After I left them there was nothing too bad for Tudor to say against me in New York - Falsehoods of the blackest die - he said he saw me shake my Orel in a garrison

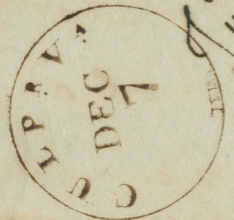

now, my dear Sir, I never forgot though
