The Library Opens

THE MAGNIFICENT Earl Gregg Swem Library, instantly a success when it opened its doors January 4, has quickly become an appropriately favorite place for hundreds of College students.

They talked admiringly of the spacious, brightly-lit building as they toured it—sometimes losing their way—the day after their Christmas holidays were over. Creaky hard chairs at the Old Library were a thing of the past and so were dim passageways and noisy stairways. The students could forget the clock—one room in the new Library was placed open 24 hours a day.

Dr. Earl Gregg Swem set the tone for the library bearing his name: He wanted it to be "a haven to all mortals who may wish to commune with immortals." Judging by the first few weeks of use, the new Library is carrying out that hope.

Dedication ceremonies for the Earl Gregg Swem Library came on Charter Day, February 12. (See this issue for a complete picture-story on the Charter Day activities.)

Between December 17 and Charter Day, Librarian James A. Servies and

his staff carefully supervised the transfer of more than 1,120,000 pieces of literature-400,000 volumes, and 800,-000 periodicals, manuscripts, pre-1900 newspapers and other itemsfrom the Old Library and various attics and warehouses about the campus. It was no small assignment. It kept Servies busy day and night, especially at the holidays when the main collections were packed, carried across campus and unpacked again by as many as 70 workers. The job, planned long ago in 1965, had been delayed for several months until the top three levels of the Earl Gregg Swem Library were ready.

The Library faces the rear of Phi Beta Kappa Hall, adjoining the William Small Physics Building and the soon-to-be-built Life Sciences Building. These four structures, soon to include a fine arts addition to Phi Beta Kappa, form a center for the arts and sciences.

Entry to the Library into the first floor takes one across a short bridge, through glass doors and onto soft carpeting in a lobby and lounge area, where he faces the efficient circulation desk. Elevators lead to the second and third floors, where the stacks and various study areas—including private carrels—are located.

At the ground level, below the first floor, William and Mary's heritage is strikingly evident. Entering via raised walkways above a pool, one is greeted by the College's old friend, Lord Botetourt, gleaming white under soft lighting after a thorough cleansing. Surrounding the Lord in the Botetourt Gallery is a portion of the Library's collection of early Virginia portraiture, including works by Bridges, Wollaston, Sully and others on permanent display. Toward the rear of the building from the Gallery are the Museum, the Rare Book Room, the Virginia Room and the Tucker-Coleman Room. Shortly, the offices of the Institute of Early American History will be located in

The Museum contains, on public display, such artifacts as the College Mace, early Phi Beta Kappa records, the earliest book of faculty minutes, the lone surviving volume from the first library at the College and other historical items.

The Gallery, fully carpeted, is surrounded by marble and by an unusual (Please Turn Page)

walnut paneling. Extensive use is made of walnut in the ground level rooms open to the public.

The impressive building, designed by the Richmond firm of Wright, Jones and Wilkerson, was constructed by R. L. Bulifant & Co. Inc., also of Richmond. Its construction and equipment cost of about \$3,200,000 came from several sources including a \$1,600,000 appropriation from the Virginia General Assembly, gifts and donations from alumni and friends, a federal grant and the sale of a portion of the old Eastern State Hospital Site. The College also sold revenue bonds to help finance the building.

Now that the Old Library is vacant, planning work is under way so that it can be remodeled for the Marshall-Wythe School of Law. Although preliminary plans had been drawn, final planning was impossible until the building was vacated. The Law School currently is located in the basement of Bryan Dormitory.


The Old Library was erected in 1908 and expanded twice in the 1920s. The College's first library, records show, was created in 1697 when college



funds were spent for "books, Mapps & papers." The next year, Governor Francis Nicholson presented the College books from his private library. But the first library was destroyed by fire in 1705 and in 1734, the General Assembly levied a duty of one penny per gallon of rum and other spirits, part of which was to buy books 'for the use of the Scholars and students in the college." Various statesmen and even King Louis XVI of France gave volumes to the William and Mary Library until, in the College's 100th year, the collection numbered about 3,400 volumes. That library was destroyed by fire in 1859 and a third library was formed from donations by alumni and friends across the nation the next year. The third burning of the Sir Christopher Wren Building in 1862 destroyed a portion of that library, too.

When the Old Library was built, the collection numbered about 15,000 volumes. By 1920, when Dr. Swem became librarian, the library had grown to 20,000 volumes.

his 24 years as College librarian acquired more that 200,000 volumes, catalogued the collections, acquired archives and manuscripts and established various special collections.

Dr. Swem, an alumnus of Lafayette College, was most known for his scholarly works in bibliography and history. But the College Board of Visitors departed from tradition in 1963 by deciding to name the new library after the then Librarian Emeritus, thus honoring Dr. Swem during his lifetime. He died early in 1965.

Through *The William and Mary Quarterly*, which he edited, the College became known as a place for valuable historical materials and papers and the *Quarterly* attracted a great deal of historical information from various persons.

Servies Leaves


Servies, who had been librarian since 1957, spent much of his waking time in planning, conferring, proposing and hoping for this day when the new William and Mary library was a fact. He joined the University of West Florida in Pensacola this month as Director of Libraries and Professor of English, where he'll be heading up a library that—again—is just getting off to a start in a new institution.

He left behind one of his favorite sidelines—the King and Queen Press, an old post-Civil War platen operated by a foot pedal and once used by the *Harpers Ferry* (W.Va.) *Times*. Though noisy and old, the press—donated in 1961 by Bernard Hunter of Berkeley Springs, W. Va.—has been highly useful in printing covers for library exhibits, book plates, and certain items for special College events. It, too, has its place in the Swem Library.

The new Library is connected by teletype to other major libraries to expedite the exchange of books to satisfy special needs. It contains microfilm facilities, photocopying units, seminar rooms, meeting areas and—in all—1,600 seats at various places.

Charter Day


VIRGINIA'S new Governor, Mills E. Godwin Jr., attended William and Mary as a member of the Class of 1936, but he went to law school before earning his degree. Now, 30 years later, he has a William and Mary sheepskin.

Godwin was awarded the honorary doctor of laws degree February 12 in the Charter Day convocation which dedicated the new Earl Gregg Swem Library and commemorated the 273rd anniversary of the College's charter. Miss Marjorie Hope Nicolson, noted literary scholar and professor of English emeritus at Columbia University, delivered the principal address and received the honorary doctor of literature degree.

The colorful event included a special honor guard formed by the Queen's Guard, which had occupied an upfront position in the Governor's Inaugural Parade in January.

The Governor and several members of the General Assembly and other College guests toured the Swem Library accompanied by, among other persons, Earl Gregg Swem Jr. and his son, Earl Gregg Swem III who is a member of the Class of 1968 at the College.

In dedicatory remarks, President Paschall said the new library has quickly become the "intellectual heart of this ancient institution." He described how the Old Library could hold less than half of the College's library collections but noted, too, that there is a desperate need for books to strengthen the Library.

Pappy's Red Ones'



Ned LeGrande Shows off 'Youtz Red' Following Setter's Win at Club.

"PAPPY" NED LeGrande's brothers at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon house will remember that he was rarely without a hunting dog . . . his dogs frequently chewed the buttons off his brothers' jackets!

LeGrande, co-captain of the College football team in 1935 with Mel "Stumpy" Bryant, still is in love with his dogs—especially "red ones," Irish Setters. In 1951, he began spearheading a movement to popularize Irish Setters among present-day hunters and to develop a better strain. Since then, he has more than 300 field trial wins across the country including national field trial champions.

His efforts among the "red ones" have been covered in nearly a dozen national magazines, as well as the book *The Hunting Dogs of America* by Jeff Griffen.

William Edward LeGrande '36, a native of Lynchburg, Va., is executive vice president in charge of production at the Pottstown, Pa. plant of Gudebrod Bros. Silk Company Inc., which makes silk threads, surgical sutures, fishing lines and electronic tapes. He took a position with the 96-year-old firm in 1941 and in 1943, began work

on developing the manufacture of fishing lines to complement existing products. Reception rooms at the plant are decorated with black marlin, Pacific sailfish, grouper and rooster fish captured by "Pappy" and his wife, Helen Gudebrod LeGrande '40, while testing the fishing lines.

At William and Mary, he was on the swimming and track teams, "13" Club president; and—of all things for a football captain—Junior Class poet. He played semi-pro football for the old Richmond Arrows while attending law school at the College and it was during his law school career that, friends will remember, he showed once more his love for dogs.

In 1938, the furnace at the SAE house exploded, scalding two of Ned's puppies to death. With the help of Dr. Dudley Woodbridge of the law school and co-student George Mason '36, he sued the company which made the furnace and won against its seasoned attorneys.


How did LeGrande go about improving the species of Irish Setters?

One magazine writer said "The Douglasville sportsman read everything he could get his hands on—and he

hasn't quit searching for additional material even now. He advertised in sportsmen's magazines that he wanted to buy Irish setters that were honest-to-goodness bird dogs. He put a number of professional trainers to watching for worthwhile prospects. He sought and obtained advice from such world-famous authorities as Henry P. Davis, Horace Lytle, McDowell Lyon and many others.

"He faced the fact that he could interest himself in bird dogs as bird dogs. Beauty and every other factor would have to be ignored, at least until immediate goals could be reached.

"We can recall writing to him about that time that the history of the breed indicated that there was too much challenge for any one man to master . . . that warning was unnecessary. Showing the measure of a true sportsman, LeGrande had determined that it would not be enough for him to develop a successful strain for himself, even if that were possible. He set his sights on the much larger goal of popularizing the Red Ones among average hunters by breeding the dogs up to true field quality."



Self-Starter

It took a human self-starter to eliminate the crank. General Motors engineers have been inspired by that example ever since. They have kept to the trail laid down by a genius named Charles F. Kettering.

Back in 1910, the experts told Mr. Kettering that a practical electric starter for automobile engines was an impossibility. It took him six months to develop one. His self-starter eventually eliminated the dangerous hand-crank, revolutionizing motoring and putting women in the driver's seat. His record of scientific achievement in the decades that followed is without parallel.

And like this remarkable man's most famous invention, today's GM engineer is a self-starter—one who doesn't wait to be asked, who seeks out the tough problems and sets out to solve them.

They're a vital group, these men of science who follow the Kettering flame—restless, curious and devoted to the idea that nothing is so good it can't be improved. Their collective contribution to GM's progress over the years is beyond measure.

The College

I T WAS a relatively warm—and exceedingly dry—Christmas at the College, but the weather gave workmen an easy time of it as they went about their annual job of re-laying sections of the brick walks and clearing up what was left over after Autumn's crop of leaves. Candles glowed warmly from Wren yard windows for the estimated 18,000 Williamsburg visitors and the night after Christmas, hundreds enjoyed the annual 18th century Yule reception in the Great Hall.

The holidays were a time for moving books into the new Earl Gregg Swem Library, for students to "rest up" before exams and for catching up or getting ahead on work. The students took home with them copies of William and Mary's latest humor magazine—Indian Made—an attractive publication that poked some fun but wasn't banned anywhere.

On Christmas Eve and again on Christmas Day, the community enjoyed telecasts of Christmas songs by the College Choir beamed from stations in Hampton and Richmond. The specially taped program reached millions of viewers elsewhere from stations in Baltimore, Philadelphia, Boston, Charlotte and several other communities in New York, Pennsylvania and Virginia. Dr. Carl A. "Pappy" Fehr's choristers got a nationwide radio audience, too, for the same tape-arranged and reproduced by WVEC-TV in Hampton-went to the American Broadcasting Company's radio network.

The William and Mary story was told, also on radio, by Jerry Van Voorhis '62, assistant dean of admissions, on the program "Off The Wing Tip," which went to more than 100 American stations plus 250 stations in the Armed Forces Radio and Television Services.

Out at Phi Beta Kappa Hall, contractors were building the foundation for what will become a \$700,000 Fine Arts wing. The wing, directly behind Phi Bete, will have an art gallery as well as classroom, studio and office space. The future of the old Fine Arts

Building across Jamestown Road from The Brafferton, is unsettled; hopefully, it'll be empty next year.

Nearby, the Physics Department—comfortably settled into the new William Small Physics Building—was reaping the benefits of its increasing stature in the profession. A February program known as the Williamsburg Conference on Intermediate Energy Physics—first of its kind in the world—drew more than 150 physicists and eminent scientists from around the globe. The federal government, through various programs, granted more than a quarter million dollars for special work, including development of an optics research facility.

Further away to the west, the College Woods was the subject of study. A special committee, at the instigation of President Paschall and the Board of Visitors, was formulating a plan for managing the Woods so that it could be used for scientific-educational purposes and maintained for aesthetic values. Going still westward, the College-owned Central Airport stood a chance at undergoing as much as \$100,000 worth of improvement from federal-state aviation funds to make it more useful to the College and the

Community.

There were these other news notes at The College:

Fourteen students were initiated as charter members of the new Thomas Jefferson Inn of Phi Delta Phi, America's oldest legal fraternity. A team of three law students took William and Mary into the national finals for the first time in the Moot Court competition

The English Department played host to English poet Stephen Spender, who is this year's consultant in poetry in English to the Library of Congress, and who delivered the address for the 189th anniversary meeting of Alpha of Virginia, Phi Beta Kappa. He talked with students at several English classes during his visit. The Departwas preparing for a new Summer Institute for Advanced Study in English, under a \$45,000 federal grant.

Winthrop Rockefeller, chairman of the board of Colonial Williamsburg Inc. and a well known Arkansan, praised the William and Mary concept in a speech on "The Harmonious Man," delivered as he underwent honorary initiation into the College's chapter of Kappa Delta Pi, educational fraternity.

Another Echo to Treasure

NOTHER college year is fast coming to a close, and no one knows it better than Bob Gatten '66. Gatten, a biology major from Lexington, Ky., is editor-in-chief of this year's *Colonial Echo*—newest in the series of year-books which began before the turn of the century.

March is deadline time for the *Echo* staff and this year's yearbook, 400 pages long, took a full year's work to produce. Gatten found himself spending more time on the *Echo* during the summer session of 1965 than he did on his studies—"Unfortunately," he adds.

The *Echo* is compiled as a souvenir, of course, of the years at William and Mary. But Dr. Davis Y. Paschall, College president, points to its value as a "treasury of memories . . . for alumni everywhere."

"It is the finest overall continuing record of events at the College that we have," the President says.

Every year, the *Echo* undergoes change. Crumbling binders of years ago notwithstanding, the *Echo* library at the Alumni Office attests to the high quality that has been consistent—as the editors experimented with brown and black inks, as they gradually used more photographs and fewer drawings, and as they introduced color photographs.

The 1966 Colonial Echo is taking on another "new look." Gatten, turning to the nation's largest yearbook publisher for the 1966 edition, chose to convert to printing by the offset process rather than letterpress. He finds it flexible, and by saving money on printing costs he could up the size of the Echo by about 80 pages.

With the increased size, Gatten, says, the 3,000 *Echo* readers will get "more life," with more candid shots and a wide variety of page layouts.

New Bookstore Reflects Trend In Studies

IN A DAY when the world of books has become revolutionized by paperbacks, bookstores find their clientele—and space needs—expanding.

At the College, where professors prescribe six or eight times as many books per course as they once did, a modern new Bookstore has been opened to serve this growing demand. It opened early in January.

Y. O. Kent, the manager, recalls the earlier days when one book per course was all that a student needed. In those days, when College enrollment was smaller, he needed only some space in the old Wigwam to meet the need. In recent years, however, even the wing of New Taliaferro Hall occupied by the Bookstore became much too small. Last fall students waited in line for hours to have their orders filled individually by clerks, as much as 15 minutes for each order.

College Planning "Wise," Says Va.


THE VIRGINIA Higher Education Study Commission, created by the 1964 General Assembly to help chart the course for state-supported higher education in the future, made a number of recommendations which could be far-reaching.

For William and Mary, the Commission concluded in its report to Governor Albertis S. Harrison Jr., no great changes—except more funds—are necessary. The report came in December.

"The College . . . is a distinguished institution with long traditions of high quality programs, very selective in its admission policies, and with a heavy list of applications for admissions from all over the country. It is one of Virginia's prestige institutions, and it should be preserved as such.

"It should not be converted to a mass education university, but should wisely follow the course of its recent development as a high grade college of liberal arts with associated graduate programs," the report said.

Math Under Glass

'True Creative Art'

A FEW YEARS ago, Mrs. Mary Anna (McKinney) Thomison '48 spent some cold winter days at a neighbor's, dabbling with glass to create Christmas decorations in her friend's kiln. The work became fascinating and she discovered glass laminating to be "a true creative art."

After increasingly intense study and experimentation, Mary Anna created a work that—in the words of one newspaper writer— "is causing totally unmathematical people to make a pilgrimage to the IBM Building just to look."

The work, dubbed "Mathematics Under Glass," is a large paneled screen in the lobby of the IBM Building in Atlanta. The panels symbolically trace the challenge and uses of mathematics from the cuneiform clay tablets of

Babylon to the tapes of today's sophisticated computers.

An IBM official who saw some of Mary Anna's glass work at an arts festival asked her to create the screen as a means of combining art with architecture and he succeeded in overcoming the fears of architects that it wouldn't work. Then began months of patient work in her small shop at her Lookout Mountain, Tenn., homedesigning, cooking, cooling, and waiting to see what temperature changes did to them. Her husband Locke, who is with Penn Mutual Life Insurance Co. in Chattanooga, helped her in figuring out how to hang the panels in the frame without them looking

Since that project, Mary Anna has created a number of glass pieces, fin-

ished an interior glass dividing wall for a home and currently is working on a glass mural for a home being built on the bluff of Signal Mountain.

"I try not to tackle more than I can handle without running the family crazy," she says. "Family" includes three children—Kathy, 15 (she has "her heart and sights set on William and Mary"), Grier, 13, and Strand, 10.

After studying drawing and painting, architecture, music, advertising, interior decorating, and jewelry-making at William and Mary, Mary Anna now finds "glass is a glorious material—with unlimited uses."

In an article written about her work, which was published in a local magazine, she credits her years at William and Mary as laying the basis for her varied interests.



This proposed building will house a 10,000-seat multi-purpose fieldhouse, gym-auditorium with rising stage, physical education classrooms, auxiliary gyms and locker facilities, as well as a natatorium. The 1966 General Assembly approved a \$2,000,000 emergency appropriation for the first phase of this structure, which ultimately will cost \$4,000,000. President Paschall indicated hopes for an opening of part of it in time for the 1967-68 basketball season. Designed by Wright, Jones and Wilkerson, Richmond architects, it will be built northwest of the new library near a new dining hall.

W ILLIAM AND MARY finally received Richmond as its guest for the traditional last football game of the year, and when the day was over, Marv Levy's Indians had shut out the visitors, 21-0.

It was important that William and Mary had claimed a victory over its arch-rival; it was also important that William and Mary had placed second in the Southern Conference. But, what was so important and vital was the fact that for the first time since 1953.

the gridiron Indians had won more games than they had lost.

The final won-lost count showed six victories in 10 games. It had become obvious that Marv Levy, the man from California who came to William and Mary for the 1964 football season, had established respectability in two years and was well on his way toward making the Indians a contender in their league.

"We would like to think that we have a 50-50 chance against any team on our schedule," both Levy and Les Hooker, the athletic director, have said in eyeing what's next.

That schedule in the future will feature five or six Southern Conference teams, independents like V.P.I. and Navy and such prestige games as Vanderbilt, Syracuse and Miami in future years.

The increase in alumni support, the better attendance at the home games and the fact that the Indians played in the Oyster Bowl last year and have a date with V.M.I. in the Tobacco Bowl in 1967, indicate that 50-50 chance can be an attainable goal.

Achieving that winning season took

a dramatic change at midstream. After being demolished by Navy, Levy and his staff decided to toss away the popular two-platoon system and go back to all-the-way performers.

The results were immediate and emphatic. First, undefeated Davidson was crushed, 41-7; then George Washington was a Homecoming victim; then nationally tough Southern Mississippi fell, 3-0, before 24,000 in Norfolk's Oyster Bowl.

The Tribe stretched the streak to four by beating the Citadel, 20-6, before Eastern power Boston College reminded the Indians that miracles aren't accomplished overnight. The Richmond shutout ended the season, but the honors began to pile up.

Levy was named coach-of-the year for his second successive time. George Pearce made the second team All-American and was named the Southern Conference's outstanding player as he and four other teammates made the all-conference team. With a 5-1 record in the Southern Conference the Indians finished second only to the champs, West Virginia.

Even before the football honors came in, the basketball team was busy preparing for the winter season. Haunted by the memory of last year's near win in the tournament, the cagers of Bill Chambers spent 1965 trying to live with that memory.


The results were disappointing at first, but as the Indians headed into the tournament again, the disciplined, control-type game preached and taught by Chambers seemed to be taking hold again.

The Indians did claim two significant victories over state rivals Virginia and Richmond. The Cavaliers visited Williamsburg and never recovered from an 18-2 lead the Indians quickly and shockingly ran up. Later, just before the exam break, Richmond's strong Spiders came to Williamsburg and the Tribe dealers held all the high cards, trumping with defense to win, 71-65.

With 13 varsity sports in the athletic program, antique Blow Gym is a busy place all year. No fewer than six varsity sports dominated the winter scene with gymnastics, wrestling, rifle, swimming and indoor track sharing the spotlight with basketball.

Alumni Grants Reach \$5,000

Harry D. Wilkins Named To Head Alumni Society



The Faculty



DR. WARNER MOSS, chairman of the Department of Government since 1937, has become director of the College's new Marshall-Wythe institute of Public Affairs. Dr. James H. Roherty succeeded Dr. Moss in February as department chairman.

The new Marshall-Wythe Institute will seek to undertake research in the social sciences, cutting across departmental lines. It also will have charge of such activities as the Marshall-Wythe Symposium, the law school's Tax Conference and the Business Index, as well as the coordination of visits to the campus by notables.

DR. LUDWELL H. JOHNSON, III, a Civil War historian, became chairman of the Department of History to succeed acting chairman Bruce McCully. Dr. McCully acted as chairman after Dr. Harold L. Fowler became Dean of the Faculty in 1964. Dr. Johnson is married to the former Pamela Cartin '57.

MISS GRACE BLANK, a member of the biology faculty between 1931 and 1965, died in January. She had retired in 1965, becoming professor emeritus. Funeral services were held in Williamsburg.

DR. THOMAS C. ATKESON of the Law School was responsible for preparation of a massive report on a proposed state-wide sales tax for the Virginia State Chamber of Commerce. The report drew wide praise, although the 1966 General Assembly appeared to be divided over just what kind of sales tax Virginia should have. He is a former high-ranking Internal Revenue Service official.

BOOKS: Dr. William F. Swindler of the Law School is author of "Magna Carta: Legend and Legacy," published in January by Bobbs-Merrill. He currently is preparing manuscripts for three other books.

Marcel Reboussin, professor of modern languages, wrote "Balzac Et Le Mythe De Foedora," to be published in Paris in the spring. The book, in French, depicts Balzac as "an artist—not just a 'camera' who depicted only what he saw."

Skipatitis?

The 1965 William and Mary Fund came up with a total of \$60,887, a sizable increase over the year before but without a noticeable increase in the number of contributors.

It surpassed an informal goal of \$60,000 and marked the fifth consecutive year that Fund donations showed increases.

The William and Mary Educational Foundation, meanwhile, reported contributions of \$49,304. That fund, for athletic scholarships and awards and other athletic purposes, collected \$30,500 in 1964.

What happened to many who contributed to the Fund in 1964, and not in 1965? Perhaps it was a case of "skipatitis," an old Society disease. Or maybe it was forgetfulness.

There were many new contributors. But if alumni who forgot to make a 1965 contribution had instead remembered, their gifts could have raised the Fund total by \$10,000. The Fund Committee, though concerned with that segment of alumni, takes some comfort in knowing that William and Mary alumni have a lower percentage of forgetfulness than most other alumni groups.

Plans for the 1966 Fund will be announced shortly by Fund Chairman John Dalton '53.

Teaching English To A Major

IN LIBERIA, English is the national language. But there are 26 separate native languages, so most citizens have an English vocabulary of 50 to 100 words.

Richard Bethards '49, a speech specialist in the National Scientific Laboratories of Washington, has written a 550-page book with which he hopes to teach secondgrade English to Liberian soldiers. All army communications are written in English-so it's sometimes a problem passing along "the word."

Bethards, of Monrovia, Liberia, conducts a course in English in a small school in an army camp in the bush, where he has a 10-position language laboratory, complete with tape recorders and playback facilities. The course is given for six hours a day, five days a week, over a four-month period.

He teaches from a small vocabulary and expects no more than a 30-per cent success rate among the soldiers, many of them from tribes. His book, he believes, will improve that percentage considerably.

His classes are said to be the first to teach literacy by the use

of language labs.

Bethards, who earned a master's degree from Harvard, taught for three years at Roberts College in Istanbul, Turkey, after teaching English and German in public and private schools in the United States.

He worked with the Congolese army in Luluabourg, where he taught native soldiers enough English to let them take training in the United States. In his language laboratory in the Congo, his students included soldiers ranking from corporal to major. But his school there was discontinued after six months because Maj. Gen. Joseph Mobutu ordered the students back to fighting the rebels.



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

John L. Carey, *The CPA Plans for The Future*, American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, 1965. 541 pages.

This comprehensive review of the more important social, economic, political and international trends which are likely to affect the professional practice of accounting is based in part on a nine-year study by the Long-Range Objectives Committee of the Institute. Mr. Carey foresees the probability of an extension of the attest function beyond the measurement and communication of financial and economic data to appraisals of management performance by both corporate and government officials.

He further urges the preparation of textbook materials to permit development of accounting instruction for liberal arts and science students designed to emphasize the end uses of accounting for external reporting and for internal planning, control, and decisionmaking without involvement in the techniques and procedures of application. "Understanding of accounting," he emphasizes, "must carry with it an understanding of the corporate structure, the relations of government, business and labor, the basic principles of management-in fact, the wealth-producing and wealth-distributing processes which support the people of the United States. It is an indictment of present liberal-arts curriculums that many of the finest minds among American youth with college degrees which mark them as educated men are wholly ignorant of any of these things."

He also urges practicing accountants to acquire competence in operations research and computer technology.

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
