

Washington Dec 10th 61

Nothing special happened to day
we discharged camp duties as usual
Dec 12th I was on sentry duty to day
and night I cant see two of the sentry
mals fast asleep and waked them up
and and and cautioned them to
tend to their bus of I would report
them and not risk my off of my
post to wake them up

Dec 13th I wrote a letter this fore noon
and drilled this after noon there
was a large balloon passed over
our camp yesterday It was quite
a sight Dec 14th we drilled as
usual to day and I went on dress
parade at night and after that was
over I read two or three chapter in
my bible and went out to roll
call at half past eight and then
went to bed with my comrads
viz orderly sargent John Ellis & W E [unclear]

as four occupy one tent Dec 18th
To day is the sabbath I hear bad
news this pleasant morning one
of our comrads has passed over
the river of death during the night
he was at the city hospital and
was discharged from there to go
to his camp he came in last night
^{on foot} and went to our hospital and died
during the night I have seen his
to see the corpse I was the relact of
the measles that ailed him Brotha
Steaver preached to us today his
text was the first verse of the
Lord prays Our Father his sermon
affected the worst of the soldiers
very much last night after reading
a chapter or two in my bible we had a
sort of bible class in our tent after
that was over I took a stroll around
camp the moon and stars seemed
just as they used to at home but

the landscape was very much different
nothing but pitch pine trees and tents to
be seen Dec 16 I have been strutting
around camp with a new carbine hung
to my back I was put on guard to
day but taking advantage of a good
chance I got clear of the duty

Dec 16th 1861

Dear Brother

I received your and
Eunice's and Loviak letters Friday eve
it is not necessary to tell you how
glad I was to receive some good news
from home I wish I had known that
Mr Williams came to Washington I have
liked to have seen him Will you tell me
what regiment Edwin belongs to and
name of captain I have seen Joseph
Stafford and Fletcher Baxter they
are down to front Washington tell Eunice
that I paid Hammie Hart a visit
the other evening her husband is sick

my self most small now
my mind is not so very bad and
now more than ever you young

with the measles I got a letter
from Sister Daphne last saturday
she said that they were all well
she said that they had a cow and
cat but no baby Anna wrote that
also went after my clothes but they
were not there I put them into a box
with the other boys satchels and sent
the box to Mr Dowd the merchant in
Randolph I had two satchels died to
gather and directed to C D Churchill
Keeney and I put into the box a
oil cloth cape ~~so~~ rolled with a string
tied round it and a paper under the string
requesting Mr Dowd to put them into my
satchels and forward them to Keeney
there was in the roll a gun lock that
I ~~had~~ picked up in the guard house
in Albany the gun it come off of was
all stove to pieces the lock is a good one
they are not to Keeney you will have
to go to Randolph after them I do not
want to lose them
