



### Shadows

WE noted several young citizens of Williamsburg walking backwards on the Duke of Gloucester Street yesterday afternoon. It appeared from their actions and conversation that they were far more interested in the shadows they had cast and the regions from whence they had come than where they were going.

Now let it be settled right here—we are not about to condemn walking backwards, particularly in Williamsburg. It's really a lot of fun, and an occasional go at it relieves the monotony of the continued and socially accepted form of forward motion.

But shadow-watching brings to mind a question. As an alumnus or good friend of the College, what thoughts come to your mind when someone mentions the name of the College of William and Mary? Well, first off we suspect you say, "That's where I went to school, it rains there, and when it is not raining it's getting ready to rain, and when it is not raining or getting ready to rain it is one of the most beautiful spots on earth-I wonder if dear old Dr. What's It is still living." OK, so you went there to school. Now tell me something about the College of William and Mary. "Well, it is located in Williamsburg, Virginia-that is the restored town you read so much about. It's the second oldest college in the United States, a lot of the great statesmen of this nation went to school there like Jefferson, and Marshall, and it has a list of academic priorities that includes just about everything except driver training, etc. And so it goes-the point here being that most often we describe our College like a shadow-what it has been-Shadows, our heritage, are most important and only great men and institutions have the pleasure of looking back on them. Yet in the piercing light of the high noon sun and on rainy days when we are without shadows, how do we describe our College?

This is not an original question, it is one that thoughtful alumni and members of the faculty have been considering for some time. What is even more significant is the action President Chandler has taken in instituting a program based on a master plan of development for the College which is in effect to say what the College is, and where the College is going (See THE ALUMNI GAZETTE, December, 1958).

An accurate description of the presentday college will most certainly demand a description of the present-day alumni program, and here it is most appropriate to ask another question-""Are you proud or inclined to brag to your friends about the notable contributions made by William and Mary alumni to their Alma Mater?" True, there are many aspects of the alumni program of the College that have outstanding merits; however in the universally recognized (and appreciated) area of financial support we make a very poor showing. Why have we fallen behind in this particular area? Some say-because our College receives aid from the State of Virginia-obviously, other alumni don't feel the same way about their state-supported College. Last year Texas A & M's alumni giving program was judged best in the nation. Others say we suffer because almost half of our alumni are women, and their loyalty goes to their husbands' college. This is nonsense, and the girls themselves (God bless them) would be the first to say our College shall not be penalized because of their attendance. The majority of women's colleges in the state have a better participation than we do. Finally some say we do not find anything in the Fund objective that we feel merits our support. The Board of Directors of the Society has certainly tried to answer this and we invite you to consider the objectives presented on Page 13. Here is a program that alumni can brag about and, if each person will do his part we shall when the time comes to consider shadows have one that will be greatly admired by ourselves and by the generations yet unborn.

#### At Last


Unfortunately, America was denied her Casanova for several days' growth under

# The Library of the College of William and Mary

"Gift of Kings . . . and Gentlemen"

NE hundred years ago, after the fire which destroyed the Old Main Building, the faculty bemoaned the loss of the library, which had been "in great part of the gift of kings . . . and gentlemen." This tragic event—ironically, it took place on Charter Day, February 8, 1859—resulted in the loss of almost all of William and Mary's 8,000 volume collection. Many of these books had been presented to the young College in the early part of the eighteenth century. But this is not to be a history of the Library, although we have in the coming pages touched on the highlights of the past and tried to point out some of its significance for the William and Mary of today. This *is* the story of the present condition of the Library; the story of its users and of its staff; the story of its future.

Libraries, like children, are apt to grow faster than proud alumni, or parents, are able to realize. All of us can take pride in the box score to the right, comparing our Library with several of its neighbors to the north. These figures, however true they may be, leave much to be desired since intellectual quality, like school spirit, cannot be counted or measured. But we can measure the thousands of books, magazines, documents, microfilms and archives added to the shelves each year; the many students, faculty members and visiting scholars who use them; the countless instances of exposure to recorded knowledge and experience, whether from the musty pages of Christopher Marlowe or the latest issue of *Missiles and Rockets*.



## Three Fires, Two Wars

HE mythical phoenix is an appropriate symbol for the College of William and Mary. Like the bird rising from its own ashes, the story of re-birth out of tragedy has been the motif of this old College not once but several times in-its 265 years. Three times the priceless intellectual heritage of the Royal College in Virginia has been destroyed by fire, twice the hazards of war have brought destruction and scattering of its records.


The first fire occurred October 29, 1705 and destroyed a collection estimated at between seven and eight hundred volumes; the second fire took place almost exactly one hundred years ago, on February 8, 1859, destroying the library which had developed to about 8,000 volumes, most of which indeed were "the gift of kings . . . and gentlemen." One year later, through the efforts of students, faculty, alumni and friends, the collection had been restored—in numbers, at least. But this, too, was short lived. For on September 9, 1862, the College Building was set afire while occupied by Federal troops and again irreplaceable damages were sustained.

Other troubles were to come. Early in 1865, the west doorways and windows of "Old Main" were filled with cannon behind a strong line of palisades. The Brafferton was gutted; the President's House was deserted; Lord Botetourt had been moved to Eastern State Hospital for the duration; and the Library and the scientific equipment of the College—such that survived the burning of the Main Building—was stored in several locations in Williamsburg. In the gray autumn of 1865, Colonel Benjamin ("Old Buck") Ewell returned to Williamsburg to reopen the desolate College. Little wonder that classes were suspended for the academic year 1868/69, or that a longer hiatus—between 1881 and 1888—could not be avoided.

Through these years, the library was stored in the south wing of the Main Building, adjoining the College Chapel, its 6,000 volumes gathering dust on the shelves. The College reopened in the autumn of 1888, under its new President, Lyon G. Tyler. The small dusty collection watched over by President Ewell and used by a number of local schoolboys under his guidance, became the nucleus of the present College Library. In 1908, a small building was erected to hold approximately 12,000 volumes, a number of pamphlets, and a few priceless manuscripts which had, somehow, survived the past tragedies.

In 1920, with the appointment of E. G. Swem, formerly with the Library of Congress and the Virginia State Library, a new page in the history of the College Library was turned. These were exciting times; Dr. J. A. C. Chandler brought new blood and new ideas to the old campus. New programs, new buildings, new personnel and increased numbers of students and faculty were creating a dynamic atmosphere in the sleepy community of Williamsburg. Library resources doubled again and again from 1920, until Dr. Swem's retirement in 1945. Additions were made to the little Library building—a stack tower in 1923, a four-story structure (now the reading rooms) in 1929.

So this is the story of our Library, a story of tragedy, perseverance and dynamism which is typically William and Mary.



The only book, owned by the College that was in the first Library, is shown here.




About 1880 the Library of the College was located in the Great Hall of the Wren Building. This print was found during the restoration of the Powder Magazine


### In Their Memory

s you enter the front door of the library, you step into a small room which was formerly the old (1908) building. This unit was built from funds supplied by Andrew Carnegie and from gifts of other friends of the College. Continuing on, you step into the "Saunders Reading Room," so named in honor of Robert Saunders, the 14th President of the College. The furnishings of this room, the chairs, tables, portraits on the walls, plaques and statuary, are all gifts.

Prominent students, alumni, and friends of the College from all walks of life are represented by books on the Library shelves. Such renowned campus figures as Dean Grace Warren Landrum, Bursar Charlie Duke, and President John Stewart Bryan; and such prominent alumni as the Honorable St. George Tucker, the Honorable Schuyler Otis Bland, Colonel Joseph W. Wright, and General William B. Taliaferro may be but names to some raw freshman. But the influence of their books and those presented in their memory will extend for more lives than one.





## The Library Today

I N order for the Library to be an intellectual center on campus, a number of pressing needs—apart from books must be met immediately. By its very nature, the College Library is an instrument of education for all students and for all members of the academic family. Yet less than 350 chairs are available in the library building—one-sixth of the present enrollment and far below the requirements for anticipated enrollment increases. Other things are lacking: there are no individual study desks for advanced student or faculty member, no seminar rooms for small classes, no space for music

listening rooms, no provision for display or exhibit of those surviving documents and artifacts which are an integral part of William and Mary's heritage.

The list of problems is endless—overloaded electrical conduits, no hot water, naked and ill-placed heat pipes, no elevators or book-lifts, cold in winter and hot in summer. But still the Library is, and will remain, the most heavily used building on campus.

This building, the least adequate structure of its kind in the Commonwealth of Virginia, holds only about one-half of the materials treasured by the College Library. The remainder are in departmental libraries (Law, Biology, Chemistry, Education, Virginia Fisheries Laboratory), basements (Wren Building), and attics (Library, Rogers Hall, Marshall-Wythe).

## Select, Process and Organize

HE forgotten man—or woman—on William and Mary's campus is the patient librarian recording, listing, sorting, pasting, and ferreting away the scraps of print, film and parchment which may become the germs of future ideas. A few of these people are well known to generations of students for their helpful and conscientious efforts to bring this raw material to the attention of the inveterate term-paper writer. But for every one library staff member whose work brings him in contact with the public, there are four others whose labors are less known yet of equal, if not of equally publicized, importance.

Each of these workers has a common goal—to select, process and organize the best results of modern scholarship into a useable "memory." This is a complex task, at best, and one most severely hindered by the inadequate physical circumstances in which it must be carried on. The long, dark aisles, the inaccessable basements, and tenement-like offices have become, unfortunately, a way of life humbly accepted by most employees and users of the College Library. But this must not obscure the central facts: unless proper conditions for work and study are found no great library can render satisfactory service.





## To The Future


Here's to the Library of the future! What it will look like, where it will be, and what it will contain are questions not yet answered. President Chandler has expressed himself forceably about the need for modern library facilities to match in quality the excellent resources now scattered campus-wide, and Dr. William F. Swindler, Director of Development and James A. Servies, Librarian of the College, have collaborated in a detailed descriptive brochure outlining the present and future of the Library. The General Assembly has provisionally allocated \$1,000,000 to the College, but an additional \$2,000,000 must be raised to provide the proper conditions of Library service.

So, Phoenix-like, the Library of the College of William and Mary in Virginia is about to rise again. Not, fortunately, out of the ashes of the past, but out of its irreplaceable treasures of the present.



# The William and Mary Fund

The Society



This is a report of the eighth year of annual giving to the College of William and Mary. It summarizes and records the generosity of 2,561 alumni who contributed \$25,686.00 and the loyalty and unselfish service of the Class Agents and Chapter Presidents. The many alumni who are already doing their thoughtful best, whether it be the largest gift or the smallest, have our enduring thanks. We direct this appeal to many who could help and have not, feeling sure that they will do so when they are aware of the importance of the Society's annual giving program—The William and Mary Fund. This year the Fund is dedicated to continuing the program and assistance in the area of faculty salaries and research grants; and is accepting the two challenges as outlined below. To meet our obligations and to realize our objectives, the Fund must collect \$50,000.00.

## TWO CHALLENGES &

The 1959 William and Mary Fund

1. A program supported by the United States Steel Corporation designed to recognize institutions which have best demonstrated notable success or improvement in alumni giving and an organized effort to broaden the base of support. William and Mary will be competing in the large coeducational group. In this group last year the average participation figure was 20.3%; at William and Mary 21% of our alumni contributed. The average alumni gift to their respective funds was \$26.85; at William and Mary our average gift was \$8.82. For our effort to be competitive we must at least double our participation figure (42%) and we must double our average gift figure (\$17.64).

2. With the endowment of the Jefferson Chair in government, the alumni of the College of William and Mary will restore this institution to its traditional position of leadership in the training of young people for service in an understanding of the

local, state, and national areas of interest and public affairs.

Research and publication, lecture and seminar, conference and clinic on all aspects of public affairs, in their broadest sense, will contribute significantly to the scholarly reputation of the College and to the practical need for expert attention focused upon the problems of democratic processes in the context of a complicated modern society.

The alumni initiative in making possible the Jefferson Chair of Government at the College of William and Mary will bring to the College a prestige worthy of the name of its illustrious son, and a program of scholarly activity many times the financial aid the chair itself will represent.

**PLUS** continuing alumni programs already established, particularly the support of improved faculty salaries and faculty research grants, and maintaining alumni activities such as Alumni Day, Homecoming, class reunions, and this magazine.

## Colonial Echoes



A FTER graduation from William and Mary in 1937, Carl Mitson went to work with the Vick Chemical Co. as a sales trainee. For one year he called on all types of retail outlets from city department stores to country general stores.

Then Carl was given the job of taking Vaporub, Vatronol and Cough Drops to Venezuela. Before selling the stores in each town, advertising had to be nailed up on all street corner houses and samples distributed house to house. Carl and a native boy covered the country in something just short of a year by using a Chevrolet part time, river boats other times and horses and donkeys still others.

For about five years Carl continued in the Foreign Division of Vick traveling back and forth between New York and South America on special assignments to most all of the major countries.

Just prior to the War he went with Sterling Drug International and when the War started was deferred along with about half a dozen others to go to South America, set up in each country a drug business, and compete directly with the German drug interests who were using their income for propaganda and espionage purposes.


Much news flows in on the Spring breezes to these parts, so here is the latest about us. . . .

**RESOLVED**, that it is advisable and in the best interests of the Corporation to increase the maximum number of directors of the Corporation from eleven to twenty-five, and in order to accomplish the said change to amend the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation by restating Article VII to read as follows:

The maximum number of directors of the corporation is to be twenty-five, and the number may be increased or decreased from time to time within this maximum upon recommendation of the Board of Directors and approval of the members of the Society in either a general or special meeting, provided that there shall never be less than three directors.

The President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, shall be chosen from the Board of Directors by the said Board. The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the bylaws of this Society.

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that a special meeting of the members of the Corporation be, and hereby is, called to convene on the sixth day of June, 1959, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon at the Great Hall of the Wren Building at The College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Virginia, for the purpose of considering the said restatement of Article VII of the Articles of Incorporation in the manner and in the form hereinabove set forth, and that the Secretary of the Corporation be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to serve written notice of such meeting upon each and every member of the Corporation, stating the time, place, and purpose of the meeting as hereinabove set forth, stating specifically that amendment of the Articles of Incorporation in the manner and form aforesaid has been proposed, and accompanying such notice with a copy of the proposed restatement of Article VII of the Articles of Incorporation, in the manner provided by law;

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that the Officers of the Corporation be, and hereby are, authorized and directed to take such action as may in their opinion be necessary or convenient to carry out the foregoing resolutions and the intent thereof and, that in the event of the members of the Corporation voting in favor of amending the same as aforesaid, the Officers of the Corporation be, and hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, deliver and file the necessary documents and certifications required by law;

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that it is also in the best interests of the Corporation to increase the Board of Directors from nine members to fifteen members, and in order to accomplish such change that the Bylaws of the Corporation be amended in the following respects:

By restating Article I, Section 1 to read as follows:

The exclusive ultimate control of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in its active members and shall be exercised, subject to control of said members, by a Board of Directors consisting of fifteen members, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum.

By restating Article I, Section 2 to read as follows:

Members of the Board of Directors shall be members of the Society, their terms of office and method of election being as follows:

(a) Directors shall be elected by members of the Society for terms of three years and shall take office on December 1st, following their election.

(b) They shall be elected in such manner that five directors will be elected annually.

(c) One member of the Board of Directors must be a resident of Williamsburg.

(d) Members of the Board of Directors, except any member resident of Williamsburg, shall not be eligible for election to more than two consecutive terms but may be eligible for election to any number of terms not consecutive.


(e) Vacancies on the Board of Directors which may occur between regular elections shall be filled by the Board of Directors then remaining in office.
