THE Governor of Virginia has signed into law an act that will establish The College of William and Mary. Included in this system will be the College of William and Mary in Norfolk (See story Page 6), the Richmond Professional Institute and two new junior colleges located in Petersburg, and on the ower Peninsula (Hampton-Newport News) and the College of William and Mary in Virginia. The bill further provides for the establishment of the Office of Chancellor and increasing the size of the Board of Visitors from nine to fifteen.

This bill in effect recognizes a system of higher education established in Virginia more than thirty years ago by the 19th President of the College of William and Mary, Dr. J. A. C. Chandler. From their beginning the chief administrative officers of the institution in Norfolk and Richmond have been responsible to the President of the College in Williamsburg. However, both of the units have experienced spectacular growth in recent years (R.P.I. total enrollment 2,142—Norfolk total enrollment 2,324). The result has been that the administrative responsibilities of the president's office in Williamsburg have grown to a point where some reorganization was absolutely necessary. Under the new law it appears that the chief administrators of the various institutions will report to the chancellor; the chancellor in turn is responsible to the Board of Visitors of The Colleges of William and Mary.

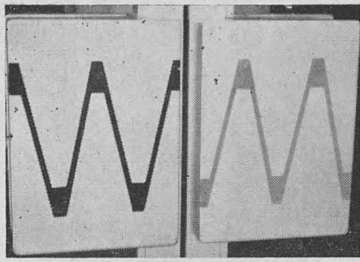
The new law recognizes the uniqueness of the College in Williamsburg and it specifies "that the Board of Visitors is hereby empowered to choose distinctive and appropriate titles for all constituent colleges except for the College at Williamsburg which shall be known as The College of William and Mary in Virginia; further, the ancient charter of the College will continue to be recognized. The General Assembly appropriated \$30,000 for the year 1961 for the operation of the Office of Chancellor. (See story on Page four)

It is presented here as a progress report on one of the College's children. Most of our alumni know of the Norfolk College; yet very few have any idea about the extent of its operation. There is one exception to this last statement and that is the group of William and Mary graduates who have lived in Norfolk and/or have transferred from Norfolk to the College in Williamsburg. For years there was a steady stream of junior transfers to our College, but now in Norfolk there is a four-year, degree-granting institution that in size is much larger than the parent college. This story must also be a tribute to a man who had the vision to establish a center of higher education for Virginia's largest population concentration (and now one of the fastest growing areas on the east coast), Dr. J. A. C. Chandler; to the present administration of the College who have guided the institution in its recent growth; to Provost Webb; to the faculty, the undergraduates, the alumni, and to the citizens of Norfolk who have proven by their support that they want and are determined to have an institution of the highest quality.

Hail Delaware!

Approximately 100 alumni living in the State of Delaware would like to extend a challenge to the William and Mary alumni across the nation. In the 1959 William and Mary Fund drive 73% of their number contributed. This is truly a significant figure when you realize that the national average for alumni participation is 21% (William and Mary alumni—22%). 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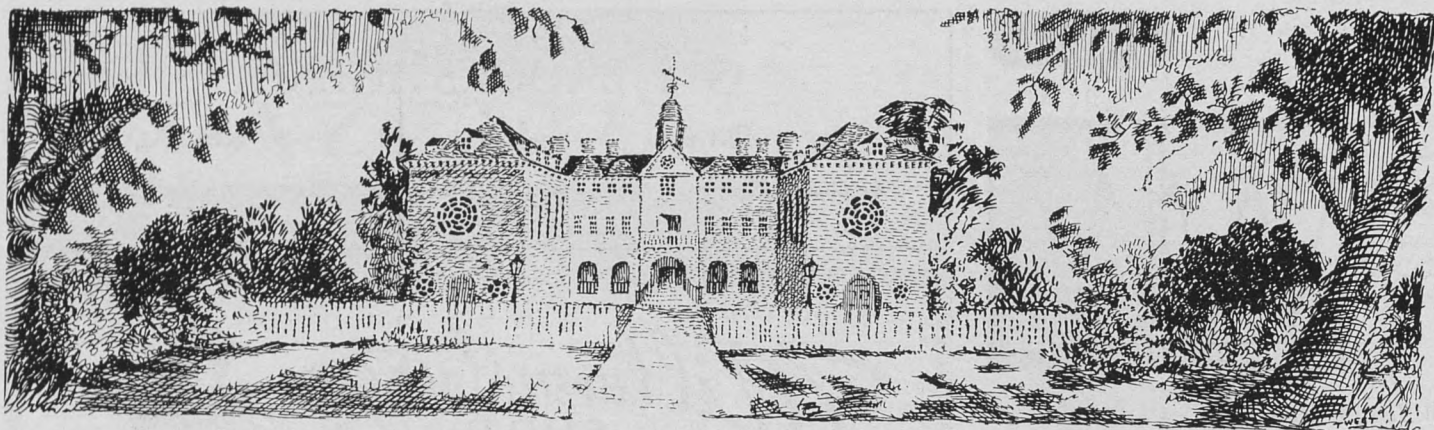

On the Campus

As a clear acknowledgement of the importance of the college's ever-enlarging and ever-enriching educational program, the 1960 Virginia General Assembly and Governor J. Lindsay Almond Jr. have given a broad new name to the overall William and Mary system. Now William and Mary and its associate colleges or branches—what commonly had been called collectively "The Greater College"—is known as The Colleges of William and Mary in Virginia.

The new name symbolizes the big role of William and Mary to provide more educational opportunities in Tidewater and it indicates a unified administrative setup to guide and coordinate The Colleges.

Legislation enacted by the General Assembly and approved by the Governor provides for the appointment of a chancellor to oversee the activities at Williamsburg, Richmond, Norfolk and two new junior colleges soon to be established with the assistance of William and Mary at Newport News and Petersburg. Chief executives at the various branches will have direct administrative responsibility for their respective campuses, but will report to the chancellor and through him to the Board of Visitors. As yet, however, the chancellor has not been named.

In order to direct the expanding program of The Colleges, the Board of Visitors has been enlarged from 11 to 15 members. New appointees announced recently by the Governor are Dr. H. Hudnall Ware of Richmond, a former member of the board; Mayor W. Fred Duckworth of Norfolk; Frank A. Ernst of Petersburg and J. B. Woodward Jr. of Newport News. Delegate Charles K.

Hutchens of Newport News was named to succeed Delegate Russell M. Carneal of Williamsburg and James P. Harper of Norfolk was selected to succeed Roy R. Charles of Norfolk. Reappointed this year to the board are Judge H. Lester Hooker of Richmond, T. Edward Temple of Danville and W. Brooks George of Richmond.

The expanded board is expected to name the chancellor for The Colleges and will assist State agencies and civic and governmental associations in Newport News and Petersburg to organize the two-year community colleges. Preliminary plans for these branch colleges already have been made and they are slated to open in September, 1961. The new institutions, which at first will have an enrollment of about 200 students, are designed to help meet the education needs of two important and fast-growing urban areas.

As another step toward the improvement of the physical plant at Williamsburg, the 1960 General Assembly and the Governor have granted funds for needed buildings. The capital outlays will enable William and Mary to carry out some phases of its master development program for the Williamsburg campus.

Funds have been allocated for the construction of a woman's gymnasium and a men's dormitory. Additional money has been earmarked for the drawing of preliminary plans for a \$1 million-plus science hall which will be erected some time in the future.

A modern language laboratory will be installed in Washington Hall; some existing facilities will be remodeled; new

books and laboratory equipment will be purchased.

William and Mary is continuing its efforts to raise funds for the construction of a \$3 million library, a project that has been given a top priority rating. The college is seeking to solicit \$2 million to supplement the \$1 million already conditionally granted by the General Assembly.

At the 1960 session, the General Assembly enacted special legislation that permits William and Mary to sell parcels of historic land to Colonial Williamsburg so that "important restoration and reconstruction work may be carried on." All money received from the sale of the property, the General Assembly specified, is to be expended toward the construction of a new library, or debt reduction.

The property, previously part of Eastern State Hospital, includes the 18th Century location of the Travis House and the site of a colonial mental hospital and the Custis family land. The two parcels—comprising a total of about 16 acres—are adjacent to Williamsburg's Restored Area and front on both sides of Francis Street.

Another key campus development project is nearly complete. William and Mary's \$1 million Campus Center has been finished and furnished and is scheduled to be open this Spring. The new building will be a focal point of campus extracurricular and recreational activities.

The center contains a number of lounges; two music listening rooms equipped with hi-fi record players; a reading room; the Wigwam snack bar and cafeteria; game rooms with billiard tables, table tennis and four bowling alleys; meet-

ings rooms for campus organizations; editorial offices for the "Flat Hat," "Royalist" and "Colonial Echo"; a theater-auditorium and an oval cherry-paneled ballroom.

WILLIAM and Mary celebrated its 267th anniversary February 8 by awarding honorary degrees to a retired American diplomat, a retired Naval officer, a Virginia official and a book publisher. The degrees were conferred by James M. Robertson, rector of the Board of Visitors, during a special Charter Day convocation in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

Recipients of the college's honorary doctor of laws degree were Walter S. Robertson, former Assistant Secretary of State; Virginia's Lieutenant Governor A. E. S. Stephens and Admiral Jerauld Wright, past commander of the United States Atlantic Fleet and supreme Allied commander Atlantic of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Book publisher Alfred A. Knopf received the college's honorary doctor of humane letters degree.

Robertson, an authority in Far Eastern affairs, delivered the main address and urged the United States to continue its support of Free China and not to recognize Red China and to help keep the Peiping regime out of the United Nations. He told the convocation audience that America's policy "to oppose by every feasible means the spread of Communist influence and power" demands that the United States

"continue to support and strengthen the anti-Communist Republic of China." He called Free China "firmly oriented in the Free World as an alternate focus of Chinese loyalty to the aggressive, threatening International Communist regime."

Robertson, an alumnus and a former member of the Board of Visitors, was honored as a champion of the cause of freedom in Asia and the Far East. The citation notes: "He has been an envoy of American good will and friendship towards people everywhere. Respected and honored by all who have associated with him, he is a symbol of the devoted public servant and a model of democracy and freedom."

The lieutenant governor, also an alumnus, was cited as "a legislator, leader and outstanding citizen." The William and Mary citation stated: "In anticipating, determining and satisfying the needs of Virginia and her people in the fields of health, education, conservation, finance, insurance and the general welfare, he has shown keen perception, extraordinary devotion to duty and deep wisdom."

Admiral Wright was called "one of the key architects of the defensive plans of the Free World."

Knopf, a board member for the Institute of Early American History and Culture, was recognized for his unique place in the literary history of America. "Under his discriminating direction," the citation read, "the business of publishing

has merged with the art of publishing."

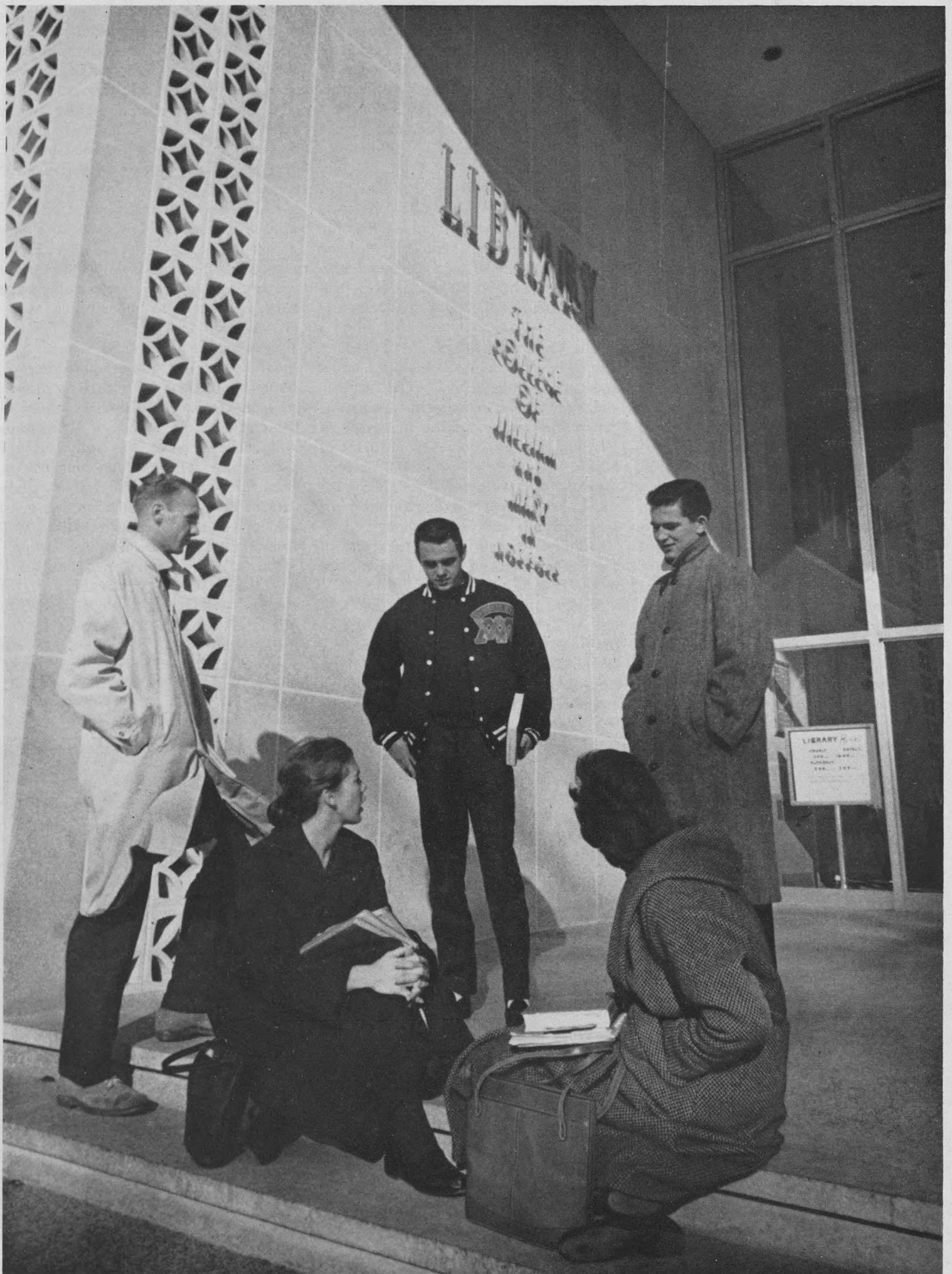
On hand for the academic ceremony was Governor Almond, who last June received an honorary doctor of laws degree from William and Mary.

A number of special grants recently have been given to William and Mary to carry out specific educational projects. A grant of \$97,200 to support a 1960 summer institute of science and mathematics has been awarded by the National Science Foundation. The grant represents an increase of \$44,200 over the award made to William and Mary last year for the institute in science and mathematics for high school and junior college teachers. A grant of \$10,000 from the Coe Foundation will support a summer program in American studies to be offered to secondary teachers of American history. A grant from the National Society of Daughters of the Barons of Runnemeade will make possible the lamination of some of the college's John Marshall papers. And Walter J. Zable, BS, '37, president of the Cubic Corporation, has given a block of 700 Cubic shares to the William and Mary Endowment Association.

On the student scene, a varsity basketball player, David N. Bottoms Jr. of Auburn, Ala., has been elected president of the student body for the 1960-61 academic year. Voted vice president was Perry E. Ellis of Portsmouth and secretary-treasurer was Miss Maurene V. Rumazza of Newport, R. I.

Students at the College of William and Mary in Norfolk—like students at almost every college—gather on the library steps to talk about the latest philosophy or government exams, Saturday's date, the Cold War, sports or their own campus. At Norfolk the campus is a new one, a growing one; it is a community campus with modern buildings and bright, fresh ideas.

WE'LL need that cornfield over there, too."

That statement raised the eyebrows of some of Norfolk's City Fathers, but not those of the man who made it, Dr. J. A. C. Chandler, President of the College of William and Mary. He was a man of vision, no doubt looking far beyond the cornfield. The time was three decades ago; the scene, the steps of the old, abandoned Larchmont School, just donated to the College by the City of Norfolk.

Today at The College of William and Mary in Norfolk there exists an intense atmosphere of change, of growth. The completion and occupation of a \$1,000,000-plus library and the nearly completed Fine Arts Building stand in evidence.

One need only walk about the campus and chat with faculty members and students to be convinced that a great transformation is underway. Even the newest architecture, with its solar screen walls, exemplifies this change.

The realization of the potentialities of the College has long been delayed. Although there have been many developments in the last few years that have helped to mold the school, the calendar must be turned back to the year 1919 in order to appreciate fully the farsightedness of Dr. Chandler, father of the present President of William and Mary. Norfolk was hungry for higher education. The cry went out to William and Mary and the College answered as best it could, sending dedicated professors to conduct evening classes, often after teaching a full load in the morning. Since these early beginnings thousands of students have

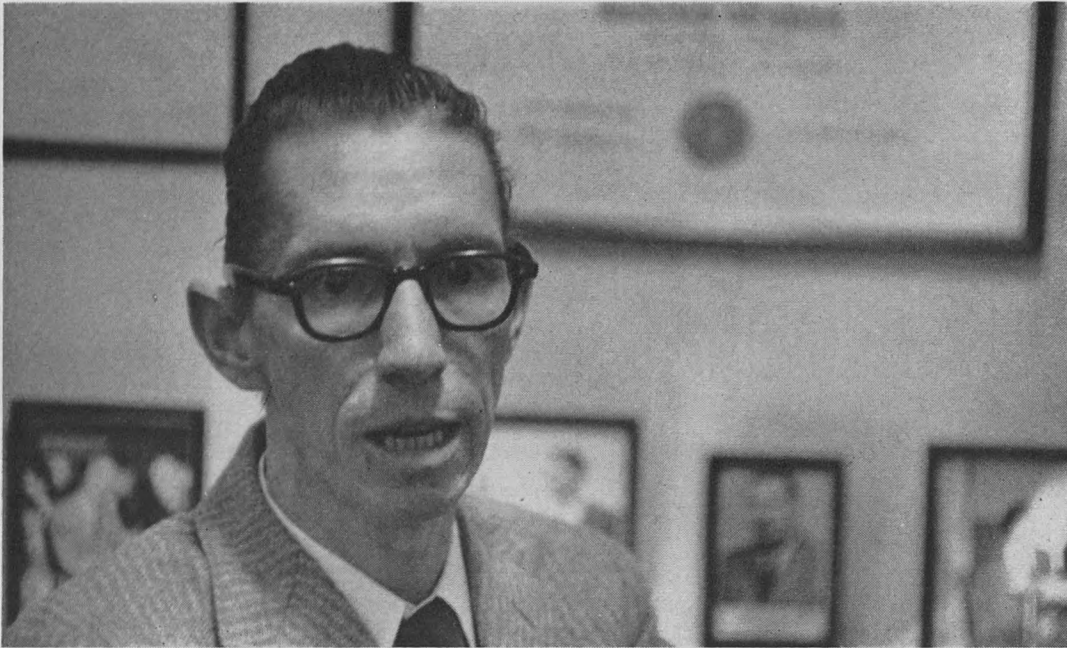
gained their higher education or parts of it from the Norfolk institution.

Today the College offers programs for full four-year degree study. There are about 5,000 students at Norfolk. There is a night school enrollment of more than 1,300 students from all over the lower Tidewater area. In addition more than 600 students are pursuing special training in the Technical Institute, which is the outgrowth of courses begun in 1939 to train technicians for the Naval Air Station. When World War II broke out, the institute was quickly expanded into defense training courses and was considered to be one of the most successful of such programs on the East Coast. Today the Technical Institute offers full-time day and night courses in many phases of electronics, architectural and general drafting, as well as basic mechanical skills.

Students interested in engineering may pursue a two-year program that is patterned after the one offered at Virginia Polytechnic Institute. This plan enables the student to get the first two years in Norfolk and then transfer to VPI for the last two years without losing the face value of grades received.

The Norfolk College offers a Summer session that attracts students from many other colleges. In a recent survey it was revealed that students enrolled from 107 different colleges, representing 30 states.

Men and women enrolled in all of these various programs are filtering through classrooms in an almost continuous stream. Classes are held in every available, as well as conceivable, place, from old Army barracks to one of most modern structures in the city.



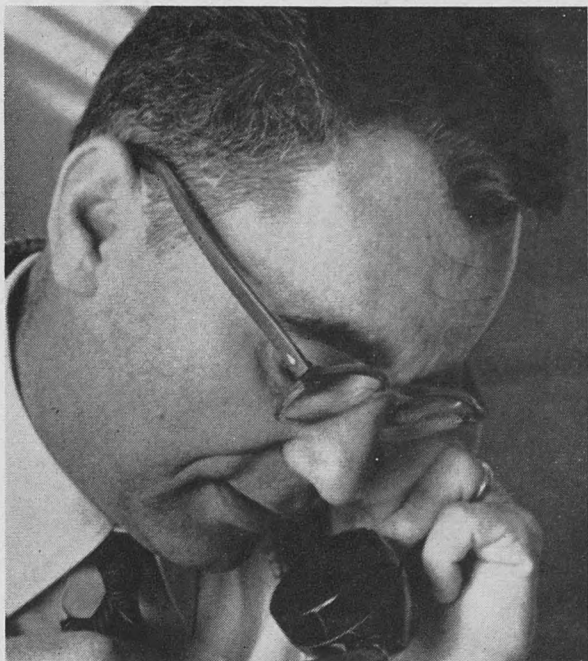
William W. Seward, an English professor, strongly believes "Every indication is that the Norfolk college is destined to become one of the largest institutions of higher learning in the State."

Growth AND Quality Education

MEMBERS of the William and Mary faculty at Norfolk all are quick to point out two main characteristics of their community college: it's growing, and rapidly; its quality of education is good, and getting still better. "The College of William and Mary in Norfolk has a great future," predicts W. G. Akers, head of the modern languages department. "It is already growing rapidly and is surely destined to expand into a much larger institution, meeting more and more the educational needs of this large center of population." William W. Seward, head of the English department, notes: "The opening of the new library introduced a new era with respect both to physical outlay and to academic advancement. All of this portends more buildings, equipment, a larger faculty and a decidedly larger student body." "In spite of its recent growth," adds Akers, "I believe that the quality of teaching and the caliber of the faculty today are as high as ever in our 30 years." "This college," continues Seward, "has consistently prided itself in the quality of its teaching. I am convinced that in its evolution from a very small junior college to a senior college with a present enrollment of more than 5,000 students, the quality of education has not suffered; on the whole, I am inclined to think it has improved."



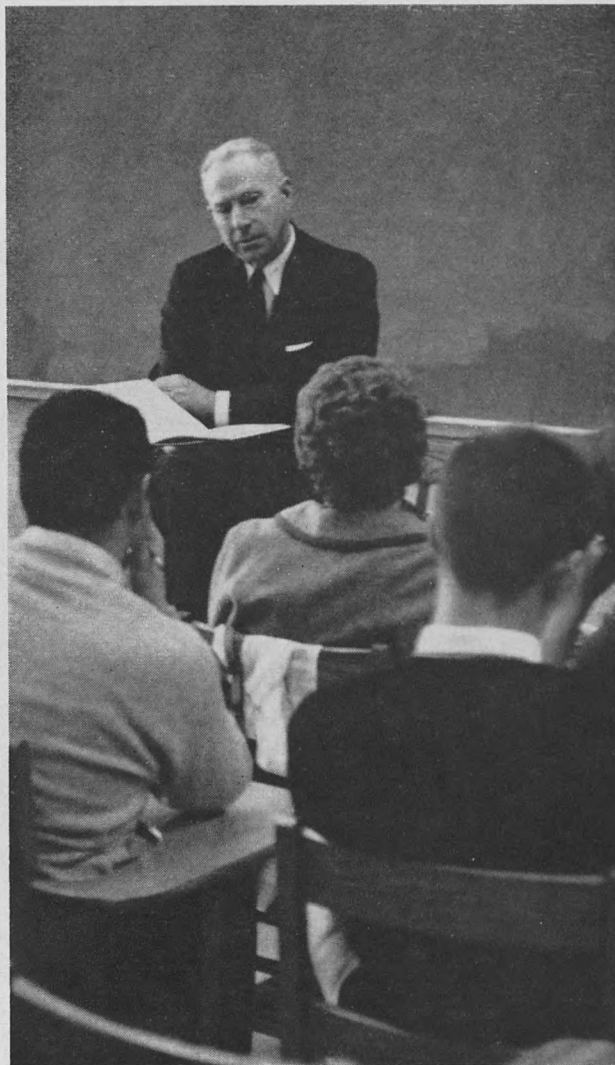
W. G. Akers, language professor, "Quality of teaching and caliber of the faculty are as high as ever."



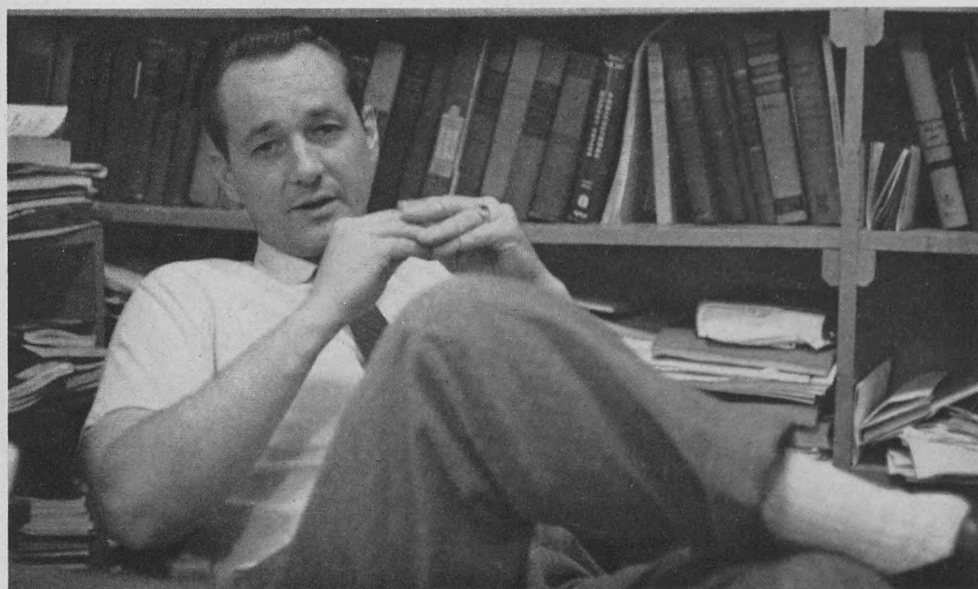
Stanley R. Pliska feels the Norfolk school is the fastest growing college in Virginia, if not the South.

IN addition to its regular faculty members—such as Stanley R. Pliska, head of the history department, and John R. Tabb, head of the division of business administration—the college in Norfolk draws on leading citizens of the community to help teach students certain professional courses. One such visiting lecturer is R. K. T. Larson, associate editor of the Norfolk *Virginian-Pilot* (and W&M alumni medallion recipient). He explains: "We seek to develop each individual in wisdom and knowledge, preparing him to grow, to develop originality, to ride with the punches of exploding times and to adjust." And, he adds, "right here, within our sight, is enough of a changing story to keep students writing as long as they are here and long after." Men like Larson and the other devoted members of the regular faculty answer one of the Norfolk college's largest needs: More dedicated and competent teachers. "Our biggest single problem," says Tabb, "is the difficulty of recruiting additional faculty." Tabb and other professors note that the Norfolk salary scale is low, fringe benefits largely non-existent, teaching loads high and administrative duties burdensome. Unfortunately, as Tabb adds, "not everyone can be sold on the future."

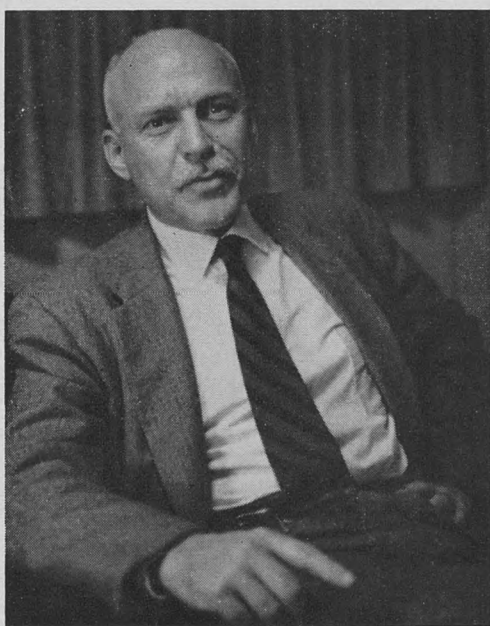

THE college in Norfolk is twice attached: it is part of The Greater College of William and Mary and it is a community college associated with the City of Norfolk. Both William and Mary and Norfolk have been responsible for its development; both the college and the city guide its future. The relationship between the Norfolk and the Williamsburg campus is almost entirely an administrative one; there is very little contact between the faculty or student body of the two schools. More contacts would be welcome, say some Norfolk faculty members, but distance and busy schedules preclude more such association. "The College of William and Mary in Norfolk," observes Reuben Cooper of the speech department, "is directly related to the health and welfare of this increasing metropolis. The future of one is intimately related to the future of the other." And the future, as most everyone agrees with G. W. Whitehurst of the history department, "looks excellent." He comments: "I think that we are reaching a point where we are fulfilling the educational needs of the community." C. L. Adams, head of the physics department, points out: "While the direct affiliation with Williamsburg at the beginning was absolutely necessary, now it would be to the advantage of the Norfolk division to have its own identity." Cooper agrees: "It is true that the Norfolk college has grown under the leadership of its provost, its local faculty and the citizenry of Norfolk. Yet the parent college has made this growth possible. Perhaps the child is old and strong enough to strike out for himself." But others disagree. "If there is a closer relationship between all three schools (Richmond, W&M and Norfolk) they would be a tremendous force in Virginia educational circles," notes C. S. Sherwood, head of the chemistry department.

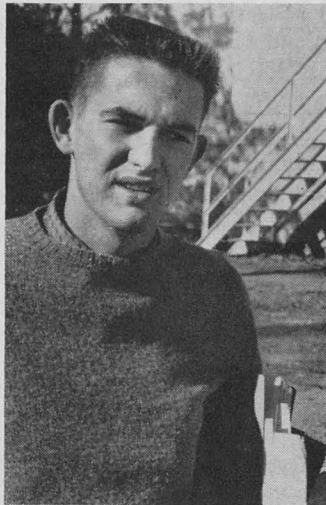

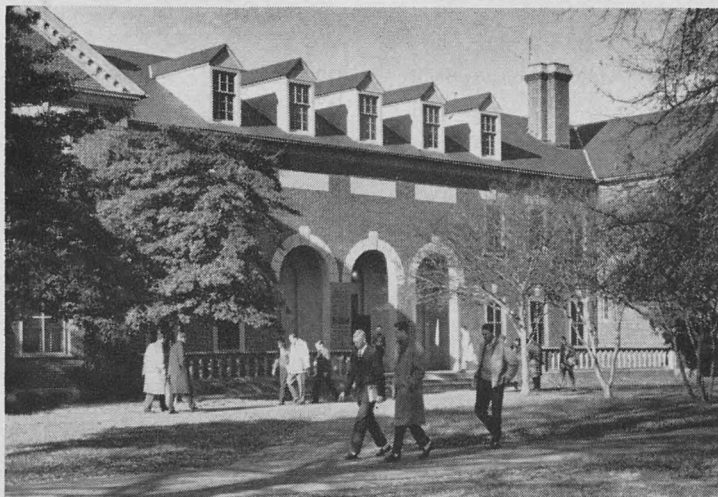

THE campus of a community college has its own distinctive atmosphere. At Norfolk many students are married, many work and all of them live at home and commute to class. Students complain that they have a difficult time getting together and planning campus activities. But some older students, like B. K. Osborne, believe "a city college affords an excellent opportunity for the older student." Hugh Ward, head of the honor council, thinks the basic shortcoming of the campus is the lack of college spirit. Sue Dusingberre, editor of the yearbook, reports a dance with a big-name orchestra "fell flat." Nevertheless, nearly every student agrees the standards at Norfolk are high and level of instruction is challenging.

A Successful Fund

EACH year the William and Mary Fund grows, setting new standards for the next year. The 1959 Fund was the most successful ever conducted; the challenge for 1960, therefore, is especially great.

Almost \$10,000 more was contributed to the 1959 Fund than was given to the 1958 Fund. A total of 2,788 alumni and friends of William and Mary last year donated \$35,421.17 to the 10-year-old educational fund-raising program, as compared to the \$25,685.95 contributed in 1958 by 2,561 persons. (The 1959 donors are listed on the following pages.)

The most significant fact about the results of the 1959 Fund is the marked increase in the average gift. In the 1958 campaign it was \$9.97, but in the 1959 appeal it rose to \$12.56.

The largest single gift to the 1959 Fund was \$1,551, given by an anonymous donor who matched all contributions from Delaware. The smallest gift was 50 cents.

A total of 1,299 persons gave over \$10. A total of 852 alumni and friends gave between \$10 and \$15 and 284 donated between \$15 and \$25. There were 270 alumni who gave between \$25 and \$50 and there were 55 who contributed between \$50 and \$100. Twenty-five persons donated from \$100 to \$500; one alumnus gave between \$500 and \$1,000 and two alumni gave more than \$1,000.

The class of 1948 has the largest number of donors: 141 of them. The largest amount of money was contributed by members of the class of 1936: a total of \$2,329. The class of '36 also registered the largest increase over the previous year.

During 1959 the Alumni Society solicited all of the 14,850 known alumni of William and Mary. Approximately 22 per cent of them supported the Fund, which compares favorably with the American Alumni Council's national average of 22.5 per cent for effective solicitation. Of the 2,788 contributors to the 1959 Fund, 2,213 were graduates of the college and 575 were former students. And of the 2,788 contributors, 1,372 were women.

There were 409 new contributors to the 1959 Fund. Of the former contributors, 811 of them increased their gift.

But 1960 is a new year. And the 1960 William and Mary Fund now is underway. The new challenge to alumni is, indeed, especially great.

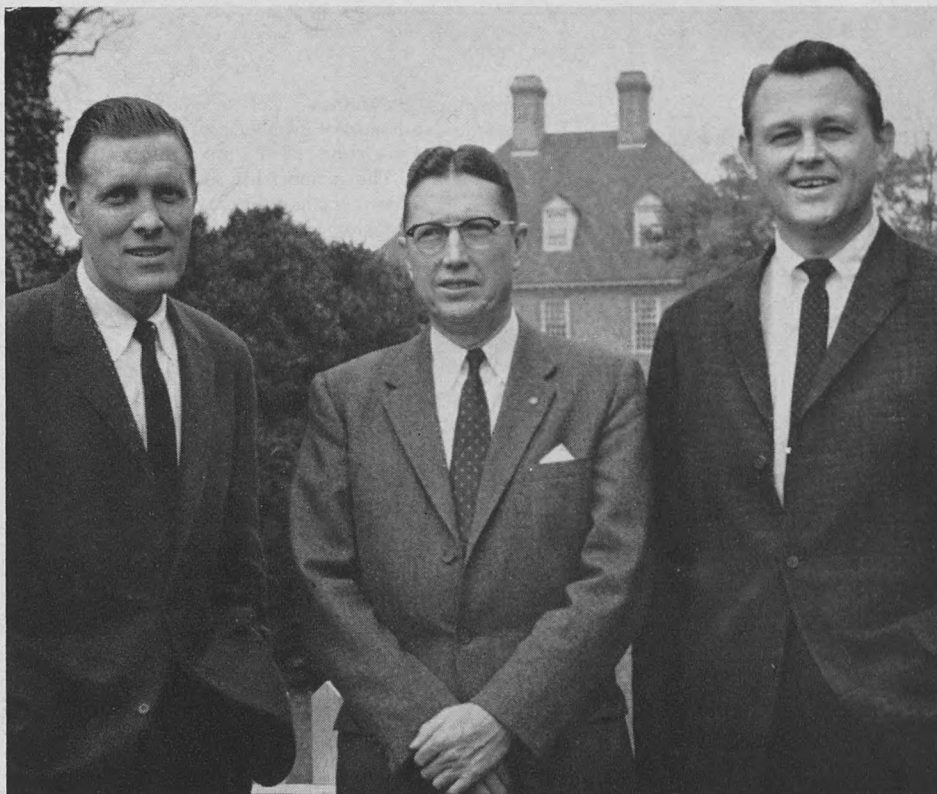

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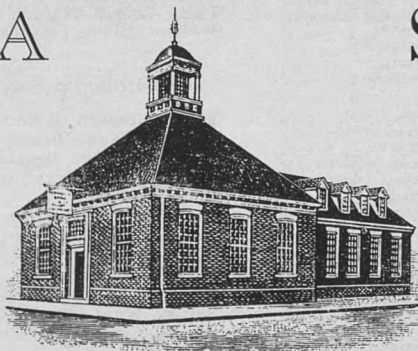

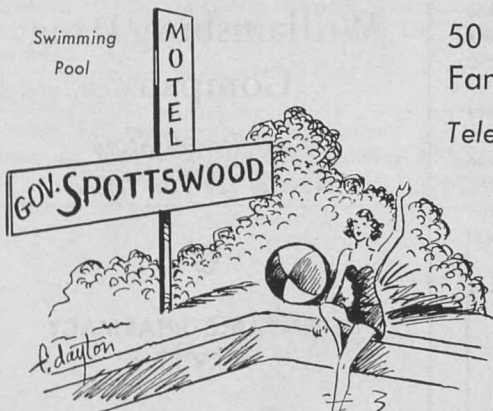

Milt Perry, curator of the museum at the Harry S. Truman Library, with Mr. Truman and his honorary degree from William and Mary, awarded in 1948.

In the last 10 years Milton F. Perry, '50, has moved from museum to museum, somewhat like an Army officer from post to post. He now is curator of the museum at the Harry S. Truman Library in Independence, Mo., an assignment he finds most stimulating and interesting.

Perry first was associated with Colonial Williamsburg as assistant to the director of craft shops. Afterwards, as curator of Fort Macon State Park in Morehead City, N. C., he directed the partial restoration of a Civil War American seacoast fortification and the installation of a museum.

In 1953 he went to the West Point Museum at the U. S. Military Academy as curator of history. His duties included setting up museum exhibits, lecturing to cadets, helping students with research projects and performing historical research into the museum collections.

"My most interesting find," he recalls, "was identifying the actual battle maps Custer had with him the day he was killed at the Little Big Horn in 1876."

In January, 1958, Perry joined the staff of the Harry S. Truman Library.

As curator of the museum he heads one of three divisions, the museum, the archives and the book collection. The museum is the section of the library that is open to the public.

"So far we have been host," says Perry, "to more than a quarter of a million people. We also provide tours for educational groups and give talks and lectures in the auditorium. Former President Truman has his office in the building and is a most stimulating influence."

Perry has written a number of articles for various magazines and has co-authored one book, "Patton and His Pistols," a study of the late World War II general. He currently is working on another book, one on the Civil War.

In addition to his work at the library he is an advisor for the Fort Leavenworth, Kans., Museum, the Old Watkins Mill Association and the Jackson County Museum in Independence. For the county museum he has assisted in the restoration of a century-old jail and marshal's home.

Perry is married. He and his wife have three children. "All girls—possible future W&M coeds!" he adds.
