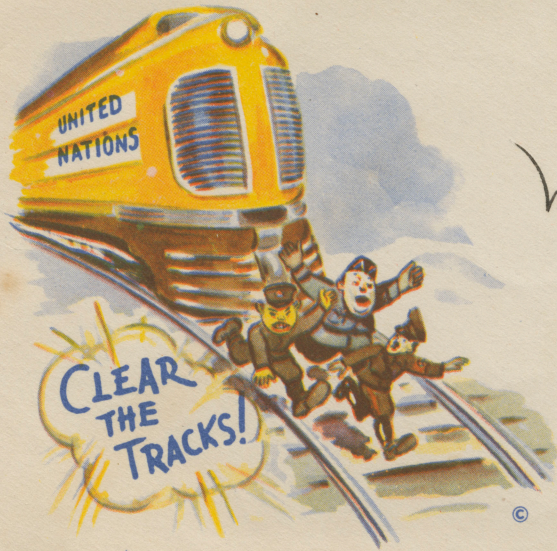
I'll be home Saturday for sure even if I have to get a five o'clock train out of N.Y.C. Darling I long for you so. Some times I just can't bear it
