"Between 1646 and 1668 four brothers, who were grandsons of the Earl of Bothwell, emigrated to this country. One settled in Virginia, one in Pennsylvania, and two in Maryland. These two were James and Joseph. Joseph died leaving no family. James patented land from the Lord Proprietor, all of which has been sold or alienated from the family except a small farm at Still Pond. On the farm which was sold is situated the burying ground, in which lie buried all the Hepbrons who died in the county previous to 1829 and some since. James married late in life and left an only son. Thomas (1st), who, when he was getting old, married a Miss Wilkerson and left an only son, also Thomas (2nd). Thomas (2nd) married a Miss Sewell. and had children, Thomas, Nancy, Sally, and John and Joseph. Thomas (3rd) married Miss Duyer and had one son, Thomas, and two daughters (Ann and Elizabeth). This Thomas was called Branch Tom because he lived by a big Branch. He married Elizabeth Wilson and had four sons, William Thomas, George, John and James. John (son of Thomas 2nd above) married 1785 Mary Stavely, dau. John and Mary Redgrave Stavely, by whom he had twelve children: Colonel Tom, Nancy, Elizabeth, Joseph, James and John (twins), Samuel, Mary, Cassandra, Sewell and William."

Sewell Hepbron got this data from his uncle, Thomas (2nd), "who, if living, would be 135 years old", (b. 1741); book published 1876. "He has been dead 45 years. He had old family jewels which descended to him as oldest male heir. The Hepbrons were peaceful, quiet people, they did not hold public office, and had evidently outlived the spirit which caused their ancestor, the Earl of Bothwell, to be banished for complicity in the murder of Lord Darnley, husband of Mary Queen of Scots, whom he married after divorcing his wife. Rev. Sewell S. Hepburn of St. Paul's Parish (son of Sewell Hepbron, who contributed the account in "Old Kent"), married Selina Lloyd Powell, dau. of Charles Powell of Alexandria, Va., and had (1876) two children."

It was Mrs. Torsch's uncle who was known as Branch Tom, and was the father of Wm. Thomas, George, John and James, all of my day. Wm. Hepburn of Lynch has just passed his 86th year. I am the next oldest and will be 81, in June. Miss Martha Sutton, the sister of Mrs. Torsch, was the earliest of my teachers.
