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The Honors: A Challenge To Excellence

New Program,
With New Ideas
In Old Surroundings

In the fall of 1965, a group of 39 College freshmen was enrolled in a special new program which is not geared to becoming much larger. It is a curriculum-within-a-curriculum, aimed at satisfying the intellectual thirsts of the most capable and ambitious undergraduates.

The 39 freshmen were no experimental group, for the beginnings of this new program at William and Mary reached back to 1957 when the Departmental Honors Program was started for upperclass students. The difference in 1965 was that selected students could undertake Honors work at every class level.


Now in its second year, the Honors Program embraces both General Honors during the freshman and sophomore years, and Departmental Honors at the upperclass level, the latter with specialization within one's concentration.

To develop and direct the four-year Honors Program, the College turned to a former Rhodes Scholar who had been on the faculty of the University of Miami in Florida for 17 years, 50-

year-old Dr. R. Carlyle Beyer, who accepted appointment as Professor of History and Director of Honors at William and Mary. A lean, greying scholar, Dr. Beyer is an articulate and well regarded spokesman for academic excellence on the campus.

In 1966, the former College Bookstore on the ground floor of New Taliaferro dormitory was renovated as The Honors Center, with a "commons room" lounge for Honors students, an Honors classroom and offices. There, removed from the traffic of classroom buildings, the students in the program can become well-acquainted and develop a common sense of purpose and "esprit de corps."

Dr. Beyer hopes that the example of excellence and intellectual enthusiasm among Honors students will be felt about the campus at large, "contributing significantly to the fulfillment of the College's academic objectives."

The 39 in the 1965 entering class were among 152 new students (in an entering class of 734) who were invited to apply for the Honors Pro-

gram on the basis of qualifications contained in their entrance credentials. To the group of 39 was added a handful more the following February on the basis of recommendations from the faculty. That class of Honors students expanded to a total of 50 in September, 1966.

Another 39-member group was selected from the class which entered last fall.

During the first two years, Honors students enroll each semester in a selected colloquium in place of one course in the normal curriculum. The colloquia are informal "conversational" classes on such broad themes as "The Nature of Man and the Varieties of Human Experience." In addition each semester, underclass students enroll in a small departmental honors class whose subject matter is related to the overall theme used in the colloquia. Last spring, for example, the departmental classes discussed readings in "humanization and dehumanization" under an anthropologist, "creativity and rebellion" under a psychologist and "images of modern man" under an English instructor.


The colloquia, Dr. Beyer says, aim to encourage scholarship, disciplined thinking, the art of productive conversation and ability to think and study across departmental lines.

Upon entering their junior year, Honors Students continue their work into concentrations, with emphasis on independent study and preparation of an Honors thesis.

The program has led to some experimentation in educational technique, since the faculty which teach in the Honors Program are free to gear their work to satisfying the particular and individual needs of their students. Among the experiments is the use of ungraded classes.

Another is the offering of a colloquium in science and the scientific method for the non-science student.

The Honors Program is viewed as a way of offering individualized and challenging work for exceptional students, at a time when higher education has been forced to have larger and more impersonal classes.

Rhode Island The Hannolds'
Nostalgic
Adventure

T ONY AND Judith Suber Hannold are hardly in a league with Cornelius Vanderbilt or J. P. Morgan, but they do own a railroad and that places them in a class of their own among William and Mary alumni.

What was once the depot and headquarters for the 90-year-od Narrangansett Pier Railroad in Peace Dale, Rhode Island, is now an enchanting home for the Hannold family—and still the office for the "working" freight line which hauls payloads six days a week and, on summer Sundays, excursion pasengers on the storied "High Society Route."

The Hannolds made their purchase in March, 1965 when Tony, long a railroad enthusiast, was in the insurance field in Philadelphia. They were living then in what had once been a dilapidated old farmhouse in a surburban community, which was their first major renovation project.


The six-mile-long railroad has a crew of four men who handle freight work and maintenance. The Narragansett Pier Railroad brings rock salt into South County for highways in the winter, along with fuel oil, coal, gas, building materials, and chemicals for a fertilizer plant. In the opposite direction—from Point Judith to the road's connection at Kingston Jct. with the New York & New Haven—fish meal and oil are shipped.

Rolling stock for the Narragansett Pier includes two locomotives, two Boston & Maine coaches built near the turn of the century and restored to mint condition by the Hannolds and volunteer rail enthusiasts; a private car built in 1885 for the Inter-Colonial Railroad in Canada; and an open car built from an old flatcar. Four buildings along the route have been kept up with a few aesthetic changes made by the Hannolds.

At one time or another, Tony is engineer, track man,

They met while at William and Mary, when Tony majored in business and Judith in art.

"We've always had a passion for old things, but this is the biggest old thing we've tackled," she said.

Their Narragansett Pier Railroad, around the turn of the century, carried a number of elegant private cars owned by wealthy travellers who left them at the Narragansett Pier to sport in the surf or vacation at Newport, Rhode Island. The railroad's posit on made it a short cut in that golden age, and the business kept 52 employes at work until a decline beginning in 1911, when a holding company leased the line as part of a power struggle. World War I, mill failures and the Depression further weakened the railroad until a brief boom in the 1940s. A holding company bought the road to use as a tax loss and finally, passenger service was abandoned in 1952. A major customer purchased it to insure transportation for its shipments and proceeded to refurbish the equipment and track. But a major shipper went bankrupt in 1963, and it was left for the Hannolds to write the next chapter in the Narragansett Pier Railroad's history.

By 1966, traffic had been developed and efficiencies introduced to put the road back in the black. With the aid of volunteers of the Narragansett-Seaview Railway Historical Society, the railroad is continuing its efforts to "bring back the days when passengers could ramble behind clanging bell and haunting whistle" through the woodlands in nostalgic visits to railroading's legendary past.

Liberal Arts in Virginia

THE LIBERAL arts constitute the brilliant thread of continuity of education itself from classical times through the period of settlement of this nation to the present. The phrase is derived from the Latin origins, "artes liberalis"—the word "artes" meaning "to make" or "to shape," and the word "liberalis" coming from "liber" meaning "free."

Thus, the term, "artes liberalis" has been translated as "activities worthy of the free" as distinguished from those appropriate for a slave. Since it has historically been used in connection with the preparation of such activities, it has been associated with education, and may be conceived as "education worthy of free men"—a class or political distinction in classi-



cal times, an intellectual or social distinction in colonial times and, I suggest, a democratic essential in modern times.

The liberal arts have, it seems to me, signified those subjects or disciplines which, upon study and assimilation, cement the foundations of personal character, public duty and responsibility, and the individual's commitment to certain values that transcend economic and vocational satisfactions.

I suggest that liberal arts, for us, connotes the value gleanings of western man in his long, arduous gropings for release from the shackles of barbarism. It embodies the discernible fabric of our civilization emanating from the humane landmarks of the past that must become a dynamic, motivating force in the lives of our students if the hand of tomorrow is to be restrained in releasing the power that would return us to the cave.

Perhaps another way of defining liberal arts is to describe one bearing the hallmarks of its mastery:

He is one who has tempered the steel of his knowledge of forces that destroy with the wisdom of those that save, and casts his lot with the latter.

He is one who has delved deeply in the purifying crucibles of ageless literature and philosophy in search of a satisfying answer to two ancient queries: Who am I? and Why this Universe?

He is one who has nurtured the wisdom to discern certain questions that defy reason and logic because their answers as yet reside in the realm of faith.

He is one who has acquired the "wherewithal" to manipulate others to his own ends, but at the same time a sense of values that refuses to permit it.

He is one who harbors a sense of moral responsibility for the formulas he devises and the instruments of destruction he invents.

He is one who recognizes the imperfections of government as a responsibility to his own initiative in dealing with them intelligently.

He is one who appreciates the aesthetic experience; articulates his ideas; and thinks conceptually on

those matters that merit deliberation and reason.

He is one who perceives in the nuclear arena of the days now upon us the Damocles sword that lurks in the emulation of the tactics and ideologies of a professedly atheistic enemy whereby one may become his own betrayal victim in action, belief and success.

He is one so steeped in the knowledge and values of a broad general education as to enable him to build the skills of future specialization without losing the perspective of the good life.

For those who would say that such hallmarks are too ideal for attainment, I would suggest that those who delved in good liberal arts discovered long ago that nothing in the history of man is more practical than an ideal.

Virginia can be proud of the longstanding tradition of liberal arts. There are certain tasks, or perhaps challenges, to a preservation and strengthening of this important core of our higher education which must now be analyzed. Without reference to priority of importance, I suggest the following as worthy of our best efforts:

1. We must safeguard strong undergraduate programs under the quickening impact of graduate work. We all recognize the need for more advanced programs in some of our institutions, and this trend need not affect adversely the undergraduate years if we will consciously be alert to the dangers of the development. I refer to those situations where the library resources of the undergraduate program are sacrificed upon the graduate altars; graduate students replace experienced faculty members in the freshman and sophomore classrooms; salary differentials favor the graduate faculty; and general education requirements for the undergraduate are subtly influenced to serve more advanced programs, thus becoming means to a concentration or specialty rather than liberating ends in themselves. I am confident we can avoid these dangers in Virginia if we maintain forthright vigilance and muster the resources to have a strong program at both levels. The commendable support of higher education in

Virginia in recent years encourages this confidence.

2. We have observed more and more students in the last decade coming to college who are better prepared than ever before. They now master knowledge in the later years of secondary schools that was standard "fare" a generation ago for the first years of college. This is a widely recognized tribute to those who operate and teach in the public schools of Virginia. These students win advanced standing upon entering college and feel they can rightly skip their first years because with better preparation many are already under the spell, the lure, the beckoning, the obsession of graduate work that invites a quick rush to a specialty.

In the sense of better preparation for college this is good. In another sense, however, it raises the very pertinent question as to whether the undergraduate program is to be sacrificed between the mills of acceleration at the beginning and the pressure of graduate specialty at the end. If liberal arts are to be preserved, I suggest that this situation warrants our early attention. Instead of minimizing the basic courses of the beginning college years in a wild rush to propel the student into early specialization, we must re-think their import and their challenge to the students who are now

coming to college.

This task is vital because the type of intellectual activity characteristic of liberal arts studies requires time—time for assimilation, dialogue and contemplation as well as time for the human organism to mature to the point of exercising critical reflection and enlightened intuition. It has been demonstrated that one can develop skills and memorize facts at an early age, but it has not been demonstrated that he can at such age do equal justice to abstract ideas, ethics, art and literature. We must, therefore, be prepared to afford time for liberal arts, and not hastily propel one's summer into winter. Rather than permit the undergraduate degree to become "commonplace," we must now resolve to find ways to make it unique.

3. Closely related to the aforementioned task is the urgent necessity to reconstitute the curriculum pattern to reflect a reversal of the trend toward greater proliferation of courses at the undergraduate years. Compare a college catalogue of a given institution thirty years ago with the catalogue today. What was once an American History course is now three or four courses. Similarly, what was once a historian recruited for the faculty is now an Early American History man, or a pre-Civil War man, or a Far-East man, or a Near-East man. What I am trying to say is that liberal arts disciplines themselves have, through a rationalization of new knowledge, tended to become over-specialized at the undergraduate years. Somehow we must face up to the task of conceiving a program that will avoid the pitfall of being merely "survey" on one hand, and over-specialized on the other. Many of our honors programs have achieved this, but these are as yet limited to a relatively small number of students. Their concept of a synthesis of knowledge tends to breed wisdom, the hallmark of a liberal education. Such a synthesis or interdisciplinary approach, if distributed in part, at least, throughout the undergraduate-and ideally into the graduate years-would provide the surest means of directing the mastery of sensational new knowledge into the perspective of the wisdom of the race. It might well become the strong, stabilizing factor in the accelerating tempo of modern life, and the surest safeguard against man's becoming enslaved to the "tools of the modern

The College

C HARTER DAY 1967, the 274th anniversary of the chartering of the College, featured the dedication of the new Robert Andrews Hall of Fine Arts which was erected to complement the 10-year-old Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

The Rev. Robert Andrews, an Episcopal clergyman who was Bursar and a member of the faculty in the 18th century, was the first American professor to teach a course of study which included the Fine Arts.

Speaker for the February 11 Charter Day was John Walker, Director of the National Gallery of Art, who discussed the arts from President Jefferson's time to the current Administration. Subsequently, at dedication of Robert Andrews Hall, Leslie Cheek Jr., Director of the Virginia Musem of Fine Arts, was the main speaker.

Both Mr. Walker and Mr. Cheek were awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Fine Arts.

Jay Winston Johns of Charlottesville, retired business executive from the Pittsburgh area, was awarded the honorary Doctor of Laws degree. Mr. Johns restored the home of President James Monroe, "'Ash Lawn," and inaugurated the Stonewall Jackson Memorial, Inc. in Lexington. He was a founder of the Virginia Museum and is widely known for his efforts to preserve places and buildings of historical significance.

President Davis Y. Paschall was named recipient of the 1967 Thomas Jefferson Award for having most exemplified the ideals and outlook of the distinguished alumnus. The award is given each year to an outstanding member of the College community under a fund set up by Robert Earll McConnell Foundation.

The Robert Andrews Hall of Fine Arts, which faces the new Earl Gregg Swem Library with a facade much like that of Phi Beta Kappa Hall, cost \$729,000 to erect. Included are studios for all phases of the creative arts, a 224-seat lecture room and a 56-seat lecture room, as well as a striking two-story exhibit hall in the entrance. The hall contained a special collection,

Mrs. Jean Outland Chrysler '42 gave the College several valuable paintings just prior to Charter Day, her newest gift of art works in the recent past which now form a collection named for her.

A new dining hall to be opened this spring on the New Campus was designated the William and Mary Commons, to indicate its intended use as more than merely a cafeteria. Space will be available in the hexagonal-shaped structure for various social functions, private luncheons and dinners and other events.

In other news of the winter months: Hugh Haynie '50 returned to the campus in February to appear as the first speaker in a new Journalism Forum series inaugurated by Pi Delta Epsilon, the journalistic honorary.

Alumni Secretary and Director of Development, Jim Kelly '51 was elected president of the Williamsburg Chamber of Commerce.

Former director of the Counseling Center and professor of psychology, Dr. Richard B. Brooks, was appointed Dean of the School of Education effective September 1, succeeding Dr. Howard K. Holland, who asked to be permitted to devote full time to teaching and research.

The papers of 35 years of public service by former Sen. A. Willis Robertson of Lexington, who received an honorary degree from the College in 1965, were given to the College Library at the end of 1966. He was, among other things, chairman of the Senate's Committee on Banking and Currency and the 35 boxes of papers, letters and manuscripts covering his political career were felt to be of great value to historians studying the era.

Carl Dolmetsch's book "The Smart Set: An Anthology" was praised in national periodicals. The volume is a collection of writings which appeared in Mencken's erstwhile magazine "The Smart Set." Dolmetsch is associate professor of English.

Dr. Anthony Esler of the History Department published his study of the Elizabethan era, "The Aspiring Mind of the Elizabethan Younger Generation."

Pappy Fehr's 70-voice College Choir will embark in April on a three-day concert tour through Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey.

Among the scheduled appearances are: Alexandria, Groveton High School, April 19 at 8:00 P.M.; Aberdeen, Md., High School, April 20 at 8:00 P.M.; Wilmington, Del., Friends School, April 21 at 8:30 P.M. and West Orange, N. J. High School, April 22 at 8:15 P.M.

THE WILLIAM and Mary track pro-I gram received unexpected recognition in the early winter when the College Board of Visitors presented Head Track Coach Harry Groves with a special resolution commending the many track teams coached by Groves, saving that "these successes of the track team, including cross country and other phases of the sport, can be attributed in large measure to the excellent leadership given the program by Harry R. Groves, whose untiring efforts, conscientious devotion and inspirational association with William and Mary track men constitute a distinctive record in the best tradition of the College." The citation was presented to Groves by College President Davis Y. Paschall, and is believed to be the first time that the Visitors have formulated such a resolution for an athletic team.

What may have prompted the Board to recognize the College track program-certainly the most successful single sports program at the Collegewas the fantastic efforts by the cross country team in the state, conference, and regional competition after the 1966 season. Paced by distance stars Terry Donnelly and George Davis, and backed up by Chop Jordan, Joe Philpott, Juris Luzins, Steve Larson, Dick Widell, and Ned Hopkins, the varsity team finished first in all three meets-including the tough NCAA Region 3 meet usually dominated by powerful Tennessee.

The future for the track team is just as bright, with another outstanding group of freshmen ready for varsity competition next year. This year's frosh, led by Jim McDuffie, Ted Wood, Eric Smith, Mike Wallace, Larry Bryant, and John Derrick retained the W&M State cross country title by winning the State Freshman Meet with a low score of 25 points.

For Coach Groves, this award was long in coming. Ever since coming to the Reservation in 1955, the Temple graduate has been molding a track power—not only in the State, but

also in the Southern Conference and this part of the country. In 1965, considered by many the top year as a whole for the track program, the Indians won five of six major crowns: the State cross country, State and Conference indoor, and State and Conference outdoor championships. This year, with the State and Conference (and regional) cross country titles already won, and predicted success in defending the others, the track teams may surpass last season's efforts. The Indians have competed on the national level in recent years, too, and this year they finished 18th in the team standings in the NCAA National Cross Country Championships held in Lawrence, Kansas.

What is most impressive about the winners molded by Groves is that he has nowhere near the same funds with which to work in recruiting, updating facilities, and so forth as football or basketball. The latest addition to the program was a banked board track one-eleventh mile in *length* which can be installed in the north end zone of Cary Field and used as an indoor track. It has allowed William and Mary to host "indoor" track meets outdoors, and thus increase the indoor season schedule.

Look Mommy, There Goes Mrs. Gulliver'

L AST SUMMER as I waded my way through hundreds of children in the registration area of a Chicago hotel, ready to launch my third children and teen age sightseeing program for the American Medical Association, I heard a little girl whisper to her mother, "Look, Mommy, there goes Mrs. Gulliver."

That innocent remark made me acutely aware of just how far Gulliver's Trails, a mere idea conceived of six years ago, had taken me down a totally new road.

Ever since leaving William and Mary, my efforts had been directed toward the writing field. I had run the gamut from my first job as copy girl on the New York Daily News to radio and TV news writer and eventually to magazines as editor. It was a career also sprinkled with work as a public relations consultant and much free lance writing. Marriage to a New York internist (Dr. S. K. Fineberg) and motherhood (one son, Bryan, now 11) never changed the happy path I was on. When I thought of Gulliver's Trails, I didn't think that would, either.

Had I dreamed back in the summer of 1960 that one day I would be

virtually commuting across the continent to handle the sightseeing activities of hundreds of youngsters a day in more than one city at a time, I might never have had the courage to get started. All I had envisioned in those peaceful days 25,000 children ago, was a small, very select supervised sightseeing service in New York City. Such a service would enable visitors a chance to offer their children a day on the town seeing the sights with other girls and boys while parents pursued their more adult interests. I did not think of it as a full time occupation. I fully intended to continue my writing career and find an experienced bureau to run Gulliver for me. At that time, I was editor of a leading hotel and travel trade magazine. I often lectured on the subject of how to increase family travel and was involved in the efforts of city hotels to win the family tourist market during weekends and summers. Providing activities for children, would, I felt, offer city hotels some of the attractions of a resort, eliminating for so many parents the problem of what to do with the children all day long in the city. I became so enchanted with the possibilities that

I decided to start Gulliver's Trails. Local hotelmen were enthusiastic and a travel bureau said they would handle the myriad details with which I was totally unfamiliar.

We started with the slogan, "You take the holiday...we take the children," and we did, I might add, in great style, picking them up in Rolls-Royces. I can still see those shuddering chauffeurs as candy-coated fingers explored every nook and cranny of those luxurious limousines. Unfortunately, as Gulliver grew we grew out of Rolls Royces and into more prosaic buses. Today we use these limousines only for special V.I.P. tours.

My early dream of running Gulliver part time was shattered when I realized that running children's tours properly required a unique approach. Newspapers and magazines began to talk about the unusual service and I became deeply involved in trying to make Gulliver as good as we said it was. I also had to learn in a hurry. I found that there were no guidelines and it was rather a shock to discover that in effect, I was a pioneer. I learned that guidebooks describing the attractions of a city never grasped the way a child's mind approaches what he sees,

and that the obvious facts and standard sightseeing techniques would not sustain their interest.

My staff (primarily college students, an intrepid breed) and I discovered that children love the unusual and facts in the extreme. . . the tallest, the biggest, the smallest, and even the goriest. We started to adapt a program geared to their interests. Today when we take youngsters to the Egyptian Wing of a museum, we restrain ourselves on the "cradle of civilization" lecture, and get right to the mummies. Gulliver guides tell them just how to make a mummy, and then tell their now captive audience other pertinent facts about the rich Egyptian culture.

The problem of mixing age groups is not as difficult as one might think. When groups are small, everybody goes together. Teenagers are given a more sophisticated explanation than the younger children. When groups become bus loads we balance age groups and gear our approach accordingly. We still may use the same points of interest, but we change our viewpoint. We have had eight years olds fascinated by the Stock Exchange once we have explained it in terms of cokes and candy bars. We explain that if you invest a nickel in these companies and if everybody buys the items they make, your nickel might become a dime. Of course we have sometimes had to restrain would-be plungers with the sobering thought that if everybody went on a diet and stopped eating candy, their nickel might be lost. One youngster decided after this discussion that banks were safer, after all.

Gulliver's special attitudes meant training a corps of young guides who possessed stamina (they must be ready to climb the steps of every tower whose top we reach); friendliness (we maintain discipline while still considering each child as if he were a visiting relative); ingenuity (having answers to such questions as how much is Manhattan worth in dollars today?), and an assortment of anecdotal facts that make the mustiest of historic homes come alive (like the story of the daughter of the owner of Fraunces Tavern being bribed to poison Washington's peas, and what she did

about it).

After employing hundreds of guides per summer (our primary period of operation), I have developed a healthy admiration for young college students. They do a great job, work hard and have a willingness that is almost unbelievable. Most school teachers seem slightly uncomfortable operating on a free-wheeling basis and tend to want peace and order to a rather rigid degree. Young people establish a quick rapport, and those we employ in many cities, have won lavish praise from grateful parents as well as downright affection from their young charges.

From a first summer when we escorted perhaps thirty youngsters ranging from six to twelve, we have reached the point where we may sometimes escort as many as five hundred

youngsters a day ranging from six to 17. The big jump came when convention groups holding meetings in New York began asking us to take over three and four day children's programs. I still recall my cold panic the first time I saw a hundred and sixty youngsters gathered in a hotel ballroom waiting for their Gulliver adventure. My knees never stopped shaking that day, and my guides were not too calm, either. By 1964, when that daily number approached five hundrd on a given day, my staff had learned to anticipate large numbers and in fact to be rather excited by the challenge. That summer they actually began to complain that just one bus load was too easy.

As well as things have gone, there are times of crisis that make me wonder what I ever did to make me undertake

such an insane business. There was one evening we had four hundred children out for an evening in Greenwich Village. The last fifteen reservations were more than we should have allowed, but the youngsters begged to go. We told them that we would not be able to take them to one of the popular teen-age clubs on the tour, but assured them that there would be an adequate substitute. If they agreed, they could come along. They all said it didn't matter a bit, but when the time came to take those 15 to the other club, we called out their names and they never answered the call. There we stood on those narrow streets, looking for 15 youngsters who just couldn't remember their names. Happily, the club squeezed everyone in, but my nerves barely held up. At another convention, the group obtained tickets to a top Broadway hit, and never showed us the tickets until the day of the show. When we looked at them, they were mistakenly for a matinee instead of the evening performance. We pleaded cajoled and cried and finally the theater found room for one hundred youngsters. Some stood in the aisles or sat on bridge chairs, but they saw the show.

By 1965, the conventions with whom we had worked in New York asked us to follow them around to other cities. We accepted that challenge, and last year set up programs in Chicago, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. for some of the groups.

We've even gotten involved with the grownups, handling women's programs and sometimes the hospitality functions for the entire convention. Actually, our service today serves many functions. We are open for individual reservations in New York five days a week from June through September, but we accept special charter reservations or groups on a year round basis. Now we are embarking on European tours for teenagers. This latter program began when parents began asking us if we could plan something more than the usual European tour and when airlines approached me about developing unusual programs for students. Our European schedule will include special receptions where youngsters will have the opportunity of meeting and getting to know European youngsters; theaters where they will take backstage tours and meet the performers, resort stopovers with time to relax and participate in sports and recreation, and a sightseeing scheduled geared to study programs.

recent General Assembly and the Governor in establishing a system of Community Colleges. They will serve not only to provide a broadened base of opportunity for boys and girls in this State to attend college, but will also offer general as well as technical education. The success of this timely venture will, in my opinion, be gauged, "in the long run," more on the quality of the general education program offered and maintained than on any other factor. Those institutions in the State providing graduate education must, therefore, turn quickly to the task of preparing teachers for these two-year colleges, and aid them in every consultative way possible.

5. The quality of liberal arts in Virginia yesterday and today rests primarily on the quality of teaching. The teachers we remember are those who brought us through the stages of critical thinking to the threshold of our own minds, and opened doors to new thought processes, and inspired learning as a thrilling and rewarding adventure in the realm of ideas. Let us, then, deliberately cultivate the soil that nurtures the great teacher and foster, as we are now doing, those incentives and encouragements that will keep him happily in Virginia.

6. We can on this occasion pay tribute to those private institutions of higher learning in Virginia which have struggled to continue as citadels of liberal arts. In many respects, they are the last fortresses of protection of the best in the liberal arts tradition, and should be encouraged in every way short of interference.

If we are to survive as a free nation, then I submit that we must liberally educate for more than survival. If we are now capable of reaching into space, then I submit that we must liberally educate for true worthiness in moving among the stars. If we have now ensnared the rays of the sun, then we must liberally educate for illuminating the dark recesses of our lives. If we are to resolve the destiny of mankind, then we must liberally educate for a worthy immortality. This is the challenge of liberal arts that promotes an education worthy of free men.
