Eclipses for the YEAR 1783,

Are six, four of the SUN and two of the MOON.

THE first is of the Sun, March 3d, beginning at 34 minutes after one o'clock in the morning, a very small eclipse; the limb of the moon will just touch that of the Sun, at the south pole.

The second is of the Moon, March 13th, beginning at 33 minutes after one o'clock in the afternoon; it will not be seen here, Its continuance on the earth according to Doctor Halley's tables upon Sir Isaac Newton's principles, will be visible 3 hours and 32 minutes; a very great and total eclipse in Europe, &c.

The third is of the Sun, April the 1st, beginning at 37 minutes after three o'clock in the afternoon, a very small eclipse, it just touches the north pole of the world.

The fourth also is of the sun, August 27th, in the afternoon, which also just touches the northern pole.

The fifth is of the Moon, September 10th, in the evening, beginning at 37 minutes after six o'clock, a very great and total eclipse, visible here, and near three quarters of the known world.

The sixth is of the Sun, September 26th, at near 3 o'clock in the morning. The Moon in this eclipse, will just touch the edge of the Sun; at the south pole invisible.

 remarkably dark that can be conceived
 if ascribed to the Density of the Clouds
 alone - To that cause alone was it
 ascribed by myself & many others
 at the Time - but Mr. Banister in
 riding from Pet. to his own house saw
 the sun, & says he very distinctly observed
 an opaque body which obscured a
 considerable part of it bearing every
 resemblance to an Eclipse - It is
 observable that a Comet was discovered
 at Wormburg on the 17. of Janry 1784. a little

A prescription for the Malignant Fever, which has been very destructive to the Negroes in this state.

WHEN the malignant fever appears, which is known by a pain in the head and faint by quick pulse, hardly to be felt at the wrist, but higher up the arm is perceivable; give a dose of tartar-emetick, and the next day a purge of forty grains of rhubarb and forty of crem-tar-tar, which repeat every other day, and give of the solution † two table-spoons full every two hours on the intermediate days, till the fever goes off, which it generally does after five purges; but if a pain in the stomach, a continuance of the head-ach, and an increase of fever appears, administer another vomit, and then pursue the above treatment, carefully observing a simple regimen of mush and molasses, panado, gruel, rice, &c. but without grease, salt meat, or any solid food, and particularly spirits; the least irregularity in either of these, the patient will relapse, even after a week or ten days removal of the fever, and in that case renew the above treatment, giving a vomit first; a very green bile is always observed to attend this fever.

Let the room where the patient stays be fumigated every hour with vinegar on a hot brick, and let vinegar be frequently used in their food. It is proper to bathe the feet often in warm water.

† *The solution is six grains of tartar-emetick dissolved in a bottle of water, with six table spoons full of spirits.*
