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Tribe Football

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With 13 starters returning from last season's team that advanced to the NCAA Semifinals, W&M enters 2010 ranked as high as No. 1 in the preseason polls.

After posting a school-record tying 11-win season in 2009, including an appearance in the National Semifinals, William and Mary enters fall drills as a consensus top-five team in the preseason polls. Some would view this sort of lofty billing as added pressure, but high expectations are the norm at the College. Under the guidance of head coach Jimmy Laycock, the Tribe has set the gold standard for sustained excellence. He has led his alma mater to 200 wins and eight postseason appearances, all while never compromising the high academic standards of the College.

While none in the Tribe program are likely to get caught up in preseason predictions, there is every reason for optimism in Williamsburg, as W&M returns 13 starters from last season's squad (six on offense and defense, and one specialist). Perhaps even more encouraging is the fact that Laycock's entire full-time staff remains intact for its third-consecutive season and brings more than 100 years of combined coaching experience to the field.

A person only needed to be a casual observer of the program to know the College's calling card was its defense last season. In fact, the 2009 unit was among the nation's elite in nearly every statistical category and featured a pair of senior All-Americans, and eventual NFL draft picks, in defensive tackle Sean Lisemore and defensive end Adrian Tracy. While the loss of that duo will certainly be felt, the overall talent level of fourth-year Tribe defensive coordinator Bob Shoop's crew remains high. The return of a trio of all-conference caliber linebackers in Jake Trantin (middle), Wes Steinman and Evan Francks will form the foundation of the corps, with Trantin likely to challenge for national honors as a junior. The team's defensive backfield also returns both starting corners in senior team-captain Ben Cottingham and returning CAA Defensive Rookie of the Year B.W. Webb. Senior defensive tackles Michael Stover and Harold Robertson give the Tribe a pair of experienced veterans to anchor the front four.

W&M's offense will feature little mystery this fall, as the unit returns one of the league's most versatile and talented performers in two-time All-CAA tailback Jonathan Grimes. Though just a junior, Grimes is already one of the most-decorated players in both school and league history, collecting a total of five conference honors. Grimes, who is averaging 5.0 yards per carry during his career, enters the year on the Payton Award Watch List and is a returning first-team All-CAA selection. The battle to replace the loss of steady senior all-conference signal caller R.J.

Archer was among the most heated in the team's spring drills, and it figures to get even more intense during the fall camp. Junior transfer Michael Paulus (North Carolina) and redshirt freshman Brent Caprio will be among a group of at least five different players looking to earn the starting nod. On the offensive front, the Tribe will count on senior team-captain Keith Hill, Jr., to lead what could shape up to be a very young, but talented, group from his left tackle position. At receiver, the Tribe will rely on the sure-handed senior duo of Chase Hill and Cam Dohse to carry the load early in the season while some of the team's younger talent has a chance to adjust to increased roles.

The graduation of two-time all-conference place-kicker Brian Pate will be a difficult loss to replace, as he was a three-year starter. Coming into the season, the College will rely on two-time returning all-conference punter David Miller to assume both duties, but he figures to be pressed by promising younger talent for placement kicks. Otherwise, the Tribe's special teams should remain a strength for the College, as Webb and Grimes each return as all-conference performers at punt and kick return positions, respectively.

The Tribe's 2010 schedule is challenging, as usual, as no less than six of the 11 opponents will start the season nationally ranked. No game will be more crucial than the team's opener, which sees the program traveling to Amherst, Mass., to take on UMass in what will also be the squad's CAA opener. The College will then play a pair of non-conference opponents during the following two weeks, as it hosts Virginia Military Institute on Sept. 11 and travels to Norfolk for a meeting with Old Dominion on Sept. 18. The matchup against the Keydets will not only serve as the Tribe's home opener, but also renew a long-standing rivalry that took a one-year hiatus last season after meeting 65 consecutive years. W&M's game at ODU will mark the first meeting between the two programs.

Following the two non-conference tilts, the Tribe will resume league play with a road contest at Maine on Sept. 25. W&M will then square off against a pair of league opponents at Zable Stadium, as the defending national champions Villanova Wildcats make a visit to Williamsburg on Oct. 2 for the College's Family Weekend before Rhode Island comes to town on Oct. 9.

After a bye week, the Green and Gold will play its third consecutive home game when longtime rival Delaware visits for Homecoming on Oct. 23.

The Tribe takes a break from conference action the following Saturday, as it

looks to knock off an ACC opponent for the second consecutive year when it plays at North Carolina on Oct. 30. W&M nearly defeated the Tar Heels in the teams' last matchup in 2004, as W&M led by 10 points in the second half before UNC rallied back with three fourth-quarter touchdowns.

The College will remain on the road for two more weeks when it returns to league action, as it will play at New Hampshire on Nov. 6 and at James Madison on Nov. 13.

The Tribe closes out the regular season with a home game versus Richmond on Nov. 20. The contest will mark the 120th meeting between the two programs.

Quarterbacks

Finding a replacement for graduated all-conference quarterback R.J. Archer was the main focus on the offensive side of the ball this spring. Junior transfer Michael Paulus and redshirt freshman Brent Caprio were in a relentless competition throughout the practice season. While both showed the potential to be a solid choice under center, neither earned the starting nod coming into the fall. Likely, some of the cause for this is that an additional pair of potential starters, senior Mike Callahan and junior D.J. Mangas, will be introduced into the mix during pre-season drills. Each was forced to miss the spring due to injury. Taken as a whole, the quarterback competition first-year position coach David Corely, Jr., will oversee figures to be fierce from day one of camp.

From a physical skills standpoint, Paulus brings the complete package. He stands a solid 6-4, 220-pounds and is closing in on multiple school position records in the weight room. While he has only been working with the Tribe's system since his January arrival on campus, Paulus will be one of only two Tribe players on the current roster to have a collegiate pass attempt to his credit, as he saw limited action while playing at North Carolina. One of the nation's most highly regarded quarterback prospects out of Syracuse's Christian Brothers Academy, he has an NFL-caliber arm and the mobility to extend plays.

Caprio came into the College's fold last fall as one of the top prep players out of the state of New Jersey (as he was selected First-Team All-State by the Star Ledger). Though he was able to save his redshirt season last fall, Caprio spent the entire season on the travel squad and picked up valuable practice experience. An extremely gifted student, both on and off the field, Caprio has a solid grip on the team's schemes. He blends good athleticism with an accurate arm and will challenge for the opportunity to become just the second player in the Laycock era to start the first game of his freshman season (of eligibility) at quarterback. The last was Stan Yagiello in 1982.

Both Callahan and Mangas missed the majority of action this past spring recovering from knee injuries, but each expects to make a healthy return in time for fall drills. As a fifth-year senior, Callahan is the most experienced of all the Tribe's quarterbacks. A tireless worker, he also is one of the team's most respected leaders who can bring a great deal of intangibles to the huddle. Mangas, when healthy, is the team's most athletic quarterback candidate, as he spent his redshirt freshman season as a wide receiver. A dual threat, he was the No. 2 quarterback for the College last year before an injury ended his season.

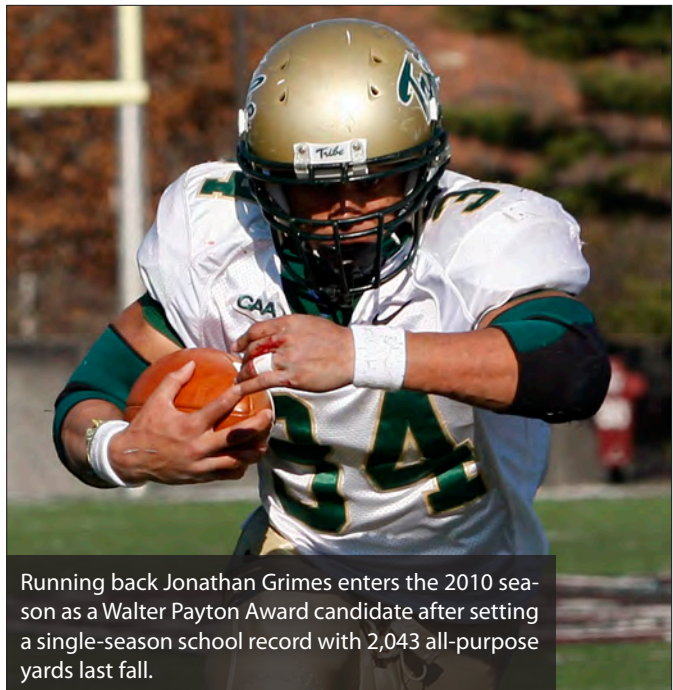
Once Mangas was injured (prior the third game), junior Terrance Schmand took over the top reserve position for the remainder of the year. He gained valuable experience and saw some limited game action for the College. Schmand is a strong-armed quarterback with good size (6-3, 215) and potentially could also find his way into the mix at the position with a strong fall showing. Redshirt freshmen Connor Farrell and Michael Graham will add depth to the position and look to gain more experience this fall.

Running Backs

First-year Tribe tailback mentor Brendan Nugent can look at the 2010 season as a good news/bad news scenario. The good news is he has some of the top talent in the FCS football world returning to his backfield, the bad news is that there is only so many opportunities to spread the ball amongst his top three ball carriers – junior Jonathan Grimes and seniors Courtland Marriner and Terrence Riggins.

That being said, it is no secret that Nugent and the offensive staff will find multiple ways to get the ball to returning first-team all-conference tailback Jonathan Grimes. Last season Grimes set the school record for single-season rushing attempts (277) and amassed the third-highest single-season rushing total (1,294), while scoring 10 total touchdowns (nine rushing, one receiving). His rushing total led the league, while he was second in total all-purpose yardage with an average of 145.9 yds/game (his 2,043 all-purpose yards set a single-season school record). Grimes was at his best in the post-season, as he ran for 331 yards during the Tribe's three-playoff competitions, including a 133-yard, three-touchdown performance over then top-ranked Southern Illinois in the quarterfinals. By earning all-conference recognition as both a running back and kick returner in 2009, Grimes now has four career All-CAA honors and is tied with all-time W&M great wide receiver Rich Musinski (2000-03) for the most in school history. Each earned the league's Rookie of the Year honors, as well. His career-rushing total of 2,223 yards ranks 10th in school history. Equally adept as a receiver, Grimes has 85 career receptions to his credit, including a career-high 46 for 289 yards last season.

Beyond Grimes, Nugent also has another two explosive tailback options in the speedy Marriner and powerful Riggins. Marriner's pure speed makes him a legitimate big-play threat from anywhere on the field, either as a runner or receiver. Not just a sprinter, Marriner has freakish strength in his compact frame and the willingness to seek contact, both with the ball and in pass protection. Last year, he was a great compliment to Grimes, as he carried the ball 93 times for 458 yards (4.9 a tote) and scored seven rushing touchdowns. At 6-1, 224-pounds, Riggins is the biggest of the Tribe's backfield options and his blend of speed and power gives him the versatility to see playing time in a variety of situations, as he can contribute in short yardage as either a tailback or fullback and also has the hands to make plays

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in the passing game. Last season he set his career high in carries (57), rushing for a total of 290 yards and two scores.

Look for the staff to be creative in its scheming to take full advantage of the versatility of the trio, with the likely result that two, or more, might be on the field at the same time.

The wealth of talent at tailback does not stop with the trio, however, as the Tribe also values the potential of sophomore Meltoya Jones, who has shown flashes of brilliance in his limited playing opportunities. A physical runner who has good hands out of the backfield, Jones will provide able depth if needed.

While Riggins enters the fall listed as the starting fullback, senior Jimmy Hobson also figures to see significant action in the role. Despite missing a large portion of 2009 with an injury, he still is the most experienced player on the roster in the role and brings great toughness and technique to the position. He is also versatile enough to play tailback in a pinch. When Hobson went down, sophomore John Ribble rose to the occasion and provided the team with quality snaps. His toughness and experience figure to earn him spot action this fall as a quality reserve. Also adding quality depth will be another sophomore, T.J. Ptachick, who converted to the position from linebacker last fall. As the most athletic among the options at fullback, Ptachick figures to challenge for immediate playing time in the fall.

Receivers/Tight Ends

One of the stated challenges coming into the spring drills for long-time Tribe offensive coordinator Zbig Kepa and his staff was to maximize the consistency and production from a talented corps of receivers.

A pair of seniors in Chase Hill and Cameron Dohse headline group, as each brings as wealth of experience to the field.

While Hill had an up and down '09 season (only 15 receiving yards on two catches through the first three games), he has the talent to be a playmaker for the Tribe, as witnessed by his six-catch, 148-yard effort in the win over Delaware that included a then-school record 91-yard catch and run. Standing at 6-2, 200 pounds, he has excellent size and strength to line up in the slot, while he also possesses the speed to play outside. He brings 73 career receptions to the field (907 total receiving yards) and 11 total TDs.

Dohse is team's leading returning receiver with 1,141 yards on just 63 grabs (an average of 18.1 yds/catch). He is the epitome of a player maximizing his abilities, as he has deceptive speed along with exceptional hands and toughness. After being one the team's more pleasant surprises during his sophomore season in 2007 (31 grabs for 557 yards and five TDs), multiple nagging injuries limited him to just spot action as a junior. However, he reemerged with a vengeance late in the 2009 season, as he went over the 100-yard receiving mark twice in the last four games (130 at Richmond and 148 at Villanova) including a school- and NCAA-Playoff record 98-yard catch and run in the National Semifinals. Dohse will enter the fall poised to have a breakout senior year as

the squad's No. 1 receiver.

Senior Terreon Conyers and sophomore C.J. Thomas fill out the two deep, but each will be pushed for playing time by a group of younger players, led by sophomore Ryan Moody. Conyers has seen spot action in the program for the last three seasons and blends this experience with good hands. Thomas seems to have the most physical promise, as he is coming off a tremendous spring, where he used his size and speed to showcase his playmaking ability. Moody was among the team's top-three receivers at the start of last season before an injury ended his year in the second game. Prior to his injury, he had a standout performance in the team's season-opening upset at Virginia, as he turned in three catches for 70 yards. He made a healthy return this spring, though, and will seriously challenge for reps in the fall.

Beyond this group, senior Marshall Dill, junior Ryan Woolfolk and a host of others all have the potential to challenge for reserve rolls in the fall.

At tight end, junior Alex Gottlieb will enter his first season as the starter after backing up the graduated all-conference standout Rob Varno the last two years. Gottlieb is the complete package in terms of size, strength and physicality for the position and should compete for postseason honors. At 6-3, 240-pounds, Gottlieb is ready for an increased role in both the run and pass games for the College. He has eight career receptions to his credit for 131 yards and a TD.

Depth at the tight end will come in the form of sophomore Nolan Kearney and senior Gareth Hissong. Kearney converted to the position from quarterback at the start of last fall camp and has made tremendous strides. With excellent size (6-4, 246-pounds) and athleticism, he will look to make an impact this season as he continues to improve on his work at the line of scrimmage. Hissong is another player with great character who maximizes both his abilities and any opportunity to see playing time. He is versatile enough to also see action at h-back, should the need arise.

Offensive Line

Veteran Tribe offensive line coach Bob Solderitch returns three starters to his offensive front for the 2010 season. He will count on the senior duo of tackle Keith Hill, Jr., and guard Derek Toon for leadership and to be the foundation of the crucial unit.

Hill, one of five team captains, comes into his final year with 24 games of starting experience and the size (6-4, 312 pounds) and strength to be an all-conference caliber performer. Despite his extensive game experience, he will be seeing his first action at left tackle this fall after spending the previous two years at the right side position. He made the switch during spring drills and his successful transition to the role will be one of the keys to the Tribe's offensive successes this year. Sophomore Mike Salazar comes into the fall at top of the depth chart in Hill's old position and will look to make an immediate impact. The projected first-year starter showed well in the spring and has good size (6-5, 296) and footwork. If he

is able to continue his development and meet his potential, he will have a major impact on the team's attack.

At the guard position, Toon is currently paired with redshirt freshman James Johnson III as the starting duo. At 6-3, 288 pounds, Toon is the most physical and aggressive of the Tribe's front five. He converted from defensive tackle in the fall of 2008 and saw starting action later the same season. With a complete year of experience under his belt, he should be poised for a standout senior campaign.

Johnson came to the College as a walk-on last fall, but earned his way onto the travel squad by season's end. This spring he earned the starting role but will be pushed throughout camp by the incumbent, junior Chris Sutton (6-2, 295). Johnson (6-1, 299) quickly proved to be the best athlete among the Tribe's offensive front and has the strength and toughness to be an immediate asset. Sutton started 13 of the team's 14 games a year ago at left guard and will challenge for playing time.

Coming into the fall, junior James Pagliaro (6-3, 284) is listed as the squad's starter at center. He brings a very physical presence to the middle of the Tribe's front five, and, like Toon, is a converted defensive lineman. He will be pushed for playing time throughout the fall by both Sutton and redshirt freshman Matt Crisafi (6-4, 302). Crisafi has good size and strength and could make contributions at any of the middle three positions up front.

Junior Dan Donker (6-3, 311) and Robert Gumbita (6-5, 300) add depth at the left and right tackle positions, respectively. Donker has the athletic potential to be an impact player with continued development in the Tribe's system, while Gumbita saw starting action one game last fall, subbing at guard for an injured Sutton.

Defensive Line

When Sean Lissemore, Adrian Tracy and C.J. Herbert collected their respective diplomas this past May, the Tribe's defense lost not only the core of what was arguably one of the greatest defensive lines in school history, but also more than 120 games of combined starting experience. The trio combined for more than 44 TFLs, including 23 sacks, and powered what was the nation's stingiest rush defense (which allowed just 61.5 yds/game last season). While a team does not reload and replace this sort of production and leadership over the course of an offseason, veteran Tribe defensive line coach Trevor Andrews is optimistic the talent remains to field another extremely effective unit.

In drastic contrast to last season, the 2010 Tribe front four will feature just one senior listed as a starter on the preseason two-deep – defensive tackle Michael Stover. Stover is the embodiment of the type of player that has served as the backbone of the Tribe program under Laycock, as he came in as a walk-on and tirelessly worked his way into an all-conference caliber performer. He collected 12 TFLs and 2.5 sacks in 13 games last season, playing through several injuries along the way. Perhaps his most impressive accomplishment was being named as the team's Defensive MVP in the team's final two postseason games (at Southern Illinois and at

Villanova). A leader by example in all phases of game, Stover will be counted on to keep the unit focused.

Working alongside Stover on the inside will be standout junior run-stopper, Harold Robertson. Robertson and Stover shared starting duties at tackle for much of last season, while Robertson made every start in 2008 as a redshirt freshman. Always a strong run-stopper, he has made significant strides in gaining more lean muscle mass in the off-season and will be a more active force along the line of scrimmage this fall and could play his way into an all-conference caliber performer.

The Tribe will feature a pair of active defensive ends in the junior duo of Ravi Pradhanang and Marcus Hyde. The defensive staff believes Pradhanang has the potential to be an elite talent, as he possesses all of the necessary physical tools and intangible skills to be a dominant player. At 6-3, 250-pounds, his blend of speed, strength and technique has made him a productive player when healthy. In just four starts last season, he collected 20 tackles, 4.0 TFLs, including 3.5 sacks. However, injuries have taken its toll in each of the last two seasons, as a concussion severely limited his playing time last fall. He has a clean bill of health coming into 2010 and should be full go at the start of camp. Hyde (6-3, 242 pounds) will enter his first year as a starter, after being a key reserve in each of the last two seasons. A converted linebacker, Hyde has been very productive in limited playing time, collecting a remarkable 7.0 TFLs, including 4.5 sacks last season. He plays with a high motor and his speed and quickness make him a challenging match-up for most offensive tackles. He could also be poised for a breakout season, as he is exposed to significantly more playing time this fall.

While on the subject of breakout seasons, versatile senior Brian Jean-Pierre is yet another player with all the tools to be an impact player. Standing at 6-4, 275 pounds Jean-Pierre is extremely athletic for his size. Whether he is slotted at tackle or end, he will bring a unique set of skills to his position. He made tremendous strides in all phases of the game the past two years and his continued development will provide the College with another premier force along the defensive front.

Fellow senior Kyle O'Brien (6-0, 247) is another key reserve who can spot at either tackle or end. A special team's staple, O'Brien plays with a great motor and brings tremendous toughness to the field. He is a proven contributor who has seen spot action in each of the last two seasons. Sophomore Nick Zarembo (6-2, 224) and redshirt freshman Bryan Stinnie (6-4, 230) are a pair of promising young players who will also challenge for reserve rolls this fall at tackle and end, respectively.

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PREVIEW | 2010 SEASON OUTLOOK

Linebackers

W&M linebackers coach Scott Boone finds himself in the enviable position of overseeing a unit that returns talent, experience and depth this fall. In terms of playing time, five of the top six linebackers from the 2009 squad are back in the fold, including all-conference junior middle linebacker Jake Trantin and both of his senior running mates, outside backers Wes Steinman and Evan Francks.

While the Tribe's front four collected most of the national attention a year ago, the squad's starting trio of linebackers was amazingly productive, as they collectively accounted for the following stat line: 223 total tackles, 29 TFLs, 8.5 sacks, 10 PBUs, four interceptions and four fumble recoveries.

Leading the way for the unit was Trantin, who had a team-high 90 stops, three interceptions and 10 TFLs last fall. Moving forward, the staff will rely heavily on Trantin's on-field leadership abilities to get the defense organized and aligned. Already one of the league's top playmakers, Trantin is more than capable of challenging for the highest national honors. Entering his third season as a starter, Trantin has demonstrated the ability to make plays from sideline-to-sideline, or to attack the backfield. His toughness and athleticism make him equally dangerous for opponent pass or running games.

Francks, who shares part of the team captaincy with Trantin, is another proven player who has appeared in all 36 games (with 22 starts) over the last three years. Despite being slightly undersized (5-11, 212), he uses all of his physical skills to his best advantage and understands and executes his role. While finishing just one tackle shy of the team lead with 89, there is no argument he was one of the team's most consistent playmakers (7.5 TFLs, six PBUs, three fumble recoveries). Francks was typically at his best during the team's biggest games, as he had double-digit tackle totals in the homecoming win over James Madison and in the NCAA quarterfinal victory at Southern Illinois. He also played a pivotal in the season-opening triumph at Virginia with five stops, two TFLs, a pair of fumble recoveries and a PBU.

Steinman had a breakout year in 2009, as he earned the starting OLB job during fall camp and never looked back. An athletic 6-2, 225-pound frame makes him the ideal fit for his role in the defensive scheme, as he has the size and strength to attack the line of scrimmage and the speed and quickness to play in space. Last season he proved to be an extremely capable playmaker, as he contributed 11.5 TFLs, 3.5 sacks and an interception. Like Trantin and Francks, he continued the momentum of a solid season by turning in an impressive showing in spring drills and appears poised for a stellar senior campaign.

The Tribe can feel good about its depth at the position, as explosive sophomores Dante Cook and Jabrel Mines back up at the outside positions. Cook was a valuable special teams performer a season ago who also saw situational defensive reps. He turned in one of the most impressive springs on the defensive side of the ball and will see increased playing time this fall. Mines has a solid grasp of the Tribe scheme and will be a key reserve and special teams player. After a solid spring showing, redshirt freshman Ben Casper enters the fall backing up Trantin in the middle. He impressed the staff with his feel for the game and should challenge for reps while contributing on special teams.

Defensive Backs

While defensive coordinator Bob Shoop will have the luxury of entering the fall with two proven performers as his starting corners, graduation was unkind to the middle of his backfield, as a pair of veteran starters in free safety Robert Livingston and all-conference strong safety David Caldwell finished stellar careers last fall.

Sophomore B.W. Webb headlines the returnees, as he made quite a splash in his debut season, earning the CAA's Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. He led the league, and was tied for second nationally, with eight interceptions. Webb, who was also earned second-team all-conference honors, literally burst on the scene with a historic performance in the Tribe's season-opening win at Virginia, as he recorded three interceptions — including a fourth-quarter 50-yard return for the game-sealing points. This effort earned him the FWAA Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week honor, making him the first FCS player selected for the recognition in the history of the award. Webb had an equally important touchdown return in the first-round playoff win against Weber State, as his pick-six came with just 0:12 remaining in the first half and put the Tribe up 17-0. A sure tackler, Webb also contributed 23 total tackles and three TFLs. His impact was not just limited to defense, as he also handled all the Tribe's punt return chores and was second in the league with an average of 8.2 yards per attempt, earning him third-team all-league recognition. While his resume is already impressive, it is likely Webb could come out with an even better sophomore year, as he has all the tools to challenge for national honors and be the premier cover corner in the FCS world.

While Webb understandably garnered most of the recognition, senior team-captain Ben Cottingham quietly and consistently holds down the boundary corner position. A three-year veteran, Cottingham sets the gold standard for preparation and approach to the game. No better example of his work ethic and character is needed than the fact that he worked his way from being a school-start walk-on to his current leadership position. A sure tackler with outstanding technique, he set his personal single-season best with six PBUs last season.

Looking toward the safety positions, the staff was excited with the spring showing by junior Terrell Wells at free safety. He has the most game experience of any of the candidates for the role, as he has seen action in 26 career games at cornerback. He proved to have great instincts for the position and is a physical presence. Wells also has the speed and ball skills to play in space and will excel playing over slot receivers.

Sophomore Brian Thompson enters the fall as the No. 1 strong safety, as he proved to be the most consistent of all the safeties during the spring session. Primarily a special teams performer a year ago, Thompson is a hard-hitting compliment to Wells. A dedicated player to the off-season training program, he has the strength to hold his own at the point of attack and be a force in the run defense.

Also positioned to see significant action in the defensive backfield is talented sophomore Ethan Lee. The Buckingham, Va., native emerged from a walk-on to a valued special team's contributor a season ago and has played his way into an expanded role this fall, as he can fill in at either safety or corner. He will see game action as both a defensive back and special team's performer.

Also pushing for reps in the secondary will be junior Jake O'Connor and a trio of redshirt freshmen in Jerome Couplin III, Takeo Hester and Ryan Smith. O'Connor has experience at both safety positions and is versatile enough to provide quality depth at either position. One of the team's most coachable athletes, O'Connor possesses a premier work ethic and will contribute on special teams while challenging for defensive reps. Couplin will mainly focus on the strong safety position, after seeing spring action at free. A physical player, he will focus on continuing to learn the new position this fall while contributing on special teams. Hester is the primary reserve behind Webb at field corner and has a wealth of athletic ability for the position. His primary goal this fall will be to work on improving his overall consistency that, when successful, will make him a dangerous cover corner. Smith was solid this spring and will be a key reserve at the boundary corner position.

Special Teams

Just as the quarterback position holds a special place in the Tribe program's tradition, the punting and kicking specialists have been no less credentialed. Since starting league play in 1993, the program has earned a total of 17 all-conference honors between the punter and placekicker positions.

Returning senior punter David Miller figures to continue to build on this legacy, as he has already earned two all-conference certificates, including first-team accolades this past fall. He has averaged nearly 40 yards an attempt for his career and last season helped the College have the league's best net punting average (35.9 yds/att). As one of the top returning punters in the FCS world, he will challenge for national honors this fall. As an added responsibility, Miller's powerful right leg may also be called on to handle the team's placement kicks as the replacement for graduated two-time all-conference honoree Brian Pate.

While Miller enters the camp with starting place-kicking duties, he will be pushed throughout by group of younger talent led by redshirt freshman Drake Kuhn.

The Tribe will also have the luxury of returning key talent at both return specialist positions, as both Jonathan Grimes (KR) and B.W. Webb (PR) were all-conference caliber players a season ago. Grimes has averaged better than 21 yards an attempt over his 47 career kick returns, while Webb was one of the top punt return specialists in the league with an average of better than 8.0 yards a return. While each possesses the speed and quickness necessary to excel in the role, both are also sure-handed with outstanding ball security. In fact, the staff will likely take advantage of Webb's sure hands and give him the added duty of holding on placement kicks.

The College also returns Chase Hill for his third season of handling the long-snapping duties, while sophomore Andy Topping will assume his first full year of short snapping, after seeing limited duty at the end of last season.

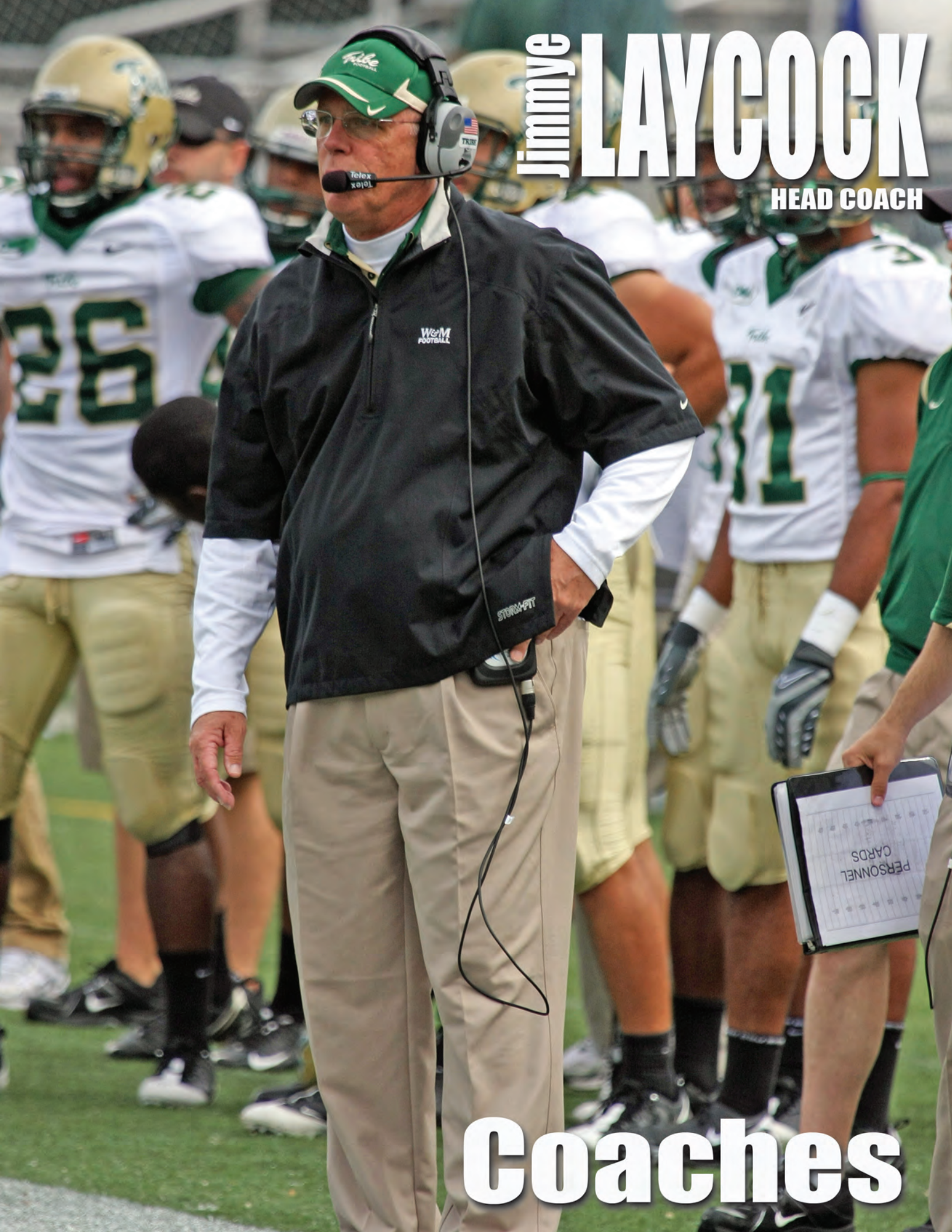

Head Coach Jimmye Laycock

Few schools feature a better match at the helm of its program than the College of William and Mary has with Jimmye Laycock. In a tenure that now reaches its third decade, Laycock has worked hand-in-hand with the College's world-class academic tradition and fashioned a program that is a point of pride for the campus, alumni and community.

Laycock is one of the nation's longest tenured and most respected head coaches. He has authored a school-record 200 wins (against 141 losses and two ties) and 20 winning ledgers since first taking over the program in 1980. The Tribe has also appeared in 12 postseason contests with Laycock at the helm and advanced to the NCAA Semifinals twice in the last six years.

On June 21, 2008, the College dedicated the \$11 million Jimmye Laycock Football Center with a ceremony that featured more than 500 friends and alumni of the program. While the building carries his name and stands as a strong symbol of what Laycock has meant to the Tribe, it makes a stronger statement about the school's commitment to football and the program's proud tradition. The state-of-the-art center provides the College with one of the finest facilities in the Football Championship Subdivision and, paired with Laycock's steady leadership, gives the Tribe the necessary resources to compete at the highest level.

As the architect of what is easily the most extended run of success in William and Mary's 115-year football history, Laycock has never compromised academic standards for athletic success, as his program earned recognition from the NCAA in each of the first six seasons the organization has awarded outstanding academic achievement. When Laycock, a 1970 grad, returned to coach his alma mater prior to the 1980 season, he inherited a program that had won six or more games in a season just four times in the previous 25 years. Few could have predicted that the College would produce more than three times that amount of seven-win seasons over the next quarter century.

The accumulated successes, both on and off the field, have led to an era of unprecedented interest and support for his program. Evidence of this is provided in the fact the Tribe averaged more than 10,000 fans per game over the last four seasons.

During Laycock's tenure, the fans at Zable have consistently been treated to a winner on the field, as the program's mentor ranks in the top 10 of all active FCS head coaches in terms of career wins. Laycock is also second among active conference head coaches in career league wins with 82.

Laycock has made the home turf in Zable Stadium into unfriendly territory for opponents as the Tribe has won 71.7 percent of its games (107-42-1) in Williamsburg in the last 26 years. W&M has turned in eight undefeated regular season home campaigns.

Individual accomplishments under Laycock have been plentiful, as he has also tutored 33 players to 86 All-America honors from the William and Mary ranks and has coached 11 Academic All-Americans. Former quarterback Lang Campbell is the most decorated of all, as the 2004 season saw him earn the prestigious Payton Award, given annually to the nation's top offensive player in the FCS ranks, consensus first team All-America honors, as well as the A-10's Offensive Player of the Year and Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The Tribe has produced an astounding 161 all-conference selections since 1993.

While no one season can define a career that spans three decades, the 2009 campaign

was exceptionally remarkable. The Tribe equaled a school record with 11 victories and advanced to the NCAA Semifinals for the second time in the last six seasons. En route to being ranked as high as third nationally in the final polls, the College led the nation in rushing defense by surrendering just 61.14 yards per game – a school record. Additionally, W&M ranked second nationally in total defense (229.79) and scoring defense (12.07), while it ranked third in sacks (3.43) and eighth in tackles for a loss (8.00). Laycock also became part of the exclusive 200-win club as he became just the 13 FCS head coach to reach the milestone with the NCAA Quarterfinal victory at top-ranked Southern Illinois.

Prior to the '09 season, the 2004 campaign highlighted Laycock's resume as W&M set a school record for wins (11), won the Atlantic 10 Football Conference's automatic NCAA bid, hosted a NCAA semifinal game before a standing room only crowd at Zable Stadium in front of a national television audience and finished the year with a school record No. 3 final national ranking. Along the way, a bevy of school single-season records fell; total points (486), total yards (6,044) and home wins (seven), to name just a few.

But, none of these achievements spoke more succinctly to Laycock's approach than the program's 100 percent official NCAA graduation-rate report for all student-athletes receiving athletics aid. This showed W&M graduated all of its scholarship football players who entered the program as freshmen during the 1997-98 school year. The Tribe not only carried the highest graduation rate in the conference, but also was far and away the top figure of any team ranked in the final national top 25 for that season. To prove this lofty number was no fluke, the team repeated the feat just two years later, as the 1999-2001 cohort also graduated at 100 percent.

When looking at the NCAA Division I Championship Division world, the Tribe's stellar 185-89-2 (.674) record against fellow Championship Division foes during

Laycock's career also confirms the success of his formula. The College also boasts a 82-56 mark in league play.

The 2001 campaign stood as a testament to Laycock's program's stability, as the team rebounded from a then nine-year low 5-6 record in 2000 to post an 8-4 mark, claiming a share of the Atlantic 10 Crown and earning a spot in the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs.

The 1996 campaign is another prime example of how Laycock has perpetuated a winning tradition within W&M's rigorous classroom standards, as he led a youth-laden squad to a quarterfinal showing in the NCAA playoffs, a 10-3 overall record (7-1 in league play), the Tribe's first Yankee Conference Championship, and a fifth-place national ranking.

One trademark of a Laycock-coached team is a prolific and intricate offensive attack. The Tribe offense has averaged nearly 400 yards a game over Laycock's 29 previous years in the program.

Prior to the deep playoff runs during the last six years, the 1990 season stood as the benchmark for the Tribe program. That season, Laycock was honored by his peers as Coach of the Year in Region II and the state of Virginia for guiding the Tribe to 10 wins and an appearance in the quarterfinals of the Division I-AA playoffs.

That 1990 squad, ranked No. 7 in the final NCAA poll, refashioned many pages in the school record book. W&M led the country in total offense by averaging almost 500 yards per game and claimed the Lambert Cup for I-AA supremacy in the East. Even the Virginia General Assembly passed a resolution commending Laycock's accomplishments. The Tribe's 1996 squad led the conference in both total offense and defense en route to earning its own Lambert Cup and ECAC Team of the Year honors.

After some lean years early in his tenure, Laycock's teams began building respectability among all opponents. After a pair of 6-5 seasons, W&M carved out a 7-4 mark in 1985 and a national ranking of No. 16. The winning ways continued in 1986 with a 9-3 record and an eighth-place final ranking. In that season, the Tribe advanced to the I-AA playoffs for the first time and had three players drafted by the NFL.

Although William and Mary dipped to a 5-6 slate in 1987, the Tribe recovered to post a 6-4-1 overall record in 1988. That memorable season climaxed with a trip to Japan and a 73-3 victory over the Japanese College All-Stars in the first Epton Ivy Bowl. The Tribe returned to the NCAAs in 1989 with an 8-2-1 regular season record.

The Tribe is well represented in the pro ranks, as 2008 team captain Derek Cox was drafted in the third round of the 2009 NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. The College is also represented in the NFL by four-time Pro Bowl free safety Darren Sharper (New Orleans Saints), a second round draft pick of the Green Bay in 1997, and Mike Leach (Arizona Cardinals). Including Cox, the College has had a total of six players

sign free agent contracts after their senior season since the end of the 2004; Lang Campbell (2005, Cleveland Browns), Dominique Thompson (2005, St. Louis Rams), Adam O'Connor (2007, Carolina Panthers), Drew Atchison (2008, Dallas Cowboys) and Mike Potts (2008, Pittsburgh Steelers). Former all-conference defensive back Billy Parker also played professionally in 2008, as he started every game for the New York Dragons of the Arena League. Former standout wide receiver Rich Musinski has been a fixture with the Scranton Wilkes-Barre Barons for the past two seasons. Michael Clemons (Class of 1987) had been one of the CFL's most explosive players after joining the Toronto Argonauts in 1989, and now serves as the team's Vice Chair.

As a 1970 graduate of the College, Laycock played football under two gurus of the game. For three years, he learned the details under the watchful eyes of Marv Levy,

the legendary former head coach of the Buffalo Bills. In his last season, collegiate coaching legend Lou Holtz schooled Laycock in the finer aspects of psyche and motivation. As a sophomore, Laycock was a starter in the defensive secondary, but he was soon switched to quarterback where he completed 96 of 218 passes for 1,366 yards.

Laycock's first full-time coaching position came at The Citadel as the offensive backfield coach under Bobby Ross, who went on to coach the NFL's San Diego Chargers and Detroit Lions. In 1975, Memphis State tabbed Laycock as its quarterback's coach and he helped the Tigers to consecutive 7-4 records.

In 1977, Laycock traveled to Clemson to serve as offensive coordinator for three years. During his tenure, he helped the Tigers fashion records of 8-3-1, 11-1 and 8-4. Clemson played in bowl games each year, defeating Ohio State 17-15 in the 1978 Gator Bowl. At that time, Laycock coached two-time All-ACC performer Steve Fuller, the Tiger quarterback who later played in the NFL, and Dwight Clark, an All-Pro receiver for the San Francisco 49ers.

A native Virginian, Laycock played football, basketball and baseball at Loudoun Valley High School, where he won 12 letters and has since had his number retired.

Laycock is married to Deidre Connelly, a sports psychology consultant at the College. They have three children: Michael, Mimi and James.

Laycock's daughter Melanie is married to Doug Johnson and is a school administrator in Atlanta, Ga. The couple had a daughter, Grail, last spring.

Laycock Era Highlights ...

- Jimmye Laycock enters his 31st season as the Tribe's head coach in 2010. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 200-143-2 career record at W&M.
- Among active Division I (FBS and FCS) head coaches, Laycock's 200 victories rank tied for 11th. The total also ranks inside the top 20 of active coaches in all divisions. Among only active FCS head coaches, Laycock's total is sixth.
- Laycock ranks fourth on the all-time CAA Football career victories list with 82. Among active coaches, Laycock trails only Villanova's Andy Talley (107).
- In 2009, W&M equaled school records with 11 wins and a No. 3 final national ranking, made its 10th postseason appearance under Laycock, and advanced to the NCAA Semifinals for the second time in six seasons.
- In 2004, W&M set a school record with 11 victories and advanced to the NCAA Semifinals for the first time in school history en route to earning a No. 3 final national ranking.
- The Tribe has posted winning ledgers in 20 of the past 27 seasons under Laycock.
- Laycock has guided the Tribe to a total of 55 career 40-plus point outings in his 343 games as the College's head coach, a number that represents more than 16 percent of his total games. By comparison, the College had seen only 12 total 40-plus point outings in the 30 seasons prior to Laycock taking the reigns of the program in 1980.
- Since joining what is now the CAA Football conference in 1993, a William and Mary quarterback has earned all-conference honors in 12 of the 17 seasons, including seven-straight campaigns from 1998 to 2004. Going hand-in-hand with the postseason honors is the fact that in seven of the 16 seasons in league play, a Tribe quarterback has turned in the conference's top passer efficiency rating.
- The College has earned 161 total all-conference citations under Laycock.
- The Tribe has posted a 110-44-1 record (.713) at Zable Stadium under Laycock, which includes eight undefeated regular seasons in Williamsburg. In Laycock's 30 seasons, the College has failed to post a .500 or better record at home just four times (1980, 1999, 2006, 2007).
- Since joining the CAA Football Conference, W&M has gone 122-69 (.639) against FCS opponents.
- During Laycock's 30-year tenure, 27 Tribe players have gone on to sign with NFL teams, including five-time Pro Bowl selection Darren Sharper.
- Laycock has mentored 34 student-athletes to All-America honors at the College, including a career-high four in 2004 that earned either Sports Network or Associated Press All-America citations (Lang Campbell, Dominique Thompson, Greg Kuehn, Adam O'Connor). Campbell was a consensus First Team All-American (AFCA, Walter Camp, AP, Sports Network) and was also the winner of the 2004 Walter Payton Award.
- Since the NCAA began its academic reform with graduation rates surveys and APR rankings in 2004, the Tribe football program has posted a 100 percent graduation rate three times (2004, 2006, 2007).

• Under Laycock, 11 Tribe football players have been named Academic All-Americans, including the most recent selection of Bryce Lee in 2001.

• W&M has had 62 players earn academic all-conference honors since 1997 under Laycock, including a career-high tying seven in 2007, and one conference Scholar-Athlete of the Year (Lang Campbell, 2004).

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (9/5/09) -- Redshirt-freshman cornerback B.W. Webb intercepted three passes, including a 50-yard pick-six late in the fourth quarter, as the 14th-ranked William and Mary football team earned a 26-14 victory at Virginia in both teams' season opener.

The victory was the Tribe's first against an FBS opponent (formerly Division I-A) since defeating Temple, 45-38, in 1998.

W&M's defensive effort was outstanding all night long, as it caused seven turnovers and held the Cavaliers scoreless in the second half. Additionally, the Tribe limited Virginia to just 269 yards of total offense and 12 first downs, with just 79 yards and four first downs coming in the second half.

Both teams found the end zone in the opening quarter as the Cavaliers scored on a 34-yard run by quarterback Vic Hall, while R.J. Archer found Rob Varno with a five-yard strike.

An 8-yard touchdown run by Jameel Sewell put UVA up 14-7 midway through the second quarter, but a pair of Brian Pate field goals (40/26 yds) drew the Tribe within one at halftime.

After redshirt freshman Dante Cooke recovered a muffed punt by Hall at Virginia's 9-yard line, Pate gave the Tribe its first lead of the contest, 16-14, when he booted in a 20-yard field goal from the right hash with 5:35 left in the third quarter.

The Tribe's defensive unit remained tough and came up with a huge stop on a fourth-and-one at midfield with 9:48 left when Trantin and senior defensive end Sean Lissemore stopped quarterback Marc Verica for no gain.

Francks' second fumble recovery of the night, coming on UVA's 36-yard line with 5:46 showing, helped set up another score for the Green and Gold. A 23-yard run by Archer on the first play of the drive helped set a 24-yard field goal by Pate, his fourth of the night, with 3:50 to play.

W&M then sealed the triumph on Virginia's ensuing drive when Webb intercepted Sewell and raced 50 yards down the Tribe sideline for touchdown to give the College a 26-14 cushion and its first victory against Virginia since 1986.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (9/12/09) -- For the second consecutive week the William and Mary defensive unit held its opponent scoreless in the second half, as the No. 7 Tribe improved to 2-0 with a 33-14 victory against Central Connecticut State in its home opener at Zable Stadium on Sept. 12.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes made history in the triumph, as he became the fastest player in school history to total 1,000 career rushing yards -- doing so in just 13 games. Among the College's top 10 career rushers, Derek Fitzgerald and Jon Smith were the quickest to accomplish the feat (15 games) prior to Grimes.

As a team, the Tribe out-gained CCSU, 372-237, and dominated the ground game, 243-78.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer posted a good all-around effort, as he threw a pair of touchdowns and scored another on the ground. Grimes finished as the game's leading rusher with 80 yards on 19 carries, while senior wideout D.J. McAulay led all receivers with three catches for 70 yards and a touchdown.

The Tribe wasted little time getting on the scoreboard, as it logged a 13-play, 86-yard drive on the game's opening series that culminated with a 1-yard touchdown run by Archer with 7:56 showing. A forced fumble by senior defensive end C.J. Herbert resulted in a safety, while a 37-yard touchdown run by junior running back Courtland Marriner increased the lead to 16-0.

Although CCSU's James Mallory scored a pair of rushing touchdowns in the second quarter, Archer connected with Hobson (17 yds) and McAulay (21 yds) on touchdown strikes to give the Tribe a 30-14 advantage at the half.

W&M scored touchdowns on four of its five possessions in the opening half and outgained the Blue Devils, 281-110.

The lone score in the second half by either team was a 42-yard field goal by senior place-kicker Brian Pate.

McAulay totaled a game-high six catches for 74 yards with a pair of touchdowns, while sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes totaled a game-high 73 yards rushing to go with two catches for 28 yards and a touchdown.

The Tribe's defensive unit was dominant for much of the contest, as it held the Spartans scoreless until late in the fourth quarter. Additionally, the College limited NSU to 216 yards of total offense and allowed just 39 rushing yards. W&M also controlled the time of possession, 37:15-22:45.

After forcing Norfolk State to a three-and-out on the contest's opening series, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when Archer found Grimes on a short pass on the left side that went for a 10-yard touchdown strike.

An interception by sophomore linebacker Jake Trantin on the first play of NSU's next possession gave the Tribe excellent starting field position at the Spartans' 32-yard line, and Archer connected with McAulay on a 13-yard touchdown strike three plays later to push the advantage to 14-0 midway through the opening quarter.

McAulay recorded his second touchdown catch of the evening when he made a diving grab in the front right side of the end zone on a 30-yard pass from Archer with 3:18 remaining in the opening half to give the Tribe a 21-0 lead.

A pair of second half field goals by Pate pushed W&M's lead to 27-0.

NSU avoided the shutout by putting 15 points on the scoreboard in the final 6:37, as quarterback Dennis Brown threw a pair of touchdown passes, and a bad snap by the Tribe on a punt attempt resulted in a safety.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (9/26/09) -- The fifth-ranked Tribe improved to 4-0 with a 30-20 victory against Delaware in its conference opener before a sold-out crowd of 12,259 at Zable Stadium on Sept. 26. The Tribe's 4-0 start is the program's best record to begin a season since it posted the same mark in 1994.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer completed 23-of-37 passes for a career-high 313 yards with two touchdowns, while junior wide receiver hauled in six-catches for a career-high 148 yards with two touchdowns. Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes also came up big with 98 yards rushing and a pair of scores.

W&M completely shut down the Blue Hens' rushing attack and allowed -2 yards rushing on 18 carries. Additionally, Delaware had -22 yards rushing until its final offensive drive yielded 20 yards on the ground. The rushing total was the second-fewest by the Blue Hens in school history.

The College jumped out to a 7-0 lead midway through the opening quarter when Archer connected with Hill on a 91-yard touchdown strike deep down the middle of the field. The electrifying play was the longest touchdown pass in the 115-year history of the program.

W&M increased its lead to 14-0 on its next possession when Archer found Hill on another scoring strike. Hill hauled in a short pass across the middle of the field and broke a tackle before racing into the right side of the end zone with less than a minute remaining in the first quarter.

W&M pushed the lead to 17-0 on a 29-yard field goal by Brian Pate with 1:45 left in the second quarter, while Delaware answered with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Pat Devlin to Phillip Taxton with just 17 seconds remaining in the half.

The Tribe opened the second half with a 12-play, 70-yard touchdown drive that culminated with a hard-fought 9-yard scamper by Grimes to extend the margin to 23-7.

In what was a defensive battle for much of the second half neither team scored again until the final 2:37 when UD added a pair of touchdown pass by Devlin and Grimes found paydirt with a 4-yard scoring run.

VILLANOVA, Pa. (10/3/09) -- The fifth-ranked William and Mary football team had its four-game season-opening winning streak snapped with a 28-17 loss at No. 2 Villanova on Oct. 3.

The College dominated total yards, 472-283, and controlled the time of possession by more than five minutes. However, W&M committed a pair of turnovers and only scored one touchdown in its five trips into the red zone. The total yardage was especially lopsided in the second half when the Tribe outgained the Wildcats, 252-81.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer completed 35-of-55 passes for a career-high 354 yards with one touchdown. The 35 completions equaled a school record while the 55 attempts established a new program mark. Additionally, the 354 yards ranks as the 15th-best performance in school history.

Villanova struck first on the contest's first play from scrimmage when quarterback Chris Whitney delivered a 57-yard touchdown strike to wideout Brandyn Harvey deep down the middle of the field on a flea flicker.

VU added another touchdown early in the second quarter on a 5-yard run by Matt Szczur, while W&M put its first points on the board midway through the quarter on a 44-yard field goal by Brian Pate.

A 3-yard touchdown run by Angelo Babbaro with 1:53 showing in the second quarter pushed the margin to 21-3, but the College answered with another field goal when Pate's try from 28 yards was good as time expired.

Although W&M opened the second half with a 15-play drive that lasted 7:32 and ended with a 29-yard field goal by Pate, Villanova took its biggest lead of the contest, 28-9, when Szczur rushed for his second touchdown of the day late in the third quarter.

A leaping 3-yard touchdown catch by junior wideout Chase Hill with 4:18 remaining proved to be the Tribe's final score of the contest, as Villanova recovered the ensuing kick and was able to hold on to preserve the victory.

BROOKLINE, Mass. (10/10/09) -- The eighth-ranked William and Mary football team forced three second half turnovers and scored four unanswered touchdowns to earn a 34-14 victory at Northeastern on Oct. 10.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes scored a pair of touchdowns and rushed for a game-high 91 yards on 14 carries (6.5 yards per carry). Highlighting his performance was a season-long 55-yard touchdown run in the third quarter that gave the Tribe its first lead of the contest.

As a team, the College outgained Northeastern (0-6, 0-3), 396-277, and limited the Huskies to just 39 yards rushing (1.2 yards per carry). The defensive unit was especially impressive in the second half when it allowed just 125 total yards and 15 yards rushing (0.9 yards per carry).

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (10/24/09) -- Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for a career-high 158 yards and scored a touchdown to help the fifth-ranked William and Mary football team earn a 24-3 victory against James Madison in front of a sold-out crowd at Zable Stadium on Homecoming.

With the victory, W&M improved to 6-1 overall and equals the program's best record through seven games since 1998. The triumph also secures the program of its 20th winning season in head coach Jimmie Laycock's 30 years on campus.

While the Tribe piled up 258 yards on the ground, senior quarterback R.J. Archer also came up big with a pair of touchdown passes and completed 15-of-22 passes.

W&M's defensive unit continued its stellar play and limited the Dukes (2-5, 0-4) to just 216 total yards while registering 11 tackles for a loss. The College was especially tough against JMU's passing attack and allowed just 66 yards through the air. Additionally, JMU's three points were the fewest allowed by the Tribe this season.

After forcing JMU to three-and-outs on two of its first three possessions, W&M got on the scoreboard first when Archer rolled out to the right side and found Varno open on a 9-yard touchdown strike with 3:26 left in the opening quarter. Varno's score capped off a 3-play, 69-yard drive that lasted just 1:15 and was highlighted by a 61-yard run down the Tribe sideline by Grimes.

The Dukes answered the Green and Gold's touchdown with a 9-play, 40-yard drive that culminated with a career-long 44-yard field goal by Dixon Wright early in the second quarter.

While neither team was able to generate much offense for much of the remainder of the half, the Tribe increased its lead to 10-3 when senior place-kicker Brian Pate made a 34-yard field goal as time expired to push the lead to 10-3 at halftime.

The Tribe extended its lead to 17-3 late in the third quarter when Archer found Gottlieb wide open in the left side of the end zone from 18 yards out to give the Delray Beach, Fla., native his first career touchdown reception.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (11/7/09) -- The fifth-ranked William and Mary football team extended its winning streak to four games with a 31-0 victory against Towson at Zable Stadium on Saturday afternoon. The victory marked the Tribe's first shutout since blanking Liberty, 56-0, in 2005.

With the win, W&M improves to 8-1 and equals the program's best mark through nine games since 1986.

W&M nearly doubled Towson's total yardage, outgaining the Tigers 396-201. Entering the game as the nation's top-ranked defense against the run, the Tribe posted another impressive showing by allowing just 72 yards on the ground.

Senior quarterback R.J. Archer threw for 206 yards accounted for two touchdowns – one through the air and one on the ground – while sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for a game-high 91 rushing yards and a touchdown.

After holding TU to a three-and-out on its opening possession of the contest, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when senior place-kicker Brian Pate kicked a 39-yard field goal.

The Tribe increased its lead to 10-0 when Archer scored on an 8-yard quarterback keeper that capped off a 18-play, 68-yard drive with 10:29 remaining in the second quarter.

A 2-yard touchdown run by Grimes with 3:13 left in the opening half pushed the margin to 17-0. Grimes' score punctuated W&M's longest scoring drive of the season, which covered 92 yards in eight plays.

The College added another score when Robertson hauled in a 25-yard touchdown, the first of his career, with 4:16 re-remaining in the third quarter.

Towson's lone trip into the Red Zone came midway through the fourth quarter and was stopped when Wells intercepted Tommy Chroniger at the W&M 2-yard line.

Sophomore quarterback Terrance Schmand engineered the Tribe's final scoring drive, which covered 83 yards on 11 plays and ended with a 2-yard scamper by Marriner on a fourth-and-goal. It was the College's third touchdown drive of the afternoon that covered more than 80 yards.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (11/14/09) -- Senior placekicker Brian Pate kicked a go-ahead 37-yard field goal from the left hash with 2:54 remaining to help lift No. 4/5 William and Mary to a 20-17 victory against No. 7/8 New Hampshire on Senior Day at Zable Stadium. With the victory, W&M improves to 9-1 and now owns the program's best record through 10 games since the 1947 season.

The College's defensive unit posted another outstanding performance and limited the Wildcats to just 226 yards of total offense, 147 fewer than its average entering the contest. Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes totaled a game-high 136 yards rushing.

After forcing a three-and-out on UNH's opening possession, W&M got on the scoreboard first when Pate made a 32-yard field goal from the right hash midway through the opening quarter.

New Hampshire answered with a touchdown on its next drive when quarterback R.J. Toman connected with tight end Scott Sicko on a 13-yard strike, while Tom Manning made a 42-yard field goal late in the quarter to give the Wildcats a 10-3 advantage.

W&M quickly answered with its first touchdown of the afternoon on its ensuing drive to knot the score at 10-10. Mar-riner provided the tying score, his seventh rushing touchdown this season, on a 5-yard rush up the middle.

After an interception by Lissemore, his second this season, gave the Tribe great starting field position at the UNH 16, Hill pulled down a leaping, 10-yard touchdown reception on the left edge of the end zone to put W&M ahead, 17-10, with 6:33 left in the third quarter.

Facing a fourth-and-seven at the Tribe's 35 midway through the fourth quarter, Toman completed a short pass to Joey Orlando, who picked up a key block and raced down the Wildcats' side line for the tying score.

After Pate's go-ahead field goal with 2:54 showing, the Tribe's defense did not allow another UNH first down. The Wildcats managed just 2 yards on its first three plays, and junior defensive tackle Mike Stover broke up Toman's fourth down pass near the line of scrimmage.

RICHMOND, Va. (11/21/09) -- Richmond place-kicker Andrew Howard kicked a 48-yard field goal as time expired to give the fourth-ranked Spiders a 13-10 victory against fifth-ranked William and Mary before a crowd of 17,527 at Richmond Stadium in both teams' regular-season finale.

W&M outgained UR, 274-239, and limited the Spiders to just 18 rushing yards on 27 carries (0.7 yards per rush). With the effort, the College has outgained all 11 of its opponents this season.

Junior wideout Cam Dohse totaled a career-high 130 receiving yards and hauled in a 60-yard touchdown catch, while senior defensive tackle Sean Lissemore equaled a career high with 10 tackles.

After both teams punted on their opening possessions, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when senior place-kicker Brian Pate connected on a 20-yard field goal with 5:18 remaining in the opening quarter. The 10-play, 89-yard drive was highlighted by a 49-yard completion deep down the middle to Dohse.

Richmond answered W&M's score on its ensuing drive when place-kicker Andrew Howard kicked a 42-yard field goal from the left hash to tie the count at 3-3 with 14:48 remaining.

Richmond took its first lead of the contest, 10-3, when running back Justin Forte scored on a 4-yard run with 14:16 showing in the fourth quarter. The touchdown capped off a short drive that covered just 30 yards, as UR took good starting field position after W&M was forced to punt out of its own end zone.

W&M answered moments later when Archer connected with Dohse on a 60-yard touchdown strike over the middle to tie the score at 10-10 with 12:09 remaining. The catch was the longest of Dohse's career.

After Steinman made a diving interception in front of the W&M sideline at UR's 32 with 5:44 left, the Tribe put itself in position to take the lead. However, a holding penalty stalled the drive, and Pate's 52-yard field goal attempt into the wind came up short.

The Tribe drove to UR's 39 in the final minute, but Justin Rogers intercepted Archer at the 36 and returned it to the UR 47 with 14 seconds remaining. Richmond quarterback Eric Ward then completed an 18-yard pass to Tre Gray and a 4-yard pass to Kevin Grayson to set up Howard's game-winning kick.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (11/28/09) -- Sophomore linebacker Jake Trantin and redshirt freshman cornerback B.W. Webb returned a pair of first-half interceptions for touchdowns to help the sixth-ranked William and Mary football team defeat No. 15/18 Weber State, 38-0, in the opening round of the NCAA Playoffs at Zable Stadium. With the win, W&M advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals for the fourth time in school history and will play at Southern Illinois.

The victory secured the program's fourth 10-win season and extended its winning streak against non-conference FCS schools to 16 games. Additionally, the triumph marked head coach Jimmie Laycock's 199th career win.

En route to posting its second shutout of the season, the College's (10-2) defense registered a season-high four interceptions and limited Weber State (7-5) to just 161 yards of total offense. The Wildcats entered the contest with one of the nation's top-ranked offensive units and was averaging more than 30 points per game and 420 yards of total offense per game. Additionally, W&M held WSU to -6 yards rushing, which marked the third time this season that the Tribe has held an opponent to negative yards rushing.

Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes set a W&M playoff record with 139 rushing yards, as he became the 12th player in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

Trantin and Webb returned interceptions for 60 and 58 yards, respectively, in the second quarter (Webb's coming with just 0:12 left in the half), while senior place-kicker Brian Pate kicked a 27-yard field goal to give the Tribe a 17-0 lead at halftime.

W&M extended its advantage to 24-0 with a 10-play, 73-yard touchdown drive to open the second half that ended with a 1-yard QB sneak by senior quarterback R.J. Archer.

Archer's second rushing touchdown of the afternoon, a 6-yard scamper with 4:21 remaining, pushed the lead to 31-0.

Following a Weber State fumble deep in W&M territory, junior running back Terrence Riggins provided the final score of the afternoon with a 23-yard touchdown run with 3:01 left.

W&M allowed just 20 yards of total offense in the second half.

CARBONDALE, III. (12/5/09) -- Sophomore running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for three touchdowns as the No. 6 William and Mary football team earned a 24-3 victory at No. 1/2 Southern Illinois in the NCAA Quarterfinals on Dec. 5. In addition to advancing W&M to the NCAA Semifinals for the second time in the last six years, the win was also significant in that it was the 200th of head coach Jimmie Laycock's career. He becomes just the 13th head coach in FCS history to accomplish the feat.

W&M's victory snapped the top-ranked Salukis' 11-game winning streak and improved the Tribe's mark to 11-2, as it equals a school record for most wins in a season with the 2004 team that also advanced to the NCAA Semifinals.

Although the Tribe was outgained 102-2 and trailed 3-0 after the first quarter, it posted a dominant performance in the final three quarters -- outscoring SIU, 24-0, and outgaining it, 371-85. Southern Illinois (11-2) entered the contest with one of the nation's top offenses and was averaging 36.6 points per game and 412 yards of total offense per game.

Individually, All-American senior defensive end Adrian Tracy and senior place-kicker Brian Pate both etched their names in the Tribe's single-season record book. Tracy earned his 12th sack of the season and equaled Luke Cullinane's mark established in 1996, while Pate kicked his 21st field goal of the season and equaled the mark set by Steve Christie in 1989.

In addition to rushing for three touchdowns, Grimes piled up 133 yards on the ground as he eclipsed the 130-yard mark for the second straight week.

The Salukis' lone points of the day came on a 46-yard field goal by place-kicker Kyle Dougherty on the contest's opening drive.

W&M answered with a 36-yard field goal by Pate and a 6-yard run touchdown run by Grime in the second quarter.

Grimes later found the end zone again with a 7-yard run late in the third quarter and a 5-yard run with less than two minutes remaining in the contest.

VILLANOVA, Pa. (12/11/09) -- The sixth-ranked William and Mary football team concluded one of the best seasons in the program's 115-year history with a 14-13 loss at No. 2/3 Villanova in the NCAA Semifinals on Dec. 11.

Despite the loss, W&M finished the season with an 11-3 mark, which equals the school record for victories established in 2004. Additionally, the squad set school records for fewest points allowed per contest (since going to an 11-game schedule) (12.1 ppg), fewest rushing yards allowed per game (61.1), most sacks (49) and most tackles for a loss (112).

As it did against all 14 opponents this season, the Tribe outgained Villanova, 336-267. Individually, junior wide receiver Cam Dohse finished with a five catches for a career-high 148 yards, which included a school and NCAA Playoff record 98-yard touchdown reception from senior quarterback R.J. Archer.

While neither team was able to generate much offense in the first quarter, the Tribe got on the scoreboard first when Dohse hauled in an NCAA playoff-record 98-yard touchdown reception down the left sideline with 10:45 showing in the second quarter.

W&M tacked on another score when senior place-kicker Brian Pate made a career-long 46-yard field goal as the first half clock expired to give the Tribe a 10-0 advantage.

Villanova narrowed the margin to 10-7 on its second offensive possession of the second half when wide receiver Matt Szczur took a direct snap from center and raced 62 yards for a touchdown with 9:03 remaining in the third quarter.

W&M answered on its ensuing possession with a 15-play, 55-yard drive that culminated with a 40-yard field goal from the right hash by Pate with 2:13 showing in the third quarter.

Villanova responded with a touchdown on the following drive to go ahead, 14-13, when quarterback Chris Whitney scored on rush from a less than a yard out with 10:57 remaining. Szczur helped set up the score with a 9-yard run on a fake punt near midfield to keep the drive alive.

While the Tribe had two more possessions down the stretch, it was unable to generate any first downs.

Still trailing by one with 2:40 remaining, the Tribe had a chance to gain more possession but VU converted a fourth-and-less-than-one from the W&M 14 and was able to run out the clock.

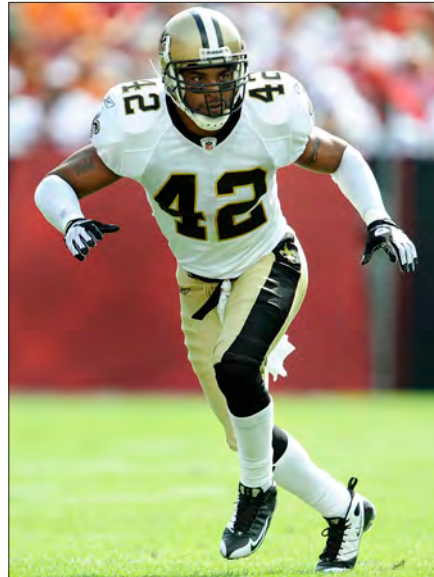

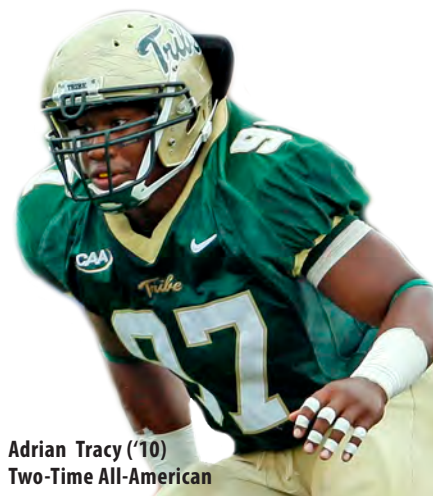

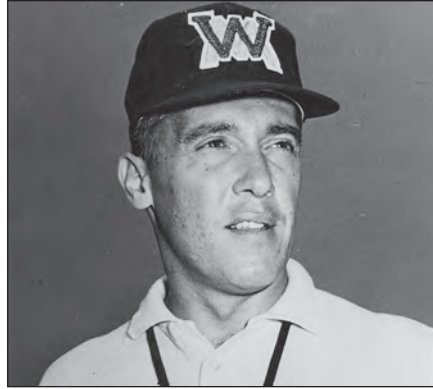
