

Washington Jan. 8th 1824.

Dear Sir

The Editors of News papers publish what they please. Had any change been made, in my family, you should certainly have heard of it, none was ever thought of. The Editors seeing that messages were delivered, by a person, not a clerk in one of the offices, concluded as I presume that the term secretary was applicable to him, & called him by that name. As I wrote you lately to Miller expressing my hope that you would soon be on, I think it probable that you are now on the road.
