MEDICAL CERTIFICATE TO RETIRE INVALID OFFICER.

[Under Act of Congress, approved February 17th, 1864.]

Capt. J. M. Adams Co. G, of the 18th Inf. Regt. of Humphreys
Brigade, having appeared before the Board for examination, we do hereby certify — that he is permanently

[Here state whether the officer is permanently disabled and cannot perform duty in any branch of the military service, with a full description of the wound, injury or disease, and the disabling effects, and that it was received or contracted in the service of the Confederate States, in the line of duty. If it is a re-examination, made at periodically, state such fact. If the invalid, being disabled for service in the field, is fit for other service, recommend him accordingly. Should an invalid retired overcome the disability, recommend him for such duty as he can perform.]
