I do.

M^r M. of Wilton sent his carriage
to Richmond for me the day on which Bee-
was expected - my not seeing him was a sad

dear good M^{rs} Tucker has regained her health
Offer much love to her - sweet Polly - Harry, and
Hodjahn Meade - not forgetting W^m Archer -
I am never unreminded of our dear Henry tho -
fate has so long separated me from him -

compared with the personal abuse poured forth

at dear Bizarre - I feel no self condemnation
on that score - indeed. The efforts I uniformly
made there, to obtain approbation, were far
