There was, certainly, vast impropriety in my application to you - I thank you for not expressing the condemnation it deserved - Be kind enough to forward the enclosed - I beg you will pardon those two scrawls, a distracting dilemma forced them from me - I could not sustain the prospect of being buried at the expense of persons strongly prejudiced against me - Mr. D. M. - my sister - resided here at the time her enmity to me knew no bounds - That single circumstance (not as it regards myself) makes me rejoice at having come here - I shall ^{not} remain long - no person except Lucy will ever know where I am -

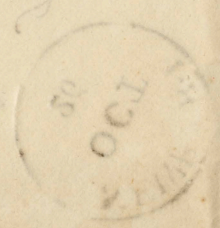
