


CUBIC'S SECOR, the surveying satellite developed for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, keeps introducing changes in the cartographer's art. For example, the system places the Ryukyu Islands a half-mile southwest of where we thought they were. To make such discrete measurements, SECOR employs electronic trilateration. As the satellite makes its pass, signals bounce between its 7-pound transponder and 4 portable Cubic ground stations. When the data is correlated, one station, whose position is only generally known, is located with new precision.

W ILLIAM and Mary paid its respects last month to its deep English roots in a 275th Anniversary Charter Day Convocation that left several things to remember in the future.

The $2\frac{1}{2}$ hour program recalled from several angles the royal founding of the College and the ultimate severance from England in the War of Independence. But the event symbolized a continuing effort to re-establish certain of the links with Great Britain to the advantage of present day students and faculty.

Queen Elizabeth II, who greeted students from the Wren balcony in 1957 during her visit to the College, dispatched greetings on the occasion of the Anniversary which were announced to the campus community by her Ambassador, Sir Patrick Dean.

The Drapers' Company, one of London's historic Guilds, presented a beautiful sterling silver rosebowl and candelabrum especially created and crafted for the 275th Anniversary (see cover illustration).

The Rt. Rev. and Rt. Hon. Robert Wright Stopford, Lord Bishop of London and titular successor to the College's first Chancellor, presented a marble detail from St. Paul's Cathedral, London, obtained during its restoration following World War II. St. Paul's is one of Sir Christopher Wren's most notable buildings, and the gift from Bishop Stopford permits William and Mary's Wren Building to house a symbolic tie with the English works of the famed architect.

Bishop Stopford and Ambassador Dean were recipients of honorary degrees along with Hugh Farmar, Clerk (executive director) of the Drapers' Company. Farmar was instrumental in 1955 in setting up the Drapers' exchange scholarship program under which a William and Mary student spends a year in England, and an English student spends a year at the College.

Each of the visiting British officials—including Anthony Packe, Master of the Drapers'—received from the College an anniversary medallion struck for the occasion by the Alumni Office. The bronze piece, with a replica of a William and Mary coin on one side and the College coat of arms on the other, will be given during the 275th Anniversary Year to certain specially designated persons.

For the future, the 275th Anniversary program was the focal point for at least three innovations.

The Society of the Alumni announced that it would begin this fall a program of faculty Alumni Fellows. Under the program, announced at Charter Day by Judge Dixon L. Foster, President of the Society, up to five outstanding faculty members would be designated Alumni Fellows and receive appropriate recognition and stipends.

The Society, through Judge Foster, also presented

the newly created Chain of Office for the Senior Class President. The Chain includes links bearing the names of all Senior Class Presidents since the practice of having class officers was begun in 1897. Hanging from it is a medallion bearing the College coat of arms.

Chancellor Alvin Duke Chandler announced during the program that the Endowment Association, which he heads, will allocate funds for up to ten Heritage Fellows among the faculty. The program would be similar to the Chancellor Professorships which provide stipends for those who are chosen.

Vernon L. Nunn, the College's treasurer-auditor, who is a member of the Class of 1925, was awarded the 1968 Thomas Jefferson Award in recognition of his "significant service through his personal activities, his influence and his leadership." He has been with the College since 1930, and has been treasurerauditor since 1961.

The Charter Day weekend actually began February 8 with a highly successful coast-to-coast alumni meeting over telephone, originating from the Blue Room of the Wren Building. About 1,500 alumni in 23 separate meetings heard the program, but technical difficulties prevented alumni at these meetings from responding to greetings from Williamsburg. The program included a special lecture by Dr. Harold L. Fowler on the personalities of King William III and Queen Mary II, greetings from President Paschall, Judge Foster, Bishop Stopford and Ambassador Dean.

A month earlier, at an alumni-sponsored reception for Virginia's General Assembly, Governor Mills E. Godwin Jr. '36x, received a gavel crafted from wood in an oak tree that grew in the Wren Yard in 1693, and which achieved a nickname as the "charter oak" until it was felled in 1941.

The Congress of the United States received a proposed joint resolution in honor of the anniversary from Virginia's delegation in the House of Representatives. The Virginia General Assembly, at a commemorate meeting in Williamsburg February 3, adopted a joint resolution marking the occasion.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Robert V. H. Duncan '35, greetings were sent by President Lyndon B. Johnson and the U. S. Post Office Department took under advisement a plea for a commemorative postage stamp.

The anniversary event culminated nine months of planning by a committee headed by Dr. W. Melville Jones, Dean of the College. The anniversary year began in full swing after February 10, with several special activities, including a fall fine arts festival, symposia, and conferences.

IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

90th CONGRESS 2d Session

January 22, 1968

Mr. Downing (for himself, Mr. Hardy, Mr. Marsh, Mr. Poff, Mr. Wampler, Mr. Tuck, Mr. Satterfield, Mr. Scott, Mr. Abbitt, and Mr. Broyhill of Virginia) submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- Whereas the people of the United States of America throughout their history have recognized the importance to democracy of an educated citizenry, and to that end have encouraged a public policy of support of education for all of its people and the development, within the several States, of centers of advanced learning as beneficial to the general welfare; and
- Whereas at the time of its independence the United States of America already was endowed with certain centers of learning established upon the initiative of the people of the several Colonies or as part of the policy of colonial growth encouraged by the then sovereign of the said Colonies; and
- Whereas, on February 8, 1693, a royal charter was granted by Their Majesties King William III and Queen Mary II of England, to found and establish "a certain place of universal learning" in the "good arts and sciences" to be known forever thereafter as the College of William and Mary in Virginia; and
- Whereas, subsequent to the independence of the said United States of America, His Excellency Thomas Jefferson, then Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia and thereafter a distinguished President of the United States of America, on December 4, 1779, led the same College of William and Mary in Virginia to a reorganization of its curriculum with the particular objective of creating therein a course of study preparing students for the service of the new State and Nation, to wit, by introducing pioneering courses in law, the several natural sciences, and the several modern languages; and
- Whereas the said College of William and Mary in Virginia has throughout its history educated men who have contributed to the commonweal of three centuries, so that it is truly and often said that the history of the Colleges forms a significant part of the history of the Nation, the same including the first President and fifteen Members of the Continental Congress, three Presidents of the United States, a Chief Justice and three Associate Justices of the United States, thirteen Cabinet members, twenty-nine Senators, three Speakers, and fifty-five Members of the House of Representatives, twenty-two Governors of Virginia, twenty-two judges of the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, an uncounted number of members of the General Assembly of Virginia, as well as leaders in the government of a number of other States of the Union; and
- Whereas today it continues in this tradition of education of men and women for useful citizenship in public and private pursuits, continuing to adapt its course of studies to the growing needs of community, Commonwealth, and Nation: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives of the United States (the Senate concuring), That the Congress on this occasion sends hearty congratulations and greetings to the College of William and Mary on the occasion of its two hundred and seventy-fifth anniversary, recognizing the contributions it has made to the well-being of the people of Virginia and the United States, and extending the hope of the people of the United States that the College of William and Mary will continue to grow and prosper in the centuries yet to come.

General Assembly Resolution

On the Two Hundred Seventy-fifth Anniversary of the founding of the College of William and Mary

- Whereas, At the request of the Assembly of Their Majesties' Colony of Virginia, King William and Queen Mary were pleased to grant a charter creating the College of William and Mary in Virginia on the eighth day of February in the year one thousand six hundred and ninety-three, the present year being the two hundred and seventy-fifth anniversary of the same; and
- Whereas, the oldest academic building in the United States, now known as the Sir Christopher Wren Building, was begun in the year sixteen hundred and ninety-five, and on two different occasions during the colonial period provided meeting facilities for the Speaker of the House and the General Assembly; and
- Whereas, In the struggle for independence and in the creating of a new Commonwealth and a new Nation, the men associated with the College of William and Mary wrought imaginatively and heroically many of the documents which have become the fundamental articles of our political faith as a republic; and
- Whereas, Through the vision and leadership of the second Governor of this Commonwealth, His Excellency, Thomas Jefferson, the curriculum of the College of William and Mary was modernized and enlarged to meet the changing needs of the new Commonwealth and Nation through the establishment of chairs of Law and of Natural and Social Sciences; and
- Whereas, Both in war and in peace the students and faculty of the said College of William and Mary have zealously and effectively served the Commonwealth and Nation in public office, in military service, and in the many arts and crafts of daily life, responding in each age to new educational challenges and needs; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Delegates, the Senate of Virginia concurring, That the General Assembly of Virginia hereby recognizes and commends the two hundred and seventy-five years of service and accomplishmnt of the said College of William and Mary in Virginia, and records the expressed hope that the College will continue to grow and prosper in the highest sense of its cherished heritage.



TO THE POINT

About The Desirability Of William And Mary

THIS MONTH, the second oldest institution of higher learning in these United States celebrates the 275th anniversary of its founding: the College of William and Mary, at Williamsburg. Unlike Harvard (a few years older), William and Mary had to struggle for survival most of its years, until the state of Virginia assumed its support and direction in 1906.

of Virginia assumed its support and direction in 1906. Virtually ruined during the Revolution, virtually ruined again during the Civil War. the College of William and Mary sometimes had only a tiny handful of students, by contrast with its present 4,000. John Randolph of Roanoke (who studied briefly at the college, and found it a poor place in the years after the Revolution) wrote in 1814 that in colonial times William and Mary had been "a seminary of learning, under able classical masters."

Certainly the college schooled great Virginians. H e r e studied three Presidents of the United States: Jefferson, Monroe and Tyler; here, too, studied John Marshall and that great man of law, George Wythe, and Peyton Randolph, first president of the Continental Congress. George Washington was the college's first American chancellor. Here, in 1776, the Phi Beta Kappa Society was founded. Although nowadays William

Although nowadays William and Mary really is a university, with the oldest school of law in America and modern greaduate schools of business, education and marine science — plus a great synchrocyclotron and a graduate branch at Newport N e w s it preserves its ancient harmony and humane scale. It was meant to raise up Christian gentlemen, and it still does, together nowadays with Christian young ladies.

Christian young ladies. Twice this commentator has delivered Marshall-Wythe lectures to the college. Such guests as your servant are lodged in the simple beauty of one of the old buildings, next door to the oldest college hall in the country — the handsome brick edifice said to have been designed by Sir Christopher Wren which somehow has survived repeated conversion to unacademic uses and long periods of neglect.

and long periods of neglect. What a contrast, this college, to Behemoth State University, with its grim utilitarian campus and its unhappy student multitudes who mutter, "Don't fold or spindle us!" (No, there isn't reallv a Behemoth State; but the modern mass campus is legion and growing more unpleasant every month.) For William and Mary 1 o o k s straight upon old Williamsburg, so splendidly restored by Rockefeller money, where everything is charming and cheerful.


Any genuine college of liberal arts and sciences should be a place of dignity, tradition, quiet and academic leisure (a very different thing from academic idleness). In these matters, the advantages of William and Mary ar e great. Had I to make the choice, I had rather dwell in Williamsburg than in Cambridge, Mass.

Very English in its patrimony, William and Mary also represents the old culture of the Southern states. Like the Old Dominion, the college retains its character and its courtesy in good-natured defiance of the age of automation and the secular city.

HE GREEKS are no more.

Favorite habitats of thousands, of William and Mary students for some two decades, the "Corner Greek's" and the "Middle Greek's" on Duke of Gloucester Street were both closed during 1967 to make room for enlarged gift shops and a new, modern cafeteria to be opened during 1968. The "Middle Greek's" became the new location for Madison's gift shop, the College Shop moved into Madison's old place of business. Both the old College Shop and "Corner Greek's" will be remodeled for the new cafeteria to serve Williamsburg's increasing flow of visitors and students, as well.

Alumni Director Gordon C. Vliet '54, whose memories of the Greeks are as rich as anyone's, was among the dozens who successfully purchased mementos at an auction in December. A complete booth set from the "Corner Greek's" now graces his office in Ewell Hall.

Anniversary Fever

Across the campus by late winter, William and Mary organizations went headlong into preparations for events and observations tied together under the umbrella of the College's 275th Anniversary. (For coverage of the major beginning events of this Anniversary year, see the special section in this month's *Gazette*.)

Among the speakers of considerable note who are being brought to the campus during the spring phase of the Anniversary, are Howard K. Smith, the ABC-TV news commentator; C. Vann Woodward, Yale expert in the history of the Southern Negro; and Eugene Genovese, also a scholar in the field of Negro development. A special fall Fine Arts Festival is in the planning stages. Mortar Board has the opportunity to observe its own 50th anniversary in the spring, and in the fall will come the 50th anniversary of the admission of coeds to William

and Mary. The long-projected publication of the history of the William and Mary Theatre was thought to be near, following completion of the manuscript late last year by Miss Althea Hunt, professor and director emeritus. Faculty were preparing for major symposia on the manifestations of English tradition in America, and on the role of higher education for the future.

New Schools

The Board of Visitors in January established the new School of Continuing Education, to serve as the framework for management of the Extension Division, with its enrollment of 6,000 off-campus and the Evening College, with an enrollment of 500, as well as of the new Peninsula Graduate Center (Virginia Associated Research Center), with an enrollment of about 250. Dr. Donald J. Herrmann, professor of education and a veteran faculty member, was named Dean.

Meanwhile, Dr. Charles L. Quittmeyer became Dean of the new School of Business Administration on February 1, the date the Department of Business Administration was elevated to School status. Dr. Algin B. King was named Assistant Dean, and Dr. A. L. Sancetta became Director of Graduate Studies in the School.

Sitar Virtuoso

William and Mary's 800-seat Phi Beta Kappa Hall was the scene in January for a performance by Pandit Ravi Shankar, India's virtuoso of the sitar, the complicated classical instrument some 600 years old. His improvisational concert drew a full audience of 809, but if an auditorium with 5,000 seats had been available, it would also have been filled. The William and Mary Concert Series sponsored the program, and all season tickets were sold, well before the fall session opened; some went to persons who obtained them only to hear Shankar.

Sun Never Sets . . .

William and Mary's English heritage will root even more firmly this fall with the beginning of a junior-yearabroad program at Exeter University. The 15-member group from Williamsburg will spend the entire academic year in residence at Exeter, which is one of England's newest universities (formally chartered in 1956, but with antecedents to 1901).

Arrangements for the program, only the second year-abroad arrangement in Virginia, were begun last summer by Dean W. Melville Jones during a visit to England. During the same visit, he helped establish the College's first English alumni chapter and to arrange for the 275th Anniversary Charter Day Convocation program.

Since 1952, William and Mary has sent individual students to English universities. Several years ago, single exchanges were started with Exeter. In 1966, a faculty exchange was begun with Exeter, and at the same time a student exchange was begun with St. Andrew's in Scotland.

The international outlook of William and Mary grows each year. During the current session, some 36 international students are studying at the College, a half-dozen from England.

Library Bequests

Some \$4,500 has been made available to establish the initial library for a new Department of Religion, to be established in September. One gift was made by J. Edward Zollinger '27,

a member of the Board of Visitors; and the second was a bequest of Frank S. Phillips '25.

The non-denominational department will initially include a single professor, who will be appointed in the spring. Establishment of the new program was thought to be a "real contribution to a liberal arts education for those students who elect to take its offerings."

Construction Program

Equipment and labor shortages continued in the winter to plague William and Mary's history-making building program. By February, seven of the 12 new men's fraternity units were completed and occupied, but the other five were not expected to be ready at least until March. The new Life Sciences Building for biology and psychology was not ready, as scheduled, by January; its opening date was uncertain. Both these projects were originally projected for completion last September, but weather and the exigencies of war collaborated to delay them.

The partial conversion of the Old

Library into the law school was, however, completed by December. Work proceeded on schedule on the first phase of the new Mathematics and Computer Center building, being constructed first as a basement and first floor building and, if funds become available, to become a three story-andbasement structure.

Plans for the new men's physical education center were at a standstill by February pending allocation of additional funds for its construction by the Virginia General Assembly, meeting in Richmond. The first bid opening for the building last summer found the College with about \$2,500,-000 less on hand than the lowest construction price. The architectural plans were ordered reworked to effect economies, an additional revenue bond sale was authorized, and extra funds were asked from the State.

Virginia's legislature appeared ready in 1968 to ask voters to approve the sale of \$81,000,000 in bonds to finance educational and hospital construction projects over the next two years.



Faculty Profile:

Soap to Marble Brings Roseberg Sculpting Honors

CARL ROSEBERG, William and Mary's gifted sculptor, has achieved enough honors and awards to fill a couple of typewritten pages, but he's never at a loss for new fields to conquer. A couple of years ago, he spent six months carving on an 800pound piece of lignum-vitae wood from Panama under a financial grant from the Society of the Alumni. Last summer he studied bronze and aluminum casting at the Tyler School of Art at Temple University. This summer he plans to launch into a 400-pound piece of Italian marble.

Whatever the medium—wood or marble carving, welding, metal casting or wax—Roseberg has probably been there or soon will be. He began as a child in soap carving, studied designing at the University of Iowa, painting under the great American artist Grant Wood and printmaking under the noted Mauricio Lasansky, and eventually settled in sculpture because it is "something you can get ahold of." But not a single medium of sculpture as many artists are content with, but the entire breadth of the field.

Roseberg has his reasons for spreading his talents. For one thing, he believes many sculptors are too restrictive, concentrating their talents on a single area. But more important, Professor Roseberg has taught art at William and Mary for the past 20 years, and to teach, he believes, a teacher must "work in all the materials to do a proper job."

By one stretch of the imagination, much of Roseberg's brilliant work could be considered a figment of the imagination. He prefers to work in abstract art because, he explains, it is more challenging and requires greater creativity than realistic art. Realistic art, according to Roseberg, is basically a reflection of the actual object, but abstract art is a "figment of the imagination" in the sense that it demands different ways of viewing an object.

The philosophy guides Professor Roseberg in his art classes as well. He will teach and advise his budding sculptors on method and approach, but he demands the initial creative effort be theirs. And for some that's not easy.

"Sculpture for those who have little or no background in art," he says, "is like trying to play basketball without having ever seen the game. I encourage them to look at publications and see what has happened so they can get a 'feeling' for art. But they have to develop their own ideas, and then as

they do the sculpture they develop the skill. They learn by doing because they have to."

The difficult task is often the "actual doing and creating." What of those with no talent? "I don't think there is anyone with no talent," he says, "there are those with more talent than others."

Since Roseberg arrived at William and Mary in 1947, 600 or 700 students have probably passed through his classes in sculpture, a sizable number because sculpture students require individual attention. A few have gone into art as a vocation, but the majority continue on in other fields. However, he explains, art courses pay intangible rather than tangible dividends because they provide a "better understanding and a greater appreciation of art." The next time a student attends an exhibit, Roseberg says, "he can appreciate that experience."

The increase in public interest in art in the United States can be explained at least partly in this fashion. Colleges and universities have greatly broadened their art programs over the past decade and more students than ever are taking art classes. At William and Mary, for instance, Professor Roseberg recalls that only 40 or 50 students were enrolled annually in the art survey course when he arrived at the College; this year more than 250 are enrolled in the course, which has been taught by the combined faculty of the Fine Arts Department.

One of Roseberg's most memorable students was Joseph Lonas, a war veteran who attended William and Mary when Roseberg first came to the College. After studying sculpture under Roseberg, Lonas followed the master's footsteps to the University of Iowa for a master of fine arts degree. He was chosen for a Fulbright Scholarship and studied in Germany where the Government invited him to stay on under one of its grants. Today he lives in Berlin, recognized as one of Germany's brightest young artists.

Lonas learned his early technique from a man who can never remember when he wanted to be anything other than an artist. "Besides," explains Roseberg who began his art as a schoolboy in Vinton, Iowa, "I had a reputation to uphold as the best drawer in the second grade."


From Vinton, Roseberg went to the University of Iowa to learn to become a commercial artist. He immediately found himself at a disadvantage because he had attended a small high school, and many of his classmates from larger schools were doing things in art that "I never knew existed." But he had an advantage as well; he had learned as a boy to work with his hands.

"In those days," he recalls, "kids did a lot more with their hands. For instance, there was no such thing as an airplane kit, you did all the work yourself if you wanted to build an airplane." Many of his students today, Roseberg says, come into his classes at a disadvantage because they have never worked in any mechanical way with their hands; many don't even know how to use a saw or hammer.

Roseberg received a bachelor of fine arts degree at Iowa, the first man to receive that degree under a new pro-(*Please turn page*)

gram, and as a result, he says, he obtained some very fine training which would have been unavailable otherwise. He immediately went on to graduate school, but his master's work was interrupted by the war in which he served as a photo intelligence officer for the Navy on Guam keeping track of Japanese airfields. A commander in the Naval Reserve in air intelligence, Roseberg completes 26 years of Reserve duty this June.

Roseberg studied painting for nearly five years in college and for more than a year under Grant Wood and James Lechay. He still dabbles in painting when he has time, and is frequently called upon for his designing talents. He created a special service medallion for the Marshall-Wythe Law School and drafted the roll titles for the Colonial Williamsburg film, "The Colonial Naturalist." During the 275th anniversary year, his work will be seen on a medallion which will be presented to distinguished persons for outstanding services and loyalty to the College.


Roseberg often designs a piece of sculpture on paper before he begins the work. Other times, depending on the medium or material in which he works, the form gradually develops as he sculptures. An industrious, softspoken Midwesterner of Swedish background, he puts no time limit on his sculptures, but rarely lets up once he begins a work. "There is always the challenge of getting it finished," he says, but then recalls one piece, a gigantic nine-foot combination of welding and wood carving called the "Last Judgement," which took nine years to complete because of its complexity.

During the past two decades, Roseberg's work has been exhibited throughout the United States. He was one of only 50 living American sculptors invited to exhibit at the New York World's Fair in 1964 and has been

Sculptor stands beside his nine-foot "Last Judgement," which took nine years to finish. awarded three "Certificate of Distinction" awards from Virginia Museum Biennials. His work was displayed in the 3rd International Exhibition at Fairmont Park in Philadelphia, the 53rd annual exhibit of Western Artists in Denver, the 12th National Ceramic Exhibition and Traveling Show, and on 17 occasions at the National Artists Exhibition in New York City. He also was invited to display his work in 1957 at the Outstanding Alumni Exhibit at the State University of Iowa, and was on the original board of the "Twentieth Century Gallery" and helped establish the gallery. Only last February he received recognition from the American Institute of Architects which gave him its "Award of Honor Certificate" and displayed his work in a private showing at the Virginia Chapter of AIA in Richmond.

In 1964 Roseberg received a Ford Foundation Grant and was selected the same year for the Advancement of Scholarship Faculty Award by the Alpha of Virginia Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. In 1965 under a Fulbright grant, he was leader of 20 visiting professors who attended a summer institute in India. That same year he received a more sentimental honor; he was invited to deliver the commencement address at his high school in Vinton, Iowa.

Roseberg's teaching interests are as broad as his sculpturing abilities. At William and Mary, he teaches at various times history of sculpture, oriental art history, ancient art history, renaissance sculpture art history, modern art history, beginning and advanced sculpture, and third year problems in sculpture. He and his Fine Arts colleagues moved this year into their brand new quarters in Andrews Hall. Roseberg says he has about four times as much room as in the old power plant where he previously taught his sculpture classes. His section has a storage room, a foundry, a room for beginning students, a room for advanced students, and a room for plaster casting. Even better, he adds, it has heat, good lighting, and no holes in the roof like the old building where students often had to put on their boots when it rained because of the SHARE water on the floor.

Athletics:

The "Little Sports" Welcomed by Men's Athletic Department and Students, Too

T HREE TIMES a week during the late afternoons, the Associate Dean of William and Mary puts aside his books and papers in his Brafferton Office and heads across campus to Blow Gymnasium. For the next hour and a half, clad in a mask, padded glove, jacket and gym sneakers, and wielding a sabre or foil, he and a campus chaplain do battle with some 20 others on the gymnasium floor.

The scene depicts neither a routine confrontation with the Board of Visitors nor a campus uprising by a group of irascible students. Dr. John H. Willis, Jr., rather, is doing something he wanted to do since he arrived at William and Mary—try to revive collegiate fencing.

Dr. Willis talks enthusiastically of the golden days of the 30s and 40s when fencing was, if not king, at least a prince at William and Mary. Tucker Jones, the athletic director and one of the leading fencing figures in the coun-

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try, coached the Indians to several Southern Conference fencing titles, but that era passed with his death.

Dr. Willis, with the help of an associate coach, the Rev. Joseph E. Trimble, III, Curate at Bruton Parish Church, is trying to revive the glory of that era. Though admittedly a formidable task, they approach the job with impressive credentials. Mr. Trimble, who serves as a campus minister, fencer at the University of Virginia, sity. Dr. Willis, an intercollegiate fencer at the University of Virginia, did "graduate study" in the sport with two world masters. While attending a language institute in Paris, he studied for a year under a French master who was master of arms of the Garde Republican. Later at Columbia University, he studied with America's great sabre master, George Santelli, while fencing several Olympic veterans in the New York area.

Their initial desire is to establish

fencing on the club level, which they hope later will lead to intercollegiate competition. The response has been gratifying. More than 20 candidates turned out this year, although, Dr. Willis notes, only three had any previous experience. This means long arduous hours of practice before the can take a team into competition.

"Fencing is an extremely challenging sport," Dr. Willis explains. "You can't take a raw recruit and turn him into a skilled competitor over night." Be that as it may, Dr. Willis and Mr. Trimble are anything but discouraged.

By mid-winter, team members had learned some of the elementary moves on the foil, as well as the épée and sabre.

The sport has received a warm welcome from Howard M. Smith and his staff in the men's physical education department. Smith, who has

encouraged a variety of new sports at William and Mary as head of the men's p.e. program, feels fencing provides an outlet for the less aggressive athlete not involved in contact sports. The Department provided all the necessary equipment except for the padded glove which team members were asked to buy themselves as an indication of their commitment.

If fencing goes the route of several other new sports at William and Mary, it may not be long before it is on a firm footing. In recent years, both soccer and lacrosse have graduated from club sports to intercollegiate competition.

Joseph Agree, an assistant professor of physical education who finds time to coach both soccer and golf, tells of the growth of soccer into a full-fledged sport.

Starting as a club sport, soccer was in its infant stages when Agee took over three years ago. Thirty boys were out, few with any experience, when Agee was told to "go out and find a field to play on." He found an empty lot near James Blair Terrace by Eastern State Hospital; the sport survived its first year on the club level and then grew to a varsity sport, although the team failed to win a game until this year when it finished second in the northern Division of the Southern Conference behind West Virginia, the Conference champ. Agee recalls that first victory vividly.

"You'd thought we had won the World Cup," he says.

Lacrosse is another late comer that began on the club level and developed into intercollegiate competition. The team has a new coach, Jim Carpenter, an instructor in physical education, who coached the club to its first "nonlosing" season last year. Playing Amherst, the University of Richmond, Randolph Macon, and Georgetown, the lacrossers lost three but managed to tie Georgetown.

Sailing, still a club sport at William and Mary, probably had the most unconventional genesis. A few years ago several students interested in sailing

placed an ad in Yachting Magazine reading "Old School-New Club Needs Sailboat." A Maryland man who was moving to California read the ad and gave the College his sailing boat for the club to use.

Some 30 students belong to the club today, though according to one member it still has a "tenuous existence" because of financial and transportation problems. A member of the South Atlantic Intercollegiate Sailing Association, the club competes against Old Dominion, Duke, The Citadel, South Carolina, and the College of Charleston. Team members—who have acquired two more small sailing craft, one of which was given them by Professor Frank Evans of the English Department—sail out of Yacht Haven on the York River.

Professors Bruce Goodwin and Steven Clement of the Geology Department serve as advisors to the club which solves some of its financial problems with the same ingenuity with which it got started. The Club has earned enough money washing cars to buy a small Penguin sailing craft.

All of these sports fit into a group the coaches call "non-revenue" sports —meaning they don't bring in any money, but provide plenty of exercise and fun for the participants. Others in this category are gymnastics, swimming, golf, wrestling, tennis, baseball, and cross-country and indoor and outdoor track.

Few of the sports offer any financial assistance to the participants, forcing the coaches who recruit to sell William and Mary on institutional appeal alone. Harry Groves, who coaches indoor and outdoor track and cross-country running, has probably been as successful at it as any coach in the country who operates on a limited budget. In 12 years at William and Mary his teams have won 13 Southern Conference and 12 Virginia titles.

To minimize expenses, the nonrevenue teams often travel together. During the 1967 spring vacation, for instance, the baseball and tennis teams made a swing south together. The host institution usually provides free college housing and meals for the visiting teams, which reciprocate when the host team returns the visit.

"This way," says H. Lester Hooker, athletic director who doubles as baseball coach, "our only expenses are for the bus." A couple years ago Hooker tried to take the golf team as well as the baseball and tennis teams on a combined trip but that didn't work so well. The golfers had so much equipment that there was no place for the players to sit on the bus.

Whatever the minor handicaps, however, the players never seem to mind. With some 13 different sports to choose from, they can always move on to another field. Which is one reason for the wide-ranging program.

"We try to offer enough different sports," explains Howard Smith, "for everyone to satisfy his desire to participate."

Read Goode's idea led to an extra \$250,000 in

business in a single year. His idea was Greg Porter.

While Read F. Goode was still in college, he worked with Gregory Porter for a prominent Richmond investment firm. Greg stayed with the brokerage firm, but Read entered the insurance business with New England Life.

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The idea has proved abundantly productive. In the last 12 months, Read's new business from this source alone has totalled more than \$250,000-an impressive portion of an equally impressive \$1,535,000 total.

"This is typical of what I hoped to be able to do when I chose the insurance field," says Goode. "I wanted a business in which initiative and ideas paid off. I wanted opportunity, with a large measure of freedom, and I've certainly found it here."

November's meeting was held at the National Book League, Dr. J. E. Morpurgo's firm. The report follows:

Support it this year!

Sirs:

Recalling the inauguration of the studentwaiter service at the College of William and Mary, it seems appropriate for me to submit the following information on its inception:

Toward the end of the 1910-11 session of the College, the Board of Visitors removed the College steward, Mr. Robert Lee Spencer, and announced that it would appoint a successor for the ensuing session. At that time Frederick D. Goodwin, a junior; Walter B. Nourse, a sophomore; and I, a freshman, were table boarders in the home of Wade T. Brown, a junior and much older man who as a teacher had attended the College off and on in pursuit of his degree. The Browns' table was regarded as excellent by the students who ate there.

Financially, the situation was tight for the three of us, as for most of the students

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of those years. Unless I could find some work at the College my prospects for returning for the ensuing session were slim indeed, and Goodwin and Nourse were anxious to complement their resources. We talked with Brown and suggested that he apply for the stewardship. He seemed surprised but interested and said he would talk with Mrs. Brown about it and let us hear from him within a day or so. We said to him that he and Mrs. Brown were experienced in providing meals, in school and college life standards and requirements, and in financing Brown's pursuit of a degree. We felt sure that they would enjoy the support of the student body and faculty.

A few days later Brown said he would apply for the position provided the three of us and perhaps one or more additional students would join him as "monitors," for our room and board-one for the supervision of laundry services, one for dormitories care, and all for mess hall services, either as supervisors or waiters as situations required. At that time he wasn't sure that he could afford or find paid waiters. We heartily agreed and at that time he added D. P. Lohr, an Academy freshman, to the group. It so happened that from the first day we became and continued to be table waiters. Later several Negro waiters were employed and we became a happily integrated force.

So, for the first time as was known, William and Mary students became mess hall waiters. Many of the students boarded in town but the mess hall boarders were a representative cross-section of the student body. The reaction of students, faculty and townspeople was generally favorable, even laudatory, although a few students protested that it was inappropriate and unseemly for their classmates, friends and social associates to serve them as waiters, the editor of the *Flat Hat* among them by means of an editorial! The system was soon agreeably accepted and there was never an unpleasant incident in or out of the messhall resulting therefrom. This veritable "windfall" in large measure enabled me to go onto the B.A. degree and high honors and I am sure assisted Goodwin (later Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia, who died in January-Ed.), Nourse and Lohr has as it has done hundreds students since that time. Goodwin became Bishop; Nourse transferred to Cornell and was graduated in agriculture and became an outstanding county agent in Fauquier County where he died early in life; Lohr's career is unknown to me. I became Com-missioner of Public Welfare in Virginia. So, if my immodesty for saying so may be pardoned, it would seem that the inaugurators of this worthy priority of the College did pretty well for their baby!

I have been told that in 1910-11 there were student waiters at VPI, but I have never verified that. It was many years before the University of Virginia and other colleges followed suit. I was waited on by a student at Harvard in 1923-24.

In several conversations, Bishop Goodwin and I have agreed that this service was one of the most rewarding and satisfying experiences of our student days, even of our lives.

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
