

Oak Hill Oct 18th 1821

Dear Sir

I have been very much concerned to hear of your long continued & serious indisposition & that of Mrs Crawford and your children, but was relieved greatly by your late letter which assured me that you were convalescent, all of you, & that your own health particularly was much improved. Many interesting concerns require my attendance at Washington, & in consequence I have resolved to go down the day after to morrow, when I hope to find you & family, rapidly improving, which the increased cold in the temperature of the air, will I think spontaneously favor. Mrs Moore & I have enjoyed good health, through the summer, tho' we have not escaped

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a very severe affliction in the loss of one
of our 2 children, & have also been me-
raced, with that of the other, tho' we thank
heaven, we have heard to day from her that
that she is thought out of danger. As I shall
be with you to soon, I shall add at pre-
sent, only, the assurance of my best wishes
& warm regard.
