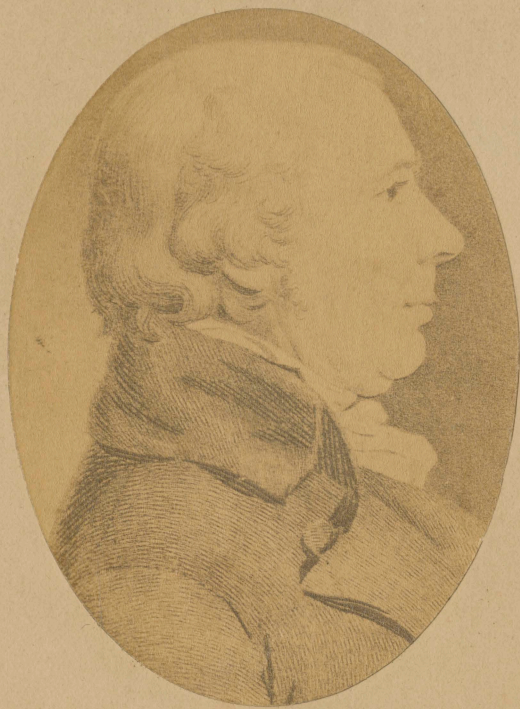

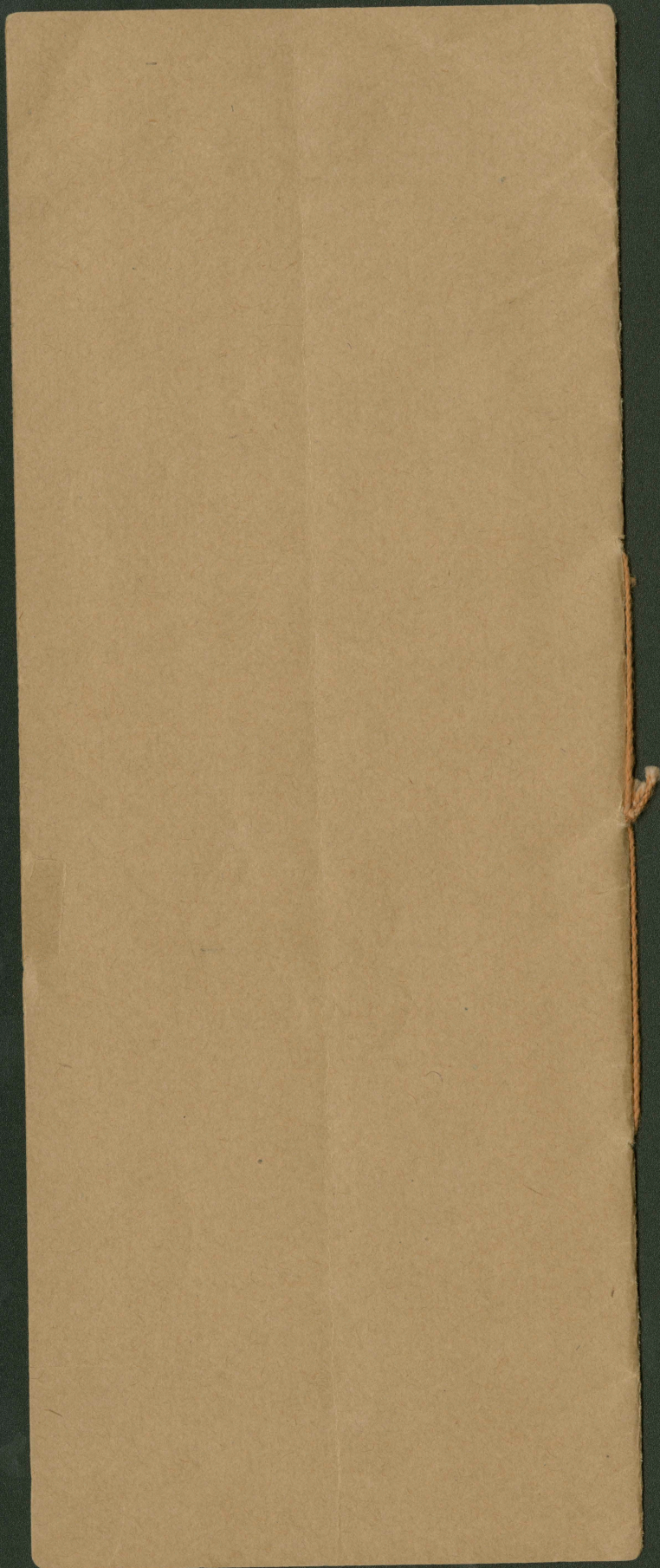
"Col. Leven Powell was a man of much distinction having been a Colonel in the Revolutionary Army in which he equipped and maintained at his own expense an entire troop. He was the founder of the Federal Party in Loudoun County, a member of the First Continental Congress, and a close personal friend of General Washington. Col. Leven Powell planned and built the turnpike leading from Georgetown, D.C. to Louisville, Ky. which passed through Middleburg, his home. His residence on the outskirts of Middleburg was known as "The Hill" and there he kept open house and lavishly entertained all the celebrities who came to Virginia."

## Amory Houghton.

Mr. Amory Houghton, a well-known manufacturer of this city for many years past, died at his residence, No. 259 Sixth avenue, on Monday last, aged 70 years. He was born in Bolton, Mass., August 26, 1812, and while a young man learned the trade of carpenter and builder, which he pursued with much success in Cambridge, Mass., for a long period. Later on he established a wharf in that city, where he carried on a large business in coal, wood and lumber. He relinquished this enterprise in 1852, and shortly before that, in 1851, built the Union Glass Works, of Somerville, Mass. He managed this institution for thirteen years, or until the year 1864, when he bought the glass works in Atlantic avenue, near the South Ferry. He continued in charge, and was the proprietor of that establishment for a period of four years. In 1868, on account of the high price of coal in the cities of the Atlantic seaboard, he removed the business of glass making to Corning, N. Y., but in 1872 returned to Brooklyn and reconstructed the works at No. 55 Atlantic avenue, which he subsequently rented out to the numerous factories in the neighborhood requiring steam power. Mr. Houghton was respected for many excellent social qualities and distinguished for his commercial activity and energy. He was a member of the Prospect street Congregational Church of Cambridge. He leaves three daughters and three sons. His funeral will take place from his late residence, No. 259 Sixth avenue, to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Dr. Theodore L. Cuyler will officiate.—[Brooklyn Daily Eagle.

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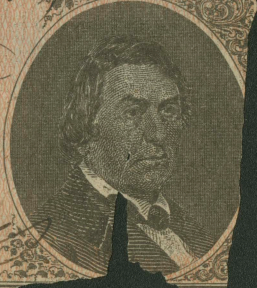

Professor Harry F. Ward, of Union Theological Seminary, and Secretary of the Methodist Federation for Social Service, has made the country indebted to him for "The Gospel for a Working World," just published by the Missionary Education Movement.

One of the significant chapters in the book is that which deals with the attitude of labor toward the Church and toward religion, and which indicates the spiritual needs of both capital and labor.

In every discussion of the relation of men to men, it is essential that we place men in the proper relation to things and that we never subordinate the individual to the material. The great frontier of Christianity now is the frontier of industrial life. The book is a stirring challenge for the Christian forces of the country to extend their lines into this new territory.

"Ancient Peoples at New Tasks," written by Willard Price, editor of "World Outlook," has the splendid graphic style of his magazine. In several fascinating chapters the new industrial movements sweeping through the Orient, South America and Africa are vividly described.

The sketches that are given us by Mr. Price are such as will be of interest to the general reader who wishes to know of the changing life of the world in an industrial age; at the same time the book is so arranged that it can be used in discussion groups by the multitudes of people who desire to study systematically the relations of Christianity to the world's workers.

ried John Hepburn, son of the mentioned Thomas Hepburn, the youngest son, Sewell Hepburn, father of the present Rev. Sewell Hepburn.

On June 23, 1918, one hundred and forty-five years after the induction of Rev. Richard Sewell as rector of Shrewsbury Parish, his great-grandson, Rev. Sewell Stavely Hepburn, held his first service as rector of Shrewsbury Parish. The blood of four old church families—Hepburn, Stavely and Redgrave—flows in his veins, and he bears the name of them. The Sewells alone are now extinct in Kent; the Stavelys are still here united with the adjoining parish, now united with Shrewsbury under its present rector.

Thus his name restores to the three of these old families, so closely connected with its early history. May we not hope this year an auspicious future to Shrewsbury and I. U. Parishes!

The Rev. Dr. Hepburn was graduated at Washington College, Chestertown, Md., in 1864, and was a student here during a period when I was a young instructor in the college, so that I have had long knowledge of his character and virtues. In 1917, while I was still President of the Board of Rectors and Governors, the old college honored itself by conferring upon him one of the few degrees of Doctor of Divinity, which it has bestowed during the long life of one hundred and thirty-seven years.

He received his theological education at the Virginia Theological Seminary.
