

Oak Hill. London. June 27th. 1829.
Saturday. P.M.

My dear Sir,

Inclosed is the key required by your letter of the 25th inst. -; a letter which tho' manifestly written to M^{rs}. H. is addressed to Hortensia.

M^{rs}. H. desires me to tell you, that she has neither time, nor capacity ^{to write} at this moment. In my late letter I mentioned that M^{rs}. M. was, I thought, declining visibly. She is now much worse than when you left her! The Doctor was here yesterday morning, and again last night - all night. A messenger has been just now despatched for him, as well as for Dr. Brockus of Aldie. - My anticipations are of the most distressing kind.

This letter cannot leave Aldie until Monday. I shall therefore keep it open, for the purpose of communicating further intelligence
