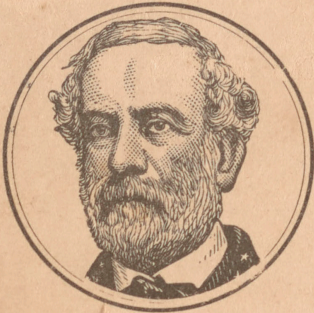

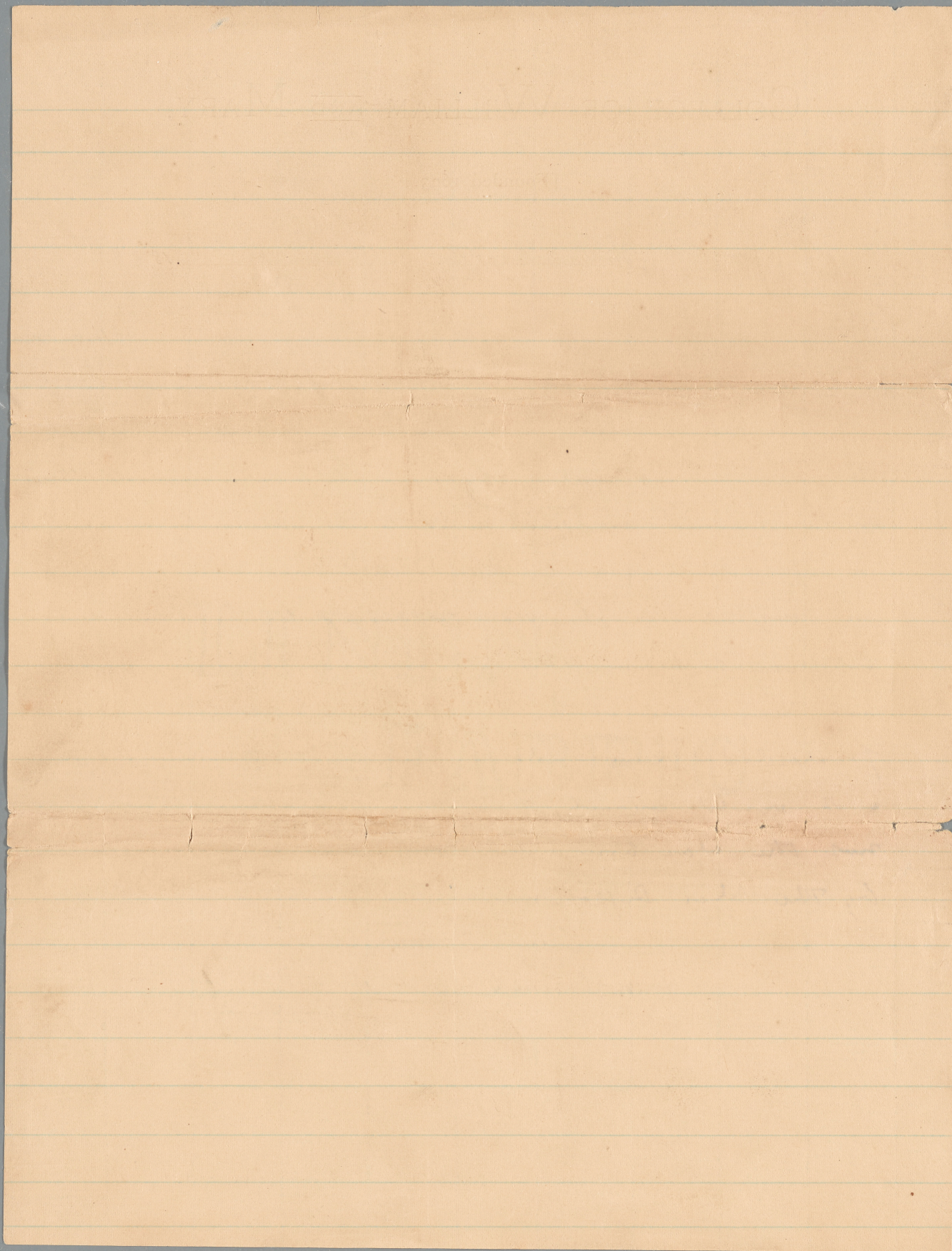

Major John Branton, by General R. S. Ewell, then
in command of Richmond & its vicinity, and remained
on this duty until the close of the War. While
on this service, he was requested by the James City
Artillery to become their 1st Lieutenant. This position
not being filled at the time, & an application was
forwarded & recommended by Gen. Ewell, to the War Department
& it would certainly have been favorably acted on, had
not the war terminated soon after it was received
by the War Department.

Dear Sir

Your letter of the
20th Inst. did not reach me until
a day or two ago, & I hasten
to reply. You were reported ab-
sent without leave, as was every
other officer, who had not sent
surgeons certificates, by order
of the Brig. Gen. Comd. & were in
consequence thereof dropped from
the rolls of the Army, by the War
Department; the notice of which
was sent to you some weeks
ago. I was much surprised &
disturbed to find this
action had been taken in your
case, as I had approved & for-
warded your resignation before
it was done, indeed in its re-
port; I stated that you had ef-
fered your resignation, & further

that I know unequivocally that
you were unfit for duty, &
it is a mystery to this day why
you were dropped. You say you
sent Surgeons certificates of dis-
ability to me, they never come
to hand but if you can show
to the Department, that you did
send them you can demand
as a matter of justice, that the
order be rescinded, & that you be
restored to your command. I would
advise you at once to make a
petition to the War Department, sta-
ting the facts & exhibiting the cer-
tificates of the surgeon etc your
certificates for duty, get some friend
to attend to it for you, & I am sure
there will be no difficulty about
it. I have always esteemed you
highly both as an officer & a gen-
tleman & should be much pleased
to see you set right. With the
best wishes for your health & success

Sir

On the 29th of last month,

I was dropped from the rolls as 1st Lieut. of Co: "C"
32nd Regiment Va Volunteers; I was not apprised
that any move of this kind had been made
until the 20th of the present month & at that time
unofficially & on the 23rd three days thereafter I
recd: an order from the Department confirming
same; It will be perceived that nearly a month
has elapsed since the order itself actually issued
before I was aware of its existence, therefore my
delay in looking into the matter; I would now
inquire if the case may not be reviewed, & if not
what proceeding is necessary to be had in order that
it may be seen whether the merits of the case justify
such treatment as I have received. I am fully satisfied
that the whole matter by a fair investigation may be adjusted,
and that I be permitted to resign my Commission
(which has been tendered three months ago) instead of
this ignominious "dropping" to which I have
been subjected; I would here take occasion
to remark that I have never been subject to
any military draft & that I am now free from
Conscription. Perhaps the only remedy I have, is
an appeal to the highest authority in the land,
which I am satisfied will not be deaf to the
story of an injured soldier, who volunteered at the

breaking out of the Revolution, who only proposed to
resign when his health became inadequate to the task
of serving his Country.

The resignation spoken of in the foregoing, was lost,
and I did not know it until a day or two before the
date of last, which is "16th Nov: 1862".

Hoping that I may be decided with at the
earliest practicable moment.
