ECLIPSES for the Year 1782.

Are four, two of each LUMINARY.

THE first is of the Moon, March 28, beginning at 26 minutes after 1 o'clock in the morning, visible to all North and South America.

The second is of the Sun, April 12, beginning a few minutes before 1 o'clock in the afternoon, a great eclipse, visible in a l North America, about Montreal and Quebeck, he will be between 7 and 8 digits eclipsed.

The third is of the Moon, the 20th day of September, beginning 10 minutes after 9 o'clock in the morning, invisible here.

The fourth is of the Sun, the 5th day of October, beginning at 40 minutes after 7 o'clock in the evening, invisible to us. If this eclipse had happened sooner in the day, we should not have seen it by reason of the Moon's great south latitude.

Oh! said he, what! have he and his father quarrelled again already? No, no. I'll have nothing to say to him.

It being proved, on a trial at Guildhall, that a man's name was really Inch, who pretended it was Litch, I see, said the Judge, the old Proverb is verified in this man, who being allowed an Inch has taken an L.

A modest Gentlewoman being compelled by her mother to accuse her husband of insufficiency, and being in the court, she humbly desired of the Judge that she might write her mind, and not be obliged to speak it, for modesty's sake. The Judge gave her that liberty, and the clerk was immediately ordered to give her pen, ink, and paper; whereupon she took the pen, without dipping it into the ink, and made as if she would write. For the HOOPING COUGH.

TAKE one scruple of the salt of worm-wood, and dissolve it in a quarter of a pint of pure water, then add to it ten grains of cochineal in fine powder, and sweeten it with sugar to a pleasant taste. Of this mixture, the fourth part of a common table spoonful may be given to a child within the first year four times a day, at four hours distance, with a spoonful of barley water after it; to a child near two years old, half a spoonful may be the dose; to a child above four years old, a common spoonful may be given; and to a child of six years old, he may take a spoonful four times a day. Milk and apples, sweetened with sugar, is

a proper food for those afflicted with this disorder; the milk to be very warm when the apples are put into it; and two or three drops of balsom capivi, according to the age of the patient, may be taken night and morning.— This prescription was never known to fail of success, and generally cures in five or six days.

For **CONSTANT FEVERS.**

TAKE an ounce of saltpetre and powder it, then divide it into four equal parts, and each of them into four others, for so many doses, each of which will contain about half a dram. One of these to be taken every three or four hours, dissolved in a large cupful of sage tea, sweetened to the palate. If there be any cough, twenty drops of balsom capivi, with powdered sugar, must be taken night and morning.

For the **RHEUMATISM.**

TAKE a common glass tumbler and scrape it half full of horse radish; then fill it up with the best rum you can get, Bathe the parts afflicted, keeping a flannel over them to keep them warm. You may bathe the places as often as you think proper.

For **BRUISES, CUPS, and other SORES.**

HOUNDSTONGUE, which grows plentifully in most parts of this colony, a leaf or more of which applied to the part afflicted will most certainly effect a perfect cure; a fresh leaf must be put on when you find the other dry, or troublesome. It cures the piles also, or any sore that requires a salve or poultice. It is a most valuable plant, and no person ought to be without it in his garden. It has a long pointed broad leaf, and when bruised between your finger and thumb smells something like spirits of hartshorn. It has a good many leaves, and resembles plantain.
