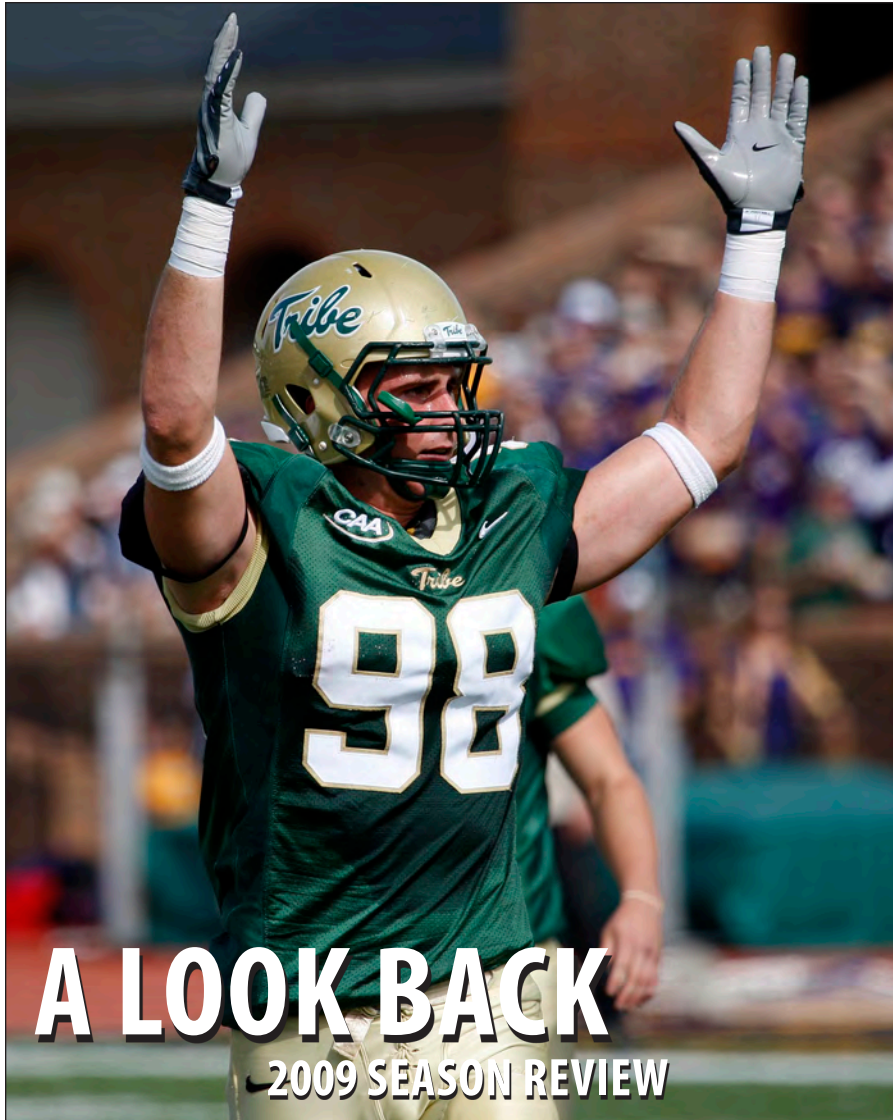

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (9/5/09) -- Redshirt-freshman cornerback B.W. Webb intercepted three passes, including a 50-yard pick-six late in the fourth quarter, as the 14th-ranked William and Mary football team earned a 26-14 victory at Virginia in both teams' season opener.

The victory was the Tribe's first against an FBS opponent (formerly Division I-A) since defeating Temple, 45-38, in 1998.

W&M's defensive effort was outstanding all night long, as it caused seven turnovers and held the Cavaliers scoreless in the second half. Additionally, the Tribe limited Virginia to just 269 yards of total offense and 12 first downs, with just 79 yards and four first downs coming in the second half.

Both teams found the end zone in the opening quarter as the Cavaliers scored on a 34-yard run by quarterback Vic Hall, while R.J. Archer found Rob Varno with a five-yard strike.

An 8-yard touchdown run by Jameel Sewell put UVA up 14-7 midway through the second quarter, but a pair of Brian Pate field goals (40/26 yds) drew the Tribe within one at halftime.

After redshirt freshman Dante Cooke recovered a muffed punt by Hall at Virginia's 9-yard line, Pate gave the Tribe its first lead of the contest, 16-14, when he booted in a 20-yard field goal from the right hash with 5:35 left in the third quarter.

The Tribe's defensive unit remained tough and came up with a huge stop on a fourth-and-one at midfield with 9:48 left when Trantin and senior defensive end Sean Lissemore stopped quarterback Marc Verica for no gain.

Francks' second fumble recovery of the night, coming on UVA's 36-yard line with 5:46 showing, helped set up another score for the Green and Gold. A 23-yard run by Archer on the first play of the drive helped set a 24-yard field goal by Pate, his fourth of the night, with 3:50 to play.

W&M then sealed the triumph on Virginia's ensuing drive when Webb intercepted Sewell and raced 50 yards down the Tribe sideline for touchdown to give the College a 26-14 cushion and its first victory against Virginia since 1986.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (9/12/09) -- For the second consecutive week the William and Mary defensive unit held its opponent scoreless in the second half, as the No. 7 Tribe improved to 2-0 with a 33-14 victory against Central Connecticut State in its home opener at Zable Stadium on Sept. 12.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes made history in the triumph, as he became the fastest player in school history to total 1,000 career rushing yards -- doing so in just 13 games. Among the College's top 10 career rushers, Derek Fitzgerald and Jon Smith were the quickest to accomplish the feat (15 games) prior to Grimes.

As a team, the Tribe out-gained CCSU, 372-237, and dominated the ground game, 243-78.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer posted a good all-around effort, as he threw a pair of touchdowns and scored another on the ground. Grimes finished as the game's leading rusher with 80 yards on 19 carries, while senior wideout D.J. McAulay led all receivers with three catches for 70 yards and a touchdown.

The Tribe wasted little time getting on the scoreboard, as it logged a 13-play, 86-yard drive on the game's opening series that culminated with a 1-yard touchdown run by Archer with 7:56 showing. A forced fumble by senior defensive end C.J. Herbert resulted in a safety, while a 37-yard touchdown run by junior running back Courtland Marriner increased the lead to 16-0.

Although CCSU's James Mallory scored a pair of rushing touchdowns in the second quarter, Archer connected with Hobson (17 yds) and McAulay (21 yds) on touchdown strikes to give the Tribe a 30-14 advantage at the half.

W&M scored touchdowns on four of its five possessions in the opening half and outgained the Blue Devils, 281-110.

The lone score in the second half by either team was a 42-yard field goal by senior place-kicker Brian Pate.

NORFOLK, Va. (9/19/09) -- The fifth-ranked Tribe remained unbeaten as it improved to 3-0 with a 27-15 victory at Norfolk State on Sept. 19. With the victory, W&M continued its best start since posting an identical mark to begin the 1998 season.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer threw three touchdown passes – all of which came in the first half – and completed 15-of-20 passes for 153 yards. Senior wide receiver D.J. McAulay totaled a game-high six catches for 74 yards with a pair of touchdowns, while sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes totaled a game-high 73 yards rushing to go with two catches for 28 yards and a touchdown.

The Tribe's defensive unit was dominant for much of the contest, as it held the Spartans scoreless until late in the fourth quarter. Additionally, the College limited NSU to 216 yards of total offense and allowed just 39 rushing yards. W&M also controlled the time of possession, 37:15-22:45.

After forcing Norfolk State to a three-and-out on the contest's opening series, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when Archer found Grimes on a short pass on the left side that went for a 10-yard touchdown strike.

An interception by sophomore linebacker Jake Trantin on the first play of NSU's next possession gave the Tribe excellent starting field position at the Spartans' 32-yard line, and Archer connected with McAulay on a 13-yard touchdown strike three plays later to push the advantage to 14-0 midway through the opening quarter.

McAulay recorded his second touchdown catch of the evening when he made a diving grab in the front right side of the end zone on a 30-yard pass from Archer with 3:18 remaining in the opening half to give the Tribe a 21-0 lead.

A pair of second half field goals by Pate pushed W&M's lead to 27-0.

NSU avoided the shutout by putting 15 points on the scoreboard in the final 6:37, as quarterback Dennis Brown threw a pair of touchdown passes, and a bad snap by the Tribe on a punt attempt resulted in a safety.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (9/26/09) -- The fifth-ranked Tribe improved to 4-0 with a 30-20 victory against Delaware in its conference opener before a sold-out crowd of 12,259 at Zable Stadium on Sept. 26. The Tribe's 4-0 start is the program's best record to begin a season since it posted the same mark in 1994.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer completed 23-of-37 passes for a career-high 313 yards with two touchdowns, while junior wide receiver hauled in six-catches for a career-high 148 yards with two touchdowns. Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes also came up big with 98 yards rushing and a pair of scores.

W&M completely shut down the Blue Hens' rushing attack and allowed -2 yards rushing on 18 carries. Additionally, Delaware had -22 yards rushing until its final offensive drive yielded 20 yards on the ground. The rushing total was the second-fewest by the Blue Hens in school history.

The College jumped out to a 7-0 lead midway through the opening quarter when Archer connected with Hill on a 91-yard touchdown strike deep down the middle of the field. The electrifying play was the longest touchdown pass in the 115-year history of the program.

W&M increased its lead to 14-0 on its next possession when Archer found Hill on another scoring strike. Hill hauled in a short pass across the middle of the field and broke a tackle before racing into the right side of the end zone with less than a minute remaining in the first quarter.

W&M pushed the lead to 17-0 on a 29-yard field goal by Brian Pate with 1:45 left in the second quarter, while Delaware answered with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Pat Devlin to Phillip Taxton with just 17 seconds remaining in the half.

The Tribe opened the second half with a 12-play, 70-yard touchdown drive that culminated with a hard-fought 9-yard scamper by Grimes to extend the margin to 23-7.

In what was a defensive battle for much of the second half neither team scored again until the final 2:37 when UD added a pair of touchdown pass by Devlin and Grimes found paydirt with a 4-yard scoring run.

VILLANOVA, Pa. (10/3/09) -- The fifth-ranked William and Mary football team had its four-game season-opening winning streak snapped with a 28-17 loss at No. 2 Villanova on Oct. 3.

The College dominated total yards, 472-283, and controlled the time of possession by more than five minutes. However, W&M committed a pair of turnovers and only scored one touchdown in its five trips into the red zone. The total yardage was especially lopsided in the second half when the Tribe outgained the Wildcats, 252-81.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer completed 35-of-55 passes for a career-high 354 yards with one touchdown. The 35 completions equaled a school record while the 55 attempts established a new program mark. Additionally, the 354 yards ranks as the 15th-best performance in school history.

Villanova struck first on the contest's first play from scrimmage when quarterback Chris Whitney delivered a 57-yard touchdown strike to wideout Brandyn Harvey deep down the middle of the field on a flea flicker.

VU added another touchdown early in the second quarter on a 5-yard run by Matt Szczur, while W&M put its first points on the board midway through the quarter on a 44-yard field goal by Brian Pate.

A 3-yard touchdown run by Angelo Babbaro with 1:53 showing in the second quarter pushed the margin to 21-3, but the College answered with another field goal when Pate's try from 28 yards was good as time expired.

Although W&M opened the second half with a 15-play drive that lasted 7:32 and ended with a 29-yard field goal by Pate, Villanova took its biggest lead of the contest, 28-9, when Szczur rushed for his second touchdown of the day late in the third quarter.

A leaping 3-yard touchdown catch by junior wideout Chase Hill with 4:18 remaining proved to be the Tribe's final score of the contest, as Villanova recovered the ensuing kick and was able to hold on to preserve the victory.

BROOKLINE, Mass. (10/10/09) -- The eighth-ranked William and Mary football team forced three second half turnovers and scored four unanswered touchdowns to earn a 34-14 victory at Northeastern on Oct. 10.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes scored a pair of touchdowns and rushed for a game-high 91 yards on 14 carries (6.5 yards per carry). Highlighting his performance was a season-long 55-yard touchdown run in the third quarter that gave the Tribe its first lead of the contest.

As a team, the College outgained Northeastern (0-6, 0-3), 396-277, and limited the Huskies to just 39 yards rushing (1.2 yards per carry). The defensive unit was especially impressive in the second half when it allowed just 125 total yards and 15 yards rushing (0.9 yards per carry).

Senior kicker Brian Pate made a pair of field goals (39 and 41 yards) in the opening quarter, while NU got on the scoreboard with a 76-yard touchdown pass from Matt Carroll to Tony Lott.

Despite trailing at the half, 7-6, W&M outgained the Huskies 184-152 and allowed just 24 yards rushing (on 16 carries).

W&M took its first lead of the contest, 13-7, when Grimes broke a 55-yard touchdown run with 6:28 remaining in the third quarter.

Grimes found the end zone again less than four minutes later when he capped off a six-play, 37-yard drive with a 4-yard touchdown run to push W&M's advantage to 20-7.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (10/24/09) -- Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for a career-high 158 yards and scored a touchdown to help the fifth-ranked William and Mary football team earn a 24-3 victory against James Madison in front of a sold-out crowd at Zable Stadium on Homecoming.

With the victory, W&M improved to 6-1 overall and equals the program's best record through seven games since 1998. The triumph also secures the program of its 20th winning season in head coach Jimmie Laycock's 30 years on campus.

While the Tribe piled up 258 yards on the ground, senior quarterback R.J. Archer also came up big with a pair of touchdown passes and completed 15-of-22 passes.

W&M's defensive unit continued its stellar play and limited the Dukes (2-5, 0-4) to just 216 total yards while registering 11 tackles for a loss. The College was especially tough against JMU's passing attack and allowed just 66 yards through the air. Additionally, JMU's three points were the fewest allowed by the Tribe this season.

Varno's score capped off a 3-play, 69-yard drive that lasted just 1:15 and was highlighted by a 61-yard run down the Tribe sideline by Grimes.

The Dukes answered the Green and Gold's touchdown with a 9-play, 40-yard drive that culminated with a career-long 44-yard field goal by Dixon Wright early in the second quarter.

While neither team was able to generate much offense for much of the remainder of the half, the Tribe increased its lead to 10-3 when senior place-kicker Brian Pate made a 34-yard field goal as time expired to push the lead to 10-3 at halftime.

The Tribe extended its lead to 17-3 late in the third quarter when Archer found Gottlieb wide open in the left side of the end zone from 18 yards out to give the Delray Beach, Fla., native his first career touchdown reception.

After sophomore defensive end Marcus Hyde recovered a fumble caused by senior end C.J. Herbert at the W&M 41-yard line, the Tribe marched 59 yards in eight plays and pushed across the final score when Grimes scampered into the end zone from 9 yards out with 5:45 remaining.

The College added another score when Robertson hauled in a 25-yard touchdown, the first of his career, with 4:16 re-remaining in the third quarter.

Towson's lone trip into the Red Zone came midway through the fourth quarter and was stopped when Wells intercepted Tommy Chroniger at the W&M 2-yard line.

After both teams punted on their opening possessions, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when senior place-kicker Brian Pate connected on a 20-yard field goal with 5:18 remaining in the opening quarter. The 10-play, 89-yard drive was highlighted by a 49-yard completion deep down the middle to Dohse.

Richmond answered W&M's score on its ensuing drive when place-kicker Andrew Howard kicked a 42-yard field goal from the left hash to tie the count at 3-3 with 14:48 remaining.

Richmond took its first lead of the contest, 10-3, when running back Justin Forte scored on a 4-yard run with 14:16 showing in the fourth quarter. The touchdown capped off a short drive that covered just 30 yards, as UR took good starting field position after W&M was forced to punt out of its own end zone.

W&M answered moments later when Archer connected with Dohse on a 60-yard touchdown strike over the middle to tie the score at 10-10 with 12:09 remaining. The catch was the longest of Dohse's career.

After Steinman made a diving interception in front of the W&M sideline at UR's 32 with 5:44 left, the Tribe put itself in position to take the lead. However, a holding penalty stalled the drive, and Pate's 52-yard field goal attempt into the wind came up short.

The Tribe drove to UR's 39 in the final minute, but Justin Rogers intercepted Archer at the 36 and returned it to the UR 47 with 14 seconds remaining. Richmond quarterback Eric Ward then completed an 18-yard pass to Tre Gray and a 4-yard pass to Kevin Grayson to set up Howard's game-winning kick.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (11/28/09) -- Sophomore linebacker Jake Trantin and redshirt freshman cornerback B.W. Webb returned a pair of first-half interceptions for touchdowns to help the sixth-ranked William and Mary football team defeat No. 15/18 Weber State, 38-0, in the opening round of the NCAA Playoffs at Zable Stadium. With the win, W&M advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals for the fourth time in school history and will play at Southern Illinois.

The victory secured the program's fourth 10-win season and extended its winning streak against non-conference FCS schools to 16 games. Additionally, the triumph marked head coach Jimmie Laycock's 199th career win.

In route to posting its second shutout of the season, the College's (10-2) defense registered a season-high four interceptions and limited Weber State (7-5) to just 161 yards of total offense. The Wildcats entered the contest with one of the nation's top-ranked offensive units and was averaging more than 30 points per game and 420 yards of total offense per game. Additionally, W&M held WSU to -6 yards rushing, which marked the third time this season that the Tribe has held an opponent to negative yards rushing.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes set a W&M playoff record with 139 rushing yards, as he became the 12th player in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

Trantin and Webb returned interceptions for 60 and 58 yards, respectively, in the second quarter (Webb's coming with just 0:12 left in the half), while senior place-kicker Brian Pate kicked a 27-yard field goal to give the Tribe a 17-0 lead at halftime.

W&M extended its advantage to 24-0 with a 10-play, 73-yard touchdown drive to open the second half that ended with a 1-yard QB sneak by senior quarterback R.J. Archer.

Archer's second rushing touchdown of the afternoon, a 6-yard scamper with 4:21 remaining, pushed the lead to 31-0.

Following a Weber State fumble deep in W&M territory, junior running back Terrence Riggins provided the final score of the afternoon with a 23-yard touchdown run with 3:01 left.

W&M allowed just 20 yards of total offense in the second half.

CARBONDALE, III. (12/5/09) -- Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for three touchdowns as the No. 6 William and Mary football team earned a 24-3 victory at No. 1/2 Southern Illinois in the NCAA Quarterfinals on Dec. 5. In addition to advancing W&M to the NCAA Semifinals for the second time in the last six years, the win was also significant in that it was the 200th of head coach Jimmie Laycock's career. He becomes just the 13th head coach in FCS history to accomplish the feat.

W&M's victory snapped the top-ranked Salukis' 11-game winning streak and improved the Tribe's mark to 11-2, as it equals a school record for most wins in a season with the 2004 team that also advanced to the NCAA Semifinals.

Although the Tribe was outgained 102-2 and trailed 3-0 after the first quarter, it posted a dominant performance in the final three quarters -- outscoring SIU, 24-0, and outgaining it, 371-85. Southern Illinois (11-2) entered the contest with one of the nation's top offenses and was averaging 36.6 points per game and 412 yards of total offense per game.

Individually, All-American senior defensive end Adrian Tracy and senior place-kicker Brian Pate both etched their names in the Tribe's single-season record book. Tracy earned his 12th sack of the season and equaled Luke Cullinane's mark established in 1996, while Pate kicked his 21st field goal of the season and equaled the mark set by Steve Christie in 1989.

In addition to rushing for three touchdowns, Grimes piled up 133 yards on the ground as he eclipsed the 130-yard mark for the second straight week.

The Salukis' lone points of the day came on a 46-yard field goal by place-kicker Kyle Dougherty on the contest's opening drive.

W&M answered with a 36-yard field goal by Pate and a 6-yard run touchdown run by Grime in the second quarter.

Grimes later found the end zone again with a 7-yard run late in the third quarter and a 5-yard run with less than two minutes remaining in the contest.

VILLANOVA, Pa. (12/11/09) -- The sixth-ranked William and Mary football team concluded one of the best seasons in the program's 115-year history with a 14-13 loss at No. 2/3 Villanova in the NCAA Semifinals on Dec. 11.

Despite the loss, W&M finished the season with an 11-3 mark, which equals the school record for victories established in 2004. Additionally, the squad set school records for fewest points allowed per contest (since going to an 11-game schedule) (12.1 ppg), fewest rushing yards allowed per game (61.1), most sacks (49) and most tackles for a loss (112).

As it did against all 14 opponents this season, the Tribe outgained Villanova, 336-267. Individually, junior wide receiver Cam Dohse finished with a five catches for a career-high 148 yards, which included a school and NCAA Playoff record 98-yard touchdown reception from senior quarterback R.J. Archer.

While neither team was able to generate much offense in the first quarter, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when Dohse hauled in an NCAA playoff-record 98-yard touchdown reception down the left sideline with 10:45 showing in the second quarter.

W&M tacked on another score when senior place-kicker Brian Pate made a career-long 46-yard field goal as the first half clock expired to give the Tribe a 10-0 advantage.

Villanova narrowed the margin to 10-7 on its second offensive possession of the second half when wide receiver Matt Szczur took a direct snap from center and raced 62 yards for a touchdown with 9:03 remaining in the third quarter.

W&M answered on its ensuing possession with a 15-play, 55-yard drive that culminated with a 40-yard field goal from the right hash by Pate with 2:13 showing in the third quarter.

Villanova responded with a touchdown on the following drive to go ahead, 14-13, when quarterback Chris Whitney scored on rush from a less than a yard out with 10:57 remaining. Szczur helped set up the score with a 9-yard run on a fake punt near midfield to keep the drive alive.

While the Tribe had two more possessions down the stretch, it was unable to generate any first downs.

Still trailing by one with 2:40 remaining, the Tribe had a chance to gain more possession but VU converted a fourth-and-less-than-one from the W&M 14 and was able to run out the clock.
