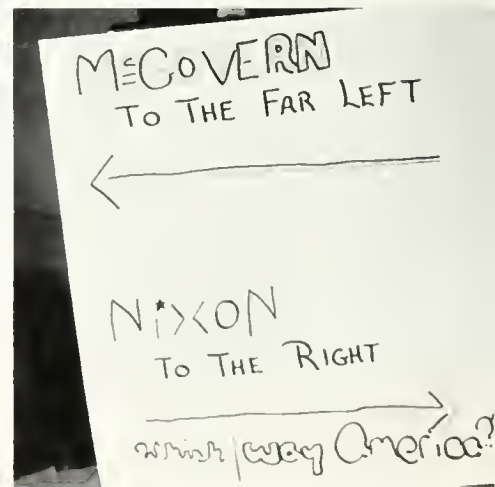
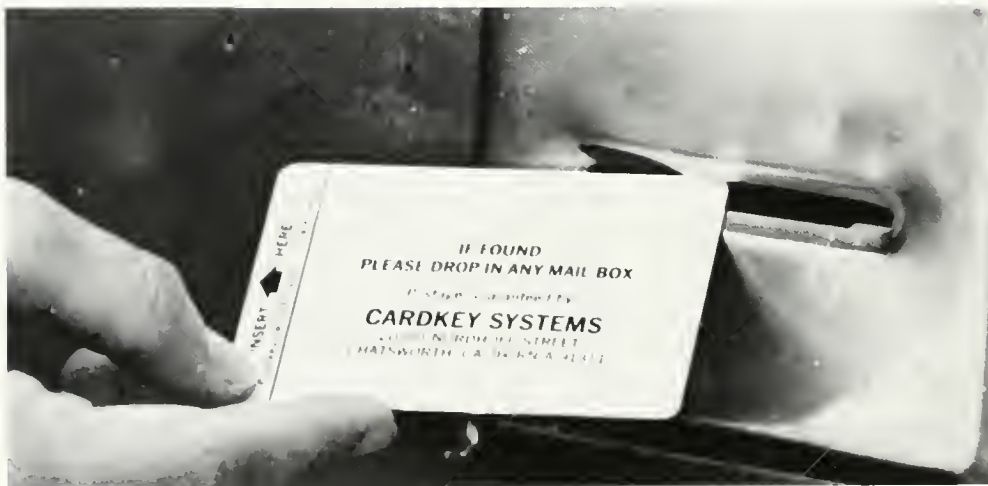




"I went to a garden party

The College delegated an increasing amount of authority to the campus' largest group: the students.

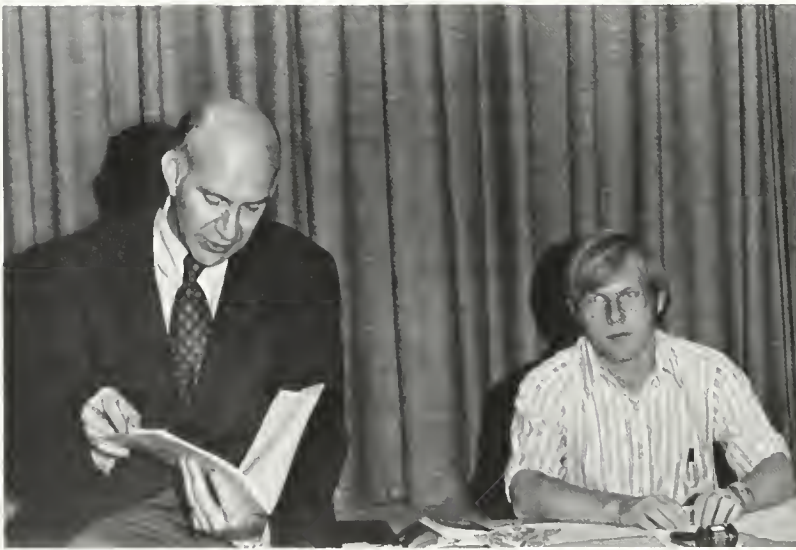

William and Mary was satisfied and complacent. The administration termed it a 're-evaluation. Students have talked and administrators have listened; now both are evaluating the changes."



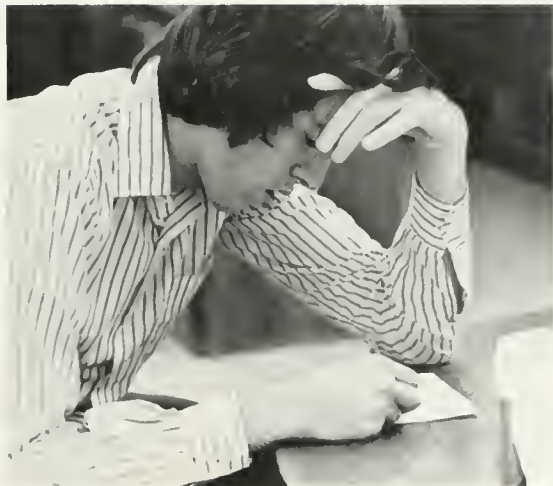
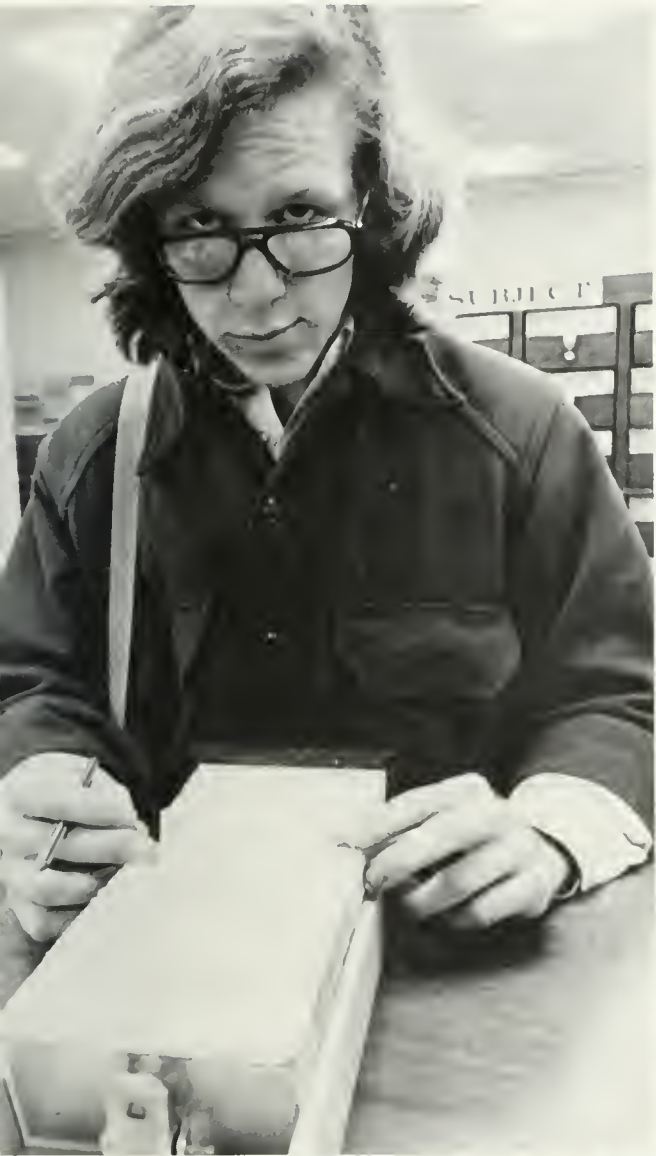

"A little out of time, but I don't mind," rasped Rod Stewart. But who could say there was "never a dull moment"?





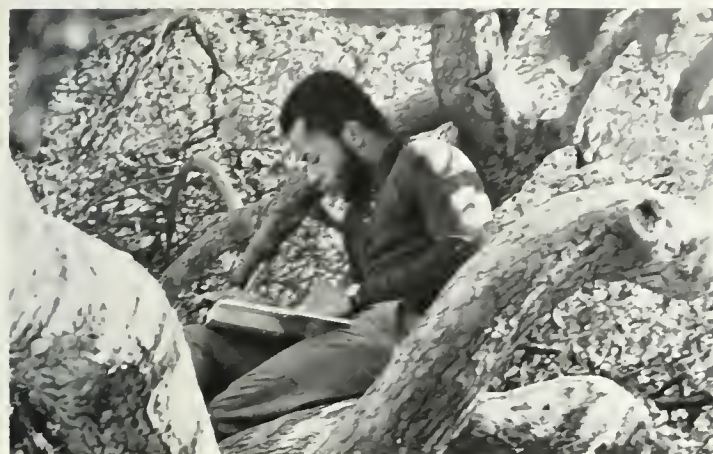

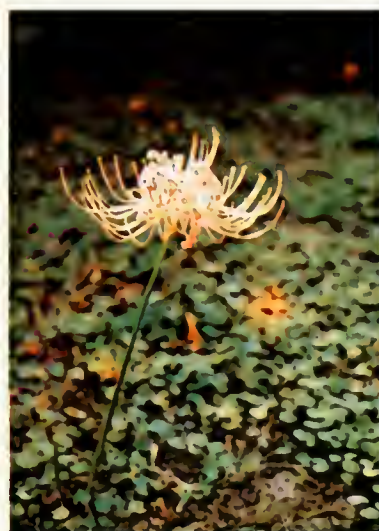




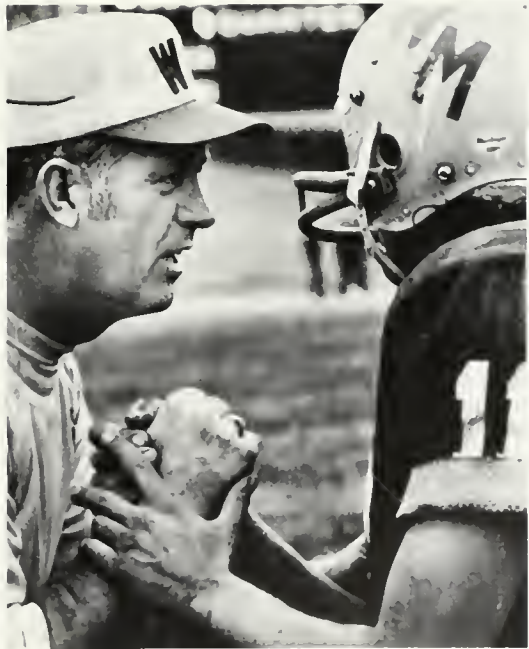

Into a rather unsavory situation stepped the new head coach, Jim Root, who came to the Reservation from New Hampshire University. He inherited an offense that had been hit hard by graduation and a defense that had earned a reputation for breaking down when the game was on the line. The team was virtually devoid of seniors and

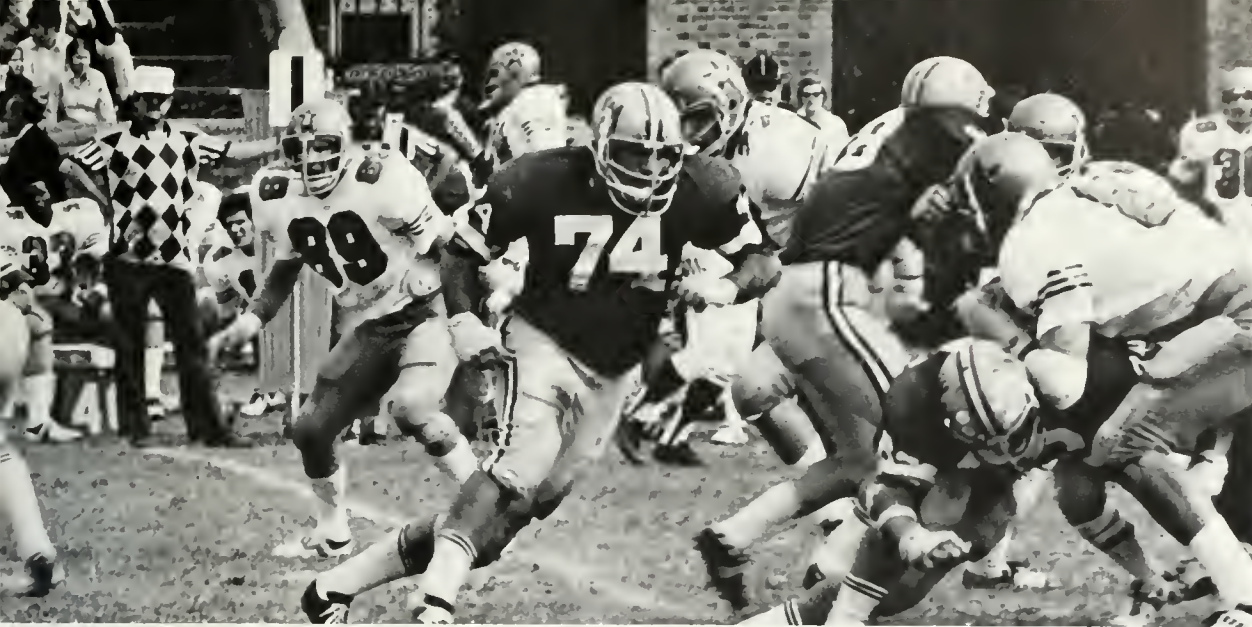
Root knew that
**a rebuilding job
was at hand.**

The young Tribe leaped from the starting gate in a 31-7 opening game victory against Furman.

Root's initial win at William and Mary was also the school's 300th of all time. All the Indians' scoring was done by sophomores.

Doug Gerhart led the team with 121 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Bill Deery rushed for two more scores and Terry Regan added a field goal and four extra points. Junior Rip Scherer completed 10 of 16 passes, including six to All-American candidate David Knight.





The next two games mirrored the 1971 season as the Indians lost to Navy and Villanova in the last of the fourth quarter. Against the Middies, the Tribe fought to a 9-6 lead with four minutes to play, only to see Navy march 90 yards in twelve plays for the winning score. The defense was brilliant for 56 minutes, the rushing offense devastating, and as Root lamented,

“No loss ever hurt worse than this one.”

Turnovers and a leaky defense victimized the Indians in the 20-17 loss to Villanova and the Tribe was anxious to return to Cary Field and Southern Conference action with the Citadel.

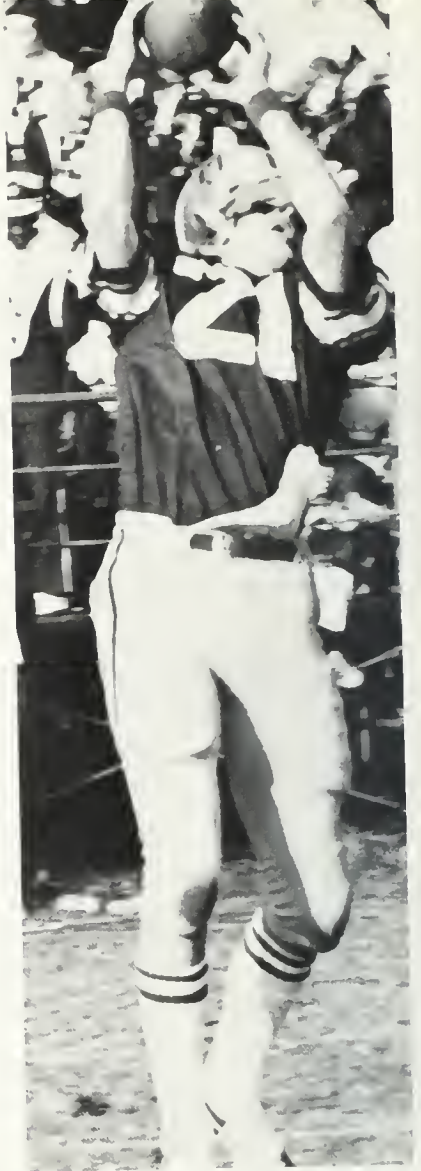
Against the Citadel, W&M scored on its first possession and kept scoring while a stingy defense held the Bulldogs to 12 points as the Tribe won, 31-12.

Travel problems hampered the Indians as they flew to Morgantown to meet West Virginia. Three WVU touchdown bombs in the last five minutes of the first half contributed to their 28-0 halftime lead. W&M exploded for 34 points in the second half and although they finished on the short end of a 49-34 score, big Green supporters looked forward to a wide open offensive display against homecoming for Vanderbilt.

It was not to be.

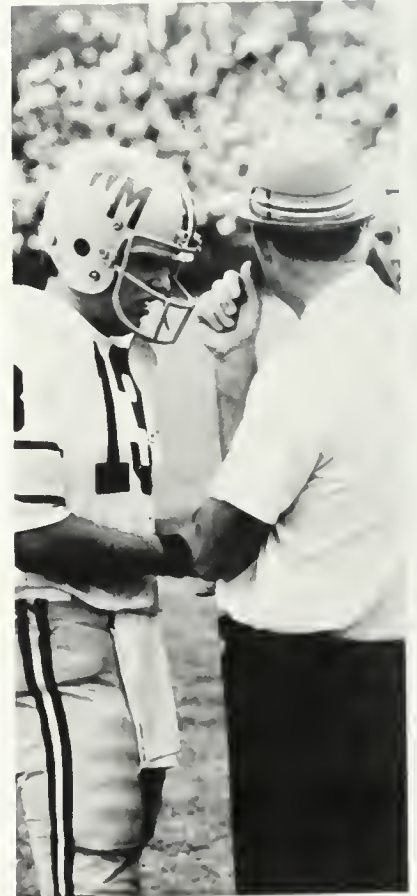
Conservatism was the order of the day when the Indians had the ball. The Tribe assumed a 14-0 lead midway in the first half on a 59-yard bolt by Deery and a 29-yard touchdown reception by Knight. As W&M tried to sit on its lead, the Commodores, behind freshman quarterback, Fred Fisher, scored three touchdowns to win 21-17.

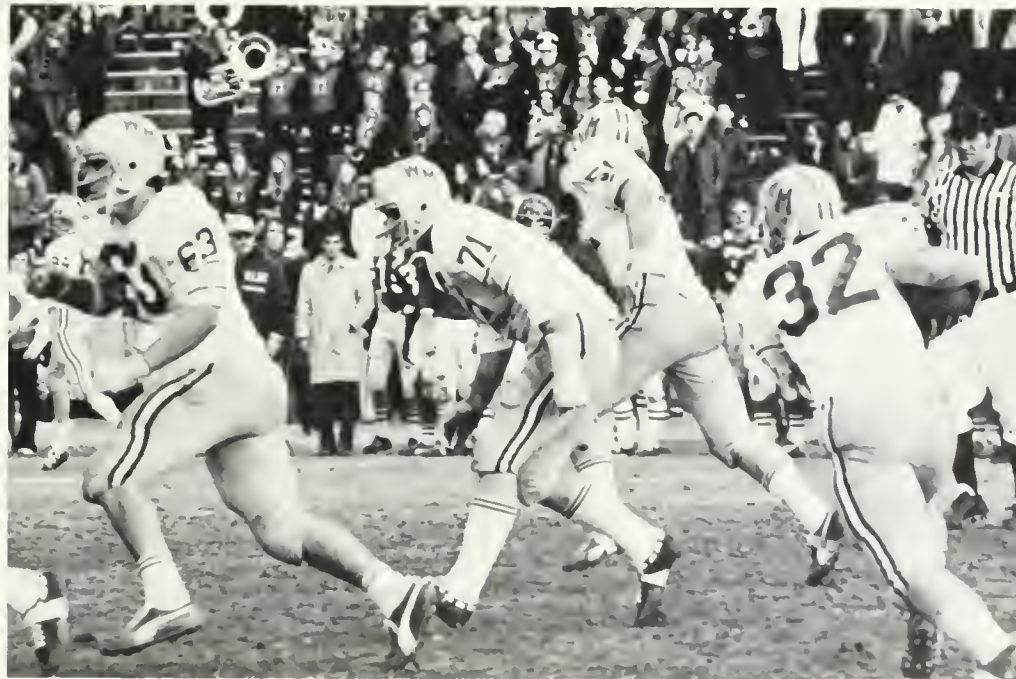

A 31-3 thrashing of worse than hapless VMI raised the Tribe's record to 3-4. Despite the rout fans across the state foresaw a Tribe disaster when the Indians would have to take on VPI in the Tobacco Bowl. The Indians entered the Tobacco Festival Mud Bowl 14 to 19 points underdogs to a hot Virginia Tech team, but parlayed a little luck, a lot of defense, and a clutch TD grab by Mark Smith into a 17-16 upset win over the Gobblers — William and Mary's first win over Tech since 1962. The lead see-sawed through the first three quarters. The Tribe went ahead to stay on an 80-yard drive, capped by Smith's grab with 2:29 to play. Tech scored again and went for the two points: Mike Stewart and John Hostetler wrestled with Randy Gallway in the mire, the ball ended up in the mud, and W&M ended up with

a stunning upset over the state's most disliked team.

Still soaring, the Tribe destroyed Davidson by 56-10 and the stage was set for the Conference showdown with East Carolina.

And the Indians came fumbling back to earth.

Four lost fumbles in the first half contributed to ECU's 21-0 intermission advantage, but W&M would not be counted out. Deery passed to Smith for a TD in the third period and the Tribe converted for two points. Early in the final period, McCutcheon scored on a 15-yard pass and the Tribe was alive. On fourth down, the Indians completed a pass for a first down, but an official conferred with the ECU bench and called a penalty on W&M for ineligible receiver downfield, some 20 seconds after the play had ended and had been declared a valid Tribe first down. The Tribe was forced to punt and never saw the ball again. The season finale against Richmond saw the Tribe without the services of stalwarts Gerhart, Bushnell, and Rovesti and the Spiders rolled to an easy 20-3 win and W&M finished with their third consecutive 5-6 season.

What used to be called freshman football was in 1972 packaged as Junior Varsity competition due to the freshman eligible rule. Still, even with the sophomores, the

quality of play changed little

as small crowds and a scrimmage-type atmosphere prevailed. The need for a JV program has been challenged, but its purpose is clear — to allow freshman and sophomore players an opportunity to sharpen their skills and impress coaches.

The season got off to an unimpressive start as the tribe absorbed a 26–6 thrashing by Fork Union Military Academy.

The Indians averted a shutout when Jim Krebs scored from one yard out in the fourth quarter. Krebs gained 53 yards in seven carries as the Indians' lone offensive standout.

A 20–14 victory over US Army Prep evened the record as freshman Mark Griffith carried for 57 yards and two TD's and Krebs ran for 118 yards, including a 71-yard touchdown run. Lou Case intercepted three passes and Randy Knight had three receptions for 42 yards.

The Tribe next hooked up with Staunton Military Academy and escaped with a 9–7 win on Steve Dalton's 22-yard field goal.

Griffith continued his strong rushing with 80 yards and Ken Ahles contributed 57 more. Paul Kruis passed nine for 19 and 76 yards.

A chance for a winning record went by the boards in the season finale at Richmond as the Baby Spiders trounced the Tribe, 24–10. William and Mary trailed 17–0 in the third period, but came back on a 32-yard Dalton field goal and a two yard touchdown run by Ahles with five minutes to play. Richmond put the game out of reach, however, on their next possession with a 56-yard touchdown pass.

The future is both now and next year for Coach Al Albert's soccer team. Tribe booters were expected to be mediocre in 1972 with an inexperienced cast of freshmen and sophomores. Many of the talented Southern Conference Northern Division title winners of 1970 and 1971 had departed with their trophies. There was no way Coach Albert could win in 1972 with

fuzzy-cheeked rookies.

Apparently no one told Albert and his team. Indian booters won a third consecutive Northern Division title in 1972 by virtue of a 7-0 rout over VMI and a 3-0 whitewash of East Carolina. Outside of the Conference, the Tribe had its problems against the powerhouses of Virginia and North Carolina. But Albert's talented youngsters will be that much better next year when hopefully a year's maturity will propel the Indians to an even more successful campaign.

Successful seasons in the past **forced them to find tougher competition,**

in order to gain the recognition they deserved. Despite competition from the best long distance runners in the East and

Southeast, the Indians methodically dispatched their adversaries in an awesome display of depth. Veterans provided the experience necessary for a successful team, while new recruits added depth.

This well rounded team then smashed ACC contingents Maryland and UNC as well as independents North Carolina Track Club, Georgetown, and Quantico. The Tribe, led by sophomore star Time Cook and junior Bill Louv, recorded near perfect scores in each of their dual meet victories. These meets served merely as warm-ups for the season goal of bettering past performances at the NCAA championships. The contingent from East Tennessee dealt a disappointing blow to the Indians in the NCAA District 3 meet in Knoxville. In placing second, the Tribe had four men in the top 25, led by Bill Louv with a fifth place showing. At the NCAA meet in Houston, the team placed eleventh, the third consecutive finish in the nation's top 25 for the harriers.

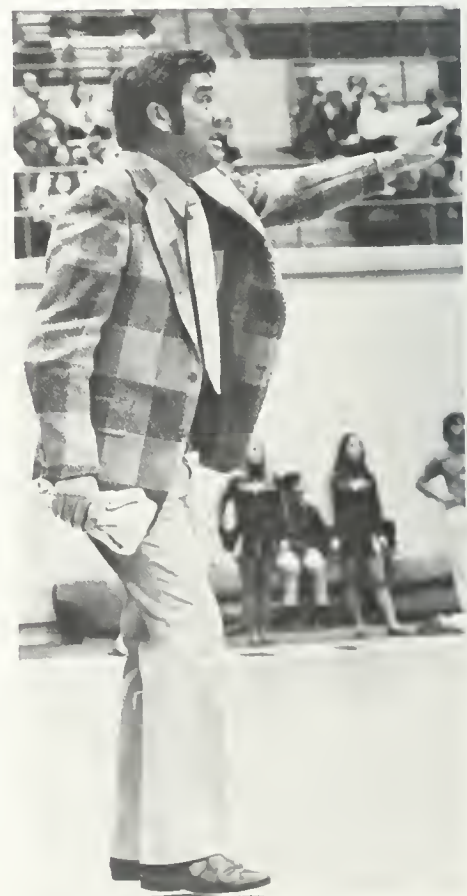
An aggressive new coach, a basketball oriented athletic director, talented freshmen, and a new attitude — these were the ingredients which comprised what was advertised as the "new look for 1972" for William and Mary basketball. But the schedule remained as tough as in previous seasons. The young Tribe, with two freshmen and a sophomore as starters, began the season with successive losses. The Indians played their early games with verve if not consistency.

Defense was the major early season problem as William and Mary

averaged 104 points given up

per game in its first three outings. By the time school let out for the

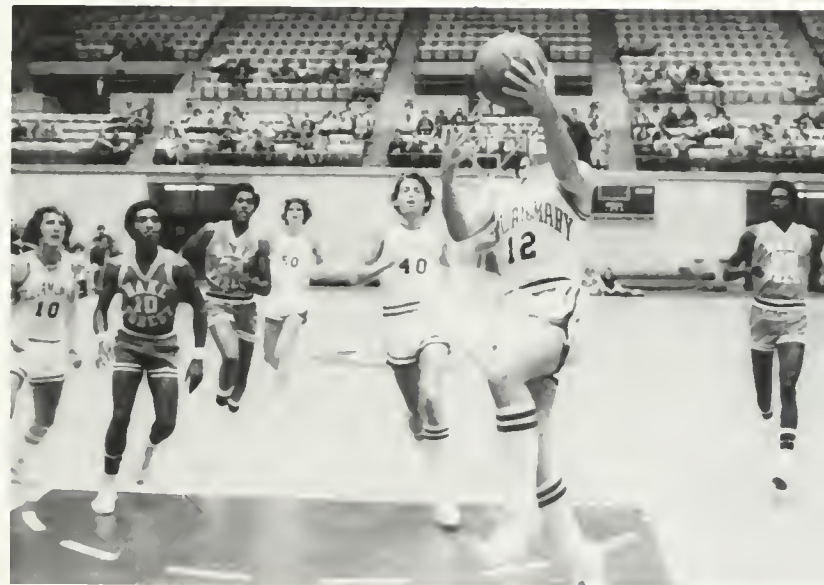

new meet records at the Southern Conference Indoor Championships.

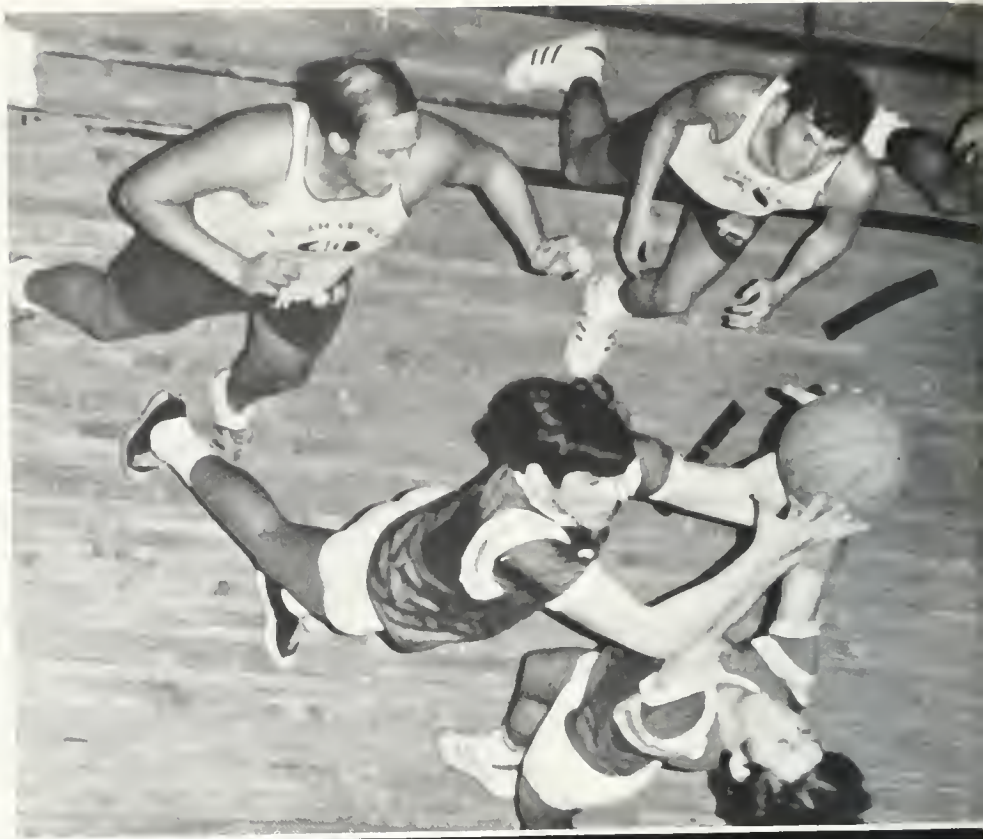

something for virtually everyone.

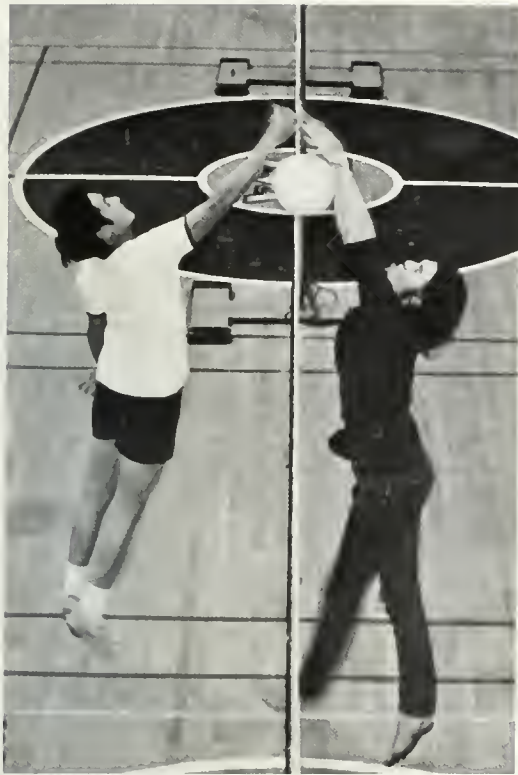
Victories led to championship points as competitors strove for the All-College Trophy awarded at the end of the year.

The biology department opened up many of its upper level courses to larger numbers of students by offering **optional labs.** Previously, laboratory space was the critical factor in limiting enrollment. Dropping the lab requirement has greatly increased the enrollment in upper level courses, especially by non-concentrators fulfilling area and sequence requirements. With the 19 faculty members, each involved in varying levels of research, the department recently adopted a policy statement of commitment in balance between teaching and research, with an emphasis on the undergraduate program.

Site preparation for the two-story, two million dollar hall began in March. 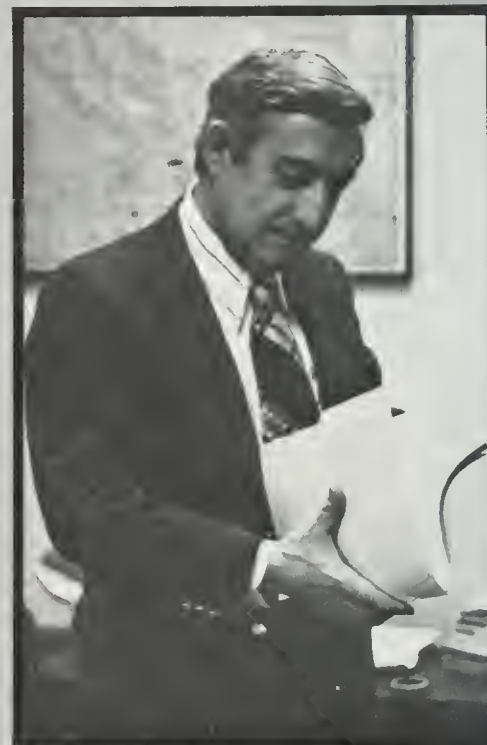


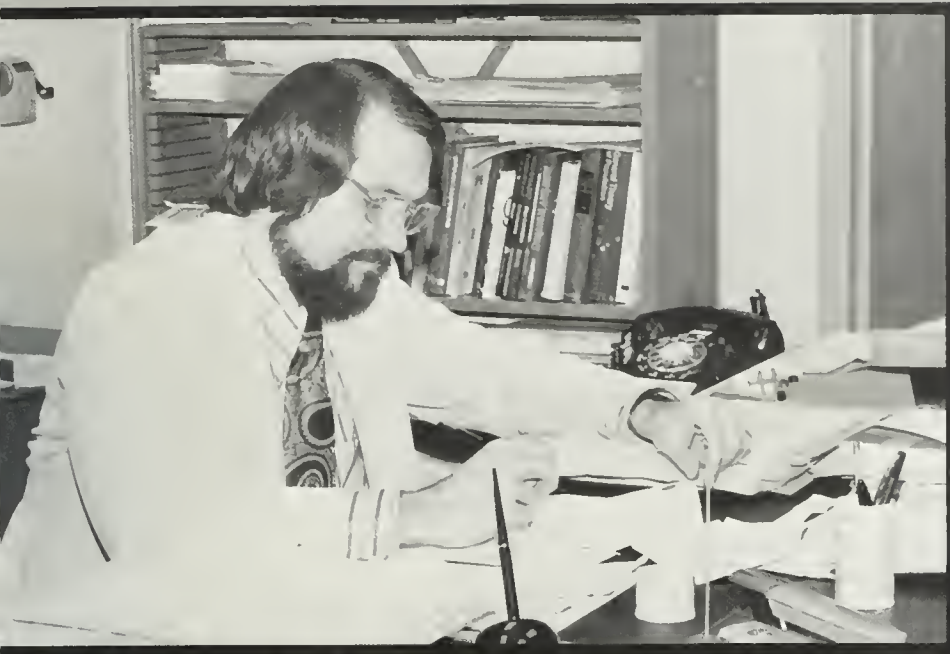

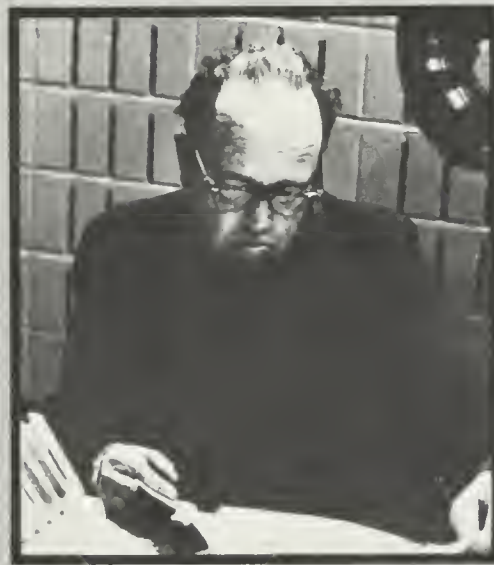

As the history department put it, "the number of persons admitted to the William and Mary doctoral program was reduced to only those candidates who are nationally competitive." Why? A long, hard look at the national market for Ph.D.'s showed that it just was not enough to absorb the numbers being turned out. This realistic approach was reflected in the third largest enrollment of undergraduate concentrators. And by numerous non-concentrators registering in history courses. New offerings were especially timely. The Paris Peace Talks sparked interest in "American Policy in the Cold War." Traditionally strong in the American, Latin American, and European areas of historical study, the department still needed to grow in the area of Asian studies. Future expansion will probably take place in this area.

The Math department, with
**a new focus
 on computer
 science,**

hoped to substantially broaden the research emphasis during the year. Professors faced the task of training professional mathematicians and providing computer science training for graduates in other fields. At the intra-department level, attempts were made to incorporate students into all academic activities, to widen student representation on committees, and to solicit support of math-related projects.

An almost entirely non-credit department as of this year. ROTC counted 134 members of the college community as participants in its military training programs. But

Cadets could receive six hours toward their academic degree, but these courses had to be "Military History" and "Civil and Military Relations" rather than strategy and practically oriented work. The social relations aspects of the ROTC curriculum seemed to indicate that the department was concerned about the role of the military as well as the reduced status of the military on campus.

Two new officers joined the small William and Mary cadre this fall, Col. Spencer T. Hockaday and Major Peter J. Emanuel. Both brought the view that the Volunteer Army will have no great impact on the ROTC role. Instead, VOLAR would effect the lowest enlisted ranks. Spencer and Hockaday did predict, though, that ROTC's numerical enlistment would suffer with the draft incentive gone. They felt they had less cause for worry at William and Mary because freshman enrollment was up from the past several years.

Fifty percent of the entering freshmen at William and Mary have at least four years of foreign language background. And many elect to continue.

New courses included Modern Languages 203: East Asian Languages, a survey in systems of writing. Future plans include concentrations in Russian and Italian.

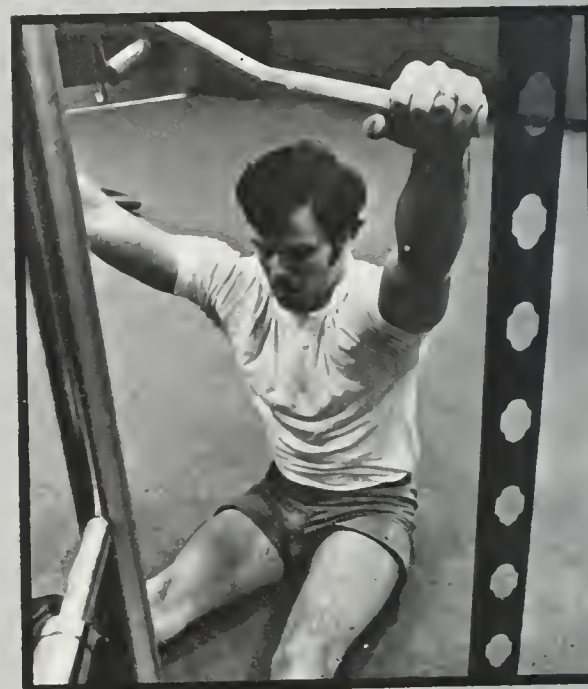

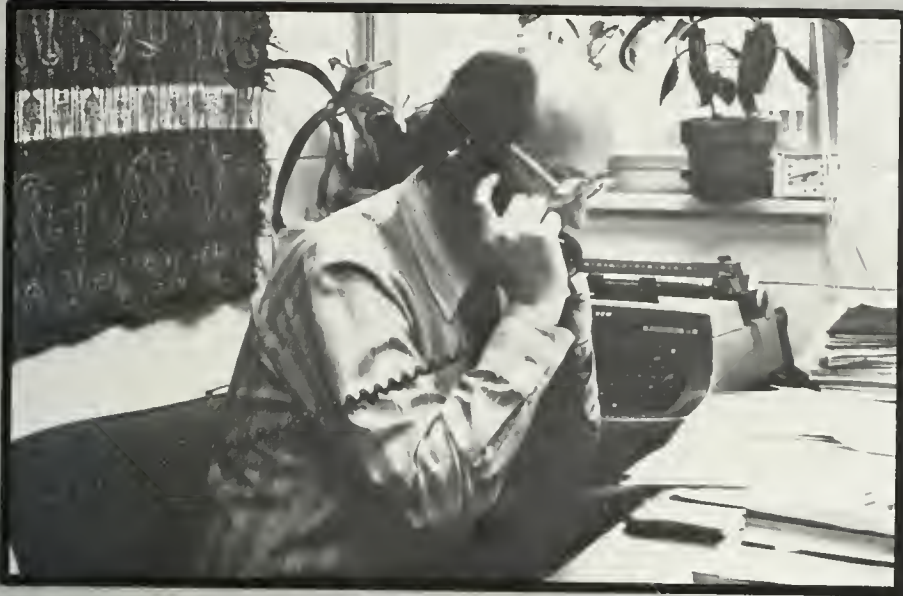


The accent was on research

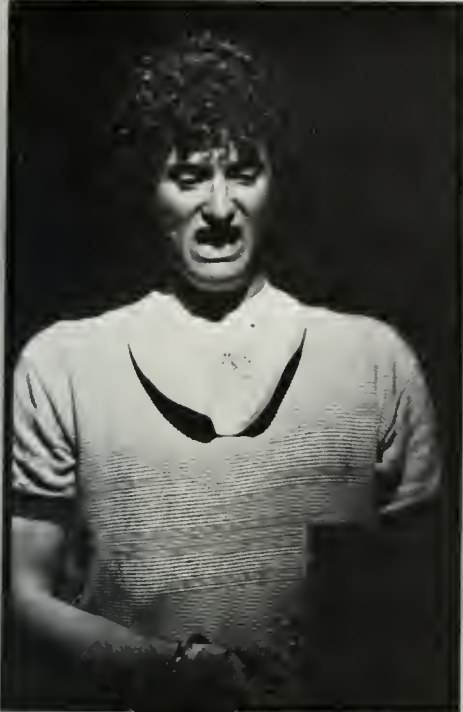

featuring 84 sophomore guinea pigs, casual corduroy furniture, resident "parents," impromptu parties, and a house keypunch unit. Project Plus. William and Mary's first step toward the total "live and learn" experience.

Born of the General Honors Program, the co-ed academic/social unit received the faculty's and administration's imprimatur last spring. Selection of residents followed. For once, it wasn't based on grades, but instead on the individual's capacity to contribute.

And communicate.

As stated, the purpose of Project Plus was to draw together fragments of the arts, natural sciences, and social sciences into a single theme: The Future of Technological Society. In reality, the question of whether or not such an unorthodox approach to education could possibly work was equally important. Project members learned what it felt like to be bombarded with questions, saturated by the media, and, at times, intruded upon by those who had to see it for themselves.

Isolation wasn't a major drawback, as had been predicted. Project Plus was the cultural center of the campus, with literally 24 hour-a-day possibilities. Involvement ranged from colloqs and tutorials to Sunday evening interesting meetings and late night swimming excursions. Unit 9 of the New Complex also housed the College's very first attempt at an interim semester. It wasn't four-one-four, but it wasn't classrooms, lectures, papers, and tests, either. With course offerings from auto mechanics to interior decorating, and a full schedule of quality movies and speakers, participants spent a month learning skills as well as textbook theories.

Graves' October musing, "How do we spread the message of Project Plus throughout the campus?" was a very real question by spring.

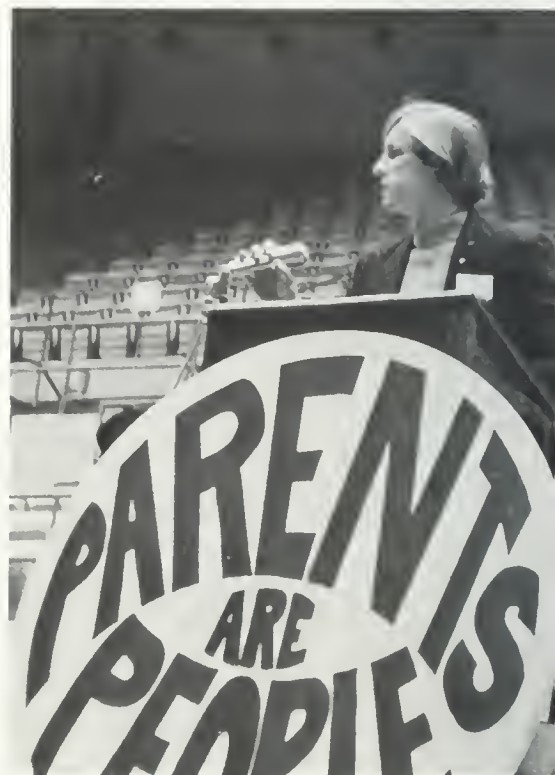


Serving the students,

A successful pre-registration for seniors prompted the registration committee to expand the program to include juniors in 1973. 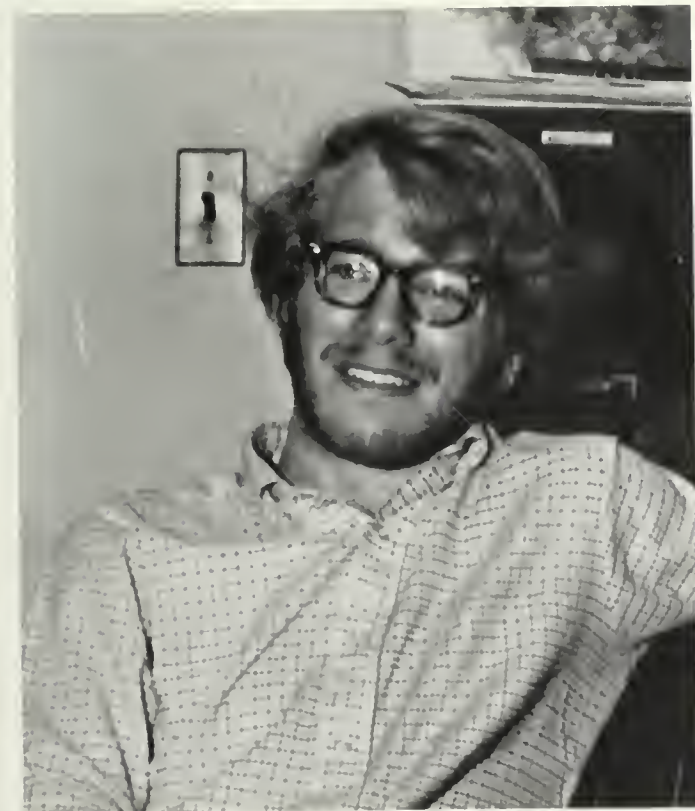


“Self-immolation

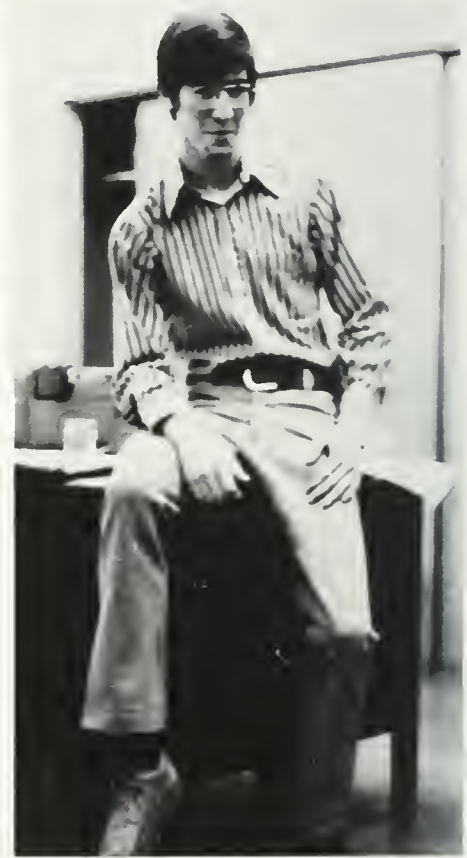

"The mood of the entire country has changed," remarked a returning POW. And indeed, it had changed. The violence of the 60's was gone, and so were the questions, for the most part — at least they seemed less frequent and less pointed. Those who had resorted to working outside "the system" decided to give it a chance. Pushing for change, young America nominated George McGovern, only to be disappointed and disillusioned with him. The election deteriorated into a relatively routine affair, and we somehow chose four more years of Nixon. All that America wanted now was "peace and quiet". (Or had we been bought off with liberalized abortion laws, a feeling that boycotts could do something about spiraling prices, and the return of the POW's?)



Even the ITT scandal, the Watergate caper, and the Russian grain deals failed to outrage citizens after a while... "This sort of thing happens all the time," wrote someone to the Washington Post. Since moral fervor cannot be generated for an indefinite period of time, Mr. Nixon sat in his White House and waited for the uproar to die down.



Which way America?
Some sought answers to the questions by trying to accomplish things in a small way: factions working on service projects, for local reforms, for minority groups. Or individuals searching for personal improvement and fulfillment. Others chose to escape into the past, as a wave of nostalgia swept the country.

The mood of the campus changed, too. Starting with changes in the administration: new faces and newly-created positions. Campus-wide, the "Paschall way" was going out the window. The College finally began renovating the old dormitories, although the project would take years. You didn't have to register in hot, crowded Blow Gym anymore. But the comparatively short time it took to register in W&M Hall was counterbalanced by the time spent trying to get your ID card picture taken. There were no more hassles for women with green, yellow, or white cards for after-curfew visits. The infirmary no longer gave you an envelope of Bufferin and told you to "run along". Dr. Richard Cilley, the infirmary's only full-time doctor, found time to see each and every patient, even if sometimes you had to wait two hours.





You didn't get an "F" if you failed a course any more. Somehow, "NC" didn't look as offensive on your grade report as that "F" did.

Finding a parking place on campus was still tough, but the incompleted parking lot by Phi Beta helped. (Though on those rainy days it was like wading through the Dismal Swamp.) With the completion of the Social Sciences building, ten minutes between classes seemed all too short when your next class was in the Wren Building. And, as luck would have it, the class after that was always back in the Social Sciences building.

Dorm life meant a party for any (and every) occasion! For a roommate's birthday, after a hard test, or just for the heck of it. And then, moments... sometimes, after the party broke up... when there were quiet talks long into the night. Moments of wandering off alone to Lake Matoaka — just to think. This was the year of establishing priorities, of making choices. And the road taken was what made you you.
