




standard deviation: 2 ft at 200 miles





SINCE recorded time began the labor of teaching has been employed by successive civilizations and cultures to perpetuate their way of life, to record and transmit their achievements, and in a later age to increase their body of knowledge. Today we are heirs to a gigantic system of instruction involving in one way or another a significant portion of our population.

We have seen in the last decade revolutionary changes in concepts and techniques, yet whatever the age or prevalent philosophy the fundamental association of teacher and student remains the same.

Our intention here is to present a study of the teacher at the College of William and Mary and to give some further insight into the total picture of teaching in America today.

The Good Teacher

NO teacher can educate his pupils; what he must do is develop in them the desire to learn and think for themselves. By effective teaching, a good teacher can lead his pupils to the realization that an education is a thing good in itself and that it can be obtained only through the student's own curiosity, energy and perseverance. To the teacher lie open whole fields of knowledge which he can share with his students while developing their powers of rational judgment, intellectual perception and critical evaluation.

To perform this function of leading students to a desire for learning, a teacher must be able to communicate his own enthusiasm for knowledge. The most brilliant men do not always make the best teachers, for brilliance is wasted unless a communication of ideas exists, unless a rapport is established between student and teacher. As this communication of ideas takes place for the most part in the formal class sessions, the effectiveness of a teacher is largely dependent on his manner of presentation. A good teacher is interested in his subject and wants his students to be interested also. He does not talk above their heads, nor does he reduce complex ideas to simple formulas. He presents his material in a way that is understandable to all his students. But he also presents stimulating ideas, and brings in additional references for the more curious students to follow up. Very few good teachers talk in a monotone, and very few lack a sense of humor. A good teacher cares about his students. He helps his poor students, and he encourages his good ones

to explore ideas on their own. He is willing to give of his time to talk with students about ideas that are new and exciting to them. A good teacher finds satisfaction in seeing one of his students come to a new awareness and appreciation of literature or history or philosophy whether it come from the teacher's direct inspiration or not.

A good teacher is a scholar. The good teacher became a teacher through a genuine love of the academic life. He is a standard of scholarship to his students, and his love of learning is the inspiration of new generations of scholars. The teacher who ceases to learn, whose curiosity becomes satisfied is unfit to teach. He becomes stagnant, a fact that is readily discernible to alert students. Intellectually curious students sense quickly which of their teachers are merely repeating lectures which they have given for ten or twenty years. Find the teacher who is admired by his students and you will find a man who is still learning, who is vitally concerned with ideas; find the teacher who is writing or doing research and you will find the man who can best guide his students on their way to becoming educated men and women.

The Teacher and the Student

RECENTLY a member of the faculty of the College of William and Mary stated that in the business of attracting outstanding teachers to this college the calibre of the student body was as important as the salary paid. This is not an uncommon feeling for in a good teaching situation there must always be a challenge, and the teacher and then the student in turn must challenge each other.

In a national climate that will support a strong and vocal group of anti-intellectuals it becomes increasingly difficult to generate a genuinely scholarly enthusiasm in the classroom. The concept of a college education is certainly accepted by the mass of students that come to the campuses of the nation. Unfortunately, many of these young folks lust for a diploma only, because he can earn more money with it. This type of student is not after an education with a genuine desire for knowledge, he is after a meal ticket.

A second deterrent to a challenging classroom situation is that many of our potentially good students arrive on campus



fresh from their preparatory schools fairly well saturated with "life adjustment" courses which have been inflicted at the expense of solid intellectual training. The minds of these students have not been activated and they are sorely lacking in any sort of academic discipline. This results in many hours of college instruction devoted to doing someone else's job to insure that the student might have those fundamental concepts so vital to continuing scholarship.

The students of the College of William and Mary are proud of their faculty, and there is evidence that there is mutual respect. Teaching is still a very personal thing in Williamsburg, and the pictures which accompany this story will certainly serve to remind many alumni of this fact. The students continue to pick their favorites, and a goodly number of the faculty still have gathered at their feet a fan club. And this is well for no generation has suffered from contact with good men.

The student and teacher begin their educational experience together by learning about each other. When and if a mutual respect develops, there can be a beneficial exchange of ideas and information. The selective process begins in the classroom, and within the confines of the subject taught the student must develop a capacity for judgment not simply from whim but based on reason and solid objective fact. That the student learn to make valid decisions is absolutely necessary to a free way of life. When men stop choosing, someone or something will make the decisions for them. And, as one Marshall Wythe Symposium speaker intimated, 1984 might be less than twenty-six years away.

The classroom has become America's first line of defense and Russia has already boasted that here she will defeat us. Frank G. Jennings writing in the *Saturday Review* presents an excellent commentary on the teacher and the student observing that, "If our teachers lack luster, fewer of their charges will be as bright as they might have been. IF our teachers are cowards, they will teach their cowardice.

IF teachers are not responsible citizens, they will produce political idiots. IF teachers become the tools of any pressure group, rather than the prime artisans of a creative society, then we will all shrink into a nation of domesticated, two-legged cattle, capable of nothing but ignorant brutality toward each other and cud-chewing obedience to the loudest shouters and the best feeders."

The Teacher's Status in America

WOULD you want your daughter to marry a teacher? In answering this question or even asking this question you gain a good deal of insight into the status of the college teacher, or any teacher in America today.

Money is certainly a crass standard to measure status and acceptance, however, in our capitalistic society it is an effective one, and certainly reflects the feelings of the consumer. The fact is simple—our teachers do not make enough money.

Beardsley Ruml writes in *The Atlantic Monthly* that: "Fifty years ago, a salary of \$3,000 a year was good but not uncommon. Allowing for changes in the cost of living and federal income taxes, and assuming that the professor has a wife and two dependents, in 1953 he would have to make \$11,200 in order to have equivalent economic status with that of his professional colleague at the turn of the century."

In 1904 probably the top professor's salary was paid at the University of Chicago, and there only to a few men. The rate was \$7,000, and today's equivalent is \$31,250. In those happy, not too-distant days, a first-class professor was considered economically as worthy as a first-class anybody else, who was working for pay and not risking his own capital.

A recent McGraw-Hill publication points out the irony of this situation by observing that the economic status of the teaching profession as far as financial incentives are concerned has been virtually socialized. There is little or no reward for outstanding performance and such a situation is not conducive to attracting qualified young men and women.

On the other hand our chief competitor





(and it is certainly good business to know what the competition is doing) the U.S.S.R. has deliberately and successfully used capitalistic incentives to improve its educational system.

In the United States the average faculty salary is little more than the average income of industrial workers. According to the N.E.A., the average faculty salary is approximately \$5,240. College instructors receive \$4,100 and full professors \$7,100. The average income of the factory worker in 1956 was \$4,580.

In Russia the head of a department can command a salary of about 6,000 rubles a month. This is about eight times the income of the average Russian worker, who earns 750 rubles a month. It has been estimated that based on Soviet consumption patterns 6,000 rubles a month is worth about \$7,200 a year. In the fields of science the teachers' salaries can run to 15,000 rubles a month, and the quality of their teaching has been recently proven.

Economic incentives to be a good teacher and to remain in teaching are practically non-existent. In the United States a full professor on the average earns less than twice as much as the beginning instructors. Limited resources for salary increases have gone predominantly to the lower ranks, so that an adequate number of teachers could be retained. Meanwhile potentially fine teachers who desire to pay for their homes, own cars, and send their children to reputable schools, must find jobs that pay.

To the Future

IN summation we say without hesitation that those who administer and teach and serve in the colleges of our land have lost a great measure of the respect and support that a free and determined people once accorded them. Political leaders and civic club presidents may expound from the daises of the nation that education at every level is more important than it has ever been. But facts are facts and even if there is public agreement in principle, there is no real public support.

As was stated before there is certainly a kind of anti-intellectualism inherent in this situation. Education is rarely openly attacked for it still has a position akin to motherhood and religion. Yet it is damned by inaction expressed in feelings of indifference which comes from a complete lack of knowledge about the contribution education has made to the greatness of this nation.

There is tragedy in the situation in which we find ourselves today, for as public apathy developed the alumni of our institutions failed to step forward in their defense.

Perhaps the alumni programs of this land are partially responsible, for in our zeal to develop loyalty to Alma Mater we have made it convenient for our educated citizenry to neglect their responsibility to the nation's total program of education.

Loren Hickerson, Director of Alumni

Relations of the University of Iowa, sums it up very well. "Of one thing we may be certain—the problems of all education have grown from a single source. Throughout the myriad levels of political and social government in this country, from the township and the school district and the social agencies of the local community to the Congress of the United States itself, those who possess rich qualities for leadership are not enough the leaders. Through abrogation of their cardinal responsibilities as educated men and women, there is ascendant in the land that devitalization of the governing power which Walter Lippman in 'The Public Philosophy' has called 'the malady of democratic states.'" It is not only the privilege but the responsibility of the alumnus to support quality in education at whatever level he may affect.

That our alumni have been inactive so long is due partially to the fact that most have never been asked to help or shown a good reason why. Today the news media of this land is carrying in increasing quantity the story of our teachers and little by little a sympathetic national opinion is being developed. That this nation will ultimately do something constructive is certain, but the critical question here is—when and will we be able to regain the ground already lost. Within the scope of these circumstances are the keys to the future, not alone of the teacher but ultimately of American civilization.





The Rebel ANSWERS to the Instructor

ON the opposite page is a portrait, painted by the famous court painter Sir Peter Lely, of Sir William Berkeley, Virginia's controversial colonial governor. The painting, long hanging unnoticed in Berkeley Castle in England, reveals the character of the man who governed Virginia (with interruptions) from 1642 to 1677. Haughty and proud, defects he recognized in himself, Sir William looks every inch the accomplished servant of two English kings.

A favorite of Charles I in his youth, trained in the law and proficient in letters (his play "The Lost Lady" [1638] was admired by the diarist Pepys), Berkeley was chosen by the King in 1641 to govern his Virginia dominion. To many at court such a post, though an honor, seemed an exile. Many wondered that the brilliant young man continued to return to his government after each trip to England when he might have stayed at "home" and occupied high positions, as his brother John, the first Lord Berkeley of Stratton, did.

But Sir William had grown attached to Virginia in his long years there. Instead of milking the country for his personal profit he ploughed all his income into the development of industries calculated to promote the colony's economic well being: silk culture and tropical fruits, for example, at his plantation at Green Spring, and into the development of James City as a fit capital for his Majesty's government.

In the summer of 1674 a new face arrived on the Virginia scene, that of thirty-year-old Nathaniel Bacon, Jr., a cousin of the governor's wife, Frances (Culpeper). The newcomer was greeted warmly by the seventy-year-old Berkeley and soon given a seat on the governor's council. Bacon showed no interest in political affairs, however, and almost never attended meetings of the council. He chose also to isolate himself from the polite society of Jamestown and Green Spring. Having "always bin delighted in solitude and mistique employments," as he put it, he established his home on the frontier, then at "Curles" on the James River.

Bacon was described by the commissioners sent from England to investigate the causes of the rebellion as "indifferent tall but slender, blackhair'd and of an ominous, pensive, melancholly Aspect, of a pestilent and prevalent Logical discourse tending to atheisme in most companyes, not given to much talke, or to make suddain replyes, of a most imperious and dangerous hidden Pride of heart, despising the wisest of his neighbors for their Ignorance, and very ambitious and arrogant." The description tallies with that of his tutor, the naturalist John Ray, who found him of "very good parts, and a quick wit," but "impatient of labour, and indeed his temper will not admit long study." It is not inconsistent with his other activities as a youth in England. His father, for example, withdrew him from Cambridge University for having "broken into some extravagancies." Later he was forced to send his son to Virginia after he had become involved in an unsavory scheme to defraud a neighboring youth of his inheritance.

It was this talented yet erratic youth who, in the fall of 1675, in the midst of a growing Indian crisis, began to take the law into his own hands in dealing with Virginia's Indians. The Indian troubles that had arisen were the result of an unfortunate series of mutual offenses among whites and Indians living in the Potomac River area. The troubles grew into a crisis involving both Virginia and Maryland with the Susquehannock Indians, whose headquarters was a fort on the north side of the Potomac. Unfortunately for Berkeley his attempts to settle the dispute fairly were botched by those

sent to handle it. Five Susquehannock chiefs were murdered under a flag of truce. The Susquehannock warriors burst out of their fort and exacted a bloody revenge against the outlying Virginia settlements.

The deterioration in Virginia's relations with the Susquehannocks, "foreign" Indians over whom she had no control, was equaled by the worsening of her relations with the friendly subject tribes. All Indians became suspect and the familiar cry that no Indian was to be trusted came to the mouths of the frontiersmen. Not the least of Berkeley's difficulties came from his cousin. Bacon, in the fall of 1675, without consulting the constituted authorities of Henrico County, seized several friendly Appomattox Indians on charges of stealing corn that was neither his nor his neighbors. The governor rebuked his cousin, calling on him to consider that his "rash heady action"—bypassing regular channels of law enforcement—could only excite the English settlers unnecessarily and alienate the friendly Indians.

Berkeley and the Assembly of March 1676 strove to make the colonists aware of the distinction between those Indians who were to be considered enemies, and those who were subjects of the King and allies of the settlers against the foreign Indians. Their efforts, however, were insufficient to restrain the frontiersmen. As the Paxton Boys in Pennsylvania were to do in the eighteenth century and Colonel Chivington's men in Colorado in the nineteenth, the Virginia frontiersmen attempted to solve the Indian attacks on the frontier by wiping out the more accessible Indians of the interior. They needed only a leader. They found him in the erratic, sullen young gentleman living at the "Curles" of the James.

Bacon's motives in leading the frontiersmen against the Indians and, eventually, against Governor Berkeley himself when the governor attempted to stop his campaigns against the red men, constitutes one of the most difficult problems in Virginia history. Historians until 1776 generally saw Bacon as an ungovernable demagogue whose main interest was in

destroying Indians. Following the American Revolution, however, a radical change occurred in the treatment of Bacon the Rebel. Rebellion having become fashionable, historians tended to see all rebels as democratically inclined patriots. The image of Bacon the democratic hero, the torchbearer of the Revolution, now began to emerge, first from the pen of John Daly Burk, the Petersburg historian, and then from the writings of men like George Bancroft, the Massachusetts democrat. The movement culminated in the twentieth century in the works of Thomas Jefferson Wertenbaker, Professor of History at Princeton, and native of Charlottesville.

Bacon received a democratic refurbishing at the hands of these historians. His hatred of Indians was played down, and his unauthorized campaigns against them seen as pretexts for, or preliminaries to, the overthrowing of the allegedly oppressive government of Sir William Berkeley. The faint suggestions left in some documents of the period of Bacon's concern for the grievances of the people were amplified into thunderous demands for political democracy.

In 1953-1954, while doing research in England, I became suspicious of the accepted theory and devoted the next few years to searching out every piece of evidence I could find on the rebellion. I had the good fortune to discover a great mass of rebellion material, previously unknown to Virginia historians, at Longleat House, the estate of the Marquis of Bath.

My conclusions have recently been set forth in a book entitled *The Governor and the Rebel: A History of Bacon's Rebellion in Virginia*, published by the University of North Carolina Press at Chapel Hill for the Institute of Early American History and Culture. In the next few years historians will examine my facts and my reasoning and accept or dispute my interpretation. The public, if I am correct, will have to abandon Nathaniel Bacon as one of its heroes. But it will have a far better replacement not only from the standpoint of Virginia's democratic traditions, which Berkeley upheld against Lords in England and rebels in Virginia, but from the standpoint of Southern honor, of which the Governor, Sir William Berkeley was one of the first and best representatives.



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

Helen Thomson Stafford wrote that Jane Spencer Smith and her two girls dropped by for a brief visit in October while they were East visiting her family. Helen and Paul



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


Congratulations to Jane Waters (Nielsen) and Bud whose second son and second child, John Waters, was born on January 1.




