Dear father

It has been a long time since I have heard from you. I have written three letters home that I have not heard from. Albro's letter is the only one that I have got from home since I got my pay and I feel a little uneasy about it for I sent some money to Charlie and I think I ought to have heard from it two weeks ago. I sent it to Mr. Dow at East Randolph. It was sent with the rest of the company. It was in an envelope and directed to Charlie. There was thirty seven dollars and one half. The seven dollars and half was gold. The other boys heard from theirs in five days after they sent it. If you have not got it I should be glad to have you go and get it.

I don't know but you might not
have got my letters if you have you should
have written to me and let me know it

We have received glorious
news to day that is the capture of
fort Donelson and 15 thousand prisoners
you have probably heard of it ere this.
Joseph Bonner was in our camp I
was quite surprised to see him here in
day the boys are so elated on account
of the news that they are firing their
revolvers and Barbies artillery is firing
and other big guns at the forts the bands
are playing in all directions the I can
hear the boys cheering from many
regiments it is half past seven P.M
the regiments of infantry are paraded
and firing their pieces if we get
the countersign I will go over to their

comps and see their fun

matter Mr. Wallerman came to
should our camp yesterday he knew me but
I did not know him we had a tip
top visit he stayed took dinner with
us he is an orderly sergeant one of
the Pa regiments of infantry they have
orders to march to Alaxndia to day they
have had rather a wet day for it

I am getting pretty expert in
the use of my right hand I think
that I keep up with my comads in the
use of the sabre we have the name of being
the best drilled regiment in the brigade.
I got a letter from Miss Silas last
week I have not time to write much
more give my respects to mother I think
that she is one of the best of women you
may kiss little Gizzie for me I often think
of her tell Albo to take care of my
things until I come home I am well

and harty as a buck I weigh
two hundred and twenty seven pounds
I never felt any better in my life
when you write please let me know
whether Charlie is at home or not
if he is not give me his post office address
I will write to Nathan soon tell
Cure to write and let me know how
she enjoys the Union give my best regards
to all and believe me to be your
affectionate and dutiful son
