ECLIPSES

For the YEAR 1787, are five; two of the SUN,
and three of the MOON.

THE first happens of the ☽, the third of January beginning at 53 minutes after 5 o'clock in the evening; visible in the western parts of Europe, and in all the known parts of America: Totally eclipsed.

The second is of the SUN, June 15th, 36 minutes after eleven o'clock in the forenoon; visible in London, but hardly will be seen here.

The third is of the MOON, the 30th day of June, beginning at 38 minutes after ten o'clock in the morning: Eclipsed near eleven digits. Invisible to us.

The 4th is of the SUN, the 9th of December, beginning at 37 minutes past ten o'clock in the morning; visible only to the southern part of the world.

The 5th and last is of the MOON, December 24th, beginning at 44 minutes past six in the morning. The greatest darkness will be at 7 minutes past eight o'clock: Eclipsed eight digits and near a half. This part nor the last of it will not be visible with us.
