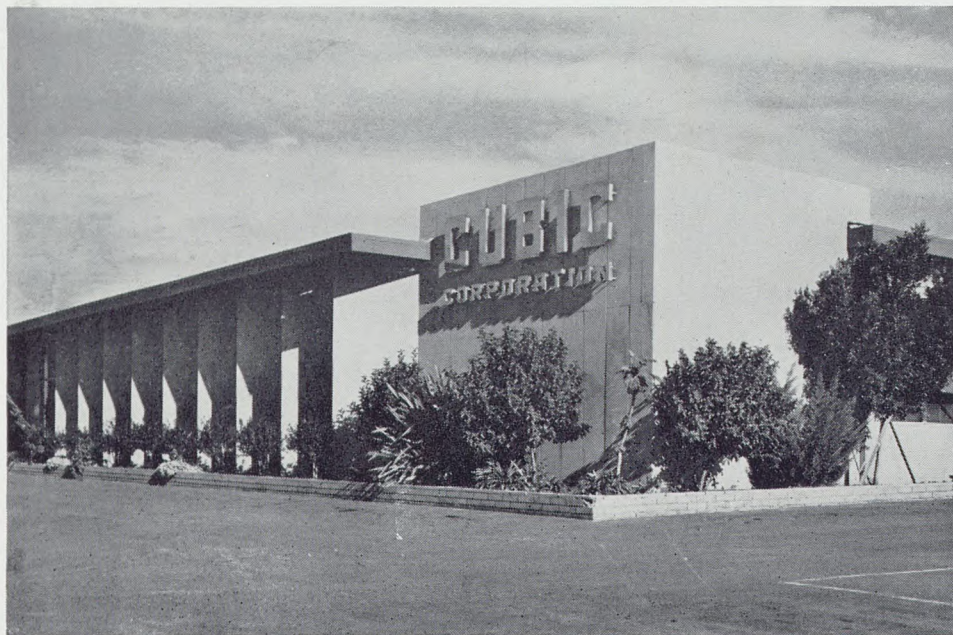

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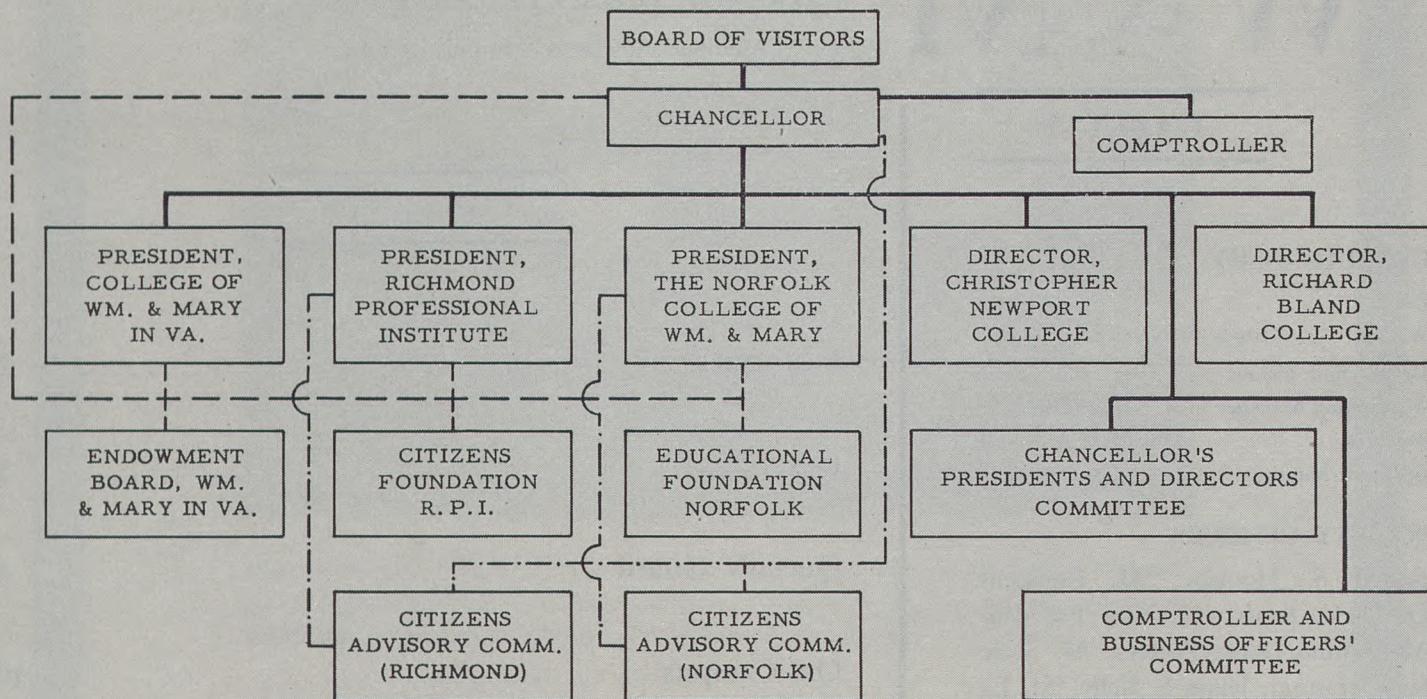

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THE COLLEGE OF W&M 1960 - 1962



With little fanfare the General Assembly of Virginia in the closing minutes of the 1960 session passed a bill calling for the immediate reorganization of the College of William and Mary and its affiliates in Norfolk and Richmond. The result of this 1960 bill is pictured in the document above.

ONE of the first items to greet the General Assembly on its return to Richmond in 1962 was House bill 156 recommended by the State Council of Higher Education and introduced by Williamsburg's and James City County's Russell Carneal. This bill called for the reorganization of the Colleges of William and Mary.

The main points of the bill affecting our College were (1) that the name William and Mary be reserved solely for the College in Williamsburg; (2) that the chief executive officer of the College of William and Mary should be its President and he should be directly responsible to the Board of Visitors; (3) that the institutions in Norfolk and Richmond should be established under separate boards of control; (4) that the two junior colleges would be governed as directed by the Board of Visitors of the College of William and Mary.

The bill as amended (the amendment compromising none of the Council's basic ideas) passed both houses with only 5 negative votes (an astounding feat for any

legislation in Virginia) and was signed into law by Governor Harrison on the 16th of February, to become effective 1 July 1962.

Opponents of the bill contended that the College of William and Mary (in Williamsburg) was being cut to pieces and would suffer politically when the appropriation's million was divided due to the loss of Norfolk and Richmond. The proponents of the bill found their keynote to be Virginia's new Governor who observed in one of his first statements to the Commonwealth, "The College of William and Mary, founded in 1693, is to all our hearts and minds a distinctive institution in the history of this Commonwealth and nation. . . . A College with so rich a promise of fulfilling such a timely mission—a College that has withstood the ravages of war and fires—does not have to compromise its identity and character, or bargain its name for support by this Commonwealth." An editorial in the *Richmond News Leader* put it simply—A time to walk alone.

But this letter wasn't started to promote the library, though, before closing the subject, I think maybe you have been the patron saint of the library, or rather the librarians, for where on earth could one find such gentlemen and scholars as Swem and Servies!

What I want now is a man to man talk with you about the new president.

You and I, and thousands of others who have heart-strings attached to the old college know that the president who will be inaugurated this week is of the William and Mary mold, in its best traditions. And so is the First Lady of the College.

Already you can notice the permeation of their personal warmth, their charm, their inspiration, their purposeful leadership among the students, faculty, alumni and the Williamsburg community. You would have felt it, standing in the yard of a winter's day even, ice and snow encrusted. It is like the glow of long-lingering embers in the Great Hall's fireplace.

Your democratic lordship, how well you know that these responsibilities are enormous and unpredictable. Help ease these burdens. Would that you were on

Speaking of football, you may remember the first time I wrote about you. That was way back in the 'Twenties when I was doing the work in the press bureau for Dr. Chandler, another man of vision and spirit. I named an Early All-American football team. George Washington was the fullback, Thomas Jefferson the quarterback, John Marshall the center, John Tyler end and so on down the alumni list of great men. I believe I designated you as the coach. You have some of the attributes of a great coach: staunchness, quiet strength, the ability to accept reverses without tearing out your hair, or blaming your own inadequacies on the greenness of the players and I've never heard you berate an athlete who gave his all, though when you looked down at him you could make him feel mighty small. Your stoic qualities, too, were felt in cubicle and classroom.

You served a great purpose, too, in deflating a pompous alumnus, returned to tell the board and administrator how to run the college.

But back to the main theme: If ever you have been the protector and the guiding spirit be so now. We have a son and daughter of the Old William and Mary, gracious and knowledgeable. Be their light. To the young student, point the way to their presence that they may be molded of the old mold.

Who knows? Some day the student who encounters another in passing on the walkways (if the subjects be male, of course) may say in greeting, as they did in my day: "Gentleman."

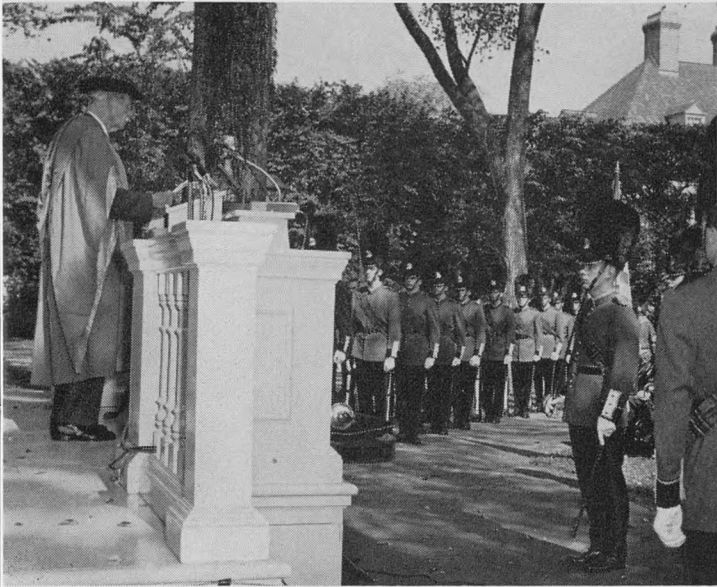


THE Queen's Guard is a new face on the campus, but to next year's freshmen, the future generations of students, and very soon to all upperclassmen and alumni, the colorful Guard will not only be an enduring part of the college, but a tradition considered as prominent as the Wren Building itself. Acknowledging the tremendous enthusiasm with which the unit has been accepted in Williamsburg, it is apparent that everyone feels that this is something which belongs in our college.

The original conception of the Queen's Guard centers around seven men; the realization around many alumni and friends. The seven men are: Davis Y. Paschall ('32), James A. Servies, Russell T. Hastings, Col. Thomas A. Duke, Col. Marcus Gewinner, James Kelly (51), and Robert Hornsby ('41). President Paschall was a driving force in the rapidity of the development and gave official permission for the activation of the plan. Messrs. Servies and Hastings designed the uniform, flag, and coat of arms. Col. Duke, PMS of the ROTC Department, and Col. Gewinner, Advisor to the Queen's Guard, rendered the former drill team and drum and bugle corps as the men for the sixty man unit. Finally, the students and alumni-friends, under the leadership of Robert Hornsby, President of the Society of the Alumni, and Jim Kelly, alumni secretary, took the responsibility for financing the venture.

TRADITION HERITAGE SYMBOLISM

THERE is precedent for designating the unit the Queen's Guard, for on several occasions in its history the college has been honored by the recognition and patronage of reigning Queens of Great Britain. On February 8, 1693, William and Mary became the only institution of higher learning in the United States to receive a royal charter from England. This was granted by Her Majesty Queen Mary II with her joint sovereign King William III. During March, 1708, Queen Ann bestowed upon the college by royal proclamation the funds for the purpose of rebuilding the college which had been largely destroyed by fire. In 1957, the college had its third

direct recognition from a reigning Queen of England, when Queen Elizabeth II and her consort, Prince Phillip, visited the college and delivered an address from the balcony of the Wren Building. At this time the school's drill team of the Reserve Officer's Training Corps, the immediate predecessor of the Queen's Guard, served as the honor unit for Her Majesty and his Royal Highness.

The colorful red and black uniforms are in keeping with the English traditions of the college and are symbolic of the three Queens. The black seal-skin grenadier's cap bears a gold sunburst which is an emblem in the coat of arms of the college. The baldric is a pleated Stuart tartan of the family of Queen Mary II, and Queen Ann and terminates in two gold tassels, thus signifying the equal union of the House of Stuart and the House of Orange. The scarlet tunic symbolizes the courage and self sacrifice of alumni of the college who gave their lives in this nation's wars.

The Present / The Future



IN an editorial entitled "Added Distinctiveness," the FLAT HAT heralded the Queen's Guard as a "vision realized" and as the unit that "gave dignity to ceremonies that few inaugurations have every enjoyed." The student paper predicted a bright future for the guard, envisioning it as an embedded institution in the college which will belong to every individual associated with William and Mary; and as a symbol of William and Mary to be recognized throughout the state and nation. Now, only 6 months later, these original aspirations are being exceeded. The Queen's Guard has become a symbol which is already recognized internationally.

The unit was asked to participate in the inauguration of Gov. Harrison of Virginia in January, 1962, and was received with great enthusiasm at that time. In April they march as the honor guard to the festival Queen in the cherry blossom festival in Washington. A magazine with an international circulation of 2,000,000, Chevrolet's *Friends*, will feature the Queen's Guard in color during their spring issue. After the president's inauguration two wire services dispatched stories on the Guard which were used from coast to coast by the country's newspapers.

The *Christian Science Monitor* reported in detail the installation of the Guard at William and Mary. This story resulted in letters from as far away as New Zealand. Reuters, the news service for the British Commonwealth, sent out a multi-column color story to their worldwide newspapers. Various persons from the college, the ROTC, and Queen's Guard have been interviewed on 13 radio and television stations concerning the colorful unit. The college radio and television department in conjunction with the ROTC department is producing a half-hour video tape, about William and Mary ROTC, to be distributed to various TV stations on the east coast.

The unit is fast becoming a distinctive part of the national image of William and Mary. This can be credited to the fact that the Queen's Guard has emerged from the same heritage and tradition that is also the background of the college. In the words of President Paschall: "The image of William and Mary is embodied in the majestic thread of spirit that truly knits the generations, each to each. Whether measured in the mute eloquence of reflection on days that were, or in eager anticipation of days that are to be, it binds forever the glories of the past with a promise of an illustrious future."

ON CAMPUS

A PROPOSAL to make William and Mary into an intellectual center for the nation and enactment of the reorganization bill by the Virginia State Legislature highlighted recent campus activities.

Carlisle H. Humelsine, president of Colonial Williamsburg, Inc., outlined the challenges which face W&M and her potential to meet these challenges in the main address at the Charter Day convocation honoring the 269th year of the College's existence. Urging that W&M remember "the restless searching for new ways" which is an inherent part of her tradition, Humelsine proposed a program under which outstanding scholars would be brought to the College for extended periods of time.

He also suggested a "scholarly seminar" for scholars from all nations. "This moment is one in which the College of William and Mary faces the opportunity to become one of the truly great liberal arts institutions," Humelsine said in outlining the programs which he feels will help fulfill the College's potential greatness.

A first step toward this greatness, many feel, was realized as Governor Albert S. Harrison signed into law the bill dissolving the present five-college William and Mary system and setting up the Williamsburg campus as a separate entity with complete autonomy under its Board of Visitors and President.

The reorganization measure encountered relatively little opposition in the legislature even though the Board of Visitors were split ten-to-five against it. Both former Governor J. Lindsay Almond and the new governor had expressed the approval of the bill. Minor difficulties were met in the form of amendments offered by Newport News delegates after the Board of Visitors stated that they found portions of the original bill insulting to their integrity, but the final, amended measure passed both houses almost unanimously.

Under the provisions of the bill, the Williamsburg campus, the Norfolk division and Richmond Professional Institute all now governed by one board of visitors and Chancellor Alvin Duke Chandler—will become separate colleges with their own boards and presidents as chief executives. The two junior colleges in Newport News and Petersburg will remain under the jurisdiction of the W&M Board, and will be coordinated by a chancellor.

While all these vitally important challenges to and changes in the College were being discussed and put into effect, the majority of the campus continued their normal cyclical activities, with exams and rush as the main features.

Of exams, about the best that can be said is that they're over.

Of rush, the best that many would say is that it's over too. Formal sorority rush the first week of the new semester was followed by formal fraternity rush the second week, which was followed by complete collapse. Almost 200 students, mainly freshmen, pledged.

In the midst of all this confusion, doing its best to make everything into utter chaos, came registration, with the sixth—or was it the seventh?—new procedure in as many semesters. This one seemed to work better than most, although some students who had to stand in the long line outside Blow Gym for an hour in the unseasonably cold—even for Williamsburg—cold weather were reportedly suffering mild frostbite. Once inside the gym however the student found things, with the few inevitable exceptions, functioning smoothly. Even *The Flat Hat* could find nothing seriously wrong with the system, except that it probably won't be able to be used next time around.

However once the new semester was firmly underway, the average student found more than enough to occupy his time, what with concerts and plays and debates and rush and parties and club meetings and, incidentally, classes. When he could find his classes, that is. A shortage of classrooms resulted in several highly "peripatetic" classes before things settled down.

The Marshall-Wythe debate Tournament this year attracted 16 teams from as far away as Ohio, Florida, Michigan and West Point. Fordham University walked off with top honors, while host W&M, exhausted by the rigors of staging the tournament, finished a respectable sixth.

Another Marshall-Wythe event, the Symposium, likewise attracted a great deal of attention with its topic, the problems of national security, and its impressive list of speakers for the year, which includes outstanding professors, the first secretary of the British Embassy and the acting Assistant Secretary of Defense.

Also on tap for the lecture-minded among the stu-

dent body and faculty was the spring half of the visiting lecture series.

Two outstanding historians, Louis Gottschalk and Bruce Catton, and an outstanding physicist, George Gamow, are scheduled to visit the college.

The campus intellectual set could take pride not only from this outstanding series of lectures and lecturers but also from the concert agenda. Before the exams began there was a recital by Dr. Frederick Truesdell, head of the music department, and a Collegium Musicum series presentation featuring members of the College in a program of baroque pieces for harpsichord, viola and voice.

Voluptuous Lisa Della Casa, leading soprano for the Met and other opera companies, appeared at Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Auditorium, which was filled to capacity, in the third program of the Concert Series. Her performance drew a standing ovation from the audience, which in turn received three encores.

Rounding out the Concert Series for the year will be the Duo Lee-Makinoitzky. In addition at least one more Collegium Musicum series program is scheduled.

The theatre was still in the midst of its season, preparing for Stephen Vincent Benet's classic *John Brown's Body* and looking ahead to Shakespeare's *Taming of the Shrew*. To help the audience to a better understanding of the plays presented by the theatre, Theta Alpha Phi, honorary dramatics fraternity, initiated lectures explaining some historical or theatrical aspect of each play before the performance.

Two student-written plays, by Steve Bellon and Bill Smith, were premiered at the College to general acclaim. Faculty member Peter Derks and senior Jeanne Raab turned in especially good performances in the one-act plays, which were written for a class assignment.

The theatre crowd and intellectual set also thrilled to the announcement that Dame Judith Anderson will appear at the College in mid-March. She will do scenes from *Medea* and from *MacBeth*.

French grammar and conversation books were being hauled out and dusted off in anticipation of the appearance of a touring French company in Sartre's *Huis-Clos* and Ionesco's *La Cantatrice Chauve*. (*No Exit* and *The Bald Soprano* to the non-French-speaking majority). The plays, to be given entirely in French, are expected to attract a large crowd to Phi Beta.

Would-be linguists who don't find just French stimulating enough will have a good chance to try their listening ability during the Foreign Film Festival being sponsored by the Campus Center.

The classic *Mayerling* premiered the series, which is completely sold out for all four shows, and will be followed by the Japanese *Gates of Hell*. *Jeux Interdits* (*Forbidden Games*) and the Russian *Ballad of a Soldier* will complete the series.

Religious circles, pro and con, hummed to the news that Canon Bryan Green, an Anglican evangelist sometimes compared to Billy Graham, will be on campus for a week during March, holding nightly meetings at

Phi Beta and other campus gathering spots. His agenda includes such topics as "Basic Christianity" and "Love, Friendship and Marriage—a Basis for Sex Morality Today."

In fact, only the political enthusiasts were left out in the cold as far as lecturers and events of interest were concerned, and they almost made it. Barry Goldwater, chief apostle of the "new conservatism" which many partisans claim is "sweeping" the nation's campuses, first accepted a bid to speak here and then within less than a week withdrew his acceptance because of "legislative entanglements."

That element of the campus which could find nothing to discuss in the lecture and theatre line could always fall back on the weather, which this year has furnished an equal amount of discussion and headaches. Palmy balmy mid-60 days were immediately followed by snow, and when it wasn't snowing the campus was inundated (almost literally!) by torrential monsoon rains.

But W&M conformed to its "neither rain nor snow nor sleet . . ." tradition and soggy students slogged their way across campus and dripped through class in high hopes that teacher hadn't been able to make it and was still stuck in the snow or the mud or something. *Good luck!*

Meanwhile William and Mary's aspiring journalists were hard at work. *The Royalist*, a literary magazine which had of late acquired an impressive reputation for being almost as late as the ALUMNI GAZETTE, actually made it out on time. Both first prizes, one for poetry and the other for prose, were carried off by Bruce Heckman, a junior who is also a member of the magazine's staff. Purely coincidence, and the minor fact that Heckman can write, averred the magazine's beleaguered editor, when accused of collusion.

Seminar and *Colonial Echo* staffs were in the middle of wrapping up their publications and getting them ready to send off to the printers. In the usual deadline flurry of lost pictures, missing writers and gaping holes in copy the respective staff seemed to be bearing up quite well however.

The Flat Hat as usual found itself beset by the mid-year slump due to lack of activities and staff, due in turn mainly to rush and mid-year grades. However our noble paper did feel up to taking on Bill McLaughlin of the *Daily Press* and most of the citizenry of Williamsburg in a fiery editorial entitled "Williamsburg's rotten apples."

It all began when a junior, Bruce Douglass, was rather seriously injured crossing a street when he and a truck collided, leaving the truck unharmed and Bruce in the hospital with a badly broken jaw. Friend McLaughlin of the *Daily Press* used this as the occasion for a tasteless "College Corner" commentary on W&M students and their vast indifference to traffic regulations, etc.

The Flat Hat then used this occasion for an editorial blasting that "small minority" of citizens who consider

A HOST of 28 lettermen among a relatively small squad of 49 reported to the opening of Spring football drills Monday, February 12, at William and Mary. Nineteen of the 49 will be rising sophomores.

Head Coach Milt Drewer in preparation for his sixth year at the helm of Tribe gridistics set several objectives for the four-day-a-week practices. With practices scheduled for Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday and a scrimmage each Saturday, Drewer hoped to develop more fully a passing attack. Drewer noted before the drills started "We will experiment with our offense and will make defensive adjustments which should help us to have more punch in the fall.

"If anything," the Tribe mentor went on, "everyone should come out of the month's work with a higher proficiency at blocking and tackling." Fundamentals will be a prime target on the program.

Expected to execute the intensified passing attack are three "Dans." Dan Henning, a junior come this fall, has the inside track after a good passing season last year, but Dan Driscoll, a senior, who did most of the punting last season, and Dan Armour, a rising soph, both will get a watchful eye from the coaches.

On the receiving end, letterman Dennis O'Toole returns as does Bill Corley, a present sophomore, who showed flashes of offensive brilliance last fall. Ronnie Jones, the twin brother of halfback Arnie, returns after missing last semester.

Only Eric Erdossy fails to return in the interior line from tackle to tackle. "Big John" Sapinsky and T. W. Alley, both starters, return for their junior year and will be pushed by hefty Jeff Craig, up after a good year with the frosh.

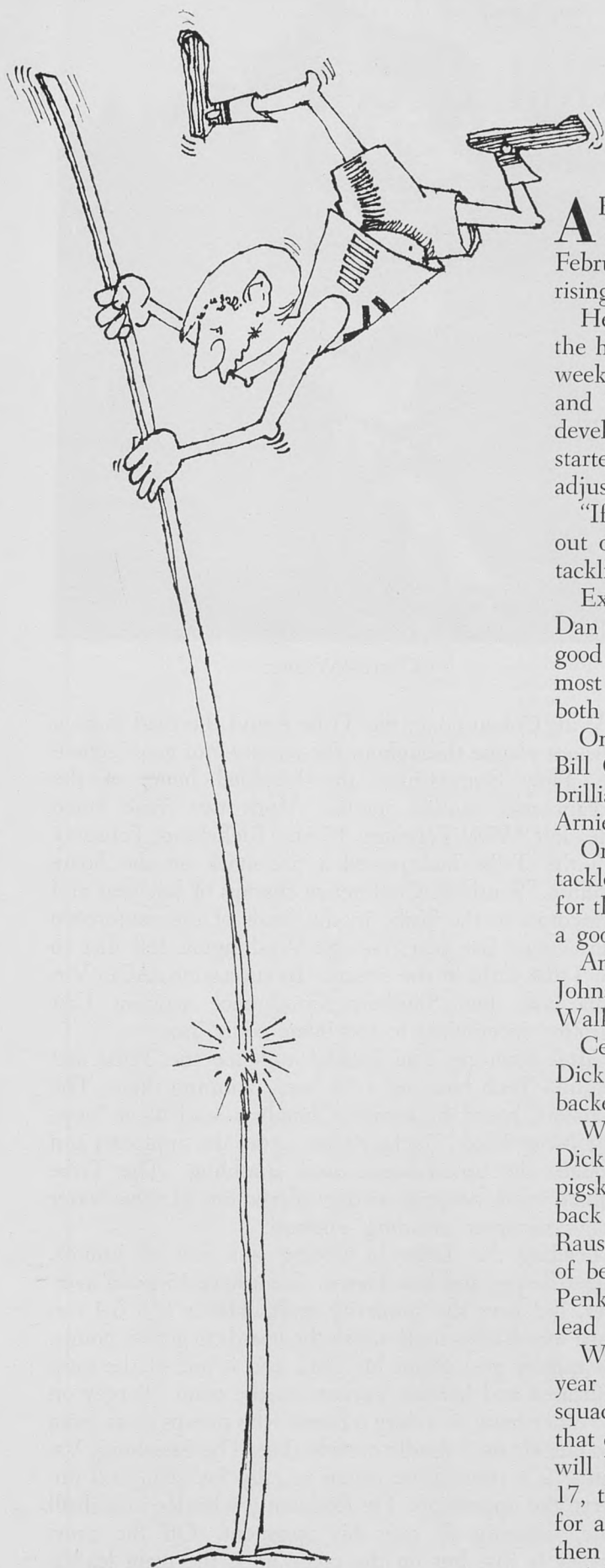
An array of guards including Bill Banner, Mike Lesniak, Wilbur Johnson and Chuck Puskar, along with frosh Craig Smith and Larry Walk vie to supplant the skill vacated by the All-Conference Erdossy.

Center looms as the Tribe's strongest position. John Gravely and Dick Korns, who alternated at center last year, both return and are backed up by the more than capable Tom Feola, another frosh.

With the Dans eager to do the throwing at qb, Charlie Weaver, Dick Kern and Arnie Jones (all halfbacks) seem ready to lug the pigskin among the returning varsity men. To help out at the halfback posts come frosh Scott Swann, Dick Prillaman, and Harold Rausch. Sam Miller, another frosh whom Drewer has high praise of becoming a "real good" fullback battles fullback and senior Stan Penkunas, who came on late in the season to have a good season and lead the Tribe rushers.

With more than double the number of lettermen at this time last year and with the promise of several more ball-players to join the squad in the fall, Drewer hopes to avoid the manpower shortage that crimped success plans last year. A good indication of the future will be on display at the annual intersquad game slated for March 17, the official end of Spring practice. Drewer still has faint hopes for a varsity-alumni game for that date, but if the negotiations fail, then the intersquad game will be held as scheduled.

Athletic Director Milt Drewer announced a ten game football slate for 1962 which includes all eight Southern Conference teams.



West Virginia, the only team not on the Tribe list last year replaces Army for the fall campaign. State rival and ACC member Virginia will again be met, this time in Williamsburg.

Docketed to meet William and Mary at Cary Field in Williamsburg will be VPI, September 15, Virginia, September 23; Furman, October 20; and George Washington, November 10. Furman will be the Homecoming foe.

Powerful Navy once again will be met in Annapolis. Richmond, the Tribe's ancient and most bitter foe, will be met in the State Capital on Thanksgiving Day, November 22.

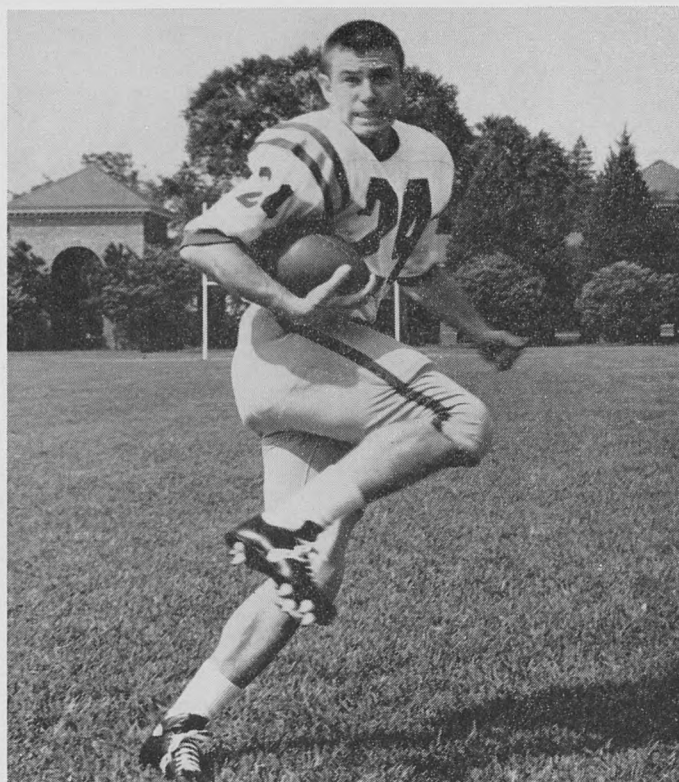

With Cohen gone, the Tribe found the road to be a constant plague throughout the twenty-four game schedule. Blow Gymnasium, the heralded home of the Indians was another matter. With two more home dates left (VMI February 17 and Richmond, February 24) the Tribe had posted a 5-2 mark on the home confines. Southern Conference champs of last year and tormentors to the Tribe in the finals of the conference tournament last year, George Washington fell first to the Tribe early in the season. In succession, ACC Virginia and then Southern Conference aspirant East Carolina succumbed to the home court jinx.

After downing The Citadel at home the Tribe met Virginia Tech boasting a 16 home winning skein. The Gobblers, paced by former Chambers student at Newport News High, Bucky Keller, upset the appercart and brought the proud home mark tumbling. The Tribe righted itself, however as they played one of their better games to upset invading Furman.

Bergey on the other hand, is a fiery 6 footer who pumps away from the outside on a deadly outside shot. The Strasburg, Va. native is a court antic trying to rally his team and unnerve the opposition. He frequently whistles in a shrill note, harrying all over his opponent. Off the court Bergey is shy, but on the court he is the team leader. The crowds at Blow Gym love it and often the "Bergey

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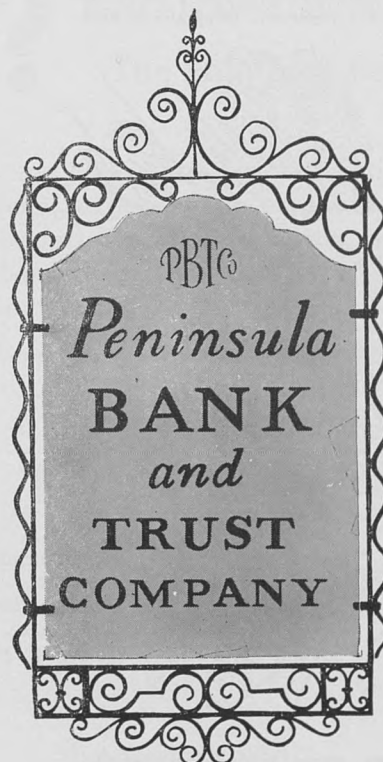

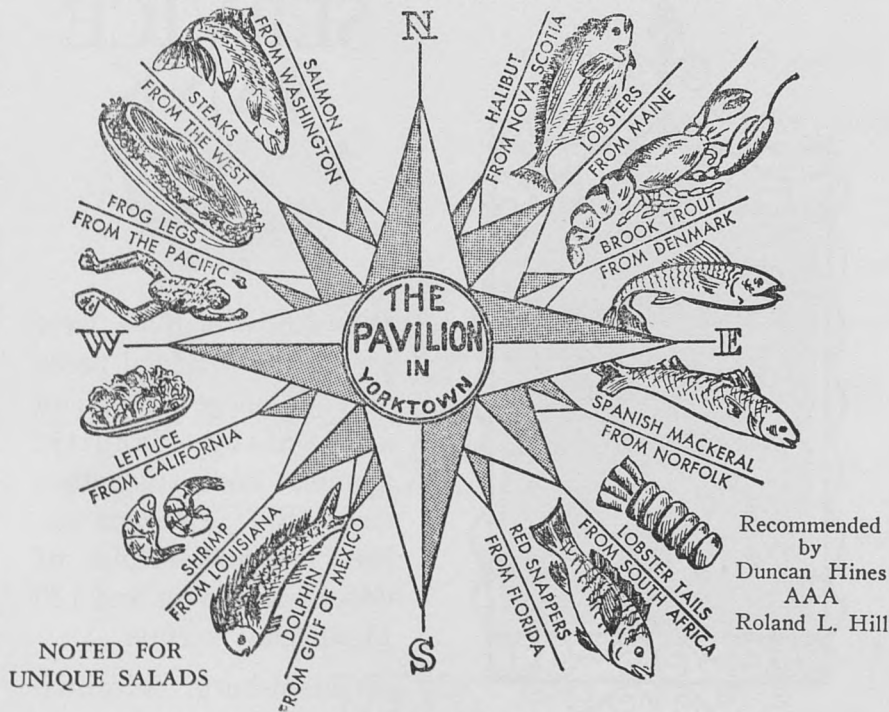

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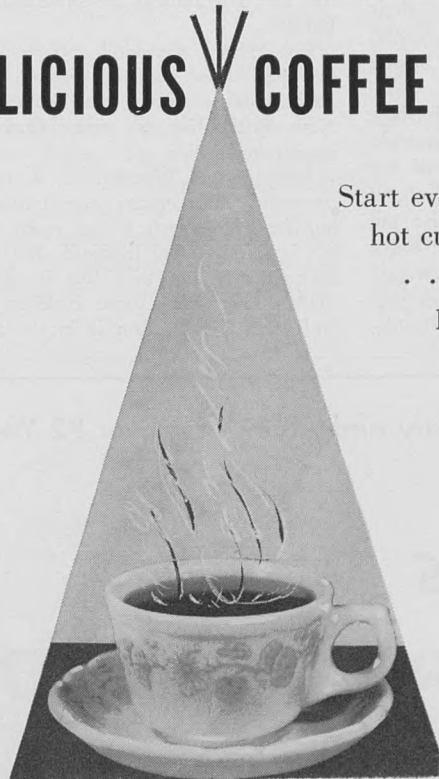

Though it's Spring, the Christmas card harvest is the biggest thing in news that comes my way all year long.

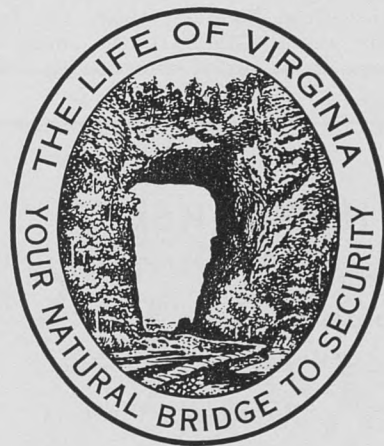

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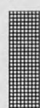

all students "young, immature, incompetent, unreliable" and detrimental to the community. The physics department announced that two grants have been made to William and Mary recently. The second of these was a \$2,500 discretionary grant by General Electric to the physics department. This award, which carries no specifications, will probably be used to purchase books and special equipment.

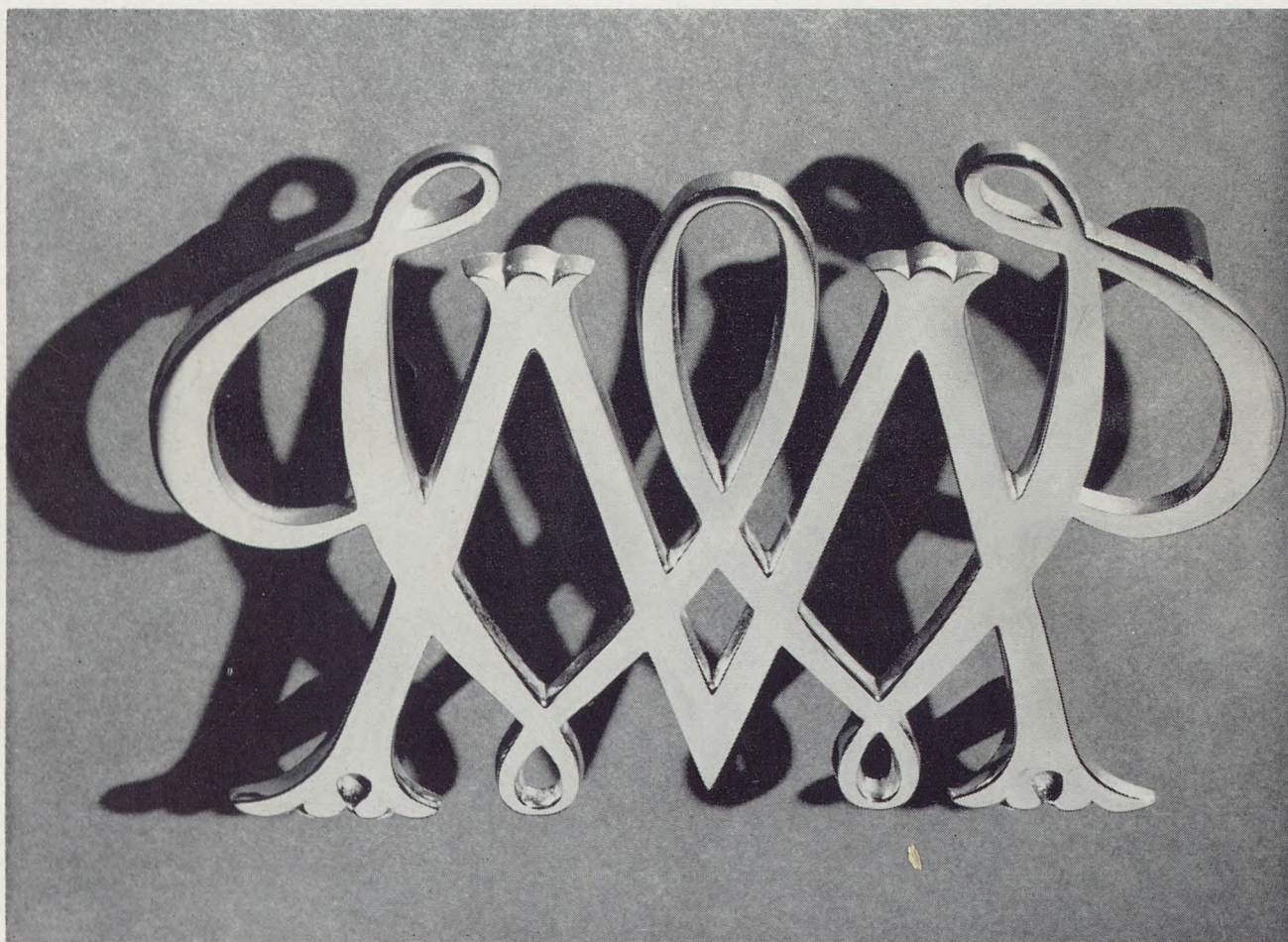
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
