Paris Febry. 1. 1795.

Dear Sir

I have lately been favored with yours of the  
last. you have no doubt long since rec'd  
two or three of mine & apprising you of our arri-  
val and whatever else happened to us as well as the  
publick on this theatre up to this respective date. The  
sum of what has since followed may be compriſed  
in a small space. Within the last week the French  
have actually taken Arnhem & the whole of the  
provinces of Holland with the fort of Brada. Marne  
op-y-yoom &c &c and Horaton the native conquest of  
the whole of the 7. provinces. The Stadholder with  
his family made his escape & whether is unknown  
but presumed either to Engl<sup>d</sup>. or Russia. Before  
this last event a minister had advised from the  
States genl. who had offered great sums, the fort  
the flat &c, but he was uninterested & the money re-  
ferred to Adrann. No extent & details of the acquisi-  
tion are not fully known us yet, nor is it known  
how his country will be considered, but I am  
inclined to think that the French will ostentatiously  
leave them to arrange their own affs. (intend-  
ing absolutely ultimately so to do) but confide  
only in the patriotic & heroic Meodley favor of  
put a revolution. Engl<sup>d</sup>. will most sensibly feel this

went: indeed I suspect it is but the commencement of her misfortunes, for it is certainly the intention of France to crush her if possible. Nor will this be avoidable if the other powers are detached & the Holland fleet taken. Within a few days a minister Baron Stahl arrived from Sweden, and a latent laelite from Russia, & this said that Baron Goly from Prussia is on the way so that these powers want no invitation / the Russian it is pronounced common behalf of the Emperor to abandon us. The eyes of the world are cast upon her & her fate is deemed almost inevitable and yet none pity her. In my next I shall be able to give more comprehensive details.

In other respects the affairs of the republick flourish much. The people are contented, of which the best proof in this city, has lately been shown, by the patience with which they have borne the severest winter known for many years past, altho' there was the most popular provision made for such incident. The publick councils are it is true sometimes somewhat animated, & now and then the head of a capital offender is taken off as was lately done of Latorier, the infamous representative at Nantes. but yet no dangerous reverations from this source. with respect to our own affairs they may be said to be in a good footing. They have actually agreed to execute the treaty of commerce whereby our flag will protect enemy's goods. Some uncleanness is instanced upon the subject of Jay;

treaty but it is hoped when it is seen it will appear that there is no cause for it: after which every thing will be right again.

I transmit by this opportunity to Mr. Mendolphi the order for 3000 dols. it was intended I should receive here. It was detained to be committed to the minister w<sup>t</sup> to depart but his delay continuing I have forwarded to Washington to be sent by some safe path. - I have desired this money to be paid to you. - I am extremely glad to hear that you have purchased certain land. You will of course apply this sum in that & other particulars according to yr. own judgment & knowledge of my affairs. I suspect you will not be able to apply any to the claims of Virg<sup>a</sup> officers, tho' certainly the profit would be immense, for as a surveyd land there will soon rise greatly - supposing what you have any idea of. and as with respect to my brothers I can add nothing, wishing you to do for them what you can within the limits and according to what I have heretofore intimated: as likewise my sister - Joseph is well and since my last his conduct has been much improved. He begins to understand the French which is a prerequisite to every thing. He has grown very perceptible & seems inclined to coope-
