Should my dearest M<sup>r</sup> Tucker be kind enough to gratify me with a few lines at any time, he may direct to "Sandy Ford, near Farmville" - it is quite impossible for me to relinquish the satisfaction of scribbling to you - my memory shall prove most tenacious of the solemn vow, never again to impart a painful occurrence to you - Quik, will be attainable in my new abode, and I require nothing else -
