of our men came on
this morning - It is thought
we will send for Thomas &

I was sent over to Maryland
to day to take arms - a great

many arms were taken
from the buildings the night
of the explosion - They have
been found scattered in
their houses.

There are so many reports
from abroad that no reliance
can be placed in any -
Some very contradictory
Charles Canherd is the Commissary
for our Company.

Cons. Rott. Simpkins is here
with his company Benton Ray
is among them - Genl. Cochrane
is the Genl. of one Brigade
our men all appear to be in
fine spirits.

There are many living here
who sympathize with Lincoln
he can occasionally hear them
as far as sympathy is concerned
I would as soon be in Pitts-^{burg}

My quarters are full
nothing but grease from
the working of machinery
Two buildings were burnt
you can see the arms
ruined and in heaps.

I expect to send some one
home in a few days - I wish
my over coat was at home
and I had my shawl in
place - Cons. Rott is
stationed in the Mountains
above the river.

Clark missed a letter from
his wife to day, tell her not to
write such affectionate letters
for fear it will make him
epitised - I am writing in
Dr. Clagett's Office - Don't be
uneasy - Our Superior Officers
are very indifferent very little
or discipline
