I received through my friend Miss Wanees, the Photograph of yourself & you note accompanying it - I extend it no slight mark of your regard for a wish expressed by me - almost unknown to you - And feel no doubt in laying me under so much obligations you are not unfamiliar altogether, of the memoirs it nice & rare - The recollections of the past, when even I venture to advert to them - & turn over their sacred pages - reveals to my eye no name more often mentioned, and with more lively admiration than your own - In the year 62 (my ~~to~~ son) then only ^{you} seventeen of age attached himself to your ~~own~~ Brigade as a member of the 3^d Regt, during

College recess of that year, he
packed his trunk with his
usual outfit for Chapel Hill
where he was pursuing his
collegiate course - His first
letter, rather long, coming after
leaving us - instead of being
dated at "Chapel Hill" - was
dated Camps below Richmond
His course was piped. The same
same fire that had all the while
burned in his ^{spirit} bosom for his
Country's service & success,
now culminated in a flame of
enthusiasm that never abated to
the last - The invincibility of
Lee's Army - & still more of your
noble Old Brigade - continued
to form the burden ^{many} of ^{many} his
letters - & it was his pride &
boast that it had never
known defeat - either on the
soil of Va. - Geor. or Lee - In
threading the lines of the sand

missions alluded to. I can
sometimes imagine the many
degrees that your high position
placed you above the common
the noble soldier of your cause
removed, - & you has like him
admitted to the families, &
friendly teachings of one whom
they were accustomed to regard
with fatherly consideration.
For he from ~~you~~ his peculiar
ten of mind found pleasure in
interview ^{with the men} of mature years his
youth, & the time at which he
entered the service - precluded
any professed hope of
preference. - & Capt through hard
fighting & gallant soldierly
bearing - How he discharged

and on the morning of the Battle of
Cedar Creek, when the gallant
attack of your old Brigade, in

way in quick succession - &
the enemy fled like chaff
before the wind - at sunrise
that morning in marching on
the second line of breastworks, &
as those nearest to him - informed us
he met, line of bayonets in advance

put an end to the youthful soldier's
career - Here my heart like that of
thousand of mothers of the land
ceases its fluctuations between hope
and fear - & still when I turn to
those sacred sad miseries of
love, & affection - in the hope of
something to console a saddened
thrill only - puts an end to what
I seek in vain - The undying grief
of a mother's love & broken heart is
the excuse I have to offer for this
long & tedious letter - thousands
& thousands - of your countrymen &
women bear living testimony - to your
noble ^{gallant} conduct as a soldier - and
officer - & a gentleman - & it is to
be hoped that history will
make a truthful record of your
and dear life & deeds

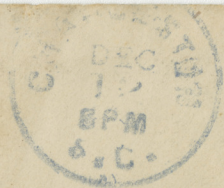
