like to hear from you.

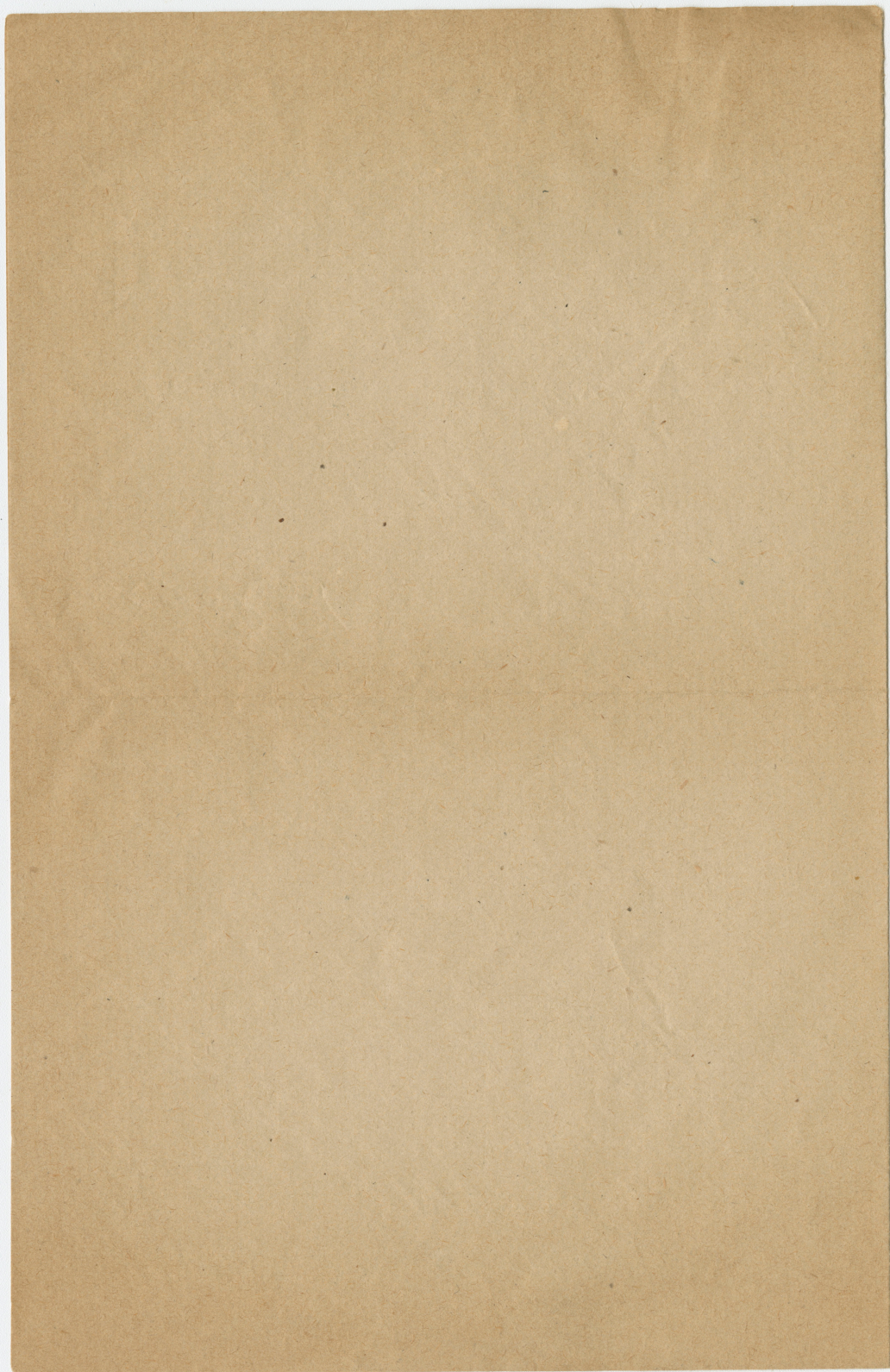
