## COUNTING DOWN TO THE COLLEGE'S TERCENTENARY

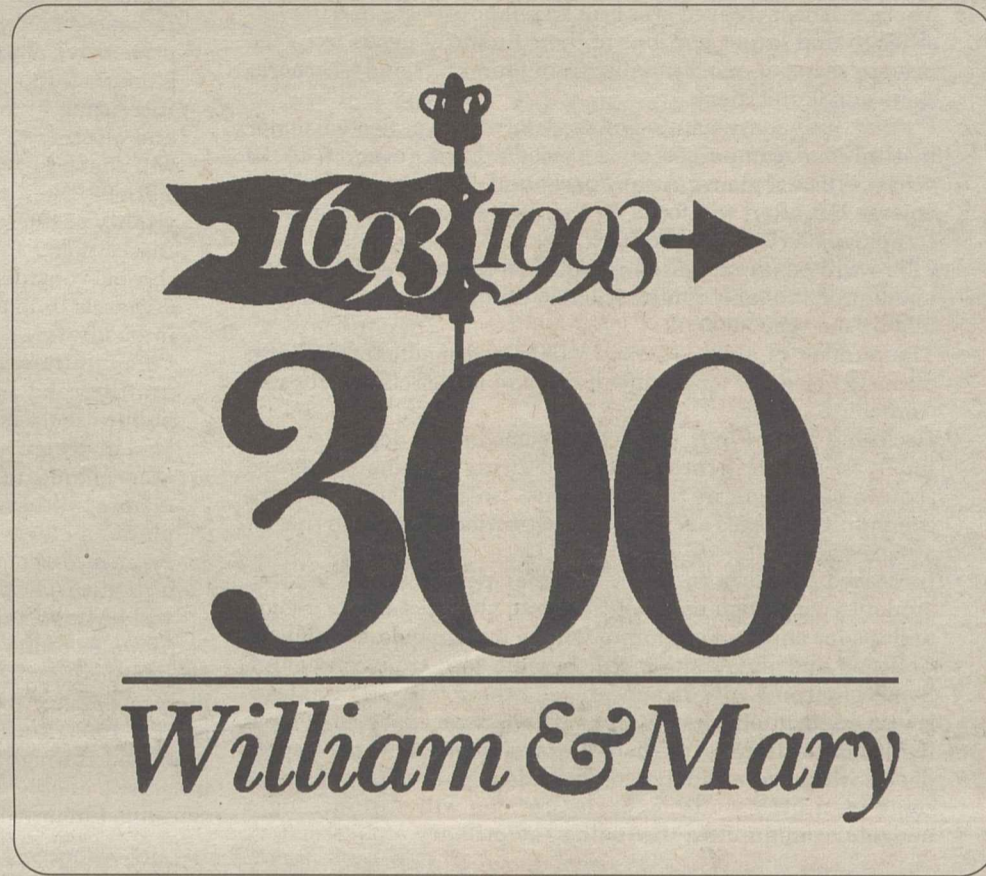
In 1993, the College will combine opportunities for intellectual pursuit with a spectacular party to celebrate its 300th anniversary. Mixing cake with cogitation would not be appropriate at some institutions, but it is a natural combination for William and Mary, said Henry Rosovsky '49, chair of the Commission on Tercentenary Observances.

"We are, after all, celebrating the life of a university and we should focus on the life of the mind, more than anything else," Rosovsky said. "But this is an anniversary and like all anniversaries it is an occasion to have a good time, just as William and Mary people like to do."

Rosovsky should know. As a major force behind the Harvard University 350th celebration in 1986, he saw that school's alumni, faculty, students and friends come together for a commemoration of impressive proportions and results. Rosovsky is making good use of that experience as he leads the commission—established by the William and Mary Board of Visitors in 1987—to oversee the College observance. With College Chancellor and retired U.S. Chief Justice Warren E. Burger as its honorary chair, the commission is made up of a wide-ranging group of past and present elected officials, William and Mary alumni, faculty, staff, students and friends. Leading the College tercentenary staff effort until Nov. 1 was Anne Pratt, who was director of advancement programs. When she left to take a position with the State Council for Higher Education in Virginia, Martha Hamilton-Phillips was selected to become the director of tercentenary programs.

The celebration will be held during the 1993 calendar year and supported with private funds. While there will be observances throughout the year, two periods have been selected for special concentration: Charter Day week, Feb. 8-13; and Homecoming, Oct. 20-23.

Charter Day week will feature a number of academic conferences including those focusing on international education and the



future of liberal arts education. In addition, a conference on women's issues entitled "Mary's Legacy" is being prepared to commemorate the 75th anniversary of women being admitted to the College. Concerts, historic displays, new artwork for the campus and student performances are also in the planning stages. The week's events will culminate with the Charter Day convocation in William and Mary Hall on February 13.

In October, Homecoming will give faculty and students an opportunity to "show off" their intellectual and creative talents in a series of lectures, symposia and displays. In addition to enhanced versions of the Homecoming parade and football game halftime show, the weekend will climax with a giant birthday party.

Certainly, one focus of the observance will be William and Mary's ability to survive and prosper through 300 years.

"In human terms, there are very few things that reach the age of 300. That alone is something to celebrate," said Rosovsky.

During 1993, the first complete history of the College will be published. The work, being written by a group of William and Mary faculty and local historians, will trace the history of the institution from its royal roots in 1693, through the colonial period, into the

turbulent years during and after the American Revolution, through the equally difficult years as a private college in the 19th century, to its revival in 1888 and its emergence as a nationally recognized liberal arts university in the late 20th century.

Looking back and celebrating the College's accomplishments is warranted, but for William and Mary, it also isn't enough. In explaining why, Rosovsky re-

called some of his impressions as a student:

"When I first came to the College in 1944, the emphasis then was very heavily on the past, so heavily in fact that I got sort of tired of hearing about Washington and Jefferson, Madison and John Marshall. The present was understated. You almost had a feeling you had entered an institution that had been great in the past, that was very proud of those people, but that the present somehow didn't measure up," he said.

"But today, it is very, very different. Today, when you take a look at what has been accomplished academically in recent years, when you take a look at the quality of the students who graduate from here, it is remarkable. I don't want us to forget the great names of the 18th and early 19th century, but I hope the celebration will focus attention on the 20th and 21st centuries."

"Commemorations like the one now being prepared are important for a number of reasons," he said. Not only will it draw together College supporters to celebrate its longevity, the events will introduce others to the distinctive qualities of the university. "A celebration of this type acquaints the rest of the country, and the rest of the world, with William and Mary. People will be looking at us. Students will become more interested in us. So it's not only celebrating the College's past, it is also charting a course for the future."

For alumni specifically, Rosovsky believes the tercentenary celebration will reacquaint them with the talented faculty and students. "I would like William and Mary alumni to leave with a sense of great pride in the quality of the school, in terms of its faculty, the quality of the students and quality of the visitors who will be here," he said.

### Start Planning Now

**Get out those long-range calendars and flip them to the fall of 1993. Alumni will have four days to help the College observe the tercentenary with an expanded Homecoming celebration, Oct. 20-23, 1993.**

**Several thousand alumni are expected to participate in a variety of events in Williamsburg. One of the most popular opportunities is expected to be the faculty lectures that will be held across the university. Each department and school at the College is being asked to offer lectures or symposia that will display the depth and strength of the faculty.**

**In addition, the Homecoming parade, football game and halftime show will have special features befitting the celebration. Plans currently also include concerts, fireworks and a giant birthday party to top off the weekend.**

**Most hotels in the area are not yet taking reservations for the 1993 Homecoming period. Hotel information will be published in the June 1992 Gazette. Classes celebrating reunions in 1993 will be assigned to specific hotels. Additional information on reservations and the events will be publicized through the Alumni Gazette in future months.**

**And for those who cannot come back to Williamsburg, the Alumni Society will be encouraging local chapters to plan their own celebrations during 1993.**

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## Alumni Associations and the 21st Century

The report, "Colleges and Universities for the 21st Century," released in July by a special commission, is a relatively short but important document to read. It opens with the statement that "This is not a plan for recovery, but a set of actions for continued improvement." Such an articulation is worthy of great praise in view of the budget trauma that the Commonwealth of Virginia has suffered the past two years.

Just as higher education institutions are facing a new century, some more optimistic about the opportunities than others, so are alumni associations like the Society. Thinking beyond 1993 at this point isn't easy. But the emerging priorities of higher education and the yet unforeseen circumstances which will encumber the society at large require some prudent study of our own.

The alumni association for the 21st century may be affected significantly. Among some trends being acknowledged are:

- There will be increased pressure on public colleges and universities to find larger portions of their financial needs from the private sector — most notably from alumni, friends, corporations and foundations.
- Former university campaign models which projected major institutional campaigns on a periodic basis (every 5 to 10 years) will be replaced. A new "perpetual campaign model" will emerge but often will focus on a series of shorter and smaller campaigns for special needs.
- There will be an increased reliance on alumni records — the amount of available information on alumni will increase tenfold by the year 2000.
- The number of alumni served will increase substantially for all institutions — longer life spans and larger class sizes will contribute to this.
- Declining state funds will lessen some of the dependence of public institutions through restructuring of some mandated requirements and at the same time tuition costs will place community colleges and in-state institutions higher on the list among parents.
- Increased pressure to admit a higher percentage of in-state students will alarm many out-of-state alumni parents. Scholarships for children of alumni will be in demand everywhere.
- Colleges and universities will become less tradition-bound. Some programs will disappear and others will emerge. Continuing education opportunities will become expected of most institutions. Course credit by examination and correspondence will be more widely accepted and popular alternatives at some institutions. Although institutions will still face tight budgets, communities (including the primary and secondary



have a greater visibility and demonstrate a new vitality among students and faculty.

- Alumni volunteers will expect more services and seek more personal satisfaction from their volunteer efforts. Nationwide, most associations will have developed community service programs through chapter networks.
- Increased cultural and ethnic diversity will require more comprehensive planning and better trained and more experienced alumni staffs.
- Increasing numbers of alumni appointed to governing boards and electing to retire in the community of their alma mater will change how alumni programs are viewed. For most associations their programs will seek to support the long-term vitality of the institutions.
- Institutional financial needs, competition from other philanthropic considerations, expanded alumni constituencies and demands from across campus will force development efforts to intensify.
- Communications to alumni will be consolidated. The cost of printing and mailing may reduce the frequency of alumni publications, but they are more likely to be comprehensive, bold in design and visually appealing due to competition from other publications. Use of videotape for alumni news, enrollment applications and even appeals will begin to be commonplace.
- New sources of revenue for alumni associations will need to be identified. Corporate sponsorships and membership programs will be important to association efforts.

As we examine the programs (and evaluations), services and communications the Society provides today it becomes increasingly necessary for the review to be linked to what's ahead — beyond 1993. Many of our most recent efforts have already been improved through strategic thinking. Long-term strategic planning will enable the Society to prepare "a set of actions for continued improvement."

## New Members Elected to Society of the Alumni Board

Following the annual fall election of the Board of Directors of the Society of the Alumni, three alumni have been re-elected to their second terms and two have been elected for the first time. The election results were announced by Rebecca Beach Smith '71, '79 J.D., chair of this year's nominating committee and vice president of the board, at the Society's Annual Meeting held Oct. 18 during Homecoming weekend.

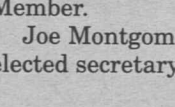

Re-elected to their second three-year terms are Joseph J. Ellis '65 of Holyoke, Mass., Anne Nenzel Lambert '35 of Williamsburg and Joseph W. Montgomery '74, also of Williamsburg. Barbara Pate Glacel '70 of Burke, Va., and Sunshine "Sunny" Trumbo Williams '44 of Norfolk are newly elected members and will begin their first terms at the close of the Society's board meeting in April.

A member of the board since 1989, Joe Ellis chairs the College Relations and House Expansion committees and is a member of the Executive Committee. In 1990 he was appointed the Ford Foundation Professor of History at Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Mass., where he has taught since 1972. From 1980-90 he was dean of the faculty there, overseeing the efforts of approximately 200 faculty members and a support staff of more than 300 employees. In 1983-84 he served as acting president of the college. He received an M.A., M.Phil. and Ph.D. from Yale University where he held Woodrow Wilson and Yale fellowships.

Actively involved in the life of the College for more than 50 years, Anne Lambert has served on the board since 1989. She chairs the Alumni Service Committee and serves on the Executive and House Expansion committees. She is former secretary of the Olde Guard Council, has served as a member of her class reunion committee and was an adviser to Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority for more than 45 years. The wife of the late J. Wilfred Lambert, former vice president for student affairs, she carried out numerous duties as a faculty wife and supported the College extensively with both her volunteer efforts and presence at events. She has been a volunteer with the Williamsburg Community Hospital Auxiliary for 25 years, serving for six years on the board and in 1990 was named a Life Member.

the Finance and Operations Committee and is a member of the House Expansion Committee. His professional achievements have been recognized with numerous awards and recognitions. An active alumnus on many fronts, he has held all major offices in the Athletic Educational Foundation and has participated in Career Exploration Day and the Life After D.O.G. Street program. He is a Randolph's Associate of the Dean's Circle of the School of Business and a member of the Lord Botetourt Affair Committee.

Barbara Pate Glacel joins the board as president of Pace Consulting Group Inc. of Burke, Va., and Monterey, Calif. She consults in executive development, organizational design, team-building and productivity enhancement. She is an adjunct faculty member at the Center for Creative Leadership, Greensboro, N. C. Previously she was a general manager with the Hay group and senior consultant with Atlantic Richfield in Alaska. She holds a Ph.D. in political science and an M.A. in human relations, both from the University of Oklahoma. She is published in the fields of stress management, family systems and public policy analysis.

Sunny Williams has performed a wide variety of alumni services for the College since her graduation. An active member of the Norfolk alumni chapter, she also served as class reporter for the *Alumni Gazette* for more than a decade. On five separate occasions she has chaired or served on her class reunion committee, and as the parent of two William and Mary students served for eight years on the Association of Parents. For many years, she has been on the executive board of the President's House and has helped coordinate successful fund-raising seminars. Involved in countless activities in her community, she was the first woman named to the Norfolk Arts Commission, a post she held for 19 years.

Creating New 'Solid Gold Memories'

New memories were created and old ones revived for thousands of alumni who returned to campus for Homecoming 1991. For the third year in a row, sunny skies prevailed, adding even more warmth and brilliance to the weekend's theme, "Solid Gold Memories."

The drenching rains of Thursday tapered off in time for the weekend's traditional beginning — the Order of the White Jacket's dinner in Trinkle Hall. With President Jack Garrett '40 presiding, the after-dinner program included awarding \$1,500 scholarships to 11 lucky students. In addition, new officers and board members were recognized and two awards were given. The Student of the Year Award was presented to Stephanie Anne Morse '92 of Amherst, Va., who is president of Students OWJ. Rodney Musselman '76, president of Patrons OWJ and manager of food, beverage and catering at the Fort Magruder Inn and Conference Center in Williamsburg, was named Patron of the Year.

Among early morning events on Friday was the annual alumni golf tournament, held this year for the first time at the new Golden Horseshoe Green Course. The winning foursome, with a score of 61, consisted of Dan Brown '81, Don Gibson '84, Porter Peery '81 and Frank Swithers '82.

Across town at the William and Mary Hall tennis courts, tennis aficionados competed in the 14th Annual Sandy Kelly '77 Tennis Tournament. Winners were Joan Costabell Austin '61, Jim Friscia '71, Carole Waller Welborn '60 and John Van Namen '82.

It was time for celebrating on Friday evening at the annual Awards Dinner and Dance sponsored by the Society of the Alumni. Shiny, golden star-shaped balloons and candles added to the festive atmosphere at each table as old friends shared laughter and conversation. The dance floor reflected the same warmth and happiness as couples danced until midnight to the music of "The Society of Seven."

Alumni medallions were awarded to the following five individuals: K. Dane Brooksher '61, Chicago; Mary Land Gill '28, Petersburg, Va.; Denys Grant '58, Richmond; Shepard W. McKenney '62, '64 B.C.L., Drayden, Md.; and Helen Thomson Stafford '48, Princeton, N. J.

Recognized as the 1991 Outstanding Alumni Chapter was the South Hampton Roads Chapter. Four chapters were noted as honorable mention winners: Greater Metropolitan Washington, D.C., New York, Triangle (North Carolina) and Williamsburg.

Four Annual Giving Awards were presented. The Class of 1925 Trophy for the most outstanding increase in giving was awarded to the Class of 1953. The Class of 1944 received the Class of 1954 Trophy for best class percentage participation in the Annual Fund. The Baltimore/Annapolis Trophy, awarded to an outstanding individual with efforts or money for the Annual Fund, went to Theresa Thompson '67. The Board of Directors' Cup for best all-around in support of the Annual Fund was awarded to Richard S. Kraemer '65.

On Saturday, alumni, students and local residents lined Duke of Gloucester Street and Richmond Road to view the 62nd annual Homecoming parade, which included more than 60 student and alumni units.

First place in the floats category went to Phi Mu sorority and Psi Upsilon fraternity for their entry, "We've Got the Solid Gold Touch." They received \$500 and an inscription on the Lambert Cup. The Class of 1946 won second place and \$350 for their "Golden Girls" float. Third place and \$250 went to Delta Gamma sorority for "Solid Goal Memories."

Winners in the bands category included Salem Junior High School of Virginia Beach, first place; Mathews High School, second place; and Berkeley Middle School of Williamsburg, third place.

A standing-room-only crowd filled Zable Stadium to witness the Tribe's 24-17 victory over The Citadel Bulldogs. Despite a malfunctioning public address system, the cheers of Tribe fans chronicled the winning score and halftime festivities went on as planned. This year's Homecoming representatives were: seniors, Kimberly Leann Cathey, Sterling, Va., and Earl Thomas Granger III, Richmond; juniors, Erin Elizabeth Flaherty, Catharpin, Va., and Joseph Ray Price, Norfolk; sophomores, Marisa Lee Creal and Andrew Justin Zawacki, both of Warren, Pa.; freshmen, Katherine Ann Otis, Great Falls, Va., and Mark Dennis Dix, Vienna, Va.

Following the game, alumni, family members and friends celebrated the Tribe's victory at the fourth annual Post-Game Tailgater on the Alumni House lawn. A record crowd of approximately 800 people attended.

Throughout the weekend, the Alumni House was a center of activity where alumni and friends gathered. In the registration

tent on the front lawn, sign-up boards attracted the attention of alumni looking for returning classmates and friends. On Saturday, more than 1,100 people gathered for the ever-popular Luncheon on the Lawn prior to the football game.

Class dinners, breakfasts and parties filled the weekend for those celebrating reunions this year. Turnout was especially high for the Class of 1986 and the Class of 1946, which broke previous attendance records for a 45th reunion.

Other groups held reunions as well. The Association of 1775, a new group affiliated with the Society of the Alumni, joined for a traditional mess hall breakfast on Saturday morning before the parade. Membership is open to all alumni who have served or are currently serving in the military as well as former ROTC cadets at the College. Based on this year's successful turnout, the mess hall breakfast is slated to become part of the annual Homecoming schedule.

The Class of 1966 began its 25th reunion celebration on Thursday evening with the opening of the weekend hospitality suite. Special activities on Friday included a campus bus tour, lunch on the Alumni House patio, and a panel discussion with student leaders and John Randolph '64, director of athletics, and Ken Smith '67, associate vice president for student affairs.

The highlight of the weekend came on Saturday evening when 1966 class members joined for dinner and dancing in Trinkle Hall preceded by a cocktail party in the Great Hall of the Wren Building. At this time, the class presented its 25th reunion gift — a commitment of \$250,000 to be used for strengthening the class reunion programs for the Society of the Alumni. This represented the largest single endowment gift to the Alumni Society. It also broke previous records for the largest number of donors to a 25th reunion gift and for the highest percentage of class members participating as donors.

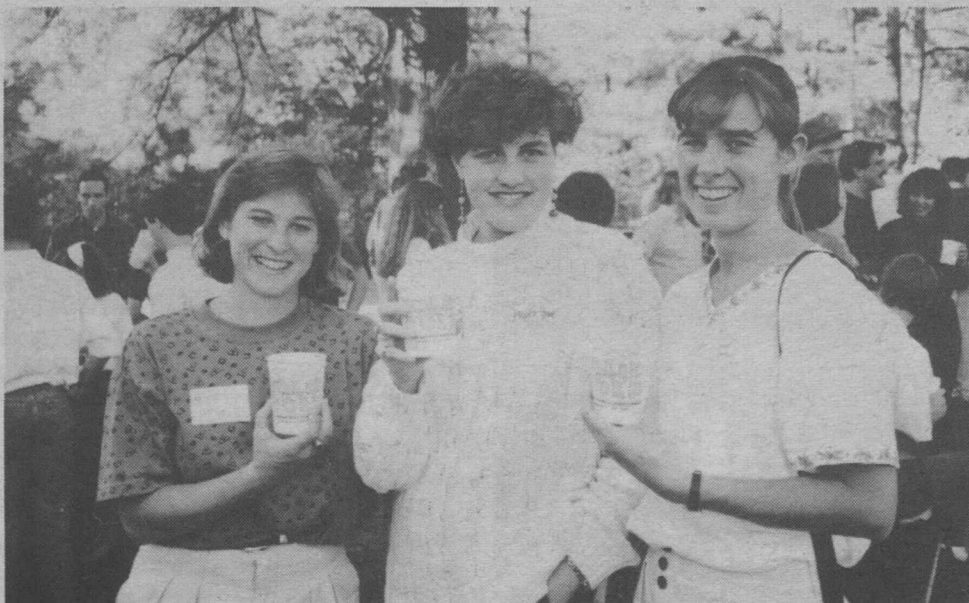

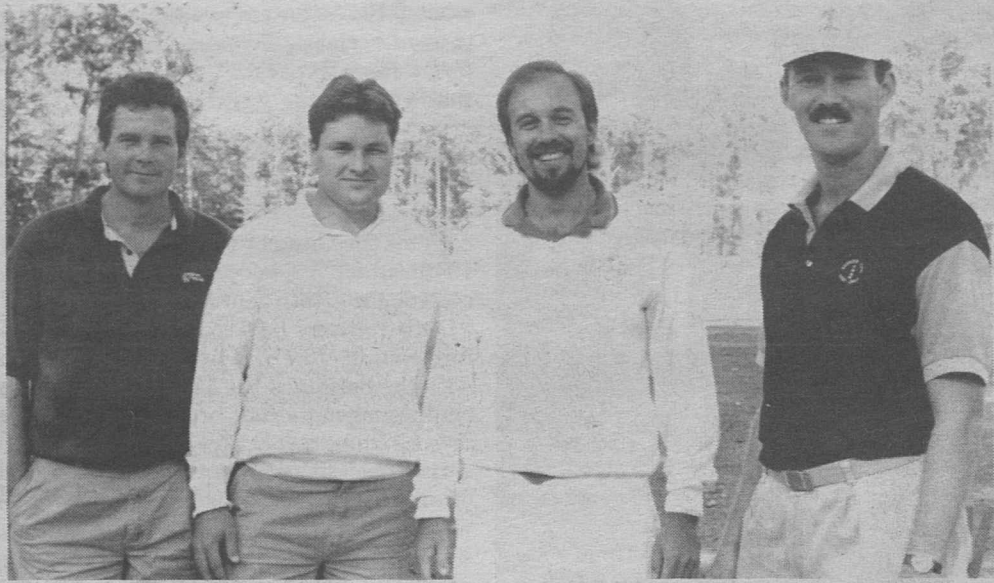

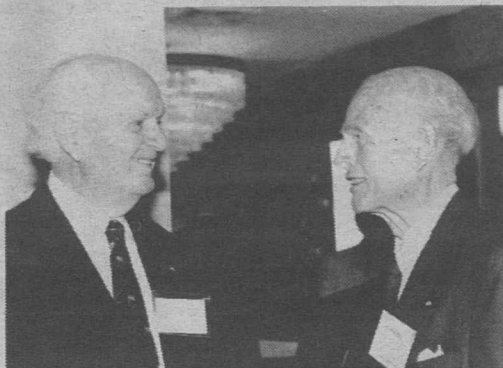

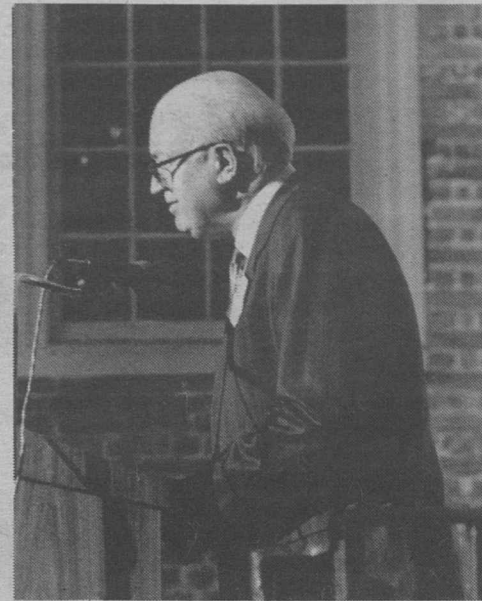

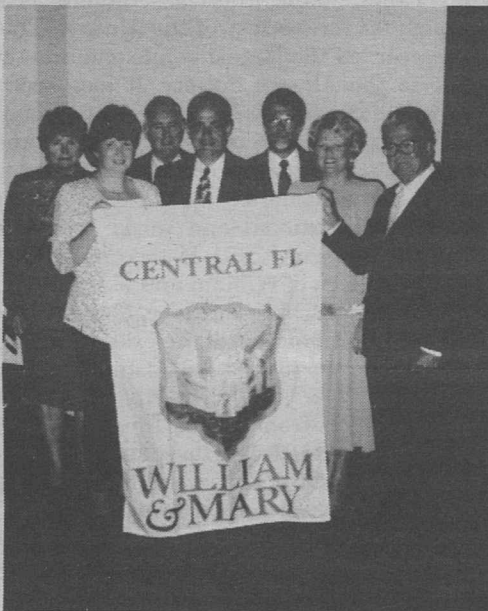

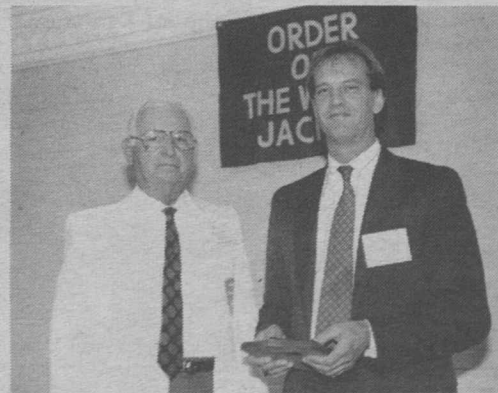

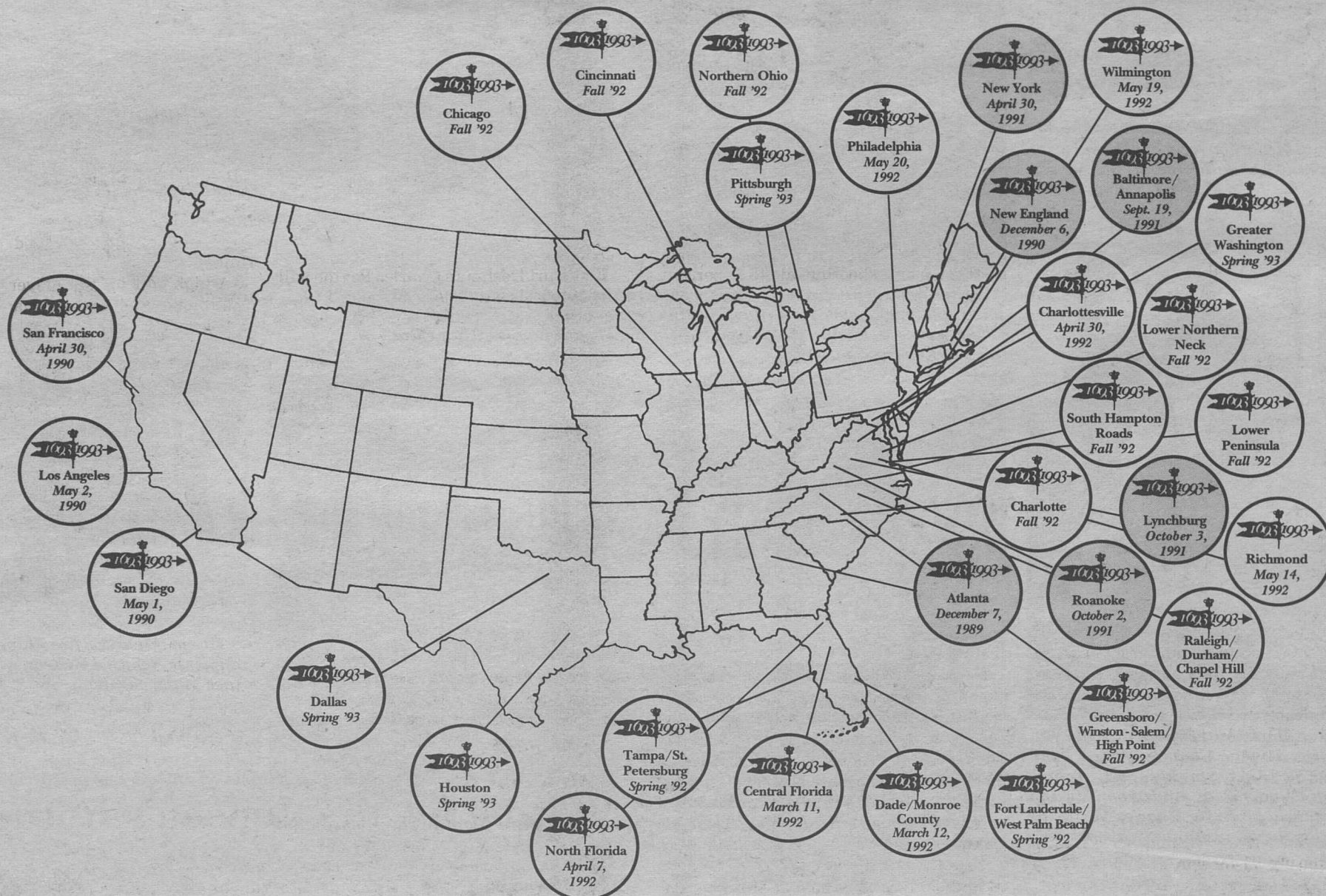

# USA - here we come!



## William and Mary Celebrations Span the Country

When was your last visit to William and Mary? Maybe it was Homecoming this fall or your 10th reunion more years ago than you'd like to remember. In either case, you may have an opportunity in coming months to get in touch with your alma mater — without coming to campus.

Through regional celebrations of the Campaign for the Fourth Century, William and Mary has already been to nine cities and in the next 18 months will roll across the country to 22 more sites where there are large concentrations of alumni. It's the perfect time to revive some fond memories, to see College friends and to renew ties with William and Mary as it nears its 300th birthday celebration in 1993.

"By taking the message of William and Mary through the alumni chapter network to this many cities and towns we're able to reach more than 80 percent of our 50,000 alumni across the country," said Mark McCormack '51, head of International Management Group and national chairman of the Campaign.

"These events are not focused on fund-raising, but on the reason we have a Campaign to begin with. These celebrations provide a rare opportunity for all members of the William and Mary family to get together again and remind each other of our mutual ties."

It's also a good opportunity to get involved again as an alumnus. "What we've seen in a very real way is that alumni are realizing the value of renewing ties with other graduates and with the College through alumni programs," said McCormack.

The idea behind the regional celebrations goes far beyond the fund-raising aspects of the Campaign, according to Edward T. Allenby, vice president for university advancement. "We see this as a very important part of our public relations program," he said. "At this pivotal time in William and Mary's history, we want to give as many alumni as possible the chance to participate in the life of the College."

The celebrations are usually held at

prominent, central locations and are hosted by area alumni and the local chapter. Some of the College's top administrators are on hand to share their personal insights, and a video presentation hosted by Glenn Close '74 titled "The Challenge of Tradition" takes viewers back to the slippery brick sidewalks and buzzing classrooms of their student days.

"These celebrations take the message of William and Mary directly to alumni in their hometowns. They are helping to strengthen the network of alumni chapters across the country, which is a wonderful legacy as we enter our fourth century," said W. Barry Adams, executive vice president of the Society of the Alumni, which is responsible for coordinating the celebration events through the alumni chapter network.

Since late 1989, regional celebrations have been held in Atlanta, San Francisco, San Diego, Los Angeles, New York, Boston, Baltimore/Annapolis and Lynchburg and Roanoke in Virginia.

What's next? In the spring of 1992, celebrations will be held in several Florida cities including Orlando (March 11), Miami/Dade County (March 12), Tampa/St. Petersburg (to be announced), Jacksonville (April 7) and West Palm Beach/Fort Lauderdale (date to be announced). Also planned this spring are celebrations in Charlottesville (April 30) and Richmond (May 14) in Virginia; Wilmington, Del. (May 19); and Philadelphia (May 20).

Next fall is even busier, with events planned in Chicago, Cleveland and Cincinnati, most of the major metropolitan areas of North Carolina, and several sites close to home in Eastern Virginia. The series of regional celebrations will conclude during the first half of 1993 with events in Dallas, Houston, Pittsburgh and Washington, D.C.

(For a complete listing of celebration sites, see the map above.)

Washington, D.C., is expected to be by far the biggest celebration. The event will be held within reach of approximately 8,000 alumni in the area.

"Because the greatest number of Wil-

liam and Mary alumni are concentrated in the metropolitan Washington area, we are able to plan an event of greater scope and magnitude than anywhere else in the country," said Adams. "It's going to be the chance

of a lifetime to celebrate William and Mary's 300th birthday, and it will be a wonderful culmination of the regional Campaign activities conducted by the advancement team, many volunteers and friends."

# Experienced Squad Generates Optimism

**F**ive for five would be a good night from the foul line. But for Chuck Swenson and the William and Mary basketball team five for five means all of last year's starters are returning, along with the squad's top reserve. That's cause for optimism.

Starting his fifth year on the job, Swenson has been gradually building up the talent and experience level in a program that hasn't posted a winning record since 1984. Now he's hoping that the team will start to reap the rewards of that patient development.

"Our strength will definitely be the experience and maturity of our starters," Swenson said. "These are kids who have taken their lumps the last few years. But they've learned from the mistakes of the past. It's a tribute to them and the hard work they've put in to improve. We've become a much more fundamentally sound club."

This year's seniors, Scott Smith, Ben Blocker and Eric Wakefield, comprised Swenson's first complete recruiting class. They struggled through 5-23 and 6-22 campaigns before last year's "great leap forward" to a 13-15 mark. For its efforts, the Tribe was named the Colonial Athletic Association's Most Improved Team.

"We improved from seventh to second in the CAA in rebounding, and from sixth to second in field goal percentage. This season we hope to be just as strong in those areas while improving our defense and free throw shooting. Hopefully that should lift us to an even higher level," said Swenson.

Picked by the CAA coaches to come in fourth, the Tribe finished last season with a flourish, breaking the University of Richmond's 14-game winning streak with a scintillating 71-69 win at William and Mary Hall. Last season also saw the first victory over Old Dominion since the Tribe's 1982-83 NIT bound squad accomplished the feat.

Home court advantage returned to the Hall, as W&M posted a 7-5 mark. "Getting off to a 6-0 start at the Hall helped get some enthusiasm going," Swenson said. "The fans saw some good basketball, culminating in the last game against Richmond. One reason we beat Richmond was that the home crowd became such a factor."

The Tribe's top five is led by 6'6" junior forward Thomas Roberts, who has amassed more points in two seasons (846) than any player in W&M hoop history at a similar stage. A second team All-CAA selection, Roberts led the team in scoring at 16.8 points per game and was second in rebounding.

"Thomas worked out over the summer and came in a lot stronger physically," Swenson said. "He definitely has a chance to be one of the five best players in the conference this season."

A co-captain for the second straight year, Roberts is Mr. Clutch for the Tribe. His last second shots provided the margin of victory against Davidson and Richmond. It was the second time in a row that Roberts nipped Davidson with a buzzer-beater.

"As good as he is, Thomas is only half way through his playing career here," said assistant coach Ralph Pim. "His abilities are still developing and he's gaining more confidence. He's ready to rise to the next level."

Versatile big man Scott Smith is another two-year co-captain. The 6'8", 255 pounder has been the bulwark of the Tribe's inside game, scoring in double figures in each of the last three seasons. Last year he averaged 13.2 and ranked in the top five in the conference in shooting percentage.

According to Swenson, Smith can be even better. "Last year he was playing hurt a lot of the time. He was never at 100 percent. But when Scott gets into the rhythm of the game, not only can he score points in bunches, he can hand out as many assists as a point guard," said Swenson.

After a slow start in '90, senior power forward Ben Blocker has emerged as the

Tribe's major force on the boards. Despite a deep thigh bruise that limited his playing time, Blocker grabbed 6.3 boards per contest, along with scoring averaging a solid eight points.

"Ben has found his niche, which is rebounding," said Swenson. "He's the best rebounder on our team by far. We're giving him a goal of double figure rebounds per game this year. He had a stretch of seven consecutive games in double figures in points and rebounds last season. Now we'd like to see him expand that performance to all 14 conference games."

Point guard Brendan Connor is the most crucial ingredient in the mix. The six-foot junior exhibits excellent ballhandling and passing skills, as well as leading the squad in three-point shooting at 45.5 percent. More importantly Connor's poise brings confidence to the rest of the team.

"Near the end of the Richmond game when we were down one, Connor came up the floor acting very cocky with the ball. He dribbled between his legs, beat his man and hit a big jumper that gave us the lead. He had so much confidence it rubbed off on everybody else," Swenson recalled.

Defensively Connor is also a catalyst, picking off a team high 31 steals, many of which resulted in easy baskets for the Tribe. Over the summer he benefited from playing on a CAA All-Star team that went unbeaten in England and Wales. "The next step with Brendan is to get him to concentrate on increased offensive production," said Swenson.

Derrick Peters, a 6'2" junior guard, is usually assigned to cover the opponent's most dangerous outside scorer. For good reason, as he was named to the CAA's All-Defensive team. Peters stymied League MVP Steve Hood in both contests last year, holding the James Madison guard to 9 and 10 points.

An exciting player to watch, Peters pleases the home crowd with his high flying dunks. In high school he won the Alabama state high jump crown with a leap of 6'8". "Pete worked hard over the summer. He's more confident with his outside shot," said Pim.

Augmenting the starting five is top reserve Todd Cauthorn, a 6'7" junior forward who is really like a sixth starter. Gifted with great offensive instincts, Cauthorn contributed 5.5 points and 3.5 rebounds a contest. He was second on the team in blocked shots with 24.

"Todd is an intense competitor. He's ready

to claim a spot in our playing rotation," said Pim. "Through weight training, he has come in much stronger, having added 20 pounds of strength weight."

While veterans dominate the top six players, the experience level drops off sharply beyond that point. "By far our best team is when we stick to the top six players. They have the best talent; and they are the best group for execution," said Swenson. "We need to develop at least three to five more players off the bench to give depth and to overcome any injuries."

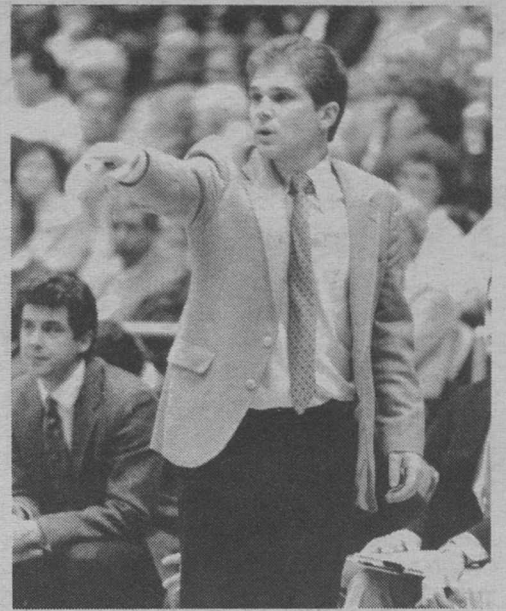
Senior forward Eric Wakefield will contribute strength and defensive abilities. In the season finale against Richmond, he frustrated the Spiders' high scoring Kenny Wood.

Red-shirt freshman Charles Payton will be a factor. The 6'6" forward adds power and athleticism. "We're looking to him to give us some scoring punch," said Swenson.

An outside scoring threat, sophomore Sean Duff usually subs for Thomas Roberts. Although he has struggled in pre-season due to a dislocated finger, Duff will keep defenses honest.

Freshmen guards David Cox and Kurt Small have good offensive skills, and 6'9" Steve Papura will spell Scott Smith in the pivot.

This year's schedule offers excitement for both Tribe fans and the players. In addition to opening ACC rival Virginia's schedule in Charlottesville, the Tribe visits defending national champion Duke on Dec. 30. At home W&M plays each CAA team, including new league member Old Dominion, plus has a date with Virginia Tech on Dec. 7, the first time in more than a decade

that the Hokies have deigned to play in the Hall.

A highlight for the players will be the Chaminade Holiday Tournament in Hawaii over Christmas break. According to Swenson, the Chaminade trip has been in the works for almost five years. "We felt that the number one place that the players would like to go is Hawaii. So five years ago when I first arrived we reached agreement with Chaminade," he said.

While the Tribe has upgraded its talent with quality recruits in the last few years, the other teams in the CAA have also improved. "This is the strongest the conference has been in the five years I've been here. With the stability of Richmond's program, and with the presence of 'Lefty' Driesell at James Madison, the rest of the schools have had to raise their programs to a higher level," said Swenson. Every other school in the CAA except W&M has attempted to accomplish that objective by the addition of transfers and junior college recruits.

## Tribe Awaits Jensen's Return

**I**f any injuries befall veteran guard Brendan Connor, Tribe fans may pine for Christopher Jensen. Jensen, a freshman guard who made the All-CAA rookie team last year, was a heady ball-handler and ace three point shooter.

A Mormon, Jensen embarked on a two-year mission to Denmark, and is not expected back until 1993. However, Jensen recently ran into a situation that might have caused an even lengthier delay.

Since his mother is a Danish national, Jensen holds dual citizenship. On his arrival Jensen was required to register for the national military draft.

He passed the written induction test (in Danish) with a higher score than his fellow draftees, passed his physical and was almost ready to take his marching orders. Luckily for the Tribe, Jensen's draft number was high enough to preclude the need for his service, allowing him to continue his original scheduled mission.

Jensen is still expected back at W&M for the 1993-94 academic year.

## Tribe Experiences Mixed Results for Season

**I**f last year's William and Mary football season was a dream, this was the year of a rude awakening. After going 10-3 in 1990 and starting this fall ranked number four in I-AA, the Tribe encountered mostly frustration on the way to a 5-6 record, its first losing campaign since 1987.

A record-setting shellacking of Richmond, 49-7, ended the season on a positive note. The Tribe scored the first six times it had the ball, rolling to a 42-0 lead with five minutes left in the second quarter.

Equalling its largest margin of victory in 101 meetings against the Spiders (54-12 in 1974), W&M racked up an all-time high 681 yards of total offense, allowing each of the Tribe's offensive leaders to enjoy one last day in the sun at Zable Stadium.

Senior quarterback Chris Hakel led the way with one of his best days ever, going 19 of 23 for 303 yards and a touchdown. At one point during the first half onslaught Hakel threw 15 consecutive completions. Senior running backs Robert Green and Alan Williams each rushed for more than 100 yards, and Green ran for three touchdowns and Williams for one.

Despite the tremendous effort against Richmond, the season was disappointing for a team that returned 12 starters from last year's national quarterfinalists. The Tribe began the fall ranked among the elite in I-AA, and as recently as seventh week of season was still featured in national top 20.

But when the defense gives up 320 points,

not even head coach Jimmie Laycock's vaunted offense could always outscore the opposition. It shows how narrow the margin of success really is. In 1990 the defense was occasionally hammered, giving up 322 points in twelve games, but came up with enough big plays and takeaways in critical situations to preserve the leads gained by the offense. This year the ball bounced in the opposite direction.

James Madison's disputed two-point conversion as time expired was indicative of the season's frustration. The Tribe could not hold a 15-point lead in the last five minutes, losing 29-28. W&M's first-ever loss at the hands of Lehigh exposed similar problems, as the Engineers rallied for a 41-37 edge.

Although plagued by inconsistency, the Tribe had flashes of brilliance during the fall. Victories over Boston University, 48-22, Division I-A Navy, 26-21, VMI, 40-26, and The Citadel, 24-17, preceded the redemption over Richmond.

Of the teams that bested the Tribe, Delaware, James Madison, Samford and Villanova are all bound for the I-AA playoffs. Lehigh was ranked, but doesn't accept post-season bids. North Carolina is in the I-A bowl picture.

Bright spots still abounded for Tribe football in 1991. Jimmie Laycock '70 stayed on as head coach at the College, eschewing a tempting offer from Boston College. Laycock's offensive juggernaut rolled on under

the expert guidance of senior quarterback Chris Hakel.

Hakel enjoyed two of the most productive years in Tribe signal calling history, rewriting the single season passing records in 1990 and 1991. This fall Hakel connected on 232 of 357 passes for an incredible 65 percent completion rate. He accumulated 2974 passing yards, 18 touchdown strikes and had only 9 interceptions.

In his career Hakel threw for 7,025 career passing yards, 523 completions, 43 touchdown passes, and 7,058 total yards, trailing only Stan Yagiello '86 (a 3 year starter) in each category.

Hakel was chosen to play in the Blue-Gray game on Christmas Day, the first W&M player so honored since tackle Archie Harris '87. (Steve Christie '90 was the South's kicker in that year's Senior Bowl.) Hakel is also the only I-AA nominee for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm award. The award honors the best college quarterback in the land.

Although his senior year was marred by nagging injuries, Green still rushed for 875 yards and 13 touchdowns, including a 79 yarder against Navy. By the end of his junior season Green had already eclipsed the career rushing mark held by fullback Tyrone Shelton '91, so every carry this year extended his new standard. Green finished with 3,543 career yards and 44 career touchdowns, one less than Jack Cloud's all-time total.

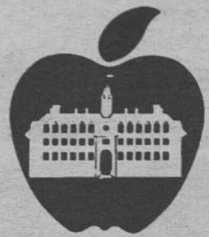

However, while Homecoming is a high profile week, it is by no means all that the Society does. The following are just six areas of endeavor managed by the Alumni Society. More will be featured in subsequent columns.

Class Programs: Class committees of alumni help plan reunions and organize major class fund-raising projects with guidance from the office of alumni affairs. These efforts have come to represent a model for other universities.

Chapter Programs: Alumni chapters in 41 locations and another 18 alumni clubs meet regularly to sponsor a range of activities. These groups of dedicated alumni fund scholarships for students, host receptions for incoming freshmen as well as a variety of social and educational events. Chapters and clubs now sponsor an activity somewhere every 56 hours. Today 79 percent of all alumni live within an area served by a chapter or club. These activities are coordinated by the chapter programs office.

More than likely you have heard of Life After D.O.G. Street. This program brings together members of the senior class with alumni willing to share practical advice on everything from renting an apartment to establishing credit. This very popular program is coordinated by the reunions and campus activities office.

Career Exploration Day is co-sponsored by the Society and the College's Office of Career Services. Attracting several hundred students from all classes, this annual program features presentations by alumni in a variety of professions. Career Services also maintains files of alumni who are interested in discussing career paths with

undergraduates and later on helping in the job search.

Student Literary Awards: The Society recognizes students for outstanding writing efforts in the categories of poetry, fiction, drama and overall creative writing. Winners are honored at an annual dinner where they are presented with a small cash prize.

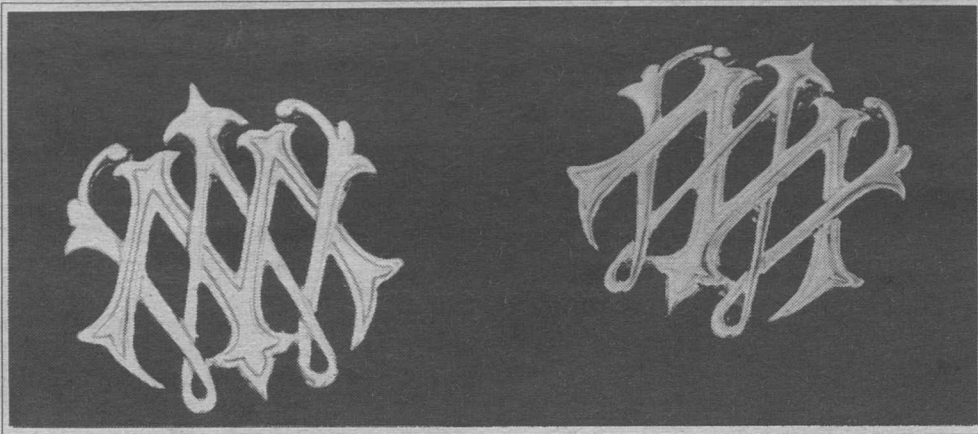

He received his master's degree from Brown University and his doctorate from the University of North Carolina State in 1948 and was head of the department for 20 years. He retired in 1976. He now travels and enjoys opera and ballet performances in many different countries.

A gift of \$100,000 has been made to the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at William and Mary by Robert J. and Benjamin J. Fiscella of Hampton to endow a scholarship honoring Kenneth G. Cumming '37, '39 B.C.L., a longtime Hampton attorney and friend of the donors. The Cumming Scholarship will be awarded to law students whose intellectual achievement, leadership ability, character and community service give promise of a career of special distinction emulating the special character, judgment and integrity which Mr. Cumming brought to a lifetime of service in the legal profession. Described as a "lawyer's lawyer" by friends and colleagues, Cumming practiced law for 52 years in Hampton. He died in April 1991.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM FUNDED BY FIPSE GRANT

*William and Mary* has launched a comprehensive substance abuse prevention program with a \$135,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE). The project includes intensive education and outreach to residential units; establishment of a substance abuse resource center with videos and written materials; linkages with community resources such as Alcoholics Anonymous, the substance abuse program at Williamsburg Community Hospital and the Williamsburg Drug Council; an education program for deans, health care and counseling center staff; enhanced substance abuse programming for student-athletes; and a more systematic follow-up system for students with alcohol-related problems. The program will be headed by **Phil Meilman**, director of the College's counseling center and research professor of psychology.

## PROFESSOR WINS \$130,000 GRANT

Robert J. 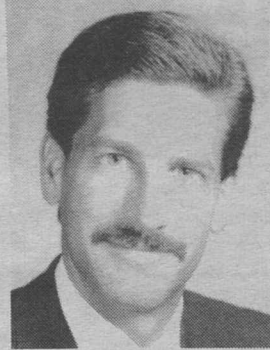

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## CHARTER DAY TO HONOR FOUR EMINENT SCIENTISTS

D. Allan Bromley, the assistant to President Bush for science and technology, will be among four distinguished scientists to be honored at the 1992 Charter Day ceremonies Saturday, Feb. 8, at William and Mary. Bromley, who will deliver the Charter Day address, will receive an honorary doctor of science degree along with British biologist Sir Cyril A. Clarke, Hon. Nuffield Research Fellow at the University of Liverpool, England; Hermann A. Grunder, director of the Continuous Beam Accelerator Facility (CEBAF) in Newport News; and Richard H. "Pete" Petersen, former director of NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, now associate administrator for the Office of Aeronautics and Space Technology at NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C. Bromley, 65, who was appointed to the cabinet-level post of White House science adviser in 1989, is credited with bringing science and technology issues to the forefront of national policy making. A nuclear physicist at Yale University, Bromley is founder and director of the Arthur W. Wright Nuclear Structure Laboratory there. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Rochester. He has held a number of science policy positions over the years, including chairman and president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, member of the White House Science Council, and member of science advisory boards of the National Research Council, the National Science Foundation and the U.S. Department of Energy.

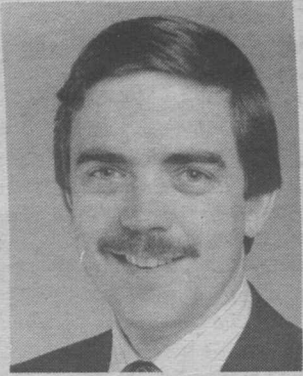

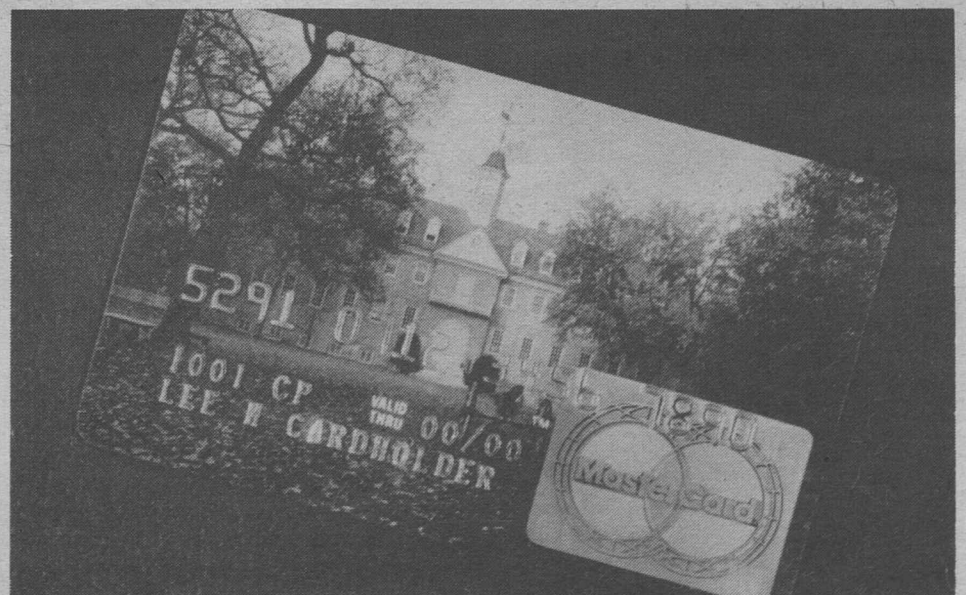
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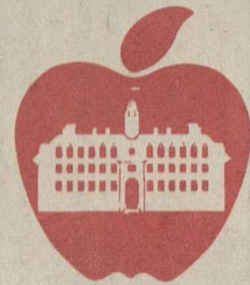
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
