The following is an EXTRACT from a Law of this Province, for establishing the Rates to be taken for the Wharfage of Vessels within the City of NEW-YORK, passed the 27th January, 1770.

FOR every Vessel of sixty Tons, or upwards, whilst careening, loading, or unloading, or lying fast to any Wharf, 3s. per Day.

Vessels under sixty Tons, and twenty-five tons and upwards, loading, unloading, and careening, one Half of the above Rates; and all Vessels under twenty-five tons,  $\frac{1}{4}$  of the above Rates.

Any Ship or Vessel that shall make fast to any other Ship or Vessel that may be fastened to any of the Wharfs, and there load, unload, or careen, liable to pay Half Wharfage.

**RATES to be taken for the Use of CRANES.**

For taking out and putting in the Mast of any Ship or other Vessel, the Sum of Thirty Shillings.

For taking out or putting in the Mast of any Ship or other Vessel, the Sum of Twenty Five Shillings.

Coasting Vessels not loading, unloading or careening, to make Room for Sea Vessels, or be obliged to pay the same Wharfage they are liable to.

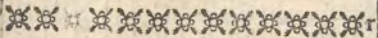
