Jan. 15. 1852

My Dear Col:

My desire to part with the Kentucky land increases daily. Some inquiries have been addressed to me, but nothing of a definitive character has transpired - and without the employment of some agency I fear that it may remain on hand for some time. It has occurred to me therefore that it would be judicious to employ Mr. Prentiss, the Broker, to look into the matter and ascertain whether any thing can be done in New York. From his reluctance to have a finger in the business he may see an opportunity to sell which is unknown to me. Will you then enquire of Mr. Stillwell as to his whereabouts and see him without delay. Of course I do not mean to impress him with continual over the subject, but mean simply to interest him to make inquiries and to report to me. If he can effect a good sale, I should not be disinclined to allow him a reasonable compensation.

I am now more getting along. Ely says, in more comfortable health than for the last two months, but still fears to venture

about much. I have procured the services  
of a nephew, a son of Doctor Tyler about my  
frown and shall in future exercise a more  
general supervision. This will enable me  
to devote more attention to my manuscripts  
and to complete a task which I have begun.  
Your mother is decidedly improving in health  
and I think the prospect of her entire restoration  
is better than it has been for 12 months. She  
however begins to cast her eyes to New York, where  
alone she seems content to be - well, it is natural  
that it should be so - it is her birth-place and  
besides possesses numerous attractions -  
Julia and the leaders of the Scotch class are  
getting on finely - I have my hands full  
in attending to the other children all of whom  
are well. No news - Our dead sea is never  
agitated by waves. The face of an oak or a  
towring pine, both children of centuries, some-  
times startles us, and that is all - we make  
ourselves compostable over large fires, and  
scarcely catch down the passing time -
