Dear May: Still here but waiting. Cverything is packed and all we need is the command. I had no trouble packingup, as each squad was given a surplus bag. I hat is, a good sized canvas boy, in which soup, tobacco, and other small articles may be carried. I put some of my knitted goods into it, also some soup soup and trilit articles uncle Cd gave me, and for which I want you to thank him very much, as I hardly think I shall get a chance to write today. We were very busy this morning, facking up, and getting ready for inspection. Now chowis over, and all we have to do is wait. Now for some secret rife. Somebody, Ithing it must have been mily I, passed a little package to me just as I was getting into the

train, last Tuesday enening and when I opened it found an an pillow What do you known about that. It came in very hardy on the train, and moreso, in the larracks. It was a curiout, here at camp. It sind out who gave it to me, but don't let the Nangles know about it as youth sent me one, and I wrote to here thinking hereas if I had not received the first one. Also, if Commy sent or gave me the first one keep the second me dark. Let me? I got up to see the Alynna, Friday eve. Ul hings are not running very smothly there, either. Mr. 4 lynn is sich in the hospital, and Mrs thymn does not look very well. Reggy has been very sick, but is all better now. I beg seemed think that they were drawing all the trouble to themselves, so without complaining, or boasting, I let them understand that you people of 91, were getting your shore all right. They don't think they will go to W.T. this summer, Say this old war is going rais the dence

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with about everything. I guess. I am O.T., in that Pass matter, and the fellows with me, only got a little barracks duty, which they might have got anyway. I got nothing. So you see, even if I hadn't wired, it would not have been considered a serious offence. Our Leut, is pretty considerate, Il say. He was in the ranks himself, about six months ago, at Yelly Fielf. How did those snapshots come out? Wish you would send me a set. We we are almost certain to pull out of here tonight or early in the morning, we may be here, for a couple of days. Is rush them along to the same old - abdress, (alove) if we've gone, they well follow. the rest bout, so you see I will save time, by serding them now.

If we leave tright, we go on the former Haiser Wilhelm II. Dasin by boat, next to the tatherland, I guess. The latter does not leave for a week or so yet, but I don't guess we'll wait for it. Hope not, anyway, as it is too much bother prching up etc. May I think I'll gut now, as there is one more stort note I'd like to getout. I rusting that you will remember me very kindly to Junt mily + back cd, alfthe Jenneys and the Jangles, and other people who might case to know. With lats of love to mother, dad, is and yourself, Iremain, Very Sincerely, for own little brother Yechard. Of course, when once we get on board, there will no chance to write, I mean mail letters till we get over An a while, good bye, and best wishes, and blessings be with you all.
