THE first on the twenty-first of February, partly visible, as follows:

Beginning at	- - - - 4 40	} AFTERNOON.
Sunset, - - - -	- 5 27	
Middle, - - - -	- 5 31	

DIGITS eclipsed, 7 3-5—Ditto at Sunset, 7 2-5.

The first impression will be on, nearly, the Sun's lowermost limb.

Second, on the 17th of August, invisible in the United States. δ at 3h. 11min. in the Morning. This Eclipse will be central and annular in Africa and the Indian Ocean.

The Domestic Physician.

The Iron Planter——*—* Physician by*
 For the BILLIOUS CHOLIC. *Col. Boyd.*

TAKE of the infusion of senna, three ounces; manna, one ounce; caraway water, two drachms; mix them together.—This is to be taken twice in a week: Sometimes three drachms of Glauber's salt are added to this infusion.

An absolute cure for the RHEUMATISM.

Take the pickle of barreled herrings, and rub all along the parts afflicted, before a good fire, and wrap it up in flannel. Five or six applications affect a cure in the worst cases.

For a COUGH.

Take two ounces of Spirmaceti, the yolk of an egg, and a pint of rosemary, or any other simple water, sweeten it with syrup or loaf-sugar; and take a tea-cup full night and morning.

In CONSUMPTIVE cases

Take half pint of skimmed milk, put in a large lump of sugar of roses; drink it every morning early, and sleep afterwards.

For a WHITLOW.

In the first beginning of it, dip the finger in very hot water, and take a purge to carry off the humours. - If it should still go on, and matter is formed, put on a poultice of white bread and milk, night and morning, to which you may add a little oil.

A receipt for the DROPSY.

Take the large leaves that grow upon the stem of the artichoke wipe (not wash) them; stamp them in a mortar, and strain out the juice through a linen cloth, forcing it out; then put a pint of the juice into a bottle, with a pint of Madeira wine (or mountain, if you cannot get good Madeira). Take three spoonfuls every morning, fasting, and three spoonfuls likewise at going to bed; the dose may be increased to four or five spoonfuls, if the case requires, and the stomach will bear it. Mind to shake the bottle well whenever you take it.

For SPITTING of BLOOD.

TAKE of ground-ivy, colts-foot, and liquorice root, each two ounces; elecampane, one ounce; boil them in nine pints of water to a gallon. This is directed to be taken in common drink; or a quarter of a pint three times in a day, in all distempers of the breast.

Excellent Bitters, to prevent the Fever and Ague, and other Fall Fevers.

TAKE of common meadow Calamus, cut it into small pieces; of Rue, Wormwood, and camomile, or Centaury, or Horehound; of each two ounces: add to them a quart of spring water; and take a wine-glass full of it every morning, fasting. This cheap and excellent infusion is far more effectual, in preventing Fevers, than raw spirits, or the strongest Bitters made with spirits; both of which make the breath offensive: And those who use them, are very apt to get into a habit of drinking spirituous Liquors.

Indian remedy for the TEETHACHE.

MAKE a decoction of the bark of the root of White Poplar, and apply the Liquor, hot as you can bear it, to the Tooth, the marrow of which is affected. Repeat the operation several times, and the pain will be completely removed.

A certain cure for the STONE and GRAVEL.

Fill a large bottle, or any other vessel, four parts in five with the wood strawberry, adding as much Lisbon sugar as will render the infusion palatable; then fill the vessel up with brandy, (for want of that spirit) with rum, letting it stand close corked for six weeks, when it is fit for use.

A glass of it will give immediate ease in the severest fit, and by continuance entirely cure the patient. Pour off the first infusion at the expiration of six weeks, and the same berries will make a second, if sufficient to stand two months squeezing the fruit when taken out.

Receipt to change RED HAIR, to a beautiful BROWN.

Take black lead and ebony shavings, of each an ounce; boil these an hour in a pint of clear water; when fine bottle it for use. The comb must be wet with the liquid, and the hair combed often therewith. To make the hair a jet black add two drachms of camphire to the ingredients.

Of rendering Hay in a wet season, as useful as if it had not received any wet.

Let the mow maker be provided with a quantity of salt, and, as he lays on a layer of hay, sprinkle it with the salt; a peck is sufficient for a load of hay.

An easy and expeditious method of fetching BUTTER.

Put your cream into some earthen vessel or pot, then place this vessel into a large pot or kettle of water nearly boiling; let it remain in this situation, till the cream becomes somewhat warm, repeatedly stirring it with a ladle.—After this, put the cream into your churn, and by applying the churn-dash to it fourteen or fifteen minutes, you will have good butter. This has been repeatedly proved by experiment.

Method from freeing APPLE TREES from MOSS.

This method consists, in daubing over the trunk, and all the large branches of the tree, when the sap begins to rise, with a large brush dipped in white wash, made of lime pretty thick: the moss and all the rotten bark, will soon after dropt off, and be replaced by a new bark entirely smooth.

To preserve APPLES.

Strew a quantity of dry white oak leaves, so as to cover the bottom of the hoghead; on these place a layer of found hand-picked apples, cover them with leaves, then another layer of apples, and so on alternately, leaves and apples, till you have the quantity desired; keep them in a dry place free from frost.

Approved method of keeping CROWS from CORN LAND.

Take a quart of train oil, as much turpentine and some bruised gun-powder, boil them together, and when hot dip pieces of rags into the mixture, and fix on sticks in different parts of the field; five or six may serve for an acre. The birds will not approach the spot.

An ELECTUARY for the PILES.

Take of flowers of sulphur half an ounce; lenitive electuary two ounces; sirup of marsh-mallows, enough to render it soft.—This is good against the piles, taking the bigness of a nut-meg, or walnut, at a time, every three or four hours.—If they be attended with febrile, or inflammatory symptoms, two drachms of nitre may be occasionally added.
