Dear Sir

Accept my thanks for your letter of the 15<sup>th</sup>.  
The style of M<sup>r</sup> Randolphs letter confuted its contents.  
not to mention its Contradictions, for he who as a friend.  
Conveys information to a husband should speak in simple  
and gentle terms the asperity of M<sup>r</sup> Randolphs language  
exhibits motives different from his professions, what  
excitement he had I know not; but Cause he had none  
unless it was the torment of pride wounded at the kindness  
of her whom he had treated unkindly. Those who have  
more malice than Reason take part of course with him while  
Considerate people thought it more wise as well as more  
Charitable to wait the Reception his stories met with where  
the scene was laid and especially among the members of
