My dear Mother:

A rainy day, so we have no work to do. It has been very damp and cold, for the past few days, and last night it blew very hard. This morning, it started to rain, and we had quite a shower. But now the sun is out, and I think that the disagreeable weather is over. As I have said before, there is no news. We are still living in tents, and have not yet been paid. Oh! this is a grand and glorious feeling, "being broke". Does anyone ever write any more letters? Have not received any mail at all, yet, but I hope to get a lot, one of these days.

We are not located near any large cities, but there is a small one, about 5 miles from camp, and



as the only means of transportation,  
is by foot, I have not been there.  
The smaller villages, nearer camp,  
suffice me.

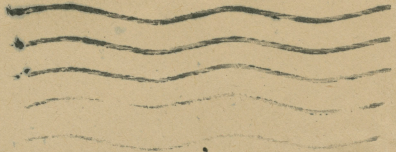
I can't think of anything else
