I think of you and your good wife daily & hourly, also of your charming Polly — It appears to me impossible to sustain my fatigues and wrongs much longer I gave up my annuity to secure my child's future comfort — The agreement with Mr Hamilton does not bind the estate at all it falls on me — and it has been suggested that my life estate in this place might be sold — then, I should be penniless — This has been Mr Kent's contrivance to please my husband's relations — I will not proceed in this detail — Randolph's course with regard to Dover gave me so much labour that my health sunk entirely

To the last thro' of life I shall remember you and yours with fond and grateful affection
