

Philadelphia 8 August 1786

Dear Sir,

I am very sorry that my necessary Detention at this Place deprives me of the Pleasure I should have felt in Meeting you at New York. Baron Stuedin delivered your Letter the Day after his Arrival and I intend troubling him with this in Reply. I had not Mr Tudor's Papers. These were (I mean the important ones) put into the Hands of Mr Soll whether taken back or not I cannot tell. His Son the present Secretary of the State will be able to inform you whether they were among the old Gentleman's Papers but the Confusions inseparable from that ambulatory Situation which the War placed every Man in who was a Clergy of New York may render it difficult to discover them. It is not improbable that some of Mr Tudor's Papers may have been placed in my Mother's Care
