are required to have an internal control review. The following areas had a high risk assessment rating as determined by the Department of Internal Audit:

Grants Office
Payroll Department
Accounts Payable Department

In addition to the internal audits performed on departments with high risk assessment, an internal control survey was circulated to selected departments. This survey requested general information in ten areas of internal controls: general controls, cash disbursements, accounts receivable, inventories, fixed assets, payroll, personnel, purchasing, budget and financial planning, and cash receipts.

Results

For the areas which were reviewed, no material internal control weaknesses were found. Operating

1. Technology Staffing and Operations Support

\$300,000 GF 4.00 FTE

Between 1995-96 and 1997-98 the College will have invested approximately \$7.0 million in technology infrastructure including installation of a campus-wide high speed fiber optic network. This investment includes \$2.6 million provided by the Commonwealth through the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund for the purchase of both equipment and special purpose software to support enhancements to academic and administrative systems. Our progress in the restructuring of academic delivery, as well as re-engineering of administrative operations, is limited by the Commonwealth's 1996-98 technology initiative which provides only \$152,200 and no FTE support for information technology operations. This amendment would allow the College to add selected staff positions to support academic enhancements and administrative re-engineering provided for under our restructuring plan.

2. Academic Clusters (Environmental Sciences)

\$320,000 GF 3.00 FTE

The College's restructuring plan also identified establishment of "academic clusters" as a means of breaking down traditional departmental barriers and allowing the College to leverage its strengths by coordinating hiring, course offerings, and interdisciplinary support across departmental lines. These clusters will provide a structure that reflects a broader vision of institutional needs and areas of excellence than the narrower vertical lines typically associated with academic departments. Review of cluster reports by the College's Strategic Planning Implementation Committee resulted in a strong endorsement for implementation of an Environmental Sciences Cluster. Planning for this cluster is on-going with a goal of Fall, 1997 implementation. This amendment provides funding for this implementation.

3. <u>Institute for Teaching and Learning</u>

\$330,000 GF 3.00 FTE

The College has been ranked third in the nation, and highest among public institutions, in its commitment to undergraduate teaching. Recognizing this commitment, and the potential to transfer our success to other Virginia institutions, our restructuring plan proposes creating an Institute for Teaching and Learning. The Institute will serve as a state-wide resource by providing increased support for teaching and curriculum development as well as encouraging the development of new approaches to pedagogy and teaching evaluation.

4. <u>Economic Development--Business Forecasting</u>

\$200,000 GF 1.00 FTE

Funds are requested to support the acquisition of appropriate data bases for the Bureau of Business Research to reinstate and expand its economic forecasting modeling capability. This activity builds on the existing strengths of the Bureau consistent with the College's renewed commitment to support the economic development goals of the Peninsula Region and the Commonwealth.

5. Safety and Code Compliance

\$388,500 GF 1.00 FTE

The College's on-going facilities maintenance budget is required to absorb significant health and safety compliance expenditures in the areas of asbestos abatement, indoor air quality, hazardous waste disposal, fire safety, and occupational health and safety. This amendment establishes a base budget for these items allowing current funds to be used for buildings maintenance activities.

Capital

1. <u>Swem Library Renovation/Expansion</u>

\$ 24,550,000 GF 6,000,000 Private

This amendment requests funding for construction of the Swem Library Addition including a Special Collections Wing as well as the renovation of existing library space to create the Information Commons. This request reflects, and is consistent with, the planning appropriation provided to the College by the General Assembly during the 1996 session.

2. Renovation: Sir Christopher Wren Building

\$ 500,000 GF 3,500,000 Private

This amendment provides general fund support to allow the College to partially meet a \$1.0 million challenge grant from a private donor to address critical structural and foundation deficiencies in the Wren Building.

3. Construction: Environmental Field Station

\$ 1,500,000 Private

Consistent with the College's restructuring commitment to create an academic cluster as a means to leverage its campus-wide strengths in environmental science and policy, this amendment provides funding for construction of an environmental field station to support various environmental science cluster activities. The facility will include laboratory as well as faculty office and support space.

4. Renovation: William and Mary Hall

\$ 2,200,000 Revenue Bonds

This amendment supports critical improvements to William and Mary Hall including roof replacement/repairs and ADA access (elevator).

VIRGINIA INSTITUTE OF MARINE SCIENCE

1997 OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGET AMENDMENTS

Operating

1. State-Mandated Research

\$650,000 GF 12.00 FTE

As a result of general fund budget reductions in the early 1990's, the Institute became heavily dependent on indirect cost recoveries (IDC) for basic operating expenses. State policy states that these recoveries should normally be used for needed enhancements to institutional research programs. Rather than cut core research or advisory programs which are required by the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, the Institute currently uses IDC to support these programs. Funds are requested to restore general fund support for these state mandated programs.

2. Prior Commitment: Equipment Trust Fund

\$413,760 GF

Chapter 912, the 1996-98 Appropriations Act, provides for a comprehensive higher education technology package which includes \$79.3 million in new equipment through the Higher Education Equipment Trust fund and \$25.8 million for technology operating costs. This proposal requests funds to correct an error in the calculations used in this allocation.

3. <u>Toxicology Building Operating Costs</u>

\$138,573 GF (\$224,919) NGF

This proposal requests a general fund allocation for the operation and maintenance of the new toxicology/pathology research center. This action would bring the total funds to a more appropriate fund split reflecting the use of the facility and the availability of funds.

Capital

1. <u>Bulkhead Replacement: Wachapreague</u>

\$280,650 GF

This amendment requests funds to replace the dangerously deteriorated bulkhead at the Wachapreague campus on the Eastern Shore. The failing bulkhead is currently a threat to property and the safety of employees at the campus. This initiative also includes funds to stop the erosion taking place behind the bulkhead and to dredge the boat basin.

2. <u>Property Acquisition</u>

\$542,200 GF

This initiative requests funds for the acquisition of two pieces of property adjacent to the VIMS main campus which are currently on the market.
