

Army Specialized Training Unit at William and Mary

Khaki-clad Youths Join Navy Chaplains

With the inauguration of classes on August 9, the 3321st Army Specialized Training Unit has taken its place on the campus of the College of William and Mary alongside the Naval Training School (chaplains). The college is one of 190 institutions participating in the program announced by the Army last summer, and about 500 men are now taking their specialized training at William and Mary.

The Army Specialized Training program has been devised to provide trained men for specific Army needs

and utilizes the facilities and faculties of selected colleges and universities for this purpose. Selection of the trainees are made by field selection boards from the men who have scored 115 or more in the Army General Classification Test. With few exceptions, the trainees are in the 18 to 22 age group.

At the College of William and Mary, the unit is housed on several parts of the campus. Brown Hall, formerly a women's dormitory, houses many of the



Alumni who have not visited the College in recent months would be surprised at the changes. Contrary to all expectations, there is no "man-power" shortage. The favorite spring fashion color on the campus was "navy-blue"; the leading fall fashion shade (in addition to navy-blue) is KHAKI.

William and Mary again, and for the eighth time in its history, is committed wholeheartedly to the war effort. The ASTU (Army Specialized Training Unit), more than five hundred strong, fills our class rooms, dormitories (even Brown Hall), the library and the cafeteria. We welcome these young men to William and Mary. We are glad to have them with us and we enjoy the lusty cadence of their marching songs as they go to and fro to classes and to mess. Also we are proud of the responsibility entrusted to us by our government in the training of this group.

Date of Opening of Fall Session Delayed-

The fall term of the 1943-44 session opened September 24, having been postponed a week later than previously announced, due to delays in construction work. The shifting of our facilities to definite purposes of the war has required many adjustments but the College has not abandoned the original purpose for which it was founded, and no opportunity is being neglected to prepare for a post-war future that will be entirely in keeping with the traditions of the past.

The Navy Sings-

Beginning September 26, there will be a series of six coast-to-coast CBS broadcasts from Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall at the College on Sunday, from 8:45 to 9:00 A.M., EWT. The program is entitled "The Navy Sings" and features the music of the choir of the United States Navy Training School for Chaplains which was commissioned at the College last spring.

No Homecoming Program—

THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE

The summer of 1943 has been one of the busiest in the annals of the College. In addition to a summer school enrolment of nearly 500 and The Navy Chaplains School of 300 officers, the College received during July a Specialized Army Training Corps of 500 cadets. During one brief period in the summer the College population totaled 1,300.

It is not possible to predict with accuracy the registration of the Fall term. The numbers in The Navy Chaplains School and the Army Corps unit will not vary, but the civilian enrolment will have undergone radical change. Owing to the transfer of Brown Hall to the Army the number of women students will decrease slightly. Instead of 700 women students there will be approximately 650. The civilian men's enrolment, however, will decline to about 250. Thus the total population of the College will stand at about 1,800, an all-time record.

Williamsburg is even more congested than a year ago. In fact, its population increase is larger than that of any community in Virginia, over 100 per cent. Consequently the College must depend entirely upon its own resources in caring for its students. Since the fraternities and sororities have abandoned eating tables for the duration, the dining hall is being converted into a cafeteria in order to service the anticipated congestion. Tyler Hall, the Morris House, and the Old Infirmary are being entirely renovated. The Morris House will be used to house new Faculty members since it is impossible to rent houses or apartments in Williamsburg.

In spite of all the confusion and turmoil of the past academic year the College finished the fiscal year with a modest surplus and was able to make slight reductions upon its indebtedness. If the College is able to avoid increased indebtedness during this difficult period it will be in an enviable position.

In spite of the War the College has been active in its devotion to a number of educational enterprises. The Faculty began an extensive survey of its library resources, and from this effort there will emerge a plan of library development that should serve the College for many years to come. In addition, through a grant from the General Education Board, the Library has been enabled to go forward rapidly with its new catalogue.

The Friends of the College, an organization whose members contribute annually one hundred dollars to the College, have set up a Memorial Book Shelf in honor of those whose lives have been lost in the present war. The funds thus made available will be used in the pur-



chase of recently-published significant books. Other donors have contributed individually to this fund. The Friends of the College have also undertaken to support financially the entire lecture and musical programs of the College, as well as the art exhibits.

Another valuable innovation has been the establishment of a library of musical records. These may be borrowed from the Library in the same manner as books by any undergraduate. Many of these records were given by students and faculty members in memory of two beloved teachers, Prentice Hill and Murray Borish. The College has also secured a large collection of high grade silent and sound films covering almost every educational field. These films will be used to supplement class-room instruction.

The College is most anxious during the war period to enlist the interest of as many Alumni as possible. Circumstances are such that many of the younger men have been forced to drop their memberships temporarily. This situation is inevitable in wartime and is common to all alumni societies. At this time, therefore, I am making a special appeal to the alumni not to allow their memberships to lapse, and furthermore I am asking each active member to recruit an additional member for the Society. There are many former students who need only to be reminded of their tie to the College. It would be noteworthy in the finest sense if the membership of the Society were to increase during these troublesome times.

ALUMNI DAY AND FINALS

June 5-6

Alumni who found it possible to return to the campus for the 1943 Alumni Day and Finals program, June 5 and 6, were approximately one tenth the usual number.

Responsible for this decline in attendance is World War II—the fault of Adolph Schickelgruber, Hirohito, et al—with attending difficulties and inconveniences, among which are included more than a thousand alumni in the armed forces and others in defense jobs plus food, tire and gas rationing, etcetera.

Reunion of classes was not emphasized this year. Only one member of the class of '93, Everett Edwards of Sweet Hall, registered for the fiftieth anniversary. Magruder Powell, '81x, came from Baltimore. Although 81 years of age and nearly blind, Mr. Powell claims to have had the "grandest time" of anyone present.

The Finals program, abbreviated for obvious reasons, began with the senior class luncheon on Friday, June 4. The class gift to the College, a new Virginia-State flag, was presented at this time and Walter Finnall Cross Ferguson, '19, President of the Society of the Alumni, formally inducted the class of 1943 into the alumni body.

Friday evening the Board of Directors of the Society held its annual meeting. The annual meeting of the Society was held on Saturday, June 5, in the auditorium, Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Building, with President Ferguson presiding. Reports of the work of the Alumni Office and the Board of Directors, together with statements of financial condition of the Society and the Endowment Fund were presented and approved. The following amendments to the By-Laws of the Society were recommended by the Board and unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED: That the by-laws of the Society of the Alumni of the College of William and Mary in Virginia be amended so that ARTICLE I, Section 2 will include:

(e) Any Director, except those in military service, who shall, without valid excuse, fail to attend two successive meetings of the Board, shall be removed from office, and the president of the Society shall thereupon declare a vacancy to exist on the Board, and the Board shall then proceed to elect a member of the Society to serve until the next annual meeting of the Society."

and

RESOLVED: That the by-laws of the Society of the Alumni of the College of William and Mary in Virginia be amended so that ARTICLE III, Section 7, shall read as follows:

"The President of the Society, not later than the first of February each year, shall appoint a nominating committee, consisting of five members of the Society, to nominate candidates for the vacancies occurring on the Board of Directors of the Society to be filled at the annual June meeting. Three of the members of the committee shall have served on the committee the preceding year and two shall not have served the preceding year.

No member of the committee shall serve more than three successive years. The committee shall meet not later than April 15th following their appointment. The Executive Secretary shall attend this meeting and assist the committee in such manner as may be requested. If the list of nominees is not completed at the first meeting, a subsequent meeting or meetings shall be held as soon as possible thereafter, in order to complete the list."


President Ferguson presented the following resolution; also unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED: That the Board of Directors of the Society of the College of William and Mary in Virginia commend Miss Alyse F. Tyler and Mrs. Olive Nestor Major for the very splendid, capable and efficient manner in which they have carried on the duties of the Alumni Office in the absence of the Executive Secretary, Charles P. McCurdy, Jr., now serving as a Lieutenant in the United States Naval Reserve.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that as an additional recognition of the splendid service of Miss Tyler and Mrs. Major this resolution be read at the annual meeting of the Society of the Alumni of the College of William and Mary in Virginia to be held at the College on June 5, 1943.

Vernon Meredith Geddy, '17Ba, of Williamsburg and Robert Morton Hughes, Jr., '99Ba of Norfolk were reelected to three year terms on the Board of Directors. Robert Edward Henley, '06Ba, was elected to the Board for a three year term succeeding Catherine Teackle Dennis. Catherine Teackle Dennis, '21Ba, was elected to fill the unexpired term of Amos Ralph Koontz.

Mr. Henley, a native of James City County, and member of the Spencer family which has sent more men and women to the College in the last hundred years than any other single family, studied law at the University of Virginia and is Vice President and General Counsel of the Life Insurance Company of Virginia at Richmond. He is a member of the Kappa Sigma and Phi Beta Kappa.

Miss Dennis, formerly of Suffolk, is State Supervisor of Home Economics in North Carolina. She was awarded the Alumni Medallion on June 3, 1939.

Dr. Koontz, whose term of office would have expired in June, 1944, resigned because of undetermined absence from this country. He is serving as Lieutenant Colonel in the Medical Corps of the American Expeditionary Forces in the Pacific area. Dr. Koontz became a member of the Board in June, 1930 and served as President of the Association from 1932 to 1934.

President Ferguson introduced the twenty-first president of the College, John Edwin Pomfret, who, among other things observed:

"This College should be a democratic institution open to all classes of worthy boys and girls regardless of the economic status of their parents. The College should emphasize all educational possibilities. There should be an electric current of intellectual life here combined with physical fitness. . . ."

Mr. Pomfret presented alumni medallions to John Lesslie Hall, Jr., and Carl Miner Andrews, in absentia due to naval service, citing them as follows:

War Prisoner, Writes Home

For the first time since he was taken prisoner by the Japanese at the fall of Corregidor, word has been received from Stuart Hopkins Hall, '37Bs, Ensign USNR. Two postcards, in his own handwriting, were received by his mother on Labor Day. The cards reveal that he is in Prison Camp 2 in the Philippines, and that he is in good health.

Ensign Hall first was reported missing by the Navy Depart-

Ensign Hall first was reported missing by the Navy Department on May 10, 1942. His gunboat, the U.S.S. Mindanao, was reported sunk somewhere in the Eastern Pacific. Later reports indicated that all members of the crew were rescued and removed to Corregidor. In March of this year the Navy Department announced that the Ensign was a prisoner of war.

CITATIONS

Distinguished Flying Cross to Ernest C. Wooten, Jr., '34x, Sergeant, United States Army Air Force, "for extraordinary achievement while participating in 50 operational flight missions in the Southwest Pacific area, during which hostile contact was probable and expected. These operations included missions for dropping supplies to advanced outposts, and transporting troops and equipment to forward areas. The flights were made in transport airplanes, flying at extremely low altitudes over mountainous terrain under adverse weather conditions, and often necessitated landing within a few miles of enemy bases. Throughout these flights, outstanding ability and devotion to duty were demonstrated."

Silver Star Medal, April 15, to *Clarence Augustus Twiddy, Jr., '40Ba, Lieutenant (jg) United States Naval Reserve. Accompanying his decoration was a citation describing his participation in a dive bombing attack on a battleship in Casablanca harbor in spite of heavy antiaircraft fire. "On other flights," the citation continued, "he participated in attacks on heavy gun emplacements and hostile vessels."

Airmen's Medal to James Hepburn Hargis, Jr., '41Ba, First Lieutenant, United States Army Air Force, for courage and devotion to duty in ferrying paratroops from North Africa to Sicily at the time of the invasion.

NEW MEMBERS OF THE FACULT

Dean Announces Sixteen Appointments

The appointment of seventeen new members of the faculty of the College of William and Mary for the 1943-44 session, has been announced by Dr. J. W. Miller, dean of the faculty.

Douglas G. Adair, assistant professor has been added to the department of history. Adair is a graduate of the University of the South, holds an M.A. from Harvard University and has done graduate work at Yale University. He held the position of social science analyst for the social security board in Washington from 1936-38. Since that time he has been an instructor in history at Yale University and at Princeton. Adair is a member of the American Historical Association and the author of several articles for historical publications.

Roderick Firth, who holds an A.B. from Haverford College and a Ph.D. from Harvard will become active instructor in psychology and philosophy. Firth was a graduate assistant at the College of William and Mary

during the 1940-41 session.

The physical education department will have two new members on its staff: Miss Marion Dale Reeder, as assistant professor and Miss Arlene Jackman as acting instructor. Miss Reeder attended Lindenwood College and Stetson University and was graduated from the University of Illinois. She acted as assistant in physical education at the University of Illinois, and has had experience in recreational work and physical therapy. Miss Jackman is a graduate of Tufts College.

As active instructor, Mrs. John M. Phillips has been appointed to the physics department. Mrs. Phillips holds degrees from Marshall College and Duke University. Her bachelor's degree was in music, and she has had considerable experience in working with musical groups.

Harold L. Jones comes to the department of chemistry from Oglethorpe University where he received his training and later served as professor of chemistry.

To the department of mathematics four new members have been added: Mrs. Ione D. V. Berkley, Miss Mary E. Meade, Glenn L. Burrows and Edward B. Temple II. Mrs. Berkley was graduated from University of Sheffield, England and has taught at Havergal College, Toronto, Canada. Miss Meade, who holds degrees from Randolph-Macon Woman's College and the University of Virginia, was formerly instructor in mathematics at New York University. Burrows held the position of instructor at the University of Michigan, from which institution he was graduated. Temple received his degree from Lafayette College. Oliver Freud, son of the late Prof. Sigmund Freud of Vienna, who holds the degree of Diplom-Inegenieur from the Technological Institute in Vienna, will become acting assistant professor of mathematics and physics.

Appointed to the department of English are Stephen E. Merton, former professor at Mary Baldwin College and a graduate of Columbia University; and Lawrence G. Nelson who holds a Ph.D. degree from the Uni-

versity of Virginia.

John T. Bout, A.B., University of Iowa, who comes to William and Mary from the staff of the theater of Northwestern University, will be acting instructor in the department of fine arts.

Mrs. Nellie Hurt, A. B., Bowling Green, has been ap-

pointed instructor of secretarial science.

As high school counselor and assistant professor of education, Douglas C. Berry comes to the college from the Madison elementary school in Richmond. Berry received his A.B. degree from Emory and Henry College and his M.A. from Emory University. His work will be mostly among the high schools of the Tidewater.

COLLEGE SUSPENDS VARSITY FOOTBALL FOR 1943

Will Organize 150-Pound Team On Campus

For the first time in a quarter of a century, the College of William and Mary will not place a varsity football team on the gridiron this fall. In making the announcement, Carl M. Voyles, director of the physical education department at the college, said that William and Mary would place a 150-pound team on the field.

Voyles stated that since the members of the army unit at the college are not allowed to participate in intercollegiate athletics, this would leave only 16 and 17 year old boys and probably three or four boys above the age of 18 and that none of last year's freshmen and varsity squads were expected to return, giving the college too small a group from which to pick a team.

Football will not be absent from the campus, for if plans materialize, Voyles hopes to have a game in the stadium each Saturday. In addition to the 150-pound team, he plans to organize four intramural teams, a civilian team, a team from the chaplains' school and two or three army teams. The 150-pound team will play

An Alumnus You Should Know

Like many another layman I have always held in great awe all men who bear the title of bishop and have wondered at times if these venerable gentlemen were at heart truly human. Now I know that my feelings were incorrect and that the answer to my question is a decided YES. These facts I discovered recently when it was my pleasure and privilege to meet the Right Reverend John Durham Wing, D.D., Bishop of the South Florida Diocese of the Episcopal Church.

I do not believe that I have ever talked with a man more understanding of human nature and possessed of a broader or more practical knowledge of current events than is Bishop Wing. Our conversation started out to be an interview from which was to come this article, but before its conclusion I was far from sure as to just who was being interviewed by whom. I did know, however, just why Bishop Wing is so beloved to the thousands of people in the Peninsula over whose spiritual lives he holds jurisdiction.

John Durham Wing was born in Atlanta, Georgia, in the year of our Lord 1882. After attending the public and high schools of that city he matriculated at the University of Georgia in the fall of 1899. Having spent two years at the Athens institution Bishop Wing decided that the paint business was to his liking and became connected with the cold water paint division of the Pittsburg Plate Glass Company in whose employ he remained for five years. The first three of these were spent in Atlanta, and the last two in his company's office in London, England.

In 1906 having decided to prepare himself for the ministry and needing additional college credits he enrolled at the College of William and Mary. Just why Bishop Wing decided upon the College of William and Mary is not known for certain. His decision may have been influenced by the fact that one of his school teachers was a graduate of the college, or because at the time the college was under the control of the Episcopal Church and offered certain financial advantages to young men preparing themselves for this ministry. Having been a paint salesman myself I am inclined to believe that the latter was the deciding factor.

Unfortunately for the college Bishop Wing only remained on its premises during the academic year of 1906-1907. Fortunately for him though, he chose the year in which was observed the 300th anniversary of the founding of the Virginia Colony with all its attendant festivities at Jamestown and Williamsburg. This year also marked the first remodeling of Bruton Parish Church at which time the Lectern was presented to the church by President Theodore Roosevelt and the Bible by King Edward VII of England, who sent the

Bishop of London to Williamsburg to make the presentation.

Having witnessed all of these memorable events and having received intensive tutoring in Greek from James Southall Wilson, '04, of whom he holds the fondest memories, the Bishop left William and Mary to enter the Virginia Theological Seminary at Alexandria, where he spent the next three years, being ordained into the Episcopal ministry in 1910.

The next fifteen years were busy ones for the Reverend Wing. During them he served parishes in Atlanta, Anniston, Alabama, Savannah, Georgia, and Chattanooga, Tennessee, and in addition found time to court and marry the former Mary Ammons of Atlanta, whose step-father, Cary Breckinridge Wilmer, '75, was the son of an early Rector of Bruton Parish Church, the late Dr. George B. Wilmer.

It was while serving the parish in Chattanooga in 1925 that Dr. Wing was elected Bishop of the Diocese of South Florida, which most important post he has held ever since.

It was comparatively easy to elicit the preceding information from Bishop Wing, but when I attempted to draw from him information concerning further honors I found myself confronted by a veritable clam or sphinx. I did ascertain that his work and popularity have won for him Doctor of Divinity degrees from the University of Georgia, The Virginia Theological Seminary, and the University of the South (Sewannee), as well as a Doctor of Law degree from Rollins College at Winter Park, Florida.

As Bishop of the South Florida Diocese Dr. Wing is responsible for the spiritual guidance of all of the peo-

men while, on completion of alterations to Tyler Hall (also a former women's dormitory), many others will reside in that building. Blow Gymnasium has been turned over to the Army Unit, housing many men on the basketball floor and in other parts of the building, and the headquarters of the unit are also located in Blow.

The personnel of the group may change during the course of the specialized training; at the end of every twelve-weeks' period some men may be sent directly to officers' candidate schools and others, for various reasons, may be assigned to other military duties. Some continue their training.

The basic specialized program consists of terms of twelve weeks each. The William and Mary unit will follow the pre-engineering curriculum. This curriculum includes mathematics, physics, chemistry, English, history, geography, and in the third term mechanical drawing

All classes are taught by members of the regular college faculty, according to general specifications of study content as outlined by the Army. Every trainee will receive a minimum of twenty-four hours of classroom instruction per week, and the program calls for a minimum of twenty-four hours each week of supervised study. The academic program is under the direction of Dr. James W. Miller, dean of the faculty. The college library is used by the cadets during their study hall periods.

In addition to the strenuous study plan, the trainees receive a minimum of five hours a week of military training, plus six hours per week of physical conditioning comprising calisthenics, long-distance running and obstacle course training of various types. The military training is under the direction of army officers while the physical education work is supervised by Carl M. Voyles, director of physical education at the college, and his regular staff. The trainees are not permitted to participate in college athletics, though an intramural program is planned.

The ASTU schedule at William and Mary corresponds to that at other institutions. A cadet rises at 6 a.m., appears for formation at 6:30, eats breakfast at 7 and attends classes from 8-12. After dinner at noon, the cadet returns to classes at 1:30 where he remains until 5:35. Supper call is at 6. Study hall begins at 8:15 and continues until 10:30 p.m. Taps are sounded at 11.

Mess is held in the college dining hall and the cadets, singing as they march to the dining hall, have become a familiar sight in Williamsburg. The groups also march to classes.

Eight army officers are in charge of the unit which is commanded by Major George F. McGinn. Major Mc-Ginn began his army career in 1909 in the Infantry. During World War I, he served as first lieutenant and later captain of the First Anti-Aircraft machine gun battalion, seeing overseas service. He was recalled from civilian life to active duty in December, 1941, to command a battalion at the reception center at Fort Meade, Maryland, where he served 19 months. Prior to coming to William and Mary, Major McGinn was in command of the First regiment at the Shenango Personnel Replacement Depot.

With both Army and Navy units on the campus, William and Mary is again taking an active part in the defense of the principles for which this nation stands. The 500-odd cadets in the Army Specialized Training Unit, the 300 members of the chaplains' school, coupled with a capacity enrollment of women students and upwards of 200 men students, will give the college more than 1,500 students this fall.

Fraternities have had a long and honorable record at William and Mary for the years of their presence, and feelings in regard to them are deep and lasting, so much so that those present at the meeting were reluctant to suspend their operation. Building. The baccalaureate sermon was delivered by Dean Alexander Zabriskie of the Virginia Theological Seminary. Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the United States Supreme Court made the commencement address. Under the accelerated program of the College 45 degrees were awarded last January at the first winter commencement ever held at the College.

campus to receive their degrees.

Concluding the exercises the College conferred the honorary degree of doctor of laws upon Justice Douglas.

ple of the Episcopalian faith residing in the peninsula section of Florida. A look at a map will show that this is no small task, as his territory extends from a point thirty-five miles south of Jacksonville to the city of Key West at the very tip of the string of keys extending southwestward from the Florida mainland, and from the Atlantic Ocean to the Gulf of Mexico. In this vast area there are nearly one hundred churches each of which he must visit at least once each year for Confirmation Services. When I asked him if this wasn't a very difficult task, especially during these times of rationing and crowded traveling conditions, the Bishop passed the difficulties off with the remark that when he left the paint business he thought that he had left his traveling days behind, only to find that in entering the ministry he had sentenced himself to them for life.

Bishop and Mrs. Wing reside in Orlando, Florida, and have four children, two daughters and two sons,

the elder of whom is preparing to follow in his father's footsteps at the General Theological Seminary in New York, while the other is a student at the University of Pennsylvania Medical School, and as such is a member of the Medical Reserve of the United States Army.

Possibly no finer tribute may be paid to Bishop Wing's unceasing efforts in behalf of his people than the statement of the rector of one of the largest churches in his Diocese: "He works harder than any of us under him."

Thus I give you alumni the Rt. Rev. John Durham Wing, a faithful servant of Our Savior, and a fellow alumnus of whom we all may well be proud.

at least two games, one with Navy at Annapolis, October 16, and one with the Apprentice School at Newport News, November 13.

Should enough boys report, a freshman team will be organized and will play preparatory and high schools. Under the plans as outlined, the college will have a full program for those boys in school and when varsity material is again available, William and Mary will resume varsity athletics.

A number of players on William and Mary's freshman and varsity teams of 1942, the Southern Conference champions, will see action on the gridirons of other institutions. A number of William and Mary students are in V-12 programs in the University of Pennsylvania, Richmond, Duke, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia Tech, Hampden-Sydney and the University of Richmond. About 95 William and Mary boys are at the University of Richmond, including 14 members from last year's freshman and varsity football teams. Among this group are Marvin Bass, captain of last year's championship team, Bob Longacre, Jackie Freeman, Herbert Poplinger, Henry Schutz, Edward Rhodes, Don Ream, Surry Harrison, Louis Hoitsma and others. Longacre was the captain-elect of William and Mary for this fall. Bass has been chosen to lead the Richmond Spiders in their opening game.

A number of other boys are scheduled to play on the physical training school team at Bainbridge, Maryland, including such stars as Harvey Johnson, All-American Garrard Ramsey, Albert Vandeweghe, and Herbert Miller. Ramsey played in the All-Star game at Chicago, August 25 and is the first football player from any Virginia school to start the game since its inception. He played longer than any lineman in the game for the All-Stars and his playing was described by coaches as being very outstanding. His down-the-field blocking was sensational and he blocked two men on the 95-yard run for a touchdown made by Otto Graham for the All-Stars.

Voyles stated that it is with regret that William and Mary anounces that it will be impossible to have a varsity team this fall but that the college hopes to begin where it left off when the war is over.
