

William & Mary Faculty Survey: Report of Findings

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Overview

The William & Mary implementation of the Ithaka S+R Local Faculty Survey was launched on March 31, 2014, and was closed to new responses on April 28, 2014, with a total of 284 complete responses. The survey covers many scholarly research and teaching-related topics, overlapping with several iterations of the Ithaka S+R U.S. Faculty Survey. The questionnaire covers topics in several key areas, including: how scholars discover materials for research; faculty members' use of varying types of formats; the ways faculty members' access content; their data preservation and management behaviors and needs; expectations regarding undergraduates' research skills; faculty members' research dissemination practices and attitudes; and the role of the library in supporting faculty members' needs. The following report provides a high-level overview of findings from the W&M faculty survey.¹

Details

All 926 W&M faculty members received an email invitation to participate in a survey about the impact of electronic technologies on their research and teaching. Three email reminders were sent before the close of the survey. In total, 385 respondents clicked the survey link (about 42% of those who received the email invitation), with 365 of those starting the survey (about 40%), and 284 of those respondents completing the survey, for an overall response rate of about 31%. Due to the survey flow and skip patterns, not all W&M faculty respondents received every question in the survey.

How to interpret the findings

For each question in the W&M faculty survey, this document provides a graph and table of overall responses. Responses are generally grouped together into categories for questions where respondents are asked to respond on a 1 to 10 scale. We report on responses in three categories: 1-3 (strong negative response), 4-7 (moderate or indifferent response), and 8-10 (strong positive response). Questions that use a 1-6 scale, and their responses are similarly grouped into categories: 1-2 (strong negative response), 3-4 (moderate or indifferent response), and 5-6 (strong positive response). Title pages provide information about survey flow and contingent items, which signify that a question was only presented to those who satisfied a condition in their response to another question.






















