But the Small Pox raging, most at that time, rendered it impossible to get a letter conveyed to the Post office in Richmond. Thus you see I have been obliged to defer thanking you, for your excessive kindness.

I enclose a letter, containing all the information I have gained, concerning my Fathers Affairs.

My anxiety, was extreme to visit you, my dear Sir, and my amiable friend M^{rs} T. before my return hither. but it was impracticable present my warmest regards to her, Fanny, and the Children. my good wishes await Fanny, Carrie
