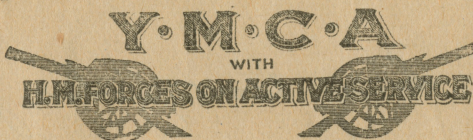

Dear Dad:

Tonight I am very tired, and in no condition to write a lengthy letter, but, I thought that you would like a word or two anyway. Yesterday, (the fourth) was a holiday, and as usual, Whit and I spent the day "on the road." We left camp at 8³⁰ A.M. and returned at 9³⁰ P.M. The "night before" was spent in a very appropriate manner. We had some time. Will tell about that later. We got up at 6⁴⁵, on the "fourth" and had a flag raising, in our end of the

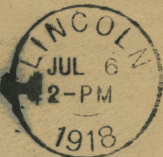
camp. Three tent poles, joined,
gave us a flagpole, about twenty
five or thirty feet high, with
ropes from the mess tent, as guy
lines, and halyards. Some time!
About a week ago we did about
thirty miles in an^{the} afternoon
and evening. We see quite a bit
of the country, in this manner,
and have some unique experiences.
Well guess I'll go to bed now as I
have to get up at 3.45
